Professional experience:

As a teacher at Xavier High School, 1969-73, served as Director of the Micronesian Social Studies Program for the Trust Territory Education Department. Initiated the planning of a high school social studies curriculum project and directed a workshop for secondary school teachers in the summer of 1970. During the following two years, coauthored two sets of course materials for high school, one for senior and the other for junior level. Conducted evaluation of course materials, developed a program for the on-going training of high school social studies teachers, and organized and taught two workshops for Trust Territory teachers (1972 and 1975).

In 1970 wrote a 100-page booklet, "Some Suggestions for A High School Religion Program in Micronesia." Conducted a workshop for religion teachers. Directed the revision of the religion program at Xavier High School.

As the Principal of Xavier High School, from 1973-1975, articulated school goals and introduced Chuukese language courses, individualized instruction, electives, peer tutoring, community service projects, a media course, and a seven-week long Town Study Project for all seniors. Initiated yearly planning sessions for students and faculty.

As the Director of Xavier High School from 1976-1982, formed alumni organizations in the individual islands, established a Board of Directors with decision-making power over school policies and finance, supervised the entire revision of the curriculum, and initiated directed retreats for seniors and juniors.

As Director of the Micronesian Seminar, planned and conducted several major Territory-wide conferences on critical issues in Micronesia. The conferences include: Moral Issues in the Political Status Question (1973), Education for What? (1974), Human Development (1975), Youth in Micronesia (1977), US Federal Programs (1979). Youth Drinking in Micronesia (1981), and Past Achievements and Future Possibilities: Economic Development in Micronesia (1984). Edited the reports that were published following each conference and disseminated the reports throughout the Trust Territory and beyond.

Authored several articles published locally and throughout the Pacific on education, economic development, local history, and social problems.

Conducted a series of workshops for Catholic school administrators to articulate criteria for evaluating private schools and to assist in formulating goals for individual schools (Nov 1977 and June 1978).

Planned and supervised three diocesan workshops of two weeks length attended by sisters, priests and brothers from throughout the Mission (1973, 1975 and 1978).

Directed diocesan-wide special pastoral programs: Youth in Micronesia (1976-77) and Marriage and the Family (1979-80).

Served as curator for and expanded the Micronesian Seminar library, a specialized collection of 24,000 titles on the region with particular strengths in history and anthropology (1967-2010). Organized as part of the library a photo collection of 80,000 historical images and a collection of over 700 films and videos on Micronesia. This and other resource material was catalogued so that it could be searched on-line.

Composed case-studies on an almost yearly basis for local adult education programs in the villages on the themes of political status, economic development, and family problems (1977-1984).

Conducted an educational/occupational/residential survey of all Chuukese high school graduates since World War II that resulted in a publication on the education explosion in Chuuk (1978). Directed a follow-up survey six years later (1984), the results of which were also published.

Supervised a political education program sponsored by the Catholic Church and conducted by Br. Henry Schwalbenberg, SJ. The components of the three-year program (1980-1983) included composing and distributing a series of 13 memoranda on issues related to the Compact of Free Association, two general workshops on the recent political history of the territory, and participation in locally-run political education programs on Pohnpei and the Marshalls.

Served as project coordinator for research on juvenile delinquency in the Trust Territory and convened a one-week meeting in May 1980 to explore the results of the work. Supervised study of alcohol abuse among Micronesian youth and conducted a three-day workshop in Nov 1981.

Assisted in production of a book on sunken Japanese fleet (1981) and of another on Chuuk during World War II (1984). Produced a monograph documenting the history and status of the Japanese shipwrecks and assisted in the production of a professional half-hour video tape (1990).

Conducted a week-long evaluation of Assumption High School and Assumption Elementary School in Majuro on two occasions (Dec 1981 and June 1984).

Since 1976 has compiled data on over 1500 suicide cases in Micronesia. Organized and convened three-day conferences on suicide for Trukese leaders in April 1981 and in 1985. Assisted Dr. Donald Rubinstein in a three-year NIMH-sponsored research project on this topic (1981-84). Assisted in the planning of a conference on Pacific suicide funded by East-West Center and held in Honolulu in 1984. In April 1988 did a brief study of suicide in Western Samoa for comparative purposes. Has written four major articles on suicide in Micronesia and developed a hypothesis relating suicide to socio-cultural changes in island family structures. Has lectured extensively in the Pacific on this topic.

