BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COMMITTEE ON RULES OF I MINA'TRENTAI KUATTRO NA LIHESLATURAN GUÂHAN:

WHEREAS, stalking is defined as a pattern of repeated and unwanted attention, harassment, contact, or any other course of conduct directed at a specific person that would cause a reasonable person to feel fear. A relatively new form of stalking, cyberstalking, can be defined as the use of electronic communication, including pagers, cell phones, emails, and the internet, to bully, threaten, harass, and intimidate a victim; and

WHEREAS, stalking takes many forms, including, repeated, unwanted, intrusive, and frightening communications; repeatedly leaving or sending the victim unwanted items, presents, or flowers; following or laying inwait for the victim; making direct or indirect threats to harm the victim and the people around them;

- 1 damaging or threatening to damage the victim's property; harassing the victim
- 2 through the internet, cell phone, or other electronic device (i.e. cyberstalking); posting
- 3 information or spreading rumors about the victim; and obtaining personal information
- 4 to harass the victim; and
- 5 WHEREAS, according to National Intimate Partner and Sexual Violence
- 6 Survey (NISVS) fifteen percent (15%) of women and six percent (6%) of men are
- 7 stalked over the course of their lifetime; and
- 8 WHEREAS, one (1) in six (6) women and one (1) in nineteen (19) men have
- 9 experienced stalking and victimization during their lifetime in which they felt very
- 10 fearful or believed that they or someone close to them would be harmed or killed; and
- six (6) million women and men in the United States are victims of stalking each year;
- 12 and
- 13 WHEREAS, 3.5 million women and nearly one (1) million men first
- experienced being stalked before the age of eighteen (18); and
- WHEREAS, people who are eighteen (18) to twenty-four (24) years old
- 16 experience the highest rate of stalking; and
- 17 WHEREAS, 66.2 percent of female victims of stalking were stalked by a
- current or former intimate partner, and thirty-one (31) percent of the women who were
- stalked by an intimate partner were sexually assaulted by that partner; and
- 20 WHEREAS, three (3) in ten (10) victims reported being injured emotionally or
- 21 psychologically from being stalked; and
- WHEREAS, statistics show that from January to December 2012, there were
- 23 four hundred eighty-eight (488) arrests related to family violence, sexual assault and
- stalking- 65.1% for family violence, 31.1% for sexual assault, and 3.8% for stalking,
- as reported by the Pacific News Center; and

WHEREAS, local statistics received from the Guam Police Department (GPD) 1 2 indicates that in 2015, twenty-four (24) incidents of Stalking were reported; in 2016, twenty-six (26) incidents of Stalking were reported; and as of 12/21/17, fifteen (15) 3 4 incidents of Stalking were reported. These numbers should actually be higher, as several stalking cases are under classed as Harassment incidents. According to GPD, 5 one hundred and forty-four (144) Harassment complaints that were Stalking related 6 were reported in 2015, one hundred fifty-three (153) Harassment complaints that were 7 Stalking related were reported in 2016, and one hundred fifty (150) Harassment 8 9 complaints that were Stalking related were reported in 2017; and that one hundred 10 percent (100%) of these reports are Family Violence or Dating Violence related; and WHEREAS, a majority of stalking victims are teenagers and young adults, 11 12 who are often unaware of the signs of stalking and the resources available to them in 13 our community; now therefore, be it 14 **RESOLVED,** that the Committee On Rules of I Mina'Trentai Kuattro Na Liheslaturan Guåhan does hereby, on behalf of the people of Guam, support and 15 16 recognize the Guam Coalition Against Sexual Assault and Family Violence, in 17 partnership with the Attorney General's Office, the U.S. Attorney's Office, the Guam Police Department, and the Governor's Community Outreach-Federal Programs 18 19 Office, as well as numerous community advocates, for their efforts to raise awareness 20 about and encourage the prevention of stalking through community outreach and
