Dear Mr. Speaker:

Transmitted herewith is Bill 478 which I have signed into law as Public Law 19-44. As you know I do not generally act favorably on measures which contain non-germane riders. However, of great concern to me is the curtailment of illegal use of drugs, especially by law enforcement personnel.

The need to address possible testing of law enforcement personnel prompts favorable action although there exist serious problems with the measure as presented. Fortunately the Legislature was farsighted in delaying implementation of these provisions for six months as the question of the constitutionality of drug testing is now before the United States Supreme Court. Only when the Supreme Court reaches its decision on the controversy will action in accordance with its mandate be appropriate.

In the interim I have asked the Attorney General to chair a task force to prepare written guidelines for an applicant/employee drug testing program under the general provisions of this public law. Several problems with this measure have been brought to my attention and I have instructed the task force to prepare a bill making necessary changes to make the drug testing program effective.

Of particular concern are the following:

(1) Although directors of the various departments must be tested the deputy directors are not included. None of the deputies objected to being tested. I suggest that they be included.

(2) Supervisors are given too much discretion in choosing which employees are to be tested. A more effective method is random testing throughout all of the government's law enforcement personnel and directives to test employees for whom there is probable cause to believe they abuse

drugs. However, the means of choosing those to be tested will no doubt be addressed by the Supreme Court if it upholds the concept of testing employees.

(3) The actual testing procedures must be designed to be tamper proof. In addition confidentiality of test results must be maintained.


(4) The term "tax agents enforcement officers" with respect to the Department of Revenue and Taxation is ambiguous and perhaps overbroad. Legislative intent appears to be addressing only those employees of the Department's criminal investigation division. Clarification of this provision is needed.

(5) It may not be possible for the government to test security officers not in the employ of the government. I have asked the Attorney General to review the extent of the government's ability to do so.

(6) No funds have been appropriated for this program. I have instructed the Task Force to determine approximately how much money will be required to administer the drug testing program. As soon as a figure becomes available I will submit legislation containing an appropriation for this purpose.

In the next six months I trust we will be able to design an effective drug testing program which will withstand judicial scrutiny.





AN ACT TO NAME THE IPAO BEACH PARK
THE GOVERNOR JOSEPH FLORES BEACH
PARK AND FOR OTHER PURPOSES.

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE TERRITORY OF GUAM:

2 Section 1. The Ipao Beach Park located in the municipality of
3 Tamuning, territory of Guam shall hereafter be known as the "Governor
4 Joseph Flores Beach Park."

5 Section 2. Any provisions in the statutes referencing the Ipao Beach
6 Park is amended to read: "Governor Joseph Flores Beach Park".

7 Section 3. The Governor of Guam, the Director of Parks and
8 Recreation, the Commissioner, Assistant Commissioner and members of the
9 Tamuning Municipal Planning Council, shall cause to be erected appropriate

1 nameplates or signs designating the Ipao Beach Park as the "Governor
2 Joseph Flores Beach Park." Further, at such ceremony as Governor, the
3 Director of Parks and Recreation, the Commissioner and Assistant
4 Commissioner and members of the Tamuning Municipal Planning Council deem
5 appropriate, said "Governor Joseph Flores Beach Park", shall be officially
6 named and a plaque bearing the name, picture and brief history of the
7 contributions of the Late Honorable Governor Joseph Flores shall be affixed
8 within a suitable spot on above designated area.

9 Section 4. A new Chapter 71 is added to Title 10 of the Guam Code
10 Annotated to read:

11 "Chapter 71

12 Drug Testing

13 §71100. Definition. As used in this Chapter:

14 1. Law enforcement personnel, employee, or position means
15 the following:

16 (a) All members of the Guam Police Department
17 including the Chief of Police;

18 (b) All members of the Guam Fire Department including
19 the Fire Chief;

20 (c) All officers of the Department of Corrections
21 including the director;

22 (d) All Customs Officers of the Department of
23 Commerce including the Director;

24 (e) Employees of the Department of Youth Affairs who
25 are engaged in juvenile detention and rehabilitation and work
26 rehabilitation work as designated by the Director of the
27 Department of Youth Affairs including the Director of Youth
28 Affairs;

29 (f) All Tax Agents Enforcement Officers from the
30 Department of Revenue and Taxation, Attorney General,
31 Deputy and Assistant Attorney Generals, and Attorney
32 General Investigators;

33 (g) All security officers employed by the Government
34 of Guam or performing security work for the Government of

1 Guam pursuant to their employer's contract, including but
2 not limited to lock-up guards, security for the Guam Air
3 Port Authority and security for the Guam Commercial Port.