Established and supervised, with funding assistance from Juvenile Justice Programs, "Youth Link" to serve as liaison between institutions serving youth in Micronesia (1985-

87). The program put out a regular newsletter and ran annual conferences for Micronesian youth workers.

Presented keynote addresses to members of the Bilingual Education Association conferences (1985 and 1987).

Assisted in the production of weekly radio dramas in Chuuk and organized two-week training for mission personnel engaged in production of radio and video programs on several occasions (Nov 1986, Nov 1988, Feb 1989). Served as consultant to the Catholic media program in Chuuk (1986-1992).

Supervised a two-month study of Palauan emigration since 1950 that was conducted by an American volunteer (July-Aug 1984). With Fr. Thomas McGrath of MARC conducted a study of emigration from the Federated States of Micronesia to Guam, the results of which were published (Sept-Nov 1988), and with Michael Levin authored a research article on later data on FSM emigration to Guam and the Marianas (1995).

Conducted a summer-long study of child abuse in Chuuk sponsored by the Community Action Agency in 1985. Directed a Micronesian-wide study of the same throughout the territory in 1985-1986 and published papers with summary findings at the conclusion of the study.

Between 1985 and 1992 has organized and conducted, together with Fr. Joseph Cavanagh, SJ, Reflection Weekends annually in each state/republic of the territory. These were two-day conferences at which local people discussed, under the chairmanship of the organizers, a critical societal issue of the participants' choosing.

Oversaw the establishment of a Catholic Schools Administrators' Association for the Caroline-Marshalls Diocese. Supervised the planning of the yearly meetings and the inception of a yearly standard testing program for all Catholic pupils to aid in curriculum development work (1986-1991).

Authored a study of mental illness for a Pacific-wide conference sponsored by NIMH and held in Honolulu in 1985. Directed an epidemiological study of the severely mentally ill throughout Palau, the Marshalls and the FSM that contained data on 425 cases (1988-1990). Published with Dr. Michael Wylie of UOG the findings of the survey. Later presented the results of this and similar studies of Micronesia at a WHO regional meeting in Manila (2002).

Served as a member of a four-person core team organized by the Academy for Educational Development and funded by the US Government to study education in the Republic of the Marshalls. During the four-month study in 1989, assisted in the research, report-writing and dissemination of results to the government.

Directed a three-year study of family change in Micronesia funded by Misereor (1988-1990). Conducted training workshops for the field workers in Chuuk and Pohnpei, supervised their work, and wrote monographs on the findings in these two island groups.

Supervised the collection of data on spirit possession in Chuuk carried out by a Peace Corps volunteer for three months in 1989. Authored a conference paper on the subject

that was later published, and assisted Fr. Jay Dobbin in research and writing of a survey article on spirit possession throughout the Micronesian islands (1994-1996).

Edited a series of occasional papers on topics of interest to counselors under the title of "Micronesian Counselor." This series, funded by FSM Mental Health Program, was begun in 1991 and continued to 1994. Publication of the second series, which began in 1996. continued to 2010. The papers, which number 82, were distributed to over 900 readers.

Handled the preparation of week-long regional Jesuit meetings in 1989 and 1993, and assumed the task of preparing for and coordinating a similar meeting for the Diocese of the Caroline-Marshalls in 1989 and in 2003.

Initiated in 1995 and helped produce a TV documentary series for FSM called "Island Topics." Produced and helped script 73 programs in this series through 2012. Programs are distributed to local TV stations for airing in the Marshalls, Palau, CNMI and all states in FSM. Key programs include a five-part series on the history of Micronesia and two documentaries on Micronesian immigrants to the US.

Coordinated yearly conferences for the Diocesan Justice and Development committee for the Diocese of the Caroline Islands (1990-2010).

At the Pacific Education Conference in August 1994 conducted a two-day workshop for island educators, and gave the keynote address at a similar conference in August 1996.

