Dear Mr. Speaker:

This is to inform you that I have signed into law Bill 74 and, is now Public Law 29-02 but not without certain reservations. After much deliberation and debate, the 29th Guam Legislature passed and transmitted Bill No. 74. I believe we both recognize that the version passed by the Legislature is substantially different from the original Bill which I transmitted to you on March 22, 2007. Clearly, any changes and amendments to the original bill is the prerogative of the Legislature but, I was hopeful that we could reach a consensus on provisions of Bill 74 where we had differences of opinion on.

Since receiving the transmittal of Bill No. 74, my Administration and the government's financial advisors, Banc of America Securities, have been reviewing and analyzing the impact an enactment or veto of this legislation would have on this government and, the services it is mandated to deliver to the people of Guam. While there have been concerns expressed regarding the final version of this bill, it is the assessment of this Administration that a veto of the bill would cause greater harm to the future viability of this government and, its ability to deliver critical services to the people of Guam.

Therefore, more work must be done for which we can reach a consensus to ensure the continued viability of this government in it's delivery of services to those most in need and, perhaps of equal importance, to preserve and enhance our creditworthiness to those who would assist us in our future efforts. This is essential as we embark on what will be a monumental effort to demonstrate fiscal stability, eventually eliminate our deficit and, to prepare future generations for the growth that we all know is sure to come.

Our actions today, our willingness to transcend our differences, the choices we make must be made in the framework for what is best for the future of our island, her people and most importantly, for future generations. Bill 74 is the beginning of this journey but, surely it is not the end. It is my sincere hope that what was not addressed in Bill 74 will

be addressed in our revised FY '08 budget. We must continue our endeavor to strengthen our finances, be able to immediately provide for emergencies and unforeseen circumstances, all while continuing to provide critical services and, finally to eliminate our cumulative and crippling deficit.

Although Bill 74 does contain revenue enhancements and reduced expenditures, it still is not sufficient. We must continue to take the necessary steps to increase revenues, reduce unnecessary expenditures while at the same time not compromise this government's ability to deliver existing service levels our people demand and are entitled to. It is in this spirit that we must work together to make the hard but, necessary decisions regarding the levels of revenues and expenditures within this government, legal mandates the government is now required providing within our financial means and resources.

I committed to the people of Guam, the government employees and the businesses which they patronize that the furlough of government employees would be the option of last resort. Today, while I still stand by that commitment, government agencies are reviewing their operational and personnel levels, prioritizing their agency mandates and putting plans in place to adjust to their operations based on the final authorized levels to their budgets contained in Bill 74.

I must however, express my disappointment that these adjusted levels are not equitable and that the actions of the Guam Legislature to exempt certain branches and agencies from some level of reductions have created an even greater disparity even among the critical services of health, safety and education. Consequently, these actions could reach potentially crippling levels.

It is apparent that the anticipated impact of a nearly 25% cut to agency budgets is too great to sustain current services and employment levels as well. Agencies throughout this government have put together plans to prioritize the delivery of certain services and identify the services that will cease for the remainder of this fiscal year.

It has been a long and hard process that has brought us to this point. Given the instability in the financial condition of this government, and the inadequate level of revenues to deliver all the services mandated by law even with the revenue enhancements in Bill 74, I am left with no option but to sign Bill No. 74 into law and allow the directors of the Executive line agencies to begin the process of identifying the reduction of operational and personnel levels accordingly.

As we adjust operational levels through the remainder of this fiscal year, I strongly urge the members of the 29<sup>th</sup> Guam Legislature to carefully consider the challenges that lay ahead. Given the unforeseen financial burdens that have come upon this government in

the form of prior years' EITC payments in the amount of \$90 million, the COLA court judgment of \$123 million, the \$209 million deficit inherited by my Administration (which includes income tax refunds, debts to the Retirement Fund, to GPA and, to government vendors) coupled with funding the operational needs of every agency to deliver all legally mandated services, it is incumbent upon us to find a workable solution to the large deficit we now face.

In light of these realities, if unfunded mandates must be eliminated then we must do so. What is required at this critical time is a structural change in the levels of service this government is required to deliver and bring these services and mandates in line with the revenue levels this government is expected to receive.

There are though, positive provisions as a result of Bill 74. Principally, the increase in certain fees the government charges, some of which were not adjusted in over fifty-five (55) years. Clearly, the need to recover the cost of providing those specific services is not only justified but, critical to this government's ability to continue delivering existing levels of service. The willingness of the Legislature to restore the Dave Santos Act to its original levels (consistent with its original intent) and, to adjust the level of exemptions shows your confidence in an economy on the front-end of strong growth while recognizing that these industries are mature and that tax exemptions and incentives are no longer needed to continue to operate profitably.

While these measures all have a positive affect on the revenues upon which this government operates, more must be done to expand our revenue base to reflect the true level of business activity that is occurring on island. Both the Department of Interior and Standard & Poor's have recognized that the level of business privilege tax exemptions that this government allows have been detrimental to the government's capacity to deliver services. Suppressing revenues at a time when our island is demanding greater service levels and as we prepare for even greater increases in demands for services that will surely come with the military build-up, only aggravates the situation and requires that we address these very issues in the upcoming Fiscal Year 2008 budget.

Furthermore, studies provided by both the Department of Interior and the Office of Management and Budget have recognized that tax exemptions do not, in and of themselves, encourage or increase investments to the extent that will make up for lost revenues. According to those reports, businesses look for investment opportunities based on the potential for profitability over the long-term and the quality of life for those they will employ. Exemptions are not the deciding factor and their influence on the final decision to invest is not as strong as commonly believed.

While I thank the members of the 29<sup>th</sup> Guam Legislature for their willingness to address the need for additional revenues, I also urge you to seriously consider substantial expansion of the revenue-base in the Fiscal Year 2008 budget through a review of all Business Privilege Tax exemptions currently provided for in the law.

In addition, there are several concerns that I ask the Legislature to consider for possible corrective action.

Chapter VI; Section 7 Use of funds received through the public welfare assistance program for the purchase of alcoholic beverages and tobacco products.

It is important to note that welfare recipients can obtain cash from their Quest card at the ATM and make prohibited purchases. The department however is working with the vendor to restrict access to cash.

Also note the bill does not mention where the money from the business fines imposed in Section 7 will be deposited.

Chapter VI; Section 11 amends 10 GCA § 51503 to add subsection b to authorize DPW to expend monies in the Recycling Revolving Fund for the Island-Wide Collection and off-island Disposal of Abandoned Vehicles, etc.

The cost for the on-going Island-Wide Collection and Off-Island Disposal of Abandoned Vehicles, White Goods, Tires, and Batteries exceeds the current revenue source but even with this additional revenue source there are insufficient funds to support the entire cost of the project which we know is essential to protect our environment, not just for today but for future generations to enjoy.

Chapter VI; Section 29 Office of Finance and Budget

Section 13108 establishes the Special Economic Service. Membership of the Special Economic Service include the Senior Economist of the Department of Labor and the Chief Planner of the Bureau of Statistics and Plans, however, these positions should be entitled Chief Economist for both agencies.

Chapter VI; Section 46 Prohibition on the Use of Appropriations to Fill Vacant Positions

Subsection f does not accommodate academic personnel of the University of Guam and the Guam Community College. This is problematic for the Guam Community College as they are in the process of hiring their president for the college.

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Finally, while the May 10<sup>th</sup> deadline for a revised Fiscal Year 2008 budget has passed, given the significant impact Public Law 29-02 on FY2008, we are unable to provide the revised budget submission at this time. The revised Fiscal Year 2008 budget will be submitted once it is completed and, the effects of Bill 74 are fully taken into account.



