1 **BE IT RESOLVED BY *I LIHESLATURAN GUÁHAN*:**

2 **WHEREAS**, Senator Paul J. Bordallo introduced Bill No. 715, creating the
3 Chamorro Land Trust Commission in the Second (2nd) Regular Session of the
4 Twelfth (12th) Guam Legislature in 1974. It was passed by the Guam Legislature
5 on January 13, 1975 and was subsequently signed by Governor Ricardo J. Bordallo
6 on February 4, 1975 as Guam Public Law 12-226; and

7 **WHEREAS**, eligibility for the Chamorro Land Trust leases is limited by
8 Guam law to ‘native Chamorros’ which is defined as any person who became a
9 U.S. citizen by virtue of the authority and enactment of the Organic Act of Guam
10 or descendants of such person; and

11 **WHEREAS**, the United States Congress passed the Hawaiian Homes
12 Commission Act, which established a land trust of approximately two hundred
13 thousand (200,000) acres for the express purpose of providing a land trust for
14 homesteading by Native Hawaiians, in 1921; and

1 **WHEREAS**, eligibility for the Hawaiian Homes Commission land is limited
2 by the federal law to ‘native Hawaiians’ which is defined as any descendant of not
3 less than one-half part of the blood of the races inhabiting the Hawaiian Islands
4 previous to 1778; and

5 **WHEREAS**, the Hawaiian Homes Commission Act provides a clear
6 precedent for the United States Congress authorizing the establishment of a land
7 trust to offer long-term leases to the indigenous people of a United States Territory;
8 and

9 **WHEREAS**, the United States Department of Justice has brought a lawsuit
10 against the government of Guam and the Chamorro Land Trust Commission,
11 alleging that the Chamorro Land Trust Act violates the Fair Housing Act; and

12 **WHEREAS**, the United States Department of Justice has stated in its filings
13 that the Chamorro Land Trust Act and its implementation “constitute
14 discrimination on the basis of race or national origin in violation of the Fair
15 Housing Act;” and

16 **WHEREAS**, in the Supreme Court ruling in *Rice v. Cayetano*, legal
17 vulnerabilities were exposed in relation to the Hawaiian Homestead Act,
18 necessitating greater protection of Chamorro lands in the form of full tribal
19 recognition; and

20 **WHEREAS**, §4103 of Chapter 43, Title 25 of the United States Code,
21 relative to Native American Housing Assistance and Self-Determination, includes
22 Guam under the definition of State, and the Federal Register of September 7, 1995,
23 Vol. 60.173 identified Chamorros of Guam as Native American Pacific Islanders;
24 and

1 **WHEREAS**, under § 4103(13) of Chapter 43, 25 U.S.C. a Federally-
2 recognized tribe means, “any Indian tribe, band, nation, or other organized group
3 or community of Indians, including any Alaska Native village or regional or
4 village corporation as defined in or established pursuant to the Alaska Native
5 Claims Settlement Act, that is recognized as eligible for the special programs and
6 services provided by the United States to Indians because of their status as Indians
7 pursuant to the Indian Self-Determination and Education Assistance Act;” and

8 **WHEREAS**, federal recognition of the native Chamorros as an Indian tribe
9 would allow the Chamorro people to incorporate the Chamorro Land Trust lands as
10 tribal land to the benefit of the native Chamorro population; now, therefore, be it

11 **RESOLVED**, that *I Mina'Trentai Kuåttro Na Liheslaturan Guåhan* does
12 hereby, on behalf of the people of Guam, assert that the native Chamorros possess
13 indigenous land rights and should be recognized as a sovereign Indian tribe,
14 allowing the incorporation of Chamorro Land Trust lands as tribal lands to the
15 benefit of the native Chamorro population; and be it further

16 **RESOLVED**, that *I Mina'Trentai Kuåttro Na Liheslaturan Guåhan* does
17 hereby, on behalf of the people of Guam, respectfully request that Congresswoman
18 Madeleine Z. Bordallo introduce legislation in the United States Congress to grant
19 Chamorros, the indigenous people of Guam, federal recognition as an Indian tribe
20 under 25 U.S.C. and to recognize the Chamorro Land Trust lands administered
21 under Guam Public Law 12-226, as amended, as Chamorro tribal lands; and be it
22 further

23 **RESOLVED**, that the Speaker and the Chairperson of the Committee on
24 Rules certify, and the Legislative Secretary attest to, the adoption hereof, and that
25 copies of the same be thereafter transmitted to the Honorable Madeleine Z.

1 Bordallo, Guam’s Delegate to the United States Congress; to the Honorable
2 Douglas L. “Doug” LaMalfa, Representative for California’s First (1st)
3 Congressional District and Chairman of the Subcommittee on Indian, Insular, and
4 Alaska Native Affairs; to the Honorable Robert W. “Rob” Bishop, United States
5 Representative for Utah’s First (1st) Congressional District and Chairman of the
6 Committee on Natural Resources; to the Honorable Paul D. Ryan, Jr., United
7 States Representative for Wisconsin’s First (1st) Congressional District and
8 Speaker of the United States House of Representatives; to the Honorable Michael
9 Richard “Mike” Pence, Jr., Vice President of the United States and President of the
10 United States Senate; the Honorable Elizabeth Barrett-Anderson, Attorney General
11 of Guam; and the Honorable Eddie Baza Calvo, *I Maga’låhen Guåhan*.