4 (2) Drug test means a urinalysis test administered under
5 approved conditions and procedures to detect drugs.

6 (3) Supervisor means law enforcement personnel assigned to
7 a position having day-to-day responsibility for supervising
8 subordinates, or responsible for commanding a work element.

9 (4) Reasonable objective basis means an apparent state of
10 facts and/or circumstances found to exist upon inquiry by the
11 supervisor, which would induce a reasonably intelligent and
12 prudent person to suspect the employee was under the influence
13 or using drugs/narcotics; or a reasonable ground for suspicion in
14 the existence of facts or circumstances warranting an order to
15 submit a drug test.

16 (5) Controlled substance means a drug, substance or
17 immediate precursor in Schedules I through II of Article 2 of
18 Chapter 67 of Title 9 of the Guam Code Annotated.

19 §71101. Drug Testing; Applicants for Law Enforcement Positions.
20 Applicants for law enforcement positions with the Government of Guam,
21 as the term is defined by this Chapter, shall be tested for drug or
22 narcotic usage as a condition of employment or as part of their
23 pre-employment medical examination. The testing procedure shall
24 contain safeguards outlining physician and others involved in the
25 testing procedure. The following rules shall apply to said applicants:

26 1. Refusal to take the test, or test results reporting a
27 presence of controlled substance, or the use of non-prescription
28 drugs, shall be the basis of discontinuing an applicant in the
29 selection process and preclude any further consideration for
30 employment.

31 2. Applicants found to be involved in the illegal sale,
32 manufacture or distribution of any controlled substance will be
33 permanently rejected.

1 3. Applicants demonstrating addiction to any controlled
2 substance will be permanently rejected.

3 4. Any improper use of any controlled substance by an
4 applicant after application will be grounds for permanent
5 rejection.

6 5. The results of drug tests on applicants for law
7 enforcement positions shall be kept confidential and shall not be
8 used as evidence in any subsequent criminal prosecution of the
9 applicant.

10 §71102. Drug Testing; Current Law Enforcement Personnel. All
11 current law enforcement personnel with the Government of Guam, as
12 that term is defined in this Chapter, shall be required to submit to a
13 drug test as outlined below:

14 1. A supervisor may order a drug test when there is a
15 reasonable objective basis or documentation or allegation that an
16 employee is impaired or incapable of performing his or her
17 assigned duties such as reduced productivity, excessive vehicle
18 accidents, high absenteeism, or other behavior inconsistent with
19 previous performance. The contents of the documentation shall
20 be made available to the employee.

21 2. Current law enforcement personnel may be ordered by a
22 supervisor to take a drug test:

23 (a) Where the allegation involved the use, or sale of a
24 controlled substance; or

25 (b) Where the allegation, involves the actual use of
26 force; or

27 (c) Where there is serious on-duty injury to the
28 employee or another person.

29 3. A supervisor who orders a drug test when there is a
30 reasonable objective basis for suspecting usage shall forward a
31 report containing the facts and circumstances directly to the head
32 of the department or agency.

33 4. Test results reporting the presence of a controlled
34 substance, or the use of prescription drugs without a

1 prescription, or the abuse of any over the counter drugs, will be
2 submitted as a part of a complaint by the supervisor to the head
3 of the department or agency.

4 §71103. Current law enforcement personnel assigned to drug or
5 narcotics enforcement units, vice unit, intelligence unit or internal
6 affairs shall be required in addition to Section 71102 of this Chapter to
7 submit to periodic announced drug test at the direction of their
8 supervisor. Prior to assignments to these units, law enforcement
9 personnel shall execute a written agreement of release stating that he
10 or she fully consents to any medical, physical, psychotic,
11 psychological or other testing, including urine and/or blood for
12 controlled substances. In addition, the agreement or release shall give
13 the department or agency permission to review the employees' medical
14 records relating to fitness for performance. The department head
15 shall select the date and time when each employee assigned to the
16 narcotics, vice, intelligence and internal affairs units will be tested.
17 The tests shall be administered randomly at least three (3) times a
18 year without advance notice.