4 violating any of the provisions of this Chapter amounting to Seven Hundred  
5 Fifty Dollars (\$750.00) for the first offense; One Thousand Five Hundred

13           “(2) Upon request of any person, the filing officer *shall* issue his  
14 certificate showing whether there is on file on the date and time stated

16 debtor and any statement of assignment thereof and *if* there is, giving the  
17 date and time of filing of each such statement and the names and addresses  
18 of each secured party therein. The certificate *shall* not include any statement  
19 as to the possibility of insolvency proceedings which might have the effect  
20 of preventing the lapse of effectiveness of a filed financing statement  
21 pursuant to Section 9403 whether actual insolvency proceedings are known  
22 or unknown to the filing officer. The uniform fee for such a certificate shall  
23 be Ten Dollars (\$10.00). Upon request the filing officer *shall* furnish a copy  
24 of any filed financing statement or related filings for a uniform fee of One  
25 Dollar (\$1.00) for the first page and Fifty Cents (\$0.50) for each page  
26 thereafter.”

27 **Section 12.** 11 GCA §6108 is *amended* to read as follows:

1           **“§6108. Same: Fees.** The Director is authorized to issue the  
2 following classes of licenses at the following fees, which *shall* be paid by  
3 the applicant at the time of application:

4                     Annual Retail License: \$100.00;

6                     Annual Wholesaler License: \$1,000.00.”

7 **Section 13.** 11 GCA §6105 is *amended* to read as follows:

8           **“§6105. Same: Renewal.** A licensee may renew his license at the  
9 expiration thereof by the payment of the annual license fee set forth in this  
10 Chapter and by filing a renewal application. A licensee who fails to renew  
11 his license on or before the thirtieth (30<sup>th</sup>) day of June of each year *shall* be

26 business *shall* constitute refusal and failure to obtain a license under the  
27 provisions of Division 3 of this Title.”

3 located where they *shall* be inaccessible to minors. Any vendor who violates

15               (b) on each multiple coin pinball machine, Five Hundred  
16 Dollars (\$500.00);

17               (c) on each coin-activated phonograph or other coin-activated  
18 music producing machine, Forty Dollars (\$40.00) plus Fifteen Dollars  
19 (\$15.00) for each coin slot in excess of one (1);

20               (d) on each coin-activated kiddie ride, designed for the use of  
21 children, Fifty Dollars (\$50.00);

22               (e) on each video horse or greyhound race machine, One  
23 Thousand Two Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$1,250.00);

24               (f) on each video type symbolic amusement machine or any  
25 other amusement device that is not listed in this Section, Five  
26 Hundred Dollars (\$500.00);

1 (g) on any amusement device that allows for more than one (1)  
2 person to participate, either by use of an additional coin slot, table,  
3 box, video screen, chair with screen monitor or other means allowing  
4 multiple concurrent participation, an additional license fee of Twenty-  
5 five Dollars (\$25.00) *shall* be imposed for each coin slot in excess of  
6 one (1); and

7 (h) on each coin-activated video amusement device designed  
8 for the use of children, Fifty Dollars (\$50.00).

9 No slot machine or amusement device set to make progressive or  
10 automatic payouts *shall* be licensed under this Section. No gambling device  
11 as defined in 9 GCA §64.20(b) shall be licensed under this Section.”

12 **Section 16.** 11 GCA §22211 is hereby *added* to read as follows:

13 “**§22211. Penalty.** Any revenue producing or revenue generating  
14 amusement device that is *not* registered and licensed according to this  
15 Chapter, *shall* be subject to seizure and confiscation. The owner of such  
16 device *shall* be fined Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) for each  
17 confiscated amusement device and such amusement device *shall* be duly  
18 registered and licensed prior to release. The owner *shall* bear all costs of the  
19 storage, handling, destruction and disposal of such device.”

- 7 (d) on each pool or billiard table, Twenty-five Dollars  
8 (\$25.00);
- 9 (e) on each shooting range/gallery, Two Hundred Fifty  
10 Dollars (\$250.00);
- 11 (f) on each game room, Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00);
- 12 (g) on each go-cart facility, Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00);
- 13 (h) on each off-track racing park, Two Hundred Fifty Dollars  
14 (\$250.00);
- 15 (i) on each paint ball gun range/gallery, One Hundred  
16 Dollars (\$100.00);
- 17 (j) on each shuffle board location, One Hundred Dollars  
18 (\$100.00);
- 19 (k) on each billiard pool hall, One Hundred Dollars  
20 (\$100.00);
- 21 (l) on each coin-operated pool table, Fifty Dollars (\$50.00);
- 22 (m) on each mahjong table, One Hundred Dollars

11 fifty (50) *or more* but *less than* one hundred (100) persons.

12 (3) Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000.00) *if* the tax preparer has  
13 one hundred (100) *or more* but *less than* five hundred (500)  
14 such persons.

15 (4) Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000.00) *if* the tax preparer has  
16 five hundred (500) or more such persons.”

10 “§72102. **Banking.** (a) Every person engaging in or carrying on  
11 business in Guam of banking or receiving the money of others on deposit  
12 *shall* be required annually to obtain a commercial license; provided,  
13 however, that in addition to the requirements of this Subchapter, a license  
14 *shall* not be issued to a foreign banking corporation unless its application has  
15 first been approved by the Banking Board pursuant to 22 GCA §106725 and  
16 the license is in the form prescribed by that Section. The annual fee for such  
17 license is One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00). Institutions which are  
18 members of the Federal Reserve System of the United States *shall* be  
19 licensed upon meeting the general requirements of this Title. Any other  
20 persons engaged in the business of banking or receiving the money of others  
21 on deposit, by whatever name said deposit is designated, may accept  
22 agreements for future deposit but *shall* not accept the deposit until the  
23 accounts of depositors have been insured in accordance with the rules and  
24 regulations of an appropriate agency of the United States Government;  
25 provided, however, that nothing herein contained *shall* prohibit persons from  
26 engaging in the business of lending money with or without security when  
27 such money is the property of said persons.

1 (b) Every Customer-Bank Communication Terminal (CBCT),  
2 automated teller machine (ATM), or cash dispensing machine that is not  
3 contiguous to a main or branch facility established and operated by a bank,  
4 credit union or a non-bank entity is subject to an annual licensing fee of Five  
5 Hundred Dollars (\$500.00).

6 (c) The Banking and Insurance Commissioner is hereby authorized to  
7 assess each bank licensed in Guam a fee of \$0.022 for every One Thousand  
8 Dollars (\$1,000) of the total assets of such bank. The total assets of each  
9 licensed bank *shall* be determined from the audited financial statement or  
10 from the call report or financial statement for the period ending December  
11 31<sup>st</sup> of each year it is filed with the Banking and Insurance Commissioner.  
12 For each national, or state, or foreign bank that operates a branch bank that  
13 is licensed in Guam, the assessment *shall* be computed on the reported total  
14 assets of the branch bank in Guam.”

15 **Section 23.** §72103 of 11 GCA is hereby *amended* to read as follows:

16 “§72103. **Other Lending Institutions.** Every person engaging in or  
17 carrying on the business in Guam of lending money with or without security  
18 (except banks and others who receive the money of others on deposit) *shall*  
19 be required annually to obtain a commercial license. The annual fee for  
20 such license is Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00).”

21 **Section 24.** 11 GCA §72107 is *amended* to read as follows:

22 “§72107. **Wholesale License.** A wholesale license must be obtained  
23 by every person who engages in the business of selling tangible property for  
24 the purpose of resale. The annual fee for a wholesale license shall be based  
25 on annual gross revenue as follows:

8 for a retail license shall be based on annual gross revenue as follows:

5 “(b) **Home Industry License.** Any person who does business as a  
6 home industry *shall* obtain a home industry license. The annual fee for a  
7 home industry license is Twenty-five Dollars (\$25.00) for each business  
8 licenseable activity at each location. A person applying for a home industry  
9 license *shall* not be required to receive endorsements from the Department  
10 of Land Management, the Department of Labor, the Department of Revenue  
11 and Taxation and from the Department of Public Works. However, when  
12 the license is for food preparation, the health certificate for persons handling  
13 food and the health certificate for the suitability of the place of preparation  
14 shall be required. For purposes of this Section, no person may qualify for a  
15 home industry license *if* he employs in his business persons other than  
16 family members and *if* such business is not actually conducted in his own  
17 home. A person qualifying for a home industry license under this Section  
18 may engage in the manufacture of products and wholesale sales without  
19 obtaining any other business licenses.”

