Relative to recognizing the observance of "National Slavery and Human Trafficking Prevention Month"; and commending the various entities and individuals for their efforts in combating human trafficking in our community and throughout the world.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COMMITTEE ON RULES OF *I MINA TRENTAI SINGKO NA LIHESLATURAN GUÅHAN*:

WHEREAS, human trafficking in the United States and on Guam continues to be on the rise, threatening the basic rights and freedom of others, and combating it must involve the American people and the United States government, and the residents of Guam and Micronesia; and

WHEREAS, human trafficking is present day slavery, involving the recruitment, transportation or sale of persons for forced labor; and through the use of violence, threats and coercion, enslaved persons may be forced to work in the sex trade, domestic labor, factories, hotels or restaurants, agriculture, peddling or begging; and

WHEREAS, human trafficking primarily involves exploitation, which comes in many forms, to include forcing victims into prostitution; subjecting victims to slavery or involuntary servitude; compelling victims to commit sex acts for the purpose of creating pornography; and misleading victims into debt bondage; and according to some estimates, approximately seventy-nine percent (79%) of human trafficking involves sexual exploitation, and fourteen percent (14%) involves labor exploitation; and

WHEREAS, according to the U.S. State Department, six hundred thousand (600,000) to eight hundred thousand (800,000) people are trafficked across international borders every year, and more than eighty percent (80%) of them are female. The average age a teen victim enters the sex trade in the U.S. is twelve (12) to fourteen (14) years old, of which many of the victims are runaway girls who were sexually abused as children; and

WHEREAS, the International Labor Organization estimates that women and girls represent the largest share of forced labor victims, with 11.4 million trafficked victims, or fifty-five percent (55%), compared to men and boys at 9.5 million, or forty-five percent (45%); and

WHEREAS, the problem of human trafficking continues to reach epic proportions, and it is the third (3rd) largest international crime industry, behind illegal drugs and arms trafficking. It reportedly generates a profit of 32 Billion Dollars every year; and of that number, 15.5 Billion Dollars is made in industrialized countries; and

WHEREAS, in 2000, the Trafficking Victims Protection Act (22 U.S.C Sec. 7101 et seq.) was enacted by the U.S. federal government to "combat trafficking in persons, a contemporary manifestation of slavery whose victims are predominantly women and children to ensure just and effective punishment of human traffickers, and to protect their victims"; together with the global efforts of emancipating the estimated forty (40) million people enslaved in today's world, of which between fourteen thousand five hundred (14,500) and seventeen thousand five hundred (17,500) of them are trafficked into the United States each year; and the efforts to prevent additional women, children and men from being trafficked by encouraging greater awareness of human trafficking, and all other forms of modern day slavery; now therefore, be it