19 §71104. All law enforcement personnel as that term is defined in
20 this Chapter shall not take any narcotics or dangerous substance
21 unless prescribed by a person licensed to practice medicine. Law
22 enforcement personnel who are required to take prescription medicine
23 shall notify their immediate supervisors in writing of the medication
24 prescribed and the nature of the injuries. Any statutory defined
25 illegal use of drugs by law enforcement personnel, whether at or
26 outside law enforcement employment, will not be tolerated.

27 Law enforcement personnel who have a reasonable basis to believe
28 that another law enforcement personnel is illegally using a controlled
29 substance shall report the facts and circumstances immediately to their
30 supervisor.

31 Failure to comply with the intent or provisions of this section may
32 be used as grounds for disciplinary action. Refusal by law
33 enforcement personnel to take the required drug test or comply with
34 the provisions of this Chapter will result in immediate relief from law

1 enforcement duties pending disposition of any administrative personnel
2 action.

3 §71105. Drug Testing/Urinalysis.

4 A. Obtaining Urine Samples.

5 1. The employee designated to give a sample must be
6 positively identified prior to any sample being obtained.

7 2. The room where the sample is obtained must be
8 private and secure with documentation maintained that the
9 area has been searched and is free of any foreign
10 substance. An observer of the appropriate sex shall be
11 present for direct observation to insure the sample is from
12 the employee and was actually passed at the time noted on
13 the record. Specimen collection will occur in a medical
14 setting, and the procedures should not demean, embarrass,
15 or cause physical discomfort to the employee.

16 3. An interview with the employee prior to the test
17 will serve to establish use of drugs currently take under
18 medical supervision.

19 4. Specimen samples shall be sealed, labeled and
20 checked against the identity of the employee to insure the
21 results match the testee. Samples shall be stored in a
22 secured and refrigerated atmosphere until tested or delivered
23 to the testing lab representative.

24 B. Processing Urine Samples.

25 1. The testing or processing phase shall consist of a
26 two step procedure.

27 a. Initial screening, and

28 b. Confirmation step.

29 2. The urine sample is first tested using a screening
30 procedure. A specimen testing positive will undergo an
31 additional confirmation test. An initial positive; rather, it
32 should be classified as confirmation pending.

33 3. The confirmation procedure should be
34 technologically different than the initial screening test.

1 Notification of test results to the supervisor or internal
2 affairs investigator will be held until the confirmation test
3 results are obtained. In those cases where the second test
4 confirms the presence of drugs or drugs in the sample, the
5 sample will be retained for six (6) months to allow further
6 testing in case of dispute.

7 4. The testing method selected shall be capable of
8 identifying marijuana, cocaine, and every major drug or
9 abuse including heroin, amphetamines and barbiturates.
10 Personnel utilized for testing will be certified as qualified to
11 conduct urinalysis, or adequately trained.

12 5. Employees who have participated in the drug test
13 program, where no drugs were found, shall receive a letter
14 stating that no illegal drugs were found. If the employee
15 request, such a copy of the letter will be placed in the
16 employees personnel file.

17 C. Chain of Evidence-Storage.

18 1. Where a positive is received, urine specimens shall
19 be maintained under secured storage for a period of not less
20 than six (6) months.

21 2. Each step in the collecting and processing of the
22 urine specimens shall be documented to establish procedural
23 integrity and chain of evidence.

24 §71106. Penalty. Any person who knowingly tampers with a
25 drug test or a report of a drug test required by this Chapter shall be
26 guilty of a misdemeanor."

27 Section 5. The provisions of this Act shall take effect six (6) months
28 after its enactment.

1 Section 6. A new 4 GCA §4203.1 is added to read:

2 "§4203.1. It is the intent of the Legislature to prohibit convicted
3 felons from being employed as peace officers in critical law enforcement
4 agencies or departments of the government. No person shall be
5 employed as a peace officer as defined in 8 GCA §5.55 (c), (d), (e),
6 (f), (g), (h), (i), (j) and (k) and 12 GCA 1112.1(b) who has been
7 previously convicted of a felony.

