"current and lifetime marijuana use among Guam students are higher than the U.S.

9 WHEREAS, according to the SEOW, the 2019 Youth Risk Behavior Survey 10 documented that, "in 2017, about 36% of high school youth reported they had been 11 offered, sold, or given an illicit drug on school property; about 5.6% of Guam high 12 school students report having tried methamphetamines, and 13% reported using 13 synthetic marijuana"; and

WHEREAS, electronic vapor products, to include e-cigarettes, vapes, vape pens, e-cigars, e-hookahs, hookah pens, and mods, have also become highly popular amongst the youth. According to the 2019 Youth Risk Behavior Survey, 35.2% of Guam high school students and 34.6% of Guam middle school students currently use an electronic vapor product; and data from the U.N. World Health Organization Global Youth Tobacco Survey has indicated that Guam has one of the highest rates of electronic vapor product use among youth; and