22 on any service business or calling, which *shall* include all non-professional

26 his employer, *shall* be required annually to obtain a service license. The  
27 annual fee for a service license *shall* be Fifty Dollars (\$50.00) except that

2 more than one family–residential unit.

3 (a) Any person who rents or leases unimproved real property to  
4 another party *shall* be required to obtain a service license annually.  
5 The fee for this license *shall* be One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00).

6 (b) Any person who rents or leases multiple residential rental units  
7 *shall* be required to obtain an annual service license. The fee for this  
8 license *shall* be Twenty-five Dollars (\$25.00), or Five Dollars (\$5.00)  
9 per rental unit, whichever is greater.

10 (c) Any person who rents or leases commercial office units *shall* be  
11 required to obtain an annual service license. The fee for this license is  
12 Five Dollars (\$5.00) for each commercial office unit.

13 (d) Any person who rents or leases hotel or motel rooms *shall* be  
14 required to obtain an annual service license. The fee for this license is  
15 Five Dollars (\$5.00) for each unit or room rented in a hotel or motel.

16 (e) Any person who rents or leases warehouse storage space *shall*  
17 be required to obtain an annual service license. The fee for this  
18 license *shall* be Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00).

19 For the purposes of this Section, person means any person,  
20 firm, partnership, association, corporation, company, syndicate, estate,  
21 trust, business trust or organization of any kind, or any branch or  
22 division thereof.”

23 **Section 30.** A new subsection (e) is *added* to §106601 of 11 GCA to read as  
24 follows:

25 “(e) Every application for an additional branch, relocation of a branch  
26 or closing of a branch is subject to a licensing fee of Five Hundred Dollars  
27 (\$500.00) and such license *shall* be subject to an annual renewal.”

1       **Section 31.** 11 GCA §109103 is *amended* to read as follows:

2               “**§109103. Foreign Exchange License Fee.** Every licensee *shall* pay

16 (\$20.00).

17               (2) Persons required to file notification who are sellers, lessors or  
18 lenders *shall* pay an additional fee at the time stated in Subsection (1) of  
19 Twenty Dollars (\$20.00) for each One Hundred Thousand Dollars  
20 (\$100,000.00) or part thereof, in excess of One Hundred Thousand Dollars  
21 (\$100,000.00) of the original unpaid balances arising from consumer credit  
22 sales, consumer leases and consumer loans, payable in installments, made

24 lessor or lender for more than thirty (30) days after the inception of the sale,  
25 lease or loan giving rise to the obligations. A refinancing of a sale, lease or

1 (3) Persons required to file notification who are assignees *shall* pay  
2 an additional fee at the time stated in Subsection (1) of Twenty Dollars  
3 (\$20.00) for each One Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$100,000.00), or part  
4 thereof, in excess of One Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$100,000.00), of the  
5 unpaid balances at the time of the assignment of obligations arising from  
6 consumer credit sales, consumer leases and consumer loans, payable in  
7 installments taken by assignment within the twelve (12) months last  
8 preceding June 30<sup>th</sup>; provided, that an assignee need *not* pay a fee with  
9 respect to an obligation on which the assignor or other person has already

25 members during office hours and a copy thereof, duly certified to by a  
26 majority of the directors and countersigned by the secretary of the

1 who *shall* attach the same to the original articles of incorporation and charge  
2 a fee of Seventy-five Dollars (\$75.00) for the filing thereof.”

3 **Section 56.** The second paragraph of §2204 of 18 GCA is specifically  
4 *amended* to read as follows:

5 “Whenever any amendment of the articles of incorporation or a new  
6 bylaw is adopted, such amendment or bylaw *shall* be attached to the original  
7 articles or bylaws in the office of the corporation and a copy thereof duly  
8 certified to by a majority of the directors and countersigned by the secretary  
9 or clerk of the corporation, *shall* be filed with the Director of Revenue and  
10 Taxation, who *shall* attach the same to the original articles of incorporation  
11 and original bylaws on file in his office and charge the sum of Twenty  
12 Dollars (\$20.00) for this service.”

18 **Section 58.** The second paragraph of §6101 of Chapter 6 of 18 GCA is  
19 specifically *amended* to read as follows:

20 “*If* such designation has not been filed with the Director of Revenue  
21 and Taxation, or if process against any domestic corporation cannot, with the  
22 exercise of due diligence, be served upon the person designated or in any  
23 other manner provided by law, service may be had upon such corporation by  
24 delivering to the Director of Revenue and Taxation, or to any person  
25 employed in his office in the capacity of a deputy, duplicate copies of such  
26 process, together with a fee of Forty Dollars (\$40.00), which *shall* be  
27 included in the taxable costs of the suit, action, or proceeding. Upon the

1 receipt of such process and fee, the Director of Revenue and Taxation *shall*  
2 forthwith give notice of the service of such process to the corporation at its  
3 principal office in Guam, and *shall* deliver to such office, a copy of such  
4 process. The defendant *shall* appear and answer within thirty (30) days after  
5 such service upon the Director of Revenue and Taxation.”

15 demand may be served. The fee for service of process *shall* be Forty

17 (e) Every foreign corporation which transacts business on Guam  
18 without having been authorized to transact business on Guam thereby  
19 submits itself to the jurisdiction of the courts of Guam, and also thereby  
20 designates the Director of Revenue and Taxation as its agent upon whom  
21 any process, notice or demand upon it may be served in any action or  
22 proceeding arising out of or in connection with the transaction of  
23 business on Guam. The fee for service of process *shall* be Forty Dollars  
24 (\$40.00).”

8 prescribed by the laws of the society or order, or of the diocese, synod or  
9 district organization of the church, the board of directors or trustees to be *not*  
10 less than five (5) nor *more* than fifteen (15). For the filing of such articles of  
11 incorporation, the Director of Revenue & Taxation *shall* collect Twenty-five  
12 Dollars (\$25.00).”

13 **Section 62.** 18 GCA §25601 is *amended* to read as follows:

14           **“§25601. Dissolution Defined.** The dissolution of a partnership is  
15 the change in the relationship of the partners caused by any partner ceasing  
16 to be associated in the carrying on as distinguished from the winding up of  
17 the business. The fee for the filing a dissolution of a partnership *shall* be  
18 Twenty-five Dollars (\$25.00).”

19 **Section 63.** Item (4) of §25616(a) of 18 GCA is hereby *amended* to read as

22 year following the year in which its application is filed, on a date specified

25 by an LLP in a given year be more than One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00)

2 any material changes in the information contained in the partnership's

9 "**§26108. Foreign Partnership; Agent.** Every co-partnership, other  
10 than those mentioned in §26102 of this Chapter, domiciled outside of Guam,

12 days from the time it commences to do business therein, file in the office of  
13 the Director of Revenue & Taxation of Guam, a designation of some person  
14 residing within Guam upon whom process issued by authority of or under  
15 any law of Guam, may be served. A copy of such designation, duly certified  
16 by the Director of Revenue & Taxation, is sufficient evidence of such  
17 appointment. Such process may be served on the person so designated, or,  
18 in the event that no such person is designated, then on the Director of  
19 Revenue and Taxation, together with a fee of Forty Dollars (\$40.00) which  
20 *shall* be included as taxable cost in judicial proceedings, and the service is a  
21 valid service on such partnership."

22 **Section 66.** Subsection (c) of §3202 of 19 GCA is hereby *amended* to read  
23 as follows:

24 "(c) Applications for a marriage license *shall* be made on a form  
25 prescribed by the Director of Public Health and Social Services and must be  
26 sworn to by both applicants before the Director of Public Health and Social  
27 Services or his delegate. No license *shall* be issued until after the expiration

1 of five (5) days after filing of the application, unless the applicant *shall* pay a

4 the immediate issuance of a marriage license.”