PREFACE

The Committee on General Governmental Operations, to which was referred Bill No. 478, conducted a public hearing on Thursday, September 24, 1987, at 9:00 a.m. in the Legislative Session Hall. [Attachment 2]

Committee members present were Senator Ted S. Nelson, Chairman, and Senator Frank R. Santos. Also present was Senator Sonny Shelton. Because of the Governor's meeting with the members of the Legislature, the Chairman excused the members not present. [Attendance Sheet - Attachment 3]

NOTIFICATION LETTERS

Notification letters were sent to the Governor, Mr. Phil Flores, the Attorney General, the President of the Commissioner's Council, the President of the Chamber of Commerce, the Director of the Department of Parks and Recreation, and to the Members of the Committee. [Attachment 4]

TESTIMONY

Testimony was received from Ms. Lynn M. Saussothe and Mr. Phil Flores, grandchildren of the late Governor Joseph Flores [Attachment 5] and Mr. Dale Willoughby [Attachment 6].

Committee members queried Ms. Saussothe and received satisfactory response.

There being no further questions, the Chairman adjourned the Committee hearing on Bill No. 478.

COMMITTEE FINDINGS

The Committee on General Governmental Operations, to which was referred Bill No. 478, finds that:

1. Governor Joseph Flores was the first Chamorro to be appointed Governor of Guam, an appointment and honor bestowed upon him by President Dwight D. Eisenhower in 1960. He was a recipient of a Certificate of Appreciation from President Gerald Ford, who holds Governor Flores in highest esteem in special recognition of his exceptional personal sacrifices for his island and country, among other services to the people of Guam, Governor Flores being the father of the Republican Party of Guam.
2. Governor Flores was appointed as a Knight Commander of the Order of St. Sylvester, a knighthood to which he was elevated by His Holiness the Pope, in recognition of devoted service and contributions to the Catholic Church of which has been an exemplary member.
3. Governor Flores is the founder of the first locally-owned, Federally-insured Guam Savings and Loan Association, and served as its President and Chairman of the Board from its establishment in 1954 until his retirement in August 31, 1980. This financial institution, having grown from one with \$100,000 in assets to a prosperous firm with assets in excess of \$30 million and with a consistent ranking among the top ten of the most successful savings and loan institutions throughout the Nation. Governor Flores was also the founder and President of the Marianas Finance Corporation, a prominent island lending institution and the equally successful Marianas Land Company, Ltd., and Pacific Basin Investment Corporation.
4. Governor Flores was the owner, publisher and editor of the territory's first free press, the Guam Daily News, the first privately-owned newspaper which served the people of Guam exceptionally well for twenty years from 1950 to 1970 when it became a member of the Gannet Newspaper chain. He was also the publisher of community, regional and statewide publications, including newspapers in his own printing plant in San Francisco, California. The California Veteran was among the publications which had an excess of 50,000 subscribers.
5. Governor Flores is the founder and sole benefactor of the Governor Flores Scholarship Foundation. The Foundation annually awards scholarships to some 20 school children and youth in the private schools of Guam and sponsor of a School Savings Program through the Guam Savings and Loan Association.
6. Governor Flores was as a member and chairman of the

Board of Regents of the University of Guam and the Territorial Planning Commission. The University has recognized Governor Flores as the initiator to expand the Territorial College of Guam into a full-fledged university through an Executive Order which he issued as Governor in 1961, and was also awarded an Honorary Doctor of Law Degree.

7. Governor Flores was also a member of the Rotary Club of Guam and of the Guam Chamber of Commerce; and past president of the Young Men's League of Guam, a civic and fraternal organization of Guamanian men which he restored to prominence and sound financial footing during his presidency of the League and chairmanship of the organization's Board of Director's and Council of Elders.
8. This Committee wishes to take public notice of Governor Joseph Flores' dedication, integrity and successful first Chamorro administration which opened the door to the appointment of other Chamorros as Governor after him and the granting of selected governship to the Territory thus enhancing the political development of the people of Guam.
9. This Committee hereby **recommends the passage of Bill No. 478.**

Senator Ted S. Nelson, Chairman: "The Committee will now hear Bill No. 478, 'An act to name the Ipao Beach Park the Governor Joseph Flores Beach Park.'"

Lynn M. Sausotte: "I am Lynn M. Sausotte. I am here on behalf of the family of the late Governor Joseph Flores and my brother, Philip, and I would like to read a letter that Philip and I have composed and sent to you as the Chairman of the Committee, in favor of Bill No. 478.

Dear Senator Nelson. We are writing in reference to Bill No. 478, 'an act to name the Ipao Beach Park the Governor Joseph Flores Beach Park.'

We are grandchildren of the late Governor Joseph Flores and our testimony is admittedly biased. Our grandfather had great love for his island and strove hard throughout his adult years to make Guam a better place.

