BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COMMITTEE ON RULES OF I MINA'TRENTAI SINGKO NA LIHESLATURAN GUÅHAN:

WHEREAS, stalking is defined as a pattern of repeated and unwanted attention, harassment, contact, or any other course of conduct directed at a specific person that would cause a reasonable person to feel fear. A relatively new form of stalking, cyberstalking, can be defined as the use of electronic communication, including pagers, cell phones, emails, and the internet, to bully, threaten, harass, and intimidate a victim; and

WHEREAS, stalking takes many forms, including, repeated, unwanted, intrusive, and frightening communications; repeatedly leaving or sending the victim unwanted items, presents, or flowers; following or lying in wait for the victim; making direct or indirect threats to harm the victim and the people around them; damaging or

- 1 threatening to damage the victim's property; harassing the victim through the internet,
- 2 cell phone, or other electronic device (i.e.: cyberstalking); posting information or
- 3 spreading rumors about the victim; and obtaining personal information to harass the
- 4 victim; and
- 5 WHEREAS, one in six women and one in nineteen men have experienced
- 6 stalking victimization during their lifetime in which they felt very fearful or believed
- 7 that they or someone close to them would be harmed or killed; and six to seven million
- 8 people in the United States are victims of stalking each year; and
- 9 WHEREAS, 3.5 million women and nearly 1 million men first experienced
- being stalked before the age of 18; and
- 11 WHEREAS, people who are eighteen to twenty-four years old experience the
- 12 highest rate of stalking; and
- 13 WHEREAS, 66.2 percent of female victims of stalking were stalked by a current
- or former intimate partner, and thirty-one percent of the women who were stalked by
- an intimate partner were sexually assaulted by that partner; and
- 16 WHEREAS, three in ten victims reported being injured emotionally or
- 17 psychologically from being stalked; and
- 18 WHEREAS, statistics show that from January to December 2012, there were
- 19 four hundred eighty-eight arrests related to family violence, sexual assault and stalking
- 20 65.1% for family violence, 31.1% for sexual assault, and 3.8% for stalking; and
- WHEREAS, a majority of stalking victims are teenagers and young adults, who
- are often unaware of the signs of stalking and the resources available to them in our