15 any day *shall* be obligatory upon all the judges, the Director of Revenue and  
16 Taxation, the Director of Administration or the Director of Public Health  
17 and Social Services. The fee *shall* be Twenty-five Dollars (\$25.00).”

18 **Section 69.** 19 GCA §3209 is hereby *amended* to read as follows:

19 “**§3209. Issuance of Certified Copies of Certificate and License to**  
20 **Parties.** The Office of Vital Statistics, after the filing of the original license  
21 and certificate, *shall*, upon request of and for either party, and after payment  
22 of a fee of Ten Dollars (\$10.00) for each copy, make a certified copy of  
23 license and certificate of marriage.”

24 **Section 70.** A new §104121 is hereby *added* to Chapter 104 of 21 GCA to

2 deposit into a trust account any down payment, earnest money deposit, or  
3 other funds that should be held within a trust account, *shall* pay a penalty of  
4 One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) for each violation.”

5 **Section 71.** §104410 of Chapter 104 of 21 GCA is *amended* to read as

7 “§104410. **License Fee.** The original real estate broker’s license fee

20 original real estate broker’s license within three (3) years from the date of  
21 filing his application, said application *shall* thereupon lapse and *no* further

**FEES AND CHARGES ASSESSED BY THE

**"§60320. Fee Schedule.** The recorder, notwithstanding any other provisions of law and exclusive of any documents tax, is authorized and directed to collect the following fees:

(a) For recording or filing any deed, agreement, assignment, amendment, addendum, lease, contract, assumption, bill of sale, mortgage, horizontal property regime transfer document, any of the foregoing covering one specific lot or parcel of land: Twenty-five Dollars (\$25.00) with Five Dollars (\$5.00) for each attachment or exhibit thereon plus Fifty Cents (\$.50) per page of the attachment or exhibit.

(b) For recording or filing of each instrument, court order, judgment, stipulation, decree, lis pendens, declaration of taking, abstract of judgment, abstracts, affidavit, bond, bankruptcy, certificates, lien, levy, order, claim, declaration, power of attorney (general & special), finding of facts, findings, final judgment and summons: Twenty-five Dollars (\$25.00) with Five Dollars (\$5.00) for each attachment or exhibit thereon plus Fifty Cents (\$.50) per page of the attachment or exhibit.

(c) For each additional lot or parcel of land involved in any single transaction as listed in paragraphs (a) or (b), a fee of: Ten Dollars (\$10.00) per parcel.

1 (d) For recording or filing of each cancellation, satisfaction, dismissal,  
2 release, termination, waiver, withdrawal, easement, consent, grant, notices,  
3 rights of way, rights of entry, revocation or other lien: Fifteen Dollars  
4 (\$15.00) with Five Dollars (\$5.00) for every attachment or exhibit thereon,  
5 plus Fifty Cents (\$.50) per page of the attachment or exhibit.

6 (e) For recording or filing of an approved survey map a fee of  
7 Twenty-five Dollars (\$25.00) plus Five Dollars (\$5.00) per additional sheet  
8 thereof plus Ten Dollars (\$10.00) per lot created by a subdivision or  
9 parceling survey map and said fee *shall* also apply to land registration, re-  
10 subdivision, retracement, recertification, or revisions of survey maps.

11 (f) For a certified or authenticated copy of a certificate of title or a  
12 certificate of guaranteed claim a fee of Fifteen Dollars (\$15.00) or for a bail  
13 bond a fee of Twenty-five Dollars (\$25.00) plus One Dollar (\$1.00) per  
14 endorsement on the memorial estate.

15 (g) For furnishing written reports on areas, ownerships, lot  
16 numbers, descriptions, or other recorded information, for each lot or parcel  
17 of land: Ten Dollars (\$10.00).

18 (h) For reproducing services costing the government *less* than One  
19 Dollar (\$1.00), the Director of Land Management *shall* promulgate a  
20 schedule of fees thereof, all such fees to be under One Dollar (\$1.00) plus  
21 Fifty Cents (\$.50) charge for each additional page over five (5) pages.

22 (i) For recording or filing any documents required to be recorded by  
23 law for which a fee has not been provided, for each page or fraction thereof:  
24 Five Dollars (\$5.00).

25 (j) **PROCESSING FEE FOR CERTIFICATE OF TITLE:**

26 (1) First Issuance of Certificate of Title in a Land Registration  
27 Case, a fee of Forty Dollars (\$40.00)

1 (2) Issuance of Certificate of Title with one (1) current title  
2 cancellation, a fee of Sixty-five Dollars (\$65.00).

3 (3) Issuance of Certificate of Title with two (2) to five (5) Title  
4 cancellations, a fee of One Hundred Twenty-five Dollars  
5 (\$125.00).

6 (4) Issuance of Certificate of Title with six (6) or more Title  
7 cancellations, a fee of One Hundred Ninety Dollars  
8 (\$190.00).

9 (5) Fee of One Dollar (\$1.00) per endorsement on the memorial  
10 estate *shall* apply to the processing fee for certificate of Title  
11 under (a), (b), (c) and (d).

12 *Note: Sealed copy of a Certificate of Title shall be provided by*  
13 *Deputy Recorder.*

14 **(k) ABSTRACT OF TITLE AND RESEARCH PROCESSING**  
15 **FEES:**

16 (1) Fee of One Thousand Dollars (\$1000.00) for abstract on  
17 unregistered parcel for court action and/or by order of the  
18 court.

19 (2) Fee schedule on the type of research listed below on  
20 parcels *shall* be assessed with the following:

21 (A) Research on one (1) parcel for the most current  
22 documented ownership, a Twenty-five Dollar (\$25.00)  
23 fee, plus the fee required by §60320.

24 (B) Research on a parcel of less than one (1) acre,  
25 from the basic lot to the current parcel description, a fee  
26 of Fifty Dollars (\$50.00) plus the fee required by §60320.

1 (C) Research on a parcel of less than one (1)  
2 hectare, from the basic lot to the current parcel  
3 description, a fee of Seventy-five Dollars (\$75.00), and a  
4 Ten Dollar (\$10.00) fee for each lot description provided,  
5 plus the fee required by §60320.

6 (D) Research on a parcel of less than one (1) acre,  
7 from the basic lot to the current consolidated parcel  
8 description, a fee of Seventy-five Dollars (\$75.00).

9 (E) Research on a parcel of less than two (2) acres,  
10 from the basic lot to the current parceled description less  
11 than six (6) lots, a fee of One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00),  
12 and a Ten Dollar (\$10.00) fee for each lot description  
13 provided.

14 (F) Research on parcels or lots, from the basic lot  
15 to the current tract subdivision description, a fee will be  
16 assessed as follows:

17 (i) tract subdivision with less than ten (10) Lots: One  
18 Hundred Dollars (\$100.00).

19 (ii) tract subdivision with less than twenty (20) Lots:  
20 One Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$150.00).

21 (iii) tract subdivision over twenty (20) Lots, research  
22 fee *shall* be One Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$150.00) plus  
23 Two Dollars (\$2.00) per additional lot.

24 (3) Service *shall* be provided pursuant to Subsection (k) only to  
25 persons eligible for “public assistance”, as provided in  
26 §2905(a) Chapter 2, Title 10 Guam Code Annotated,  
27 Program Participation and Eligibility Standards.

1           *Note: Abstract of Title Report shall be provided by the Deputy*  
2           *Recorder.*

3           All monies received pursuant hereto *shall* be deposited in the Department of  
4 Land Management Land Survey Revolving Fund (LSRF).”

5           **Section 2.** §20101 of Title 11 Guam Code Annotated is *amended* to read:

6           “**§20101. Realty Conveyance: Amount.** A tax is established on all  
7 conveyances, deeds, instruments, or writings whereby any lands, tenements,  
8 or other realty *shall* be sold, granted, transferred, or otherwise conveyed to  
9 the purchaser or purchasers, or to any other person or persons designated by  
10 such purchaser or purchasers, as follows: Five Dollars (\$5.00) for each One  
11 Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) or fraction thereof on the true consideration or

13 property, the tax *shall* be collected on the net amount of the consideration

16 addressing deficiencies in existing programs, eliminating duplication of effort, and  
17 abolishing agencies and programs that do not work.