Served as member of a select committee formed by US Institute of Medicine to evaluate health services in Pacific jurisdictions related to the US (1997). Participated in the three meetings of the committee during that year, attended follow-up meetings in Washington and in Micronesia, made presentations on the recommendations of the IOM final report,

Directed a three-year program funded by the FHP Foundation aimed at providing continuing medical education for young island doctors in Micronesia and spurring the development of primary health care in the islands (1996-1998).

Assisted in the FSM government's efforts toward economic reforms (1995-1996). Presented an address on reform to the traditional leadership of Pohnpei (Aug 1995), gave the keynote address at the Kosrae Economic Summit (Jan 1996), and chaired the committee on education at the Pohnpei Economic Summit (May 1996). Scripted and assisted in the production of two half-hour TV programs designed to speed economic reforms in FSM (1997 and 2003).

Planned and conducted an annual computer library search for journal articles relating to Micronesia for Pacific Islands Association of Libraries and Archives (1994-2010).

Authored with two colleagues a national report of 100 pages on Sustainable Human Development in the FSM under contract with UNDP (1997).

I. OVERVIEW

The Committee on Higher Education and the Advancement of Women, Youth and Senior Citizens convened a public hearing on Friday May 10, 2019 at 2:30 PM in *I Liheslatura*'s Public Hearing Room. Among the items on the agenda was the consideration of the appointment of Francis X. Hezel to serve as a member of the University of Guam Board of Trustees.

II. SUMMARY OF TESTIMONY & DISCUSSION

The public hearing was Called-to-Order at 2:34PM

Mariflor Herrera: Good Afternoon Madame Secretary and Senator Amanda Sel-Shelton and Senator Kelly Marsh Taitano. So I here today to testify on behalf of Fr. Frank Hezel for him to be confirmed as a member of the University of Guam Board of Regents. If you - I don't know if you have had a chance to look at his curriculum vitae but it's too long. But, but in any case, I really believe that he is super qualified to be a member of the board of regents of the university of Guam. Me and the nominating committee, the members of the nominating committee were really very, very happy when we saw his applications and his willingness to give out of his time and his experience to the people of Guam. He, if you look at his curriculum vitae, I mean he has spent over fifty years in Micronesia. Beginning with the fact that he's a member of the Society of Jesus, he so is a priest and came to Micronesia as a priest and to work in the catholic schools in Micronesia. But he also became the principal of Xavier High School in Micronesia then the director of school then the director of the Micronesian seminary, then at the same time he was a pastor of Moen in in the catholic church. He also became the regional superior of the Jesuits in Micronesia from 1992 to 1998. He was a local superior of the Jesuits in Pohnpei. He was the assistant editor of the American Magazine, Assistant Pastor of St. Anthony parish in Oceanside, New York. I guess he probably had a sabbatical from 2011 to 2012 so he was in Oceanside, New York. Then he came back, and became a resident of the Dulce Nombre de Maria Cathedral 2012 to 2013, and so right now is the parochial vicar of santa Barbara parish church in Dededo. So you know he has a wealth of experience in in so many fields especially Micronesia because he dedicated his life, he obviously his love is history, the social, the historical issues in Micronesia as well as the social issues. And the proof is all the work that he has done



and all his publications and just to give you a short synopsis of, according to his CV, he has published 10 books, 9 monographs, 7 edited reports of Micronesian seminary conferences. He has other unpublished reports, 10. 38 historical articles about Micronesia, 22 educational articles about Micronesia and 35 social about social issues and 38 in political and economic issues. So you know, that's, in short I really believe that he is a true scholar and the university of guam is very lucky to have him to become a member of the university of guam. Um that's my, that's my testimony.

Senator Amanda L. Shelton: Thank you very much Mariflor, and Lisa you may begin.

