RELATIVE TO REQUESTING Ι **MAGA'HĂGAN GUÅHAN** TO **ESTABLISH** THE **TOURIST** ATTRACTIONS RESCUE **PLAN** (TARP) PROVIDING AT LEAST \$60 MILLION FROM THE FUNDS RECEIVED THROUGH THE 2020 CARES ACT. THE 2021 AMERICAN RESCUE PLAN, OR OTHER FEDERALLY OR LOCALLY FUNDED PANDEMIC ASSISTANCE PROGRAMS TO ASSIST BUSINESS ENTITIES IN THE TOURISM INDUSTRY WHO HAVE BEEN SEVERELY **IMPACTED** AND SUFFERED TREMENDOUSLY **BECAUSE OF** THE COVID-19 PANDEMIC.

- 1 BE IT RESOLVED BY I MINA'TRENTAI SAIS NA LIHESLATURAN
- 2 GUÅHAN:
- 3 WHEREAS on March 20, 2020, I Maga'hågan Guåhan issued Executive Order
- 4 2020-04, Relative to responding to confirmed cases of Novel Coronavirus (COVID-
- 5 19) that placed restriction on movement, social interaction, and business activity;
- 6 and,

- 1 WHEREAS with Executive Order 2020-04, entry into Guam was restricted to
- 2 travelers who possessed a Department of Public Health and Social Services
- 3 recognized and certified document attesting they are not infected with COVID-19;
- 4 and,
- 5 WHEREAS because countries (Japan, South Korea, Philippines, Taiwan) Guam has
- 6 identified as source tourism markets were too dealing with the devastating effects of
- 7 COVID-19, tourist travels from these countries came to a halt; and,
- 8 WHEREAS in Fiscal Year 2019 and prior to the pandemic, the number of tourists
- 9 who visited Guam was 1,631,049. However, the arrivals drastically declined since
- then to a reported 46,670 visitors for Fiscal Year 2021 (up to July), a 93.8% decrease
- 11 in tourists; and,
- 12 WHEREAS the tourism industry makes up about 60% of Guam's economy,
- employing over 20,000 of our island's residents; and,
- 14 WHEREAS businesses and employees that make up our tourism industry were the
- 15 most affected by COVID-19. There were more layoffs and more business closures
- in the visitor industry than in any other industry in 2020 and 2021.
- 17 WHEREAS the tourism industry can be separated into four distinct components;
- 18 Travel (agent, website, and airlines), Hotel, Restaurant, and Attraction
- 19 (transportation, attractions, and retail sales); and,
- 20 WHEREAS the travel and restaurant components have received specific federal
- 21 disaster funding assistance through the CARES Act and the American Rescue Plan;
- 22 and,
- 23 WHEREAS most hotels are part of major conglomerates under foreign ownerships
- 24 that have managed to endure the financial stress of the pandemic through
- 25 government funded quarantine and military exercise accommodations; and,
- 26 WHEREAS while Guam's tourist transportation services, attraction venues, and
- 27 retail stores have been able to receive assistance through pandemic assistance

- 1 programs such as the Payroll Protection Program (PPP), Economic Injury Disaster
- 2 Loan (EIDL), and the Guam Economic Development Authority's Small Business
- 3 Pandemic Assistance, and their employees were availed the assistance through
- 4 programs such as the Pandemic Unemployment Assistance (PUA), Supplemental
- 5 Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), and the ALL RISE Act, these programs only
- 6 provide short-term relief that have since or will soon expire; and,
- 7 WHEREAS it had not nor could have been anticipated that the pandemic conditions
- 8 would continue past the timeframe it was originally thought to be able to recover
- 9 and regain a sense of normalcy; and,
- 10 WHEREAS Guam's tourist attraction venues, transportation services, and retail
- outlets are vital components to attracting tourists to our island and entertaining the
- 12 expected amount of military personnel to be stationed or temporarily deployed here
- because of the military buildup; and,
- 14 WHEREAS the businesses comprising the attraction component of Guam's tourism
- industry lost up to 90% of their revenue in 2020 as compared to 2019, and up to
- 16 100% in 2021; and,
- 17 WHEREAS the Guam Visitors Bureau has asked all components of the industry to
- reopen or remain open to aid in their efforts to revitalize the tourist market on Guam.
- 19 NOW, THEREFORE BE IT:
- 20 RESOLVED, that I Mina'Trentai Sais Na Liheslaturan Guåhan requests, on behalf
- 21 of Guam's tourism industry, I Maga'Hagan Guåhan to consider establishing a
- Tourist Attraction Rescue Plan (TARP) and providing at least \$60 million in funding
- 23 assistance from the 2021 American Rescue Plan, the 2020 CARES Act, or other
- 24 federally or locally funded pandemic assistance funding made available to Guam;
- and, be it further
- 26 RESOLVED that I Mina'Trentai Sais Na Liheslaturan Guåhan encourages I
- 27 Maga'Hagan Guåhan to direct the Guam Visitors Bureau, the Guam Economic

- 1 Development Authority, and any other relevant entity to assist Guam's tourism
- 2 industry to remain open or ready themselves for opening when tourists are allowed
- 3 to visit our island again; and, be it further
- 4 RESOLVED that the Speaker certify, and the Legislative Secretary attest to, the
- 5 adoption hereof, and that copies of the same be transmitted to the Honorable Carl
- 6 T.C. Gutierrez, former Governor and President of the Guam Visitors Bureau, Ms.
- 7 Melanie Mendiola, Administrator of the Guam Economic Development Authority,
- 8 and the Honorable Lourdes A. Leon Guerrero, I Maga'Hågan Guåhan.