20       (a) There is hereby established the Sunset and Rightsizing Commission.  
21 The Commission *shall* review all executive branch agencies and programs  
22 according to a schedule set by the Commission, but *no later than* one (1) year after

24       (b) All executive branch agencies and programs *shall* be realigned, modified  
25 *or* abolished one (1) year after the Commission submits its recommendations and

2 agency or program may be extended by the Commission for an additional year.

3 (c) The Commission shall be comprised of seven (7) members, four (4) of

27 *administration for the preceding quarter. Said report shall be in the form of*

1 financial statements *or* revenue and expenditure reports for every fund he  
2 administers, regardless of whether said fund is appropriated, non-appropriated,  
3 local *or* federal and regardless of the source of the funding. This and every  
4 reporting requirement imposed by this Act or any act pertaining to FY 2007 *shall*  
5 be subject to the following if any *or* all of the following requirements are not met:

- 6 (a) providing a written report;
- 7 (b) providing an electronic format of the report; and
- 8 (c) posting the report on the website.

9 The director of any government agency receiving Funds pursuant to this Act,  
10 regardless of the source of the agency's appropriations and revenue, *shall* have his  
11 gross salary per pay period and the gross salaries per pay period of his deputy and  
12 Chief Financial Officer reduced by twenty percent (20%), for the remainder of the  
13 Fiscal Year 2007, for failing to comply with any reporting requirements mandated  
14 by this Act and those reporting requirements contained in Section 2, Chapter II,  
15 Part VI of Public Law 28-149 and Section 2, Chapter VI of Public Law 28-150.  
16 Copies of the personnel actions evidencing the salary reduction *shall* be provided  
17 to the Speaker of *I Liheslatura*, the Office of the Public Auditor, and posted on the  
18 department/agency website. Beginning with the third quarter of Fiscal Year 2007,  
19 the Office of the Public Auditor shall provide notice to all directors of their  
20 responsibility under this section three (3) days before the end of each quarter. The  
21 Public Auditor *shall* prepare letters attesting to the failure to comply that caused  
22 the salary reduction for placement in each of the aforementioned responsible  
23 officials' respective personnel files. For the purposes of this Section, a director  
24 *shall* include the head of a department, agency, autonomous agency, semi-  
25 autonomous agency, or public corporation, including, *but not limited to*, the  
26 Superintendent of Education, the President of the University of Guam, the  
27 President of Guam Community College, the General Manager of the Guam

1 Educational Telecommunication Corporation, the Director of the Guam Public  
2 Library System, the Executive Director of the Mayors Council of Guam, the  
3 Executive Director of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* and the Administrator of the Courts  
4 of Guam.

5 Any person who undergoes a reduction in salary pursuant to this provision,  
6 who is transferred to a position in another department, agency, *or* instrumentality  
7 of the government of Guam that has a greater gross salary per pay period, *shall* not  
8 be paid a salary greater than the reduced salary resulting from the application of  
9 this Section for the remainder of Fiscal Year 2007.”

10 **Section 16.** Section 4(a) of Public Law 29-01 is hereby *amended* to read:

11 **“Section 4. Revised FY 2008 Executive Budget.**

12 (a) *I Maga’lahen Guåhan* shall submit, *no later than* May 10, 2007, to the  
13 Speaker of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan*, the Revised Fiscal Year 2008 Executive Budget  
14 and *shall* incorporate therein his Deficit Elimination Plan and the departmental  
15 budget allocation adjustments required by said Plan. The revised FY 2008 Budget  
16 *shall* include adjustments resulting from any line of credit *or* debt instrument that  
17 requires payment from FY 2008 revenues.”

18 **Section 17. Modification of Planned Expenditures.** §4109(c)(3) of 5  
19 GCA is *amended* to read:

20 “(3) Modify *or* withhold the planned expenditures at any time during the  
21 appropriation period *if* the Bureau of Budget and Management Research finds that  
22 such expenditures are greater than those necessary to execute the programs at the  
23 level authorized by *I Maga’lahi* (the Governor) and *I Liheslatura* (the Legislature),  
24 *or* that the receipts and surpluses will be insufficient to meet the authorized  
25 expenditure levels, provided that no planned expenditures necessary to provide  
26 every public school student an adequate public education *shall* be modified *or*  
27 withheld. The Director of the Bureau of Budget and Management Research, in

1 collaboration with the Director of Revenue and Taxation and the Director of  
2 Administration, *shall* determine revenue tracking for every fiscal year based on the  
3 actual collections of every preceding month, and prepare monthly Comparative  
4 Revenue and Expenditure Analysis Reports that compare the budgeted and actual  
5 revenues and departmental program appropriations with expenditures and  
6 encumbrances. *If* revenues are tracking below projected revenues for the year, the  
7 Bureau of Budget and Management Research *shall* adjust and sequester an amount  
8 of the remaining allotments, *except* for those of the Guam Public School System,  
9 equal to the percentage of revenues that are below the fiscal year's projected  
10 revenues. The Director of the Bureau of Budget and Management Research, the  
11 Director of Administration, and the Director of Revenue and Taxation *shall* certify  
12 said reports, which *shall* be transmitted to *I Maga'lahaen Guåhan* and the Speaker  
13 of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* no later than fifteen (15) days after the end of each  
14 month. The Director of the Bureau of Budget and Management Research *shall* be  
15 personally liable for allotments released in excess of anticipated cash receipts for  
16 the fiscal year in which allotments are released, and *shall* be subject to the  
17 liabilities and penalties imposed in Article 1 of Chapter 14 of 4 GCA.”

18       **Section 18.** §22904 of Article 9, Chapter 22, 5 GCA is *repealed* and  
19 *reenacted* to read:

20       **“Deposits and Appropriations.** All revenues in excess of expenditures  
21 authorized through appropriations from the General Fund *shall* be deposited in the  
22 Rainy Day Fund. However, no deposits to the Rainy Day Fund *shall* be made *if*  
23 the Fund's assets exceed twenty-five percent (25%) of the average gross operating  
24 requirements funded by the General Fund. No appropriations from the Rainy Day  
25 Fund *shall* be made that reduce the Rainy Day Fund below the said twenty-five  
26 percent (25%) average of the gross operating requirements funded by the General  
27 Fund.”

1           **Section 19.** §22906 of Article 9, Chapter 22, 5 GCA is *amended* to read:

2           “**§22906. Investment.** The Director of Administration *shall* invest money  
3 held in the Rainy Day Fund in any type of investment approved for the Retirement  
4 Fund. All proceeds and income from investments of the Rainy Day Fund *shall* be  
5 deposited in the Rainy Day Fund provided that *if* the Fund exceeds twenty-five  
6 (25%) of the average gross operating requirements funded by the General Fund the  
7 amount *greater than* said twenty-five percent (25%) *shall* be deposited in the  
8 General Fund.

9           **Section 20.** Section 26 of Chapter 2 Part I of Public Law 28-68 is hereby  
10 *repealed and reenacted* to read as follows:

11           “**Section 26. GPSS Compensation Plan Review.** Section 2 of Public Law  
12 28-036 is hereby *amended* to read as follows:

13           **Section 2. GPSS Compensation Plan Review.** The Civil Service  
14 Commission (‘Commission’), in consultation with the Guam Public School System  
15 (GPSS), immediately upon enactment hereof, and every three (3) years thereafter,  
16 *shall* review and upgrade, as needed, the Compensation Plans of certificated  
17 teachers, guidance counselors, and school librarians of GPSS, to be competitive  
18 with the U.S. national average. Only full-time certified teachers, full-time ~~certified~~  
19 guidance counselors, and full-time ~~certified~~ school librarians of GPSS *shall* be  
20 entitled to additional compensation pursuant to this Section *or* the Commission’s  
21 review of the GPSS Compensation Plan. The Commission *shall* enact the upgraded  
22 Compensation Plans of full-time Certificated teachers, guidance counselors, and  
23 school librarians of GPSS within sixty (60) days after commencement of its  
24 review.”