Lisa Provido: Good afternoon Madame Secretary, Senator Shelton, Senator Marsh, Marsh Taitano. I am here also in support for the nomination for Fr. Hezel to the board of regents. And I had just met him today, but I'm here because my husband actually had met him, probably more than two decades ago in Pohnpei when he was the principal and director of saint Xavier school. At that time, Fr. Hezel must have made quite an impression on him because my husband was really excited about his nomination when I told him about it and probably more so than my nomination. But in any case, I think Fr. Hezel, his calling goes well beyond the Jesuit Mission and ministry, having a lifetime of exemplary public service, he's a scholar of Micronesia, a prolific writer, he was an ADB consultant for the federated states of Micronesia, health healthcare advocate and so much more. So I too am looking forward to his participation and what he has to offer as a regent. Thank you.

Senator Amanda L. Shelton: Thank you very much Lisa. And now, I will invite anyone else who wishes to give oral testimony. No? okay so Senator Kelly do you have any questions for this panel? Okay, thank you very much ladies. And now we'll call up Fr. Francis Hezel to give his testimony. Thank you. Yes, right in the middle is good.

Fr. Francis Hezel: Thank you. Thank you senators, Senator Shelton, Senator Kelly. A few months ago, I was told that I was chosen as a candidate for a vacant position on the university of Guam's board of regents. When asked if I would accept this position, I replied that I would be honored to do so. I was especially glad to accept the position if offered because it would provide me an opportunity for payback, in the best sense of the word. After all, MARC had inspired so much of my own work at the Micronesian Seminar, which was our own creation, for nearly 40 years. As you know, I'm a Jesuit priest who spent nearly his adul- his entire adult life in this part of the world. I had always been hoped- I had always hoped to be known as a teacher, because I told somebody once, I'd like that written on my tombstone because I loved the classroom from the very beginning. My initiation into the classroom began at Xavier High School, Chuuk in 1963. Altogether, I spent 25 years in chuuk, 15 of those years at Xavier as a classroom teacher, principal, and then finally director of the school. When I left the school in 1982, the Jesuits assigned me to become the head of the newly devised but largely untested program that was called the Micronesian Seminar. The purpose of the program was to shift attention to public education from education to the young to public education at a time when there were so many contemporary issues that needed to be addressed. Political status question had been more or less resolved by that time but there were still plenty of other questions that uh, in the air. Effective economic development, improvement of public services especially education, cultural confusion in an age of rapid modernization. It was a daunting challenge, ut I quickly learned that I didn't need to an expert in any of those topics. My job was to spark the conversation among the people, who themselves would have to decide on this issues. So what I learned through this long years of Mike Sem as it was popularly known, that if I wanted to do public education I would have to be a long term student. I say this not as political speak but a lesson

learned over a fascinating lifetime. Now 40 years later I can thank the people who helped me grow up for the patience and education they offered me.

I want to say a word about MARC. MARC was attraction for me for the University from the beginning. Looking in, in my many visits to the island, it's mission was to do research on island history and culture that might be transated into material to enrich the island population. That's also what I saw myself doing to the islands to the south. So MARC became my model over the years. Now I would be happy to see it operating at full tilt once again in helping people understand the islands and the issues they face. Let me remind you that the University of Guam has served the island nations in other ways as well. After all the College of Guam provided them with a gateway to higher education in the 1960s, when the old Trust Territory dorms were filled with Micronesian students who otherwise wouldn't have anywhere to go. What do I bring to the table here and now? More years than I'd like to acknowledge. In those years I've logged lots of time in the classroom including the classrooms in the UOG campus. In addition I've written some books including histories of the area and published articles. But more important in some ways has been the 75 educational videos, dramas and documentaries produced in the Mike Sem years. But we're not finished yet, currently I'm working with a local film maker on a video on local homeless here on Guam that should be out before the end of this calendar year. If you feel I have something to offer the University as a Regent, I'd be happy to serve. But I wouldn't feel offended if you chose someone else who might offer greater benefit to the University than I could. After all it's the effectiveness of the education, whether post-secondary or public that's at stake here. So let me rest my case there.

Senator Amanda L. Shelton: Thank you very much Father, and I think we're all very excited to have you serve on the board of regents. We're thankful to Governor Leon Guerrero for appointing you and we're thankful for you to answer this call to serve in this capacity on the board of regents. And as you said, quite a fascinating life indeed, you have a very, very extensive resume as was attested to by the people here testifying on your behalf in favor of your appointment. And I'll just go ahead and let Senator Kelly Marsh Taitano

Begin if she has any questions for you today.

