She was a young adult when her father passed away, and so to help support her family, Carmen got her first job working as a store clerk at

WHEREAS, in 1941, when Carmen was twenty-four (24) years old, the Imperial Japanese forces occupied the island. One of the horrors she encountered was when she became a prisoner of war, along with her mother and her brother, José Charfauros Okiyama.