25           **Section 21.** Subparagraph 15A301(a)(2)(i) of Chapter 15, Title 17 GCA is  
26 hereby *amended* to read:

1           “(i) United States citizens, *or* a permanent resident alien, who has completed  
2 a minimum of three (3) but *no more than* four (4) academic years and meets all  
3 academic credit requirements for graduation during attendance in a public, non-  
4 public, *or* DODEA high school on Guam; and.”

5           **Section 22. Real Property Tax Amnesty.** Notwithstanding Title 5 GCA  
6 §22425, all real property tax proceeds levied pursuant to Title 11 GCA §24103 for  
7 the years prior to and including the year 2005, and collected by the Department of  
8 Revenue Taxation Real Property Amnesty Program, *shall* be deposited into the  
9 Treasury of Guam to the credit of the General Fund for the payment of General  
10 Fund obligations.

11           **Section 23. Notification of Responsibility.** The notification by the Office  
12 of the Public Auditor, of all directors of their responsibilities pursuant to Public  
13 Law 28-149, Section 3, Part VI of Chapter II and Public Law 28-150, Section 3, of  
14 Chapter VI of Public Law 28-150 as amended by this Act, *shall* be effective  
15 beginning the third quarter of Fiscal Year 2007.

16           **Section 24.** Section 2 of Chapter V of Public Law 28-150 is *amended* to  
17 read:

18           **“Section 2. Retirement Option for Government of Guam**  
19 **Employees upon the Complete Remittance of Individual Retirement Fund**  
20 **Contributions.** Members of the Government of Guam Retirement Fund who  
21 meet the minimum eligibility requirements for retirement *shall* be permitted to  
22 retire upon the complete remittance of their outstanding individual contributions to  
23 the Fund. Such contributions *shall* include the employee and employer retirement  
24 contributions. Any and all fees, interest at actuarial rates, and penalties associated  
25 with the requirements set forth by the Government of Guam Retirement Fund *shall*  
26 be paid by the Government.

1 This Section does not restrict the continuing remittance of existing  
2 Retirement Fund contributions as required by law or as set forth by the  
3 Government of Guam Retirement Fund. By the fifteenth (15<sup>th</sup>) day of each month,  
4 the Director of the Government of Guam Retirement Fund *shall* provide a detailed  
5 report to the Speaker of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* regarding said remittances and  
6 number of retirements for the prior month pursuant to this Section. Nothing herein  
7 *shall* be construed to abrogate any of the provisions of Public Law 28-38.”

8 **Section 25.** The Guam Waterworks Authority (GWA) *shall*, in the future,  
9 enact all rules and regulations according to the Administrative Adjudication Act.  
10 GWA *shall* bring its current administrative rules and regulations into conformance  
11 with law, including the Administrative Adjudication Act, within one hundred  
12 twenty (120) days, *or* its rules *shall* be of no further force *or* effect. Any GWA  
13 employees *or* agents who enforce GWA rules and regulations *shall* specify, in  
14 writing, the rule *or* regulation being enforced *or* authorizing the action taken,  
15 without which specification said action *shall* be void. GWA employees *or* agents  
16 *shall* not be held personally liable for losses caused to ratepayers when acting at  
17 the direction of superiors, including the Consolidated Commission on Utilities,  
18 subject to the provisions of 4 GCA §3106, including costs incurred and attorney’s  
19 fees, for actions undertaken in violation hereof.”

20 **Section 26.** A new Chapter 13 is *added* to Title 5 Guam Code Annotated to  
21 read:

7           **§13101. Declaration Of Policy.** The policy of *I Liheslatura* is to  
8 promote simplicity, economy, efficiency, modernization, and streamlining of  
9 the delivery of services by the executive branch of the Government of  
10 Guam. This policy will enable the executive branch to pursue accelerated  
11 economic growth and comparable social development by:

12           (a) Determining which mandates imposed on the executive branch are  
13 funded, unfunded *or* underfunded, and eliminating unnecessary mandates;

14           (b) Prioritizing executive branch services, activities, and functions;

15           (c) Promoting the modernization and streamlining of government  
16 consistent with the public service needs of the citizenry;

17           (d) Eliminating duplicative and overlapping services, activities, and  
18 functions through consolidation and integration;

19           (e) Eliminating services, activities, and functions not necessary to the  
20 efficient conduct of government;

21           (f) Enhancing the skills of public service personnel through  
22 continuous training and education.

23           **§13102. Commission on Modernization of the Government of Guam for**  
24 **the Twenty-first (21<sup>st</sup>) Century and Beyond (COM-21).**

25           (a) To realize the policy set forth by §13101, there is hereby created  
26 “The Commission on Modernization of the Government of Guam for the  
27 Twenty-first (21<sup>st</sup>) Century and Beyond” (COM-21).

1 (b) The Commission *shall* be composed of eleven (11) members as  
2 follows:

3 (1) Three (3) members *shall* be appointed by *I Maga'lahen*  
4 *Guåhan*, at least one (1) of whom *shall* be from the classified  
5 service of the government of Guam, and at least one (1) of  
6 whom *shall* not be a government employee;

7 (2) One (1) member *shall* be appointed by the Speaker of *I*  
8 *Liheslaturan Guåhan*, who may appoint himself;

9 (3) One (1) member *shall* be appointed by the Minority  
10 Leader of *I Liheslaturan Guahån*, who may appoint himself;

11 (4) Three (3) members from the Judiciary *shall* be appointed  
12 by the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Guam, at least one  
13 (1) of whom *shall* be from the classified service of the courts  
14 and at least one (1) of whom *shall* not be a government  
15 employee;

16 (5) One (1) member *shall* be appointed by the President of  
17 the Mayors' Council, who may appoint himself;

18 (6) The Public Auditor of Guam, who *shall* be a member *ex*  
19 *officio*;

20 (7) The Director of the Civil Service Commission of the  
21 Government of Guam, who *shall* be a member *ex officio*.

22 (c) The term of any appointee *shall* expire with the term of the  
23 respective appointing authority.

24 (d) Any appointed member of the Commission who fails to attend  
25 three (3) consecutive regularly scheduled meetings, without being excused  
26 by a motion passed by the Commission, *shall* automatically be disqualified

1 from serving and the respective appointing authority *shall* then appoint a  
2 replacement for said member.

3 **§13103. Duties of the Commission.**

4 (a) The Commission *shall* elect from among its membership a  
5 Chairperson, Vice Chairperson, Secretary, and Spokesperson of the  
6 Commission at its first organizational meeting.

7 (b) The Chairperson, with the approval of the Commission, *shall*  
8 detail, in accordance with applicable Civil Service laws and personnel rules,  
9 and after consultation with the officials of the various instrumentalities of  
10 the Government of Guam, such personnel he deems necessary for the  
11 Commission to perform its duties.

12 (c) The Commission *shall* formulate policy guidelines consistent  
13 with existing law that it *shall* follow in executing this Chapter.

14 (d) The Commission *shall* suggest changes to existing law and new  
15 legislation and submit draft legislation to *I Liheslatura*.

16 (e) The Commission *shall* conduct public hearings for the  
17 purposes of consulting with public officers and their employees and of  
18 reconciling conflicting interests that arise from modernization and  
19 streamlining.

20 (f) The Commission *shall* consider and make use of such studies  
21 and recommendations as may be presented to it by the Bureau of Budget and  
22 Management Research, the Department of Administration, the Bureau of  
23 Planning, the Department of Revenue and Taxation, the Office of the Public  
24 Auditor, the Civil Service Commission, the Office of the Attorney General  
25 of Guam, the University of Guam (UOG) School of Business and Public  
26 Administration, the Compiler of Laws, and such other governmental units *or*

1 agencies as it may designate, *or* such private entities and individuals as it  
2 may deem advisable.

