- 3 WHEREAS, H.R. 5606, known as the "Return Home to Housing Act," was
- 4 introduced in the United States House of Representatives on October 15, 2021 by

1 Georgia Congresswoman Nikema Williams, and referred to the House Committee on

Veterans' Affairs; and

WHEREAS, the "Return Home to Housing Act," raises the maximum allowable rate that the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs can reimburse to service providers for supplying transitional housing to homeless veterans by ensuring they will be adequately reimbursed for their costs. H.R. 5606 will also help housing providers supply more housing to displaced veterans in need; and

WHEREAS, the Department of Veterans Affairs Secretary authorizes grant funding benefits for homeless veterans, which can assist eligible entities in establishing services and programs by providing outreach, rehabilitative services, vocational counseling, training, and transitional housing assistance to displaced veterans in need. Such grant funding benefits support housing retention for veterans who were previously homeless and are transitioning to permanent housing; and

WHEREAS, the Homeless Providers Grant and Per Diem (GPD) program established in 2010, creates transitional housing programs through awarding grants to fund projects that offer communities a way to provide housing and other services to homeless veterans. Grantees work closely with an assigned liaison who monitors the services the grantees offer to veterans and provide direct assistance. Grants from the GPD program usually consist of a capped per diem payment from Veterans Affairs to community organizations; and

WHEREAS, the proposed legislation would adjust the rate of per diem payments originally from one hundred fifteen percent (115%) to two hundred percent (200%) of the rate authorized for state homes for domiciliary care; and in the case of services furnished to a homeless veteran who is placed in housing that will become permanent

1 housing for the veteran upon termination of the furnishing of such services to such

veteran, the maximum proposed rate of per diem authorized would be adjusted from

one hundred fifty percent (150%) to two hundred percent (200%); and

WHERERAS, the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs – Grant and Per Diem Program (VA-GPD) is offered annually to fund entities providing services to unhoused veterans; to promote the developmental and provision of supportive housing and services with the goal of assisting veterans who are experiencing homelessness to achieve residential stability; to increase skill levels and/or income; and to obtain greater self-determination and to ease transitions back into society; and

WHEREAS, on September 3, 2021, the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs – Grant and Per Diem Program (VA-GPD) published a Capital Grant Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO) announcing the availability of grant funding of approximately \$75 Million Dollars for the renovation, acquisition or construction of GPD transitional housing to improve personal safety for veterans, reduce risks associated with close quarters living, and increase the availability of individual unit style transitional housing; and

WHEREAS, the CARES Act, allocated additional funding to the V.A. in support of the global COVID-19 pandemic efforts allowing the U.S. Secretary of Veterans Affairs, to temporarily waive the cap on per diem payments to eligible entities; and as of October 1, 2021, the maximum per diem rate for all transitional housing (Per Diem Only, Transition in Place, and Special Need) under the V.A. Grant and Per Diem (VA-GPD) Program is One Hundred Fifty-two Dollars and Seventy-three Cents (\$152.73) and the maximum Service Center rate is Nineteen Dollars and Nine Cents (\$19.09); and

1 the maximum amount payable under the per diem is Fifty Dollars and Ninety-one Cents

2 (\$50.91) per day per veteran housed; and

WHEREAS, H.R. 5606, the "Return Home to Housing Act," proposes adjustments to the rate per diem payments provided by the United States Department of Veterans Affairs Secretary for services furnished to homeless veterans to support the additional operating costs associated with serving unhoused veterans in response to an emergency with safe isolation spaces during a state of emergency; and the proposed increased rate of per diem payments would also provide the assistance required for safety and survival in response to an emergency; now therefore, be it

RESOLVED, that *I Mina'trentai Sais Na Liheslaturan Guåhan* does hereby, on behalf of the people of Guam, express the utmost support of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* for the passage of H.R. 5606, the "Return Home to Housing Act," which seeks to amend Title 38 of the United States Code to adjust the rate of per diem payments provided by the U.S. Secretary of Veterans Affairs to grantees that provide services to homeless veterans; and does further request parity and inclusion of all veterans residing in Guam and in all U.S. territories; and be it further
