RELATIVE TO ADVOCATING FOR THE INCLUSION WHO PARTICIPATED IN VETERANS CLEANUP OF ENEWETAK ATOLL AS RADIATION EXPOSED VETERANS FOR PURPOSES OF THE **SERVICE-CONNECTION PRESUMPTION OF** CERTAIN DISABILITIES BY THE SECRETARY OF VETERANS AFFAIRS, AND FOR OTHER PURPOSES, AND TO **EXPRESSING** THE **SUPPORT** KUÅTTRO MINA'TRENTAI NA LIHESLATURAN GUÅHAN (THE 34TH GUAM LEGISLATURE) FOR H.R. 632 AND S. 283, THE MARK TAKAI ATOMIC VETERANS HEALTHCARE PARITY ACT, INTRODUCED IN THE UNITED STATES CONGRESS.

1 BE IT RESOLVED BY I MINA'TRENTAI KUÅTTRO NA

2 LIHESLATURAN GUÅHAN:

WHEREAS, the United States Government and the Atomic Energy 1 Commission conducted nuclear tests in the South Pacific from 1946 to 1962; and 2 WHEREAS, the Atomic Energy Commission detonated sixty-seven (67) 3 nuclear devices with a total yield of one hundred eight thousand four hundred ninety-4 two point two (108,492.2) kilotons in or around the Marshall Islands; and 5 WHEREAS, no less than ten (10) of those detonations yielded between five (5) 6 to ten (10) megatons of radioactive material from the center of the explosion to the 7 height of between twelve (12) to fifty-five (55) miles into the jet-stream; and 8 WHEREAS, on October 31, 1952 (GMT), Operation Ivy was conducted on 9 Elugelab Island ("Flora") in the Enewetak Atoll, in which the first true thermonuclear 10 hydrogen bomb (a 10.4 megaton device) code named Mike was detonated, destroying 11 the entire island leaving behind a six thousand two hundred forty (6,240) foot across 12 13 and one hundred sixty-four (164) foot deep crater in its aftermath; and WHEREAS, in ninety (90) seconds the mushroom cloud climbed to fifty-seven 14 thousand (57,000) feet into the atmosphere, and within thirty (30) minutes had 15 stretched sixty (60) miles in diameter with the base of the mushroom head joining the 16 stem at forty-five thousand (45,000) feet; and 17 WHEREAS, it is estimated that thirty-five (35) percent of those who handled 18 nuclear waste at Enewetak atoll now suffer from some form of cancer. Several 19 veterans from Guam were part of the group of U.S. armed forces who participated in 20

from the nuclear testing sites into a hole, and built a dome to cap it; and

WHEREAS, under the 1988 Radiation-Exposed Veterans Compensation Act it
is presumed that a veteran's disease was caused by radiation if the veteran was present

the cleanup of Enewetak atoll during the period beginning on January 1, 1977, and

ending on December 31, 1980; unaware of the danger from the radiation exposure and

without protective gear, these military members moved debris, dirt, and other material

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at a nuclear detonation, or some associated activities, and if the veteran developed one

2 of the presumptive diseases, regardless of the veteran's dose; however, cleanup of

3 Enewetak from 1977 to 1980 was not considered "present at a nuclear detonation" for

purposes of the Radiation-Exposed Veterans Compensation Act; and

WHEREAS, the presumptive law listed thirteen (13) cancers as radiogenic: leukemia (other than chronic lymphocytic leukemia); multiple myeloma; lymphoma, except Hodgkin's disease; primary liver cancer; and cancer of the thyroid, breast, pharynx, esophagus, stomach, small intestine, pancreas, bile duct, and gall bladder. Cancers of the salivary gland and urinary tract were added in 1992 and bronchiolo-alveolar carcinoma was included in 1999. In 2002, cancer of the bone, brain, colon, lung, and ovary were added, bringing the total number of cancers considered radiogenic under the presumptive law to twenty-one (21); and

WHEREAS, the regulations authorize the VA to provide medical care and pay compensation benefits to confirmed onsite participants and dependents of onsite participants in a test involving the atmospheric detonation of a nuclear device and indemnity compensation to certain survivors; and

WHEREAS, a Veteran may be eligible for presumptive service connection (SC) under 38 CFR 3.309(d) (38 U.S.C. 1112) if present at the test site during the official operational period of an atmospheric nuclear test to perform official military duties in connection with ships, aircraft or other equipment used in direct support of the nuclear test; during the six month period following the official operational period of an atmospheric nuclear test, presence at the test site or other test staging area to perform official military duties in connection with completion of projects related to the nuclear test including decontamination of equipment used during the nuclear test; Service as a member of the garrison or maintenance forces on Enewetak during the periods June 21, 1951, through July 1, 1952, August 7, 1956, through August 7, 1957,

or November 1, 1958, through April 30, 1959; or assignment to official military duties

2 at Naval Shipyards involving the decontamination of ships that participated in

3 Operation Crossroads; and

4 **RESOLVED,** that I Mina'trentai Kuåttro Na Liheslaturan Guåhan (the 34th Guam Legislature) does hereby, on behalf of the people of Guam, petition the United 5 6 States Congress to expand the Radiation-Exposed Veterans Compensation Act to provide for the treatment of veterans who participated in the cleanup of Enewetak 7 atoll as radiation exposed veterans for purposes of the presumption of service-8 9 connection of certain disabilities by the Secretary of Veterans Affairs; and be it further 10 **RESOLVED,** that I Mina'trentai Kuåttro Na Liheslaturan Guåhan does hereby, on behalf of the people of Guam, advocate for the inclusion of Veterans who 11 participated in the cleanup Enewetak Atoll as radiation exposed veterans for purposes 12 of the presumption of service-connection of certain disabilities by the Secretary of 13 Veterans Affairs, and for other purposes and to expressing the support of I14 Mina'trentai Kuåttro Na Liheslaturan Guåhan (The 34th Guam Legislature) for H.R. 15 632 and S. 283, the Mark Takai Atomic Veterans Healthcare Parity Act, introduced in 16 17 the United States Congress; and be it further