3 (g) The office of the Commission *shall* be located at the Jesus and  
4 Eugenia Leon Guerrero - UOG School of Business and Public  
5 Administration (SBPA) Building. The School of Business and Public  
6 Administration *shall* serve as the Secretariat of the Commission and shall  
7 provide administrative and professional services to the Commission.  
8 Logistical support and resources for the School of Business and Public  
9 Administration in support of the Commission *shall* be provided by the  
10 Bureau of Statistics and Plans and the Guam State Clearing House. If  
11 necessary, the School of Business and Public Administration *shall* provide a  
12 annual budget request to the Speaker of *I Liheslatura* on the Commission's  
13 behalf for Fiscal Year 2008.

14 (h) The Commission is authorized to:

- 15 (1) review all legal mandates imposed on the government of  
16 Guam by existing law, including all unfunded and underfunded  
17 mandates (1950 to present);
- 18 (2) recommend to *I Liheslatura* the merger, coordination,  
19 consolidation, *or* integration of departments, agencies, offices,  
20 instrumentalities, and functions of the government;
- 21 (3) recommend to *I Liheslatura* the dissolution of  
22 departments, agencies, offices, instrumentalities, *or* functions  
23 which are *not* necessary for the efficient conduct of government  
24 functions, services and activities;

1 (4) recommend to *I Liheslatura* the elimination of  
2 overlapping and duplicative services, functions and activities of  
3 the government;

4 (5) recommend to *I Liheslatura* the transfer of functions,  
5 appropriations, equipment, property, records, and personnel  
6 from one (1) department, agency, office *or* instrumentality to  
7 another;

8 (6) recommend to *I Liheslatura* the creation, classification  
9 and dissolution of employment positions;

10 (7) recommend to *I Liheslatura* the standardization of  
11 salaries, materials and equipment throughout the government;  
12 and

13 (8) take actions necessary and desirable to promote economy,  
14 efficiency, modernization and streamlining the government of  
15 Guam.

16 (i) The Commission *shall* review and investigate the present status  
17 of Government departments, agencies, offices, and instrumentalities of the  
18 executive branch of government, including government owned *or* controlled  
19 corporations, provided that no office, agency *or* function *shall* be continued  
20 beyond a period authorized by law *or* beyond a time when it would have  
21 terminated without Commission review.

22 (j) The Office of the Public Auditor, the Guam Election  
23 Commission and the offices of the Village Mayors are excluded from  
24 Commission purview.

25 **§13104. Evaluating Criteria.** In its review of government agencies and in  
26 proposing reforms pursuant to this Chapter, the following principles *shall* guide the  
27 Commission:

1 (a) What are the options?

2 (b) What are the consequences of the various options?

3 (c) What are the savings, expenses, benefits and detriments of the  
4 options and consequences?

5 (d) Which options create the greatest savings and benefits for the  
6 people of Guam?

7 **§13105. Timelines.** The Commission *shall* submit an integrated plan of  
8 modernization and streamlining, which *shall* include all plans described by this  
9 Chapter, to *I Maga'lahaen Guåhan* no later than November 1<sup>st</sup>, 2007. Within thirty  
10 (30) days after receipt, *I Maga'lahi* *shall* return the plan together with his  
11 comments thereon and revisions thereto to the Commission. The Commission  
12 *shall*, within thirty (30) days after the plan's return, submit to *I Liheslaturan*  
13 *Guåhan* the final plan, with *or* without further modification, together with a  
14 declaration that the plan will accomplish the purposes of this Chapter. No such  
15 plan *shall* become effective unless approved by *I Liheslatura*, which must either  
16 accept it or reject it in total. After approval, *I Maga'lahi* *shall* immediately  
17 implement the plan subject to the Appropriation Act for that fiscal year.

18 **§13106. Provisions Regarding Personnel.** *If* it is necessary to reduce the  
19 personnel of any instrumentality pursuant to the modernization and streamlining  
20 plan, Guam's Civil Service laws regarding reduction in workforce *shall* apply,  
21 provided, that no current employee *shall* lose employment. Employees affected by  
22 the plan may transfer to other positions in the government service with no loss in  
23 pay, no loss of civil service eligibility and no interruption of pay or benefits.

24 **§13107. Guiding Principles.** The Commission on Modernization of the  
25 Government of Guam (COM-21) *shall*:

1 a) Establish an administrative system that is transparent,  
2 development-oriented, and respectful of the current and future needs of the  
3 population;

4 b) Consider past and present studies conducted by different  
5 entities in the government, the University of Guam, the federal government,  
6 and the private and non-profit sectors;

7 c) Concentrate on factual analyses of conditions and problems on  
8 Guam to develop feasible recommendations for administrative improvement;

9 d) Modernize and streamline administration to implement more  
10 effectively programs approved by *I Maga'lahi* and *I Liheslatura*;

11 e) Promote the greatest possible output from the government's  
12 human, financial and other resources.

13 f) Consolidate departments, agencies, offices, and other  
14 organizational units on the basis of major functions to minimize conflicts  
15 and duplication of activities and thus achieve simplicity, economy, and  
16 efficiency in government operations;

17 g) Encourage administrative decentralization or delegation of  
18 authority that creates greater participation and more effective working  
19 relationships at various levels of management;

20 h) Consider measures to clarify lines of authority, improve  
21 communication and strengthen accountability at various levels of  
22 management;

23 i) Adopt measures that curtail and modify practices and attitudes  
24 that prevent sound, honest, ethical and effective public administration;

25 j) Take into account appropriate cultural and environmental  
26 factors;

1 k) Organize modernization and streamlining panels, each of which  
2 *shall* be headed by a member of the Commission, each having six (6) to  
3 eight (8) members, who are acknowledged experts and practitioners in the  
4 field in question. Of the members of the panels, about one-fourth (1/4) *shall*  
5 come from the private sector, one-fourth (1/4) from the University of Guam  
6 and Guam Community College, and one-fourth (1/4) from the classified  
7 service of the government of Guam, and the remainder from the primary  
8 labor organization serving government employees.

9 l) The Commission *shall* divide its work into the following  
10 twenty-one (21) functional areas, with one (1) panel concentrating on each  
11 area. The areas *shall* include:

12 **Administration of Economic Development**

- 13 (a) Agricultural and Natural Resources Development  
14 (b) Commercial Development  
15 (c) Public Enterprises and Financial Institutions  
16 (d) Economic Planning and Program Implementation

17 **Administration of Education and Social Development**

- 18 (e) Education, Science and Technology  
19 (f) Labor, Manpower and Youth Development  
20 (g) Social Welfare  
21 (h) Health

22 **General Government Affairs**

- 23 (i) Disaster Administration and Territorial Security  
24 (j) Law Enforcement  
25 (k) Administration of Justice  
26 (l) Regulatory Administration

27 **Administrative Development**

- 1 (m) Revenue System and Administration  
2 (n) Budgeting and Financial Control  
3 (o) Field Organization and Village Municipal Government  
4 Relations  
5 (p) Civil Service Improvement  
6 (q) Office of *I Maga'Lahi* and Central Administrative Services  
7 **Administration of Indigenous Programs and Political Status**  
8 **Quest**  
9 (r) Chamorro Land Trust  
10 (s) Land for the Landless  
11 (t) Chamorro Language and Cultural Programs  
12 (u) Political Status Quest and Self Determination

13 **§13108. Modernization and Streamlining Panels and Committees.** (a)

14 The modernization streamlining panels *shall* serve as “idea” groups whose basic  
15 function *shall* be to create ideas and to make recommendations to the Commission  
16 regarding their respective assigned areas.

17 (b) There is hereby created a Coordinating and Development Committee  
18 composed of the Vice-chairpersons and Chairpersons of the twenty-one (21)  
19 panels, and headed by the Commission Chairperson. The Committee *shall*  
20 integrate and harmonize the work of the various panels preparatory to the  
21 consideration of specific proposals by the full Commission.

22 (c) The Executive Director of the Commission *shall* supervise the technical  
23 staff and secretariat, which *shall* provide technical and administrative support. The  
24 technical staff *shall* be headed by a technical staff director and *shall* assist the  
25 Commission and panels in these areas:

- 26 (i) Creation of the Integrated Modernization and Streamlining Plan.

