

FY2021 General Fund Appropriation & Expenditures

The OAG received \$14,334,779.00 for Fiscal Year 2021. We have dealt with a shrinking budget year-over-year, but have maintained our effectiveness and promise to continue our mission through the creative use of resources.

Appropriation \$14,334,779.00 - Expenditures \$14,410,086.67 (\$75,307.67)*



General Fund Expenditures






Expenditure Categories

Special Revenue Funds Received

The Special Revenue Fund includes revenues received from the Criminal Injuries Compensation Program, the Consumer Fund, Operating Funds, the Notary Program, the Criminal History Clearance Program, and the newly added Opioid Litigation Settlement category.

An increase occurred in FY20 after successfully settling with Honda Motor Corporation for faulty airbags. In FY21, salaries for agency-assigned attorneys were moved into this fund, ensuring their salaries & benefits are paid out in a timely manner.

A continuous increase is expected over the next five years as a direct result of AG Camacho's commitment to hold opioid drug manufacturers, distributors and marketers accountable for their role in fueling the opioid addiction epidemic.

Victim of Crime Act (VOCA) Funds

The OAG is responsible for managing the Victims of Crime Act federal grant which funds organizations that provide direct services to victims of crime.

Highlights and Looking Ahead

Tackling Guam's Drug Abuse Problem

AG Camacho and our Consumer Protection Litigation Team took action against several drug manufacturers, distributors and marketers to hold them accountable for their role in fueling the opioid addiction epidemic. As a result, Guam is expected to receive a total of \$12 million in payments through 2038. Guam received its first funds following a settlement that was reached, bringing in \$231,293.00. The monies from these settlements will bring much needed funding for drug prevention, abatement, and treatment efforts. Learn more about our <u>Road to Recovery here</u>.



Collecting Funds Owed to the Government

Since prioritizing our collection efforts in 2019, we have successfully recovered \$2,963,534.79 for the government. This was achieved through a cooperative partnership to collect and recover outstanding payments for services the Department of Administration (DOA) and the Guam Memorial Hospital Authority (GMHA) provide to the community, and taxes owed to the Department of Revenue and Taxation (DRT).



Protecting our Environment

Sasayan Valley Settlement

In a historic lawsuit and settlement for Guam, AG Camacho sued Samsung E&C America and KEPCO Mangilao Solar for damaging the land, water and ocean around Sasayan Valley, commonly known as the Marbo Cave area. In 2022, a \$525,000 settlement was reached and included a detailed and extensive cleanup process.

Holding the US Military Accountable for Toxic Waste Dumping

Guam's litigation team won before the Supreme Court of the United States (SCOTUS), which hears less than 1% of cases they review each term, in its ongoing fight to hold the United States military responsible for its part in creating and using Ordot Dump to dispose of toxic waste.

As we continue on with our Comprehensive Environmental Response, Compensation and Liability Act (CERCLA) case against the US military, we invite the public to share stories and photos they may have that shows the military dumping at Ordot. <u>Visit our website</u> and connect with us.