Senator Kelly Marsh (Taitano): Hafa Adai. So, I'll start with some comments and then I have just one question that I'm thinking of right now. Along with some of the others who have come through here, it's, it's a very interesting situation for me because I got my education at the University of Guam, reading your books as part of my reading material so as the senator before me was mentioning, you have a very extensive curriculum vitae, I counted the pages, there are 21 and each one is full. And two of the books that I still continue to recommend quite often to a variety of people here in Guam are the "Making Sense of Micronesia" and "The New Shape of Old Island Cultures." I think that they provide us so much here as we're navigating through a lot of issues. It helps us understand what you've been observing over the years and not only you observing over the years but you took the time to be doing a lot of reflection with others, a lot of reaching out with others and having them be able to review your material to give you feedback and so forth. And so, those, among many others, are such valuable contributions. They really speak to your ability I believe at the regent level to be providing your background in looking at social issues, cultural, political issues, educational ones, and so forth. Because they all come into play in one way or the other at the higher education institutions. And I think there, you'll be able to, with your experience and with who you are and your professional background, you'll be able to think of issues at the student level, their family, at our changing island society level, both for here and maybe with the island that they come from. And having your vast interest in research and education, I think that will service well additionally. And along with many others, I miss the website, the Micronesian seminar

website, where you led the way for Micronesia in a lot of ways, by having a collection of tens of thousands of audio recordings, photographs, and so forth, that you made available to all of us. And I'm looking forward to the work that you're doing now with the homeless, to see what, what that's going to impart for us so I think that's gonna be very important to pay attention to. So the only question that I have really is you've been back here on Guam for a while now and I'm sure you've been observing the landscape, social and otherwise. Are there any priorities that you have in mind if you do make it to the board of regents for the university?

Fr. Francis Hezel: Yes. Thanks for asking that question. I do, and I talked about this just a couple days ago with the MARC Associates and also with the university president when I had lunch with him a few months ago. I told him that I feel strongly that a university like UOG has a mission to the general public and that's what I replied in my remarks. I think that one of the missions of the general- the general understanding, the general education is always related to the future. And so, I would like to see the university of Guam take a primary role in public education on such things as political status or on tourism you know and economic development as well as on the social problems, things like the homeless. Although I have to add here that when we finish the video on homelessness, it's going to have a strong note of appreciation for what the island has already done. I'm in admiration of how the government has been able to work with private organizations in doing all that it's doing, you know, to help. The problem remains a problem nevertheless, but you know, I think it's a good model of treating the problem of the collaboration that's necessary to attack a problem like this. So those are the things, those are the priorities I would see, Public Education, the university become a vehicle of that and to bring together people with differing views on such things as political status so that it gets the attention, perhaps a broader attention of the public and we have people not speaking separately on this question but actually engaging one another. That's what universities are supposed to do I think. Thank you.

Senator Kelly Marsh (Taitano): Si Yu'us Ma'ase, that sounds like a very, it sounds like a commendable set of priorities that you have there and in one of the other things that I had written down here to make sure to mention is you're, you're the type of person to make things happen so I look forward to those priorities being in the works in the near future.

Fr. Francis Hezel: People have called me different things but never a procrastinator or a person who is slothful.

Senator Kelly Marsh (Taitano): So Si Yu'us Ma'ase Madam Chair

Senator Amanda L. Shelton: Thank you very much Senator Taitano, and I just have a few questions for you Father, before we complete the hearing, so one of the key Jesuit values is cura personalis, care for the personal development of the whole person. In what ways do you think that the university of Guam can better care for the whole personal development of their students. This question is coming from a lot of recent conversation that I've had at the University of Guam and I've talked to President Krise about the need for more support for some of our victims of sexual assault on campus for example, and I think we're making a lot of positive steps towards that so. Like the University of Guam Legal Counsel has indicated that the sexual harassment policy, it's time for it to be updated this year and so I've noted to the president that there are some insufficient victim services in the policies, so what can we do for this personal development for our students and what do you think about our policy on sexual assault for our students on campus, if you can speak to those two things.

