AN ACT TO APPROPRIATE THIRTY MILLION DOLLARS (\$30,000,000) TO THE GUAM DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION FOR SCHOOL INFRASTRUCTURE REPAIRS AND MAINTENANCE.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF GUAM:

Section 1. Legislative Findings and Intent. *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* finds
that the Governor has ordered a 22% salary increase for government employees
funded by the anticipated surplus projected for this current year, FY 2023, as
indicated in the Governor's 2024 Executive Budget.

I Liheslaturan Guåhan further finds that American Rescue Plan funds
earmarked for capital improvement projects were spent for a Twenty-Five Million
Dollar (\$25,000,000) pay increase for teachers and administrators. At the same time
there are numerous reports from the Director of Public Health and Social Services
and various news stories of our schools being in gross disrepair.

1 "Section 2. GMHA Pharmaceuticals Fund Appropriation. Pursuant to §§ 26208 and 26208.1 of Article 2, Chapter 26, Title 11 GCA, the sum of Nineteen 2 3 Million Six Hundred Fifty-One Thousand Seven Hundred Five Dollars 4 (\$19,651,705) is appropriated from the GMHA Pharmaceuticals Fund to GMHA for Fiscal Year 2023. Notwithstanding §§ 26208.2 and 26208.3 of Article 2, Chapter 5 26, Title 11 GCA, I Maga'hågan Guåhan is authorized to determine that one hundred 6 7 percent (100%) of the appropriation in this Section can be expended for GMHA in 8 FY 2023 as a direct subsidy; this determination shall be made via Executive Order, 9 issued no later than September 1, 2023."

Section 4. A new section 23 is hereby *added* to Chapter II, Part I
(Guam Department of Education) Public Law 36-107 (The General
Appropriations Act of 2023) to read as follows:

13 "Section 23.Appropriation for Repairs and Maintenance The sum of 14 Twenty Million Dollars (\$20,000,000) is appropriated from the General Fund to the 15 Guam Department of Education for the purpose of repairs and maintenance of school 16 infrastructure and grounds, to meet safety, sanitation, and education requirements 17 including but not limited to the purchase of equipment, materials and supplies, and 18 the hiring of skilled workers."

Section 5. A new section 24 is hereby *added* to Chapter 11, Part I (Guam
Department of Education) Public Law 36-107 (The General Appropriations Act of
2023) to read as follows:

22 "Section 24. Appropriation for Repairs and Maintenance from Fiscal 23 Year 2024 General Fund Revenue. The sum of Ten Million Dollars (\$10,000,000) 24 is appropriated from the General Fund from Fiscal Year 2024 revenues for Fiscal 25 Year 2023 to the Guam Department of Education for the purpose of repairs and 26 maintenance of school infrastructure and grounds, to meet safety, sanitation, and

- 1 education requirements including but not limited to the purchase of equipment,
- 2 materials and supplies, and the hiring of skilled workers."
