Relative to expressing the utmost support of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* for the passage of H.R. 165, the "Improving Access to Homes for Heroes Act of 2021," which seeks to require the inclusion of veterans in housing planning and an annual report on housing assistance to veterans and for other purposes; and further requesting to advocate for parity and inclusion of veterans residing on Guam and in all United States territories.

- 3 WHEREAS, H.R. 165, known as the "Improving Access to Homes for Heroes
- 4 Act of 2021," as introduced in the United States House of Representatives on January

1 4, 2021 by Texas Representative Congressman Al Green; and referred to the House

2 Committee on Financial Services; and

WHEREAS, H.R. 165, requires housing agencies to consider the housing needs of veterans when creating their annual plans and housing strategies, the latter in consultation with agencies that serve veterans; and in similarity, the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) must revise to require jurisdictions that receive funding from HUD to include information relating to veterans in their consolidated plans; and must also conduct an assessment of the housing needs of very low-income veteran families and report annually on its activities relating to veterans; and

WHEREAS, since 1987, the Homeless Programs Office within the Veterans Health Administration of the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs have contributed to different program and services to addressing homelessness of Veterans and their families by using evidence-based, innovative practices and partnerships that will achieve an outcome that is equitable and inclusive to empower Veterans and in which enables their independence; and

WHEREAS, the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs – Homeless Programs Office are committed to ending homelessness among Veterans and their families in obtaining permanent and sustainable housing with access to high-quality care and supportive services and HPO's best essential practices are focused on the following: conducting coordinated outreach to proactively seek out Veterans in need of assistance; connecting homeless and at-risk Veterans with housing solutions, health care, community employment services and other required supports; collaborating with federal, state and local agencies; employers; housing providers; faith-based and community non-profits; and others to expand employment and affordable housing options for Veterans exiting homelessness; and

WHEREAS, U.S.V.A. Homeless Programs Office's Housing Solutions and Supportive Services helps to put Veterans and their families on the path to permanent housing and decreases the risk of housing instability; and through several collaborative

efforts. The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development – VA Supportive Housing (HUD-VASH), established in 1992, which they provide eligible qualifying

3 homeless Veterans with a housing choice rental voucher and through available

4 collaborative programs, the Veterans Affairs Office also provides case management and

5 supportive services such as healthcare, mental health treatment, and substance use

counseling to help aid in their recovery process and their ability to maintain housing in

the community; and

WHEREAS, the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development – VA Supportive Housing (HUD-VASH) program enroll the largest number and largest percentage of veterans who have experienced long-term or repeated homelessness. HUD-VASH rental assistance vouchers are based on current geographic needs and the public housing agency (PHA) performance; and since 2017, the new allocation process for awarding HUD-VASH rental assistance vouchers allow PHAs to self-identify their interest in the program; and there is at least one (1) PHA currently administering HUD-VASH in each of the fifty (50) states, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico and Guam; and

WHEREAS, the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) publishes an annual HUD-VASH Registration of Interest containing detailed instructions on the process of receiving a portion of rental assistance vouchers. All parties interested in HUD-VASH program must have the support of a partnering VA facility and meet the requirements to be eligible for an award; and once registration period ends, HUD and VA use a formulation to determine eligibility and invite PHAs to apply for specific number of HUD-VASH rental assistance vouchers; and

WHEREAS, at the end of Fiscal Year 2021, over 105,000 subsidized housing vouchers were allocated to HUD-VASH with more than 80,000 formerly homeless veterans living in their own permanent housing; and between 2008 through 2019, Guam's PHA, Guam Housing and Urban Renewal Authority (GHURA), has issued over sixty (60) rental assistance vouchers to local veterans residing on Guam; and in

July 2021, HUD announced the availability of \$49 Million Dollars (\$49,000,000) in 1 HUD-VASH funding that will support approximately 6,000 new housing vouchers; and 2 WHEREAS, the 2020 Annual Homeless Assessment Report (AHAR) submitted 3 to U.S. Congress, reported that on a single night in January 2020, 37,252 veterans were 4 experiencing homelessness in the United States, nearly all veterans were experiencing 5 homelessness as individuals; and for the past three (3) years, the number of veterans 6 experiencing homelessness increased by less than one percent (1%) (167 more people), 7 however, in 2020, 36,115 fewer veterans were experiencing homelessness than in 2009, 8 a decline of nearly 50 percent (50%) when these data were first reported; and 9 WHEREAS, of the total 37,252 homeless veterans; 1.0% (370 veterans) are 10 those of Pacific Islanders, 1.2% (450 veterans) are Asian, 2.9% (1,082 veterans) are of 11 Native American, 32.7% (12,186 veterans) are Black or African American, 56.8% 12 (21,160 veterans) are White, and 5.4% (2,004 veterans) are of multiple races; and 13 WHEREAS, it is the intent of I Liheslaturan Guåhan to seek support for our 14 local Veterans and in all U.S. territories, by requesting the advocacy of the United States 15 Congress to include Guam Veterans and in all United States territories, relative to the 16 housing assistance and planning of veterans in H.R. 165; and with the continued support 17 of local and state Veterans Affairs Offices in partnerships with PHAs can enable 18 homeless veterans and their families to access affordable housing with an array of 19 20 supportive services; and WHEREAS, our island has its fair share of homelessness, while more have 21 become so under various unfortunate circumstances. However, there are some homeless 22 who are heroes. Although Veteran homelessness should not be an issue not enough has 23 been done to help the veterans who have sacrificed their lives for our nation and our 24 island of Guam. While the U.S Department of Veterans Affairs offers services and 25 programs to prevent stateside homeless Veterans, our local Veterans and their families 26 should receive the same necessary services and programs to ensure that homelessness 27 is a rare, shortened and one-time experience; now therefore be it