We are aware of his pride in the roll he played in helping to make Ipao Beach Park a place for all of us to easily enjoy. As his time came to a close he would sometimes wonder aloud in a proud but humble way if his name would ever be placed upon one of Guam's landmarks. If so, he would say, he wished it would be Ipao Beach Park.

Thank you for considering the fulfillment of one of his final dreams. Cordially yours, Lynn M. Sausotte and Philip J. Flores."

Senator Frank Santos: "Mr. Chairman, I have questions regarding the naming of the Ipao Beach Park. Does the family want that park named in honor of the late Governor Flores?"

Ms. Sausotte: "Senator, the family would consider it a great honor to name the Ipao Beach Park after our grandfather. Let me say, Senator, that I'm a very recent arrival on the island. I've been here almost two months, so the information is coming from my brother Philip."

Senator Santos: "Is your father, Eddie?"

Ms. Sausotte: "Yes, my father is Ed and my brother is Philip; so the information I have is coming through Philip. But Phil told me this morning that it's his understanding

that my grandfather played a part in opening up Ipao Beach and securing it as a public facility for the people of Guam. He used to mention to my grandmother and Phil that he hopes someday that Ipao Beach might be named after him. He loved the beach."

Senator Santos: "Thank you, Ms. Saussottee. Thank you, Mr. Chairman."

Chairman: "I think that this Committee is cognizant of the importance of recognizing past leaders. I certainly feel that many of our leaders like Governors Joseph Flores, Carlos Camacho, Baltazar Bordallo, Governor Guerrero and Congressman Won Pat, are prominent people. They've contributed to the betterment of our island's social, economic and political development.

It is our belief that we have to remind our young people that we do have prominent leaders in our territory. It's about time that we name our facilities and schools after our leaders.

Therefore, on behalf of the Committee, I would like to thank you for appearing and sharing with us your testimony. Also, for the record, Mr. Dale Willoughby has submitted testimony supporting Bill No. 478."

Ms. Saussotte: "Thank you very much, Senator."

Chairman: "There being no further questions, this hearing is adjourned."



My name is Dale Willoughby, and I live at #186-A Route 8, Barrigada; am a registered voter and a resident of Guam for a bit more than two and one half years though I visited Guam in 1939 (48 years ago) and again in 1941, and many times since while in the military.

I am here to testify AGAINST Bill No 470 "An act to name Guam International Air Terminal" the "Antonio B. Won Pat International Air Terminal" and to vote FOR the passage of Bills No. 477, 478, 479 and 480.

Guam is a key island in the Western Pacific, blessed with a beautiful and efficient airport for air travelers, but its location is not well known by such people. For years, since the end of World War II, travel agents representing the airlines have struggled to acquaint their customers with the exact location of Guam International Air Terminal. The abbreviation of "GUM" was printed in hundreds of thousands of air schedules throughout the world and is now firmly implanted in their routing schedules. Now this Committee desires to change the name and will put the travel agents "back to square one". Consider the great amount of printing necessary to accommodate the proposed change of name and the unnecessary cost to reflect the intent of Bill 470.

Bills 477, 478, 479 and 480 do not have a far reaching effect and so I concur with the author(s) of these bills to appropriately rename the beach and facilities to perpetuate the names of these local statesmen and other notables.

However, lets keep Guam International Air Terminal intact as I believe to change it will have a decided "rippling effect" of confusion and uncertainty for those who travel and those who offer travel services on the International scene.



AN ACT TO NAME THE IPAO BEACH PARK THE GOVERNOR
JOSEPH FLORES BEACH PARK.

- 1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE TERRITORY OF GUAM:
- 2 Section 1. The Ipao Beach Park located in the Municipality of Tamuning, Territory
- 3 of Guam shall hereafter be known as the "Governor Joseph Flores Beach Park."
- 4 Section 2. Any provisions in the statutes referencing the Ipao Beach Park is
- 5 amended to read: "Governor Joseph Flores Beach Park".
- 6 Section 3. The Governor of Guam, the Director of Parks and Recreation, the
- 7 Commissioner, Assistant Commissioner and members of the Tamuning Municipal Planning
- 8 Council, shall cause to be erected appropriate nameplates or signs designating the Ipao
- 9 Beach Park as the "Governor Joseph Flores Beach Park." Further, at such ceremony
- 10 as the Governor, the Director of Parks and Recreation, the Commissioner and Assistant
- 11 Commissioner and members of the Tamuning Municipal Planning Council deem
