Relative to recognizing coral reefs as essential infrastructure for the protection of the coasts of Guam and its inherent relationship in the conservation of beaches and other elements of nature.

1 BE IT RESOLVED BY *I MINA'TRENTAI SIETTE NA LIHESLATURAN*

2 *GUAHAN*:

3 WHEREAS, coral reefs are vital and irreplaceable ecosystems that provide 4 numerous ecological, economic, and social benefits to the island of Guam, its residents,

5 and visitors; and

6 WHEREAS, Guam's coral reefs offer critical habitat for marine biodiversity,

7 supporting a wide array of fish, invertebrates, and other species that contribute to the

8 overall health of our oceans and food security; and

9 WHEREAS, coral reefs serve as natural protective barriers that help mitigate the 10 impacts of storm surges and rising sea levels, thereby safeguarding our coastal 11 communities from the devastating effects of climate change and extreme weather 12 events; and WHEREAS, the coral reef ecosystem plays a pivotal role in Guam's tourism
 industry, drawing visitors from around the world who come to witness its breathtaking
 beauty and engage in activities such as snorkeling, diving, and eco-tourism; and

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4 WHEREAS, coral reefs also contribute significantly to the island's economy, 5 providing livelihoods for local fishermen, tour operators, and businesses that rely on the 6 tourism and seafood industries; and

WHEREAS, Guam's cultural identity is closely tied to the ocean and its
resources, with Indigenous *Chamorro* practices, traditions, and knowledge deeply
rooted in the ocean's bounty and the symbiotic relationship between people and the sea;
and

WHEREAS, the sustainable practices and traditional knowledge of indigenous communities in managing marine resources have historically contributed to the health and biodiversity of coral reefs, and these reefs are not only vital for the ecological balance of marine environments, but also serve as essential infrastructure which is integral to the cultural and economic well-being of these communities; and

WHEREAS, nothing in this Resolution nor in the any future application for federal funds shall infringe upon the existing rights of indigenous fishermen as recognized by the Government of Guam and Guam law; and

WHEREAS, coral reefs play a critical role in carbon sequestration and help to mitigate the impacts of climate change by absorbing and storing substantial amounts of carbon dioxide, thus aiding in the reduction of greenhouse gas emissions; and

WHEREAS, Guam is committed to conserving and preserving its natural environment for future generations, and recognizing coral reefs as essential infrastructure will bolster these efforts; and

WHEREAS, the Government of Guam does not have the necessary funds for
 optimal protection of its coral reef systems; and

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1 WHEREAS, there is access to certain federal programs for the protection and 2 conservation of these reefs, but it has not been possible to access them since Guam's 3 coral reefs are not considered essential infrastructure; now therefore, be it

RESOLVED, that *I Mina'trentai Siette Na Liheslaturan Guåhan* does hereby,
on behalf of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* and the people of Guam, officially recognize coral
reefs as essential infrastructure for the island in the protection of the coasts of Guam
and its inherent relationship in the conservation of beaches and other elements of nature;
and acknowledge their irreplaceable role in the ecological, economic, and cultural
aspects of our community; and be it further

RESOLVED, that the Speaker certify, and the Legislative Secretary attest to, the 10 11 adoption hereof, and that copies of the same be thereafter transmitted to the Director of the Guam Department of Agriculture; the Director of the Guam Bureau of Statistics and 12 Plans; the Administrator of the Guam Coastal Management Program; the Director of 13 14 the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA); the Secretary of the Department of Land and Natural Resources of the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands; 15 the Honorable Joshua F. Tenorio, Sigundo Maga'låhen Guåhan; and to the Honorable 16 17 Lourdes A. Leon Guerrero, I Maga'hågan Guåhan.