Fr. Francis Hezel: Yes, first of all thank you. One of the things I remember very well is the Jesuit involvement in campus ministry. That was going on for a period of, it must be 20 years or so. I mean one after another, we had priests there, we had lay workers there, we had that campus ministry building close to the campus, we had outreach into the dormitories. We had not terribly many local students but a lot of the boarders were involved in this thing and even a fair number of the faculty. I'd like to see that revived in some form or other. I truly would. I know that there's a, there's a deacon, he's a former Jesuit who is attempting to do work, in fact I just talked to him about this quite recently. He's attempting to do work at the, at the dormitories there, but he is hampered by the fact that there's no institutional backup and I don't mean the university side, I mean any institutional backup on the church's side. So he's resolved to do something on that. So that's the answer to the first part of the question, as far as the sexual assault goes, I'm a little mystified by this. You know, I pointed out in some of the writings that you've referred to, I've pointed out that this sort of thing wouldn't go on as much in the islands because, because the blood relatives of the girl would mangle the boy who is responsible. I mean there would be payback in the worst sense of the word, you know, for that. That apparently is not done anymore, and I think that it's not just out of consideration for the law, it's because of a change, cultural changes that have taken place over this time. So apparently, we do need different kinds of enforcement in place. I don't know what, I don't know what can be done about it. The only is, I would say that I'm concerned not just with the sexual assault, but I'm concerned with the physical violence to women. Remember I was in Pohnpei for over well for 18 years. Over a 14-year period, we've seen 5 women die, killed by their spouses or by their boyfriends. So I became, as I explained to people, a true believer in doing something about that. But I didn't, but let me say also that I don't think that the program should be too broad, and I don't think that we should worry about psychological abuse at this point or verbal abuse perhaps. Let's narrow it down to the physical components of it that matter most. Otherwise, as I told people in Pohnpei at that time, otherwise, we're in danger of attempting to do everything and achieving nothing. What I want to see is the violence stopped and the sexual assault stopped. But those are just some preliminary thoughts.

Senator Amanda L. Shelton: Okay Father, thank you very much for those answers. I'm comforted to hear that those are issues of concern to you as well, so I hope that once you are confirmed those are things that you'll work alongside your other regents who are here in support of you so that those are issues that are always of top priority for our students' safety. So Si Yu'us Ma'ase. And just one more question. Another Jesuit value is Magis, doing more than what is expected and striving for excellence. With your extensive experience in education throughout Micronesia, in what ways do you think our university can do more for our students who come to Guam from throughout Micronesia to pursue higher education?

Fr. Francis Hezel: I think that the university over the years, as I said, has done a lot. I think it could do, I think that the university, again I don't know that the numbers show, I haven't kept up with that. But as I was explaining to somebody before the hearing started, that the numbers, the total numbers of Micronesians, compact nation Micronesians, going to the U.S. has dropped considerably over the recent years, because of the tuition, because of the unaffordability, even though Micronesians, of course, can work in the states now. I'm expecting that more and more people are going to be turning to Guam. I'm expecting that it's going to play a role, just as it has in the past, in the future. And I think that we certainly need to welcome them, but we need to make sure also that they have people to talk to. I'm thinking that one of the things that we had in the old days, when we had trust territory dormitories, was they, a group of counselors. They might not have been paid counselors, but they were unofficial persons that you could, that these people could talk to. Maybe as church involvement grows, in what I've called campus

ministry, maybe we can provide some help that way. Maybe we can work with the teachers in trying to provide, you know, a little bit of counseling help, academic counseling help and other things at the same time without having to hire a whole new cadre of persons who are licensed as counselors.

Senator Amanda L. Shelton: Thank you very much Father. I appreciate that you'll bring a different perspective and some historic experience that you've had at the university with you to the board of regents to help address some of these concerns and make student life better for everyone on campus and develop our university for Guam and our entire region, so I really appreciate that. And I look forward to confirming you in one of our upcoming sessions and Si Yu'us Ma'ase. Thank you very much Senator Kelly Marsh Taitano for joining me today. And we conclude this hearing at 3:17 p.m. Thank you very much.

III. Findings and Recommendations