1 (ii) Studying government modernization and streamlining from the  
2 date of enactment to October 1<sup>st</sup>, 2007.

3 (iii) Interviews and in-depth studies of departments, agencies and  
4 offices which fall within their respective areas.

5 (iv) Technical assistance to both the Commission and the panels.

6 (d) The Commission *shall* first formulate policy guidelines and work  
7 schedules. Then, it *shall* initiate active panel work. Hearings *shall* be conducted  
8 to seek input of knowledgeable individuals and professional groups. Proposals  
9 developed *shall* be reviewed by the Commission as a body through panel  
10 Chairpersons.

11 (e) Panel reports *shall* be completed and submitted by June 1<sup>st</sup>, 2007 and  
12 *shall* subsequently be voted upon by the Commission, which *shall* obtain input  
13 from the departments, agencies and offices concerned and the general public. The  
14 Modernization and Streamlining Plan *shall* reflect the ideas and practical insights  
15 of a cross-section of the Guam community, including political representatives,  
16 career civil servants, technician, professors, business executives, labor leaders and  
17 others.

18 (f) To maintain the integrity of the various modernization and  
19 streamlining plans and to insure legislative approval, *I Maga'lahi shall* issue an  
20 Executive Order creating the Governor's Committee to review and revise the  
21 Integrated Modernization and Streamlining Plan. The Committee *shall* assist *I*  
22 *Maga'lahi* in reviewing the proposals and *shall* obtain input from the Governor's  
23 cabinet and the community.

24 (g) Upon submission of the Plan to *I Maga'lahi*, he *shall* immediately call  
25 a series of Cabinet meetings to discuss the Plan. Subsequently, *I Maga'lahi* may  
26 invite members of *I Liheslatura* from both parties to provide their opinions  
27 regarding the Plan.”

1       **Section 27.** Subsection (d) of Section 4403 of Chapter 4, 4 GCA is *repealed*  
2 and *reenacted* to read:

3           “(d) All personnel actions regarding the classified service *shall* be  
4 filed with the Commission within twenty (20) days after their effective date.  
5 The Commission may set aside and declare null and void any personnel  
6 action if the Commission finds that it was taken in violation of personnel  
7 laws or rules, provided, however, that this Section *shall not* be deemed to  
8 permit appeals by employees from adverse actions not covered by  
9 Subsection (b) above. Prior to declaring any personnel action null and void,  
10 the Commission *shall* provide written notice of the alleged violation to the  
11 agency head. The agency head *shall* respond within ten (10) days after  
12 receipt of the notice to the Commission’s proposed action. All actions taken  
13 by the Commission pursuant to this Section *shall* be taken within one  
14 hundred twenty (120) days after the personnel action is filed with the  
15 Commission. The Civil Service Commission *shall* submit its final decision  
16 to *I Liheslatura*. The Commission’s decision *shall* be final but subject to  
17 judicial review.”

18       **Section 28.** Effective sixty (60) days from the enactment of this Act, the  
19 nomenclature “Business Privilege Tax” *shall* be used in all laws, documents,  
20 regulations and on all official forms and documents of the government of Guam to  
21 describe any transactions *or* activities formerly described as the Gross Receipts  
22 Tax.

23       **Section 29. Statement of Legislative Purpose.** The Office of Finance and  
24 Budget was originally established by Section 23 of Public Law 25-176, a  
25 supplemental appropriations act to the General Appropriations Act of 2001, a  
26 section which has not been codified. This Act codifies the laws creating the Office  
27 of Finance and Budget and expands OFB’s purpose, functions and duties.

1 (a) A new Chapter 13 is *added* to Title 2 of the Guam Code Annotated as  
2 follows:

3 **“CHAPTER 13**

4 **OFFICE OF FINANCE AND BUDGET**

5 **§13101. Legislative Findings and Intent.** *I Liheslaturan Guåhan*  
6 recognizes the need for the independent forecasting of government revenues, with  
7 the minimum goal of adopting the best econometric model for the government of  
8 Guam. There is a need to compile and provide to *I Liheslaturan Guåhan*, *I*  
9 *Maga'lahaen Guåhan* and the public, forecasts of revenues *no less than* five (5)  
10 years immediately beyond the operating budget year; expenditure information *no*  
11 *less than* five (5) years past; consistent year-by-year analysis of the impact of  
12 federal expenditures on Guam's economy and employment; and information related  
13 to the formulation of short and long-term fiscal policy.

14 Future fiscal policy must be consistent with government reorganization,  
15 performance-based budgeting, measurable program goals and transparency. The  
16 present relationship between traditional and performance-based budgeting is  
17 crucial to our fiscal maturity, a goal that requires improved articulation and  
18 standards to measure goal-driven objectives and practical technological  
19 applications in budget formulation.

20 *I Liheslaturan Guåhan*, therefore, hereby creates the Office of Finance and  
21 Budget (“OFB”) to renew fiscal discipline through the practice of open  
22 government, cooperation between the legislative and executive branches, and the  
23 assignment of fiscal responsibility to appropriate government entities and officials,  
24 all to promote public confidence and government efficiency.

25 **§13102. Creation of Office.** There is hereby created, within *I*  
26 *Liheslaturan Guåhan*, under the supervision of the Committee on Ways and  
27 Means, or equivalent Standing Committee, the Office of Finance and Budget

1 (“OFB”), organized and operating as *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* may from time  
2 to time provide through its Standing Rules.

3 **§13103. Budget of Office.** The budget of the OFB *shall not* be  
4 included as part of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan*'s annual operating budget.

5 **§13104. Purpose of Office.** The OFB *shall* administer this Chapter  
6 and perform the responsibilities assigned to it by law and the Standing  
7 Rules. It *shall* coordinate and gather information relevant to government  
8 revenue projections, fiscal policy, legislative appropriations, taxation,  
9 revenue collection, government expenditures, general fund revenues, and  
10 special fund revenues.

11 **§13105. Administration of Office.** The Chairperson of the  
12 Committee on Ways and Means, or equivalent Standing Committee, *shall*  
13 appoint a Director who *shall* administer the OFB and perform other duties as  
14 prescribed by law and the Standing Rules. The Director *shall* also be  
15 responsible for any and all matters assigned to OFB by the Chairperson of  
16 the Committee on Ways and Means, or equivalent Standing Committee.

17 **§13106. Duties of Office.** The Office of Finance and Budget *shall*:

18 (a) use all available resources to develop and adopt a model for  
19 Guam's existing and projected economy which *shall* simulate the  
20 effect of revenue raising, the effect of any proposed benefits, optional  
21 revenue generation and the utility thereof;

22 (b) compile and provide to *I Liheslaturan Guåhan*, to *I*  
23 *Maga'lahi*, and to the public, forecasts of revenues, current and prior  
24 year expenditures, and surpluses or deficits;

25 (c) assess the impact of federal expenditures in Guam; and

1 (d) perform such other duties as are assigned to it by the  
2 Standing Rules of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* or the Chairperson of the  
3 Committee on Ways and Means.

4 **§13107. Special Accounting Service.** There is hereby established a  
5 Special Accounting Service work group comprised of a senior staff member  
6 of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan*'s Office of Finance and Budget; the Controller of  
7 the Department of Administration; the Chief of the Taxpayer Services  
8 Administration Branch of the Department of Revenue and Taxation; and the  
9 Budget Analyst Supervisor of the Bureau of Budget and Management  
10 Research. Said service *shall* meet from time to time to discuss and develop  
11 recommendations on fiscal policy, provide technical assistance to the Office  
12 of Finance and Budget, and share information relative to government  
13 finances. The senior staff member of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan*'s Office of  
14 Finance and Budget *shall* serve as Chairperson of the Special Accounting  
15 Service.

16 **§13108. Special Economic Service.** There *shall* be a Special  
17 Economic Service work group comprised of the Chairman of *I Liheslaturan*  
18 *Guåhan*'s Committee on Ways and Means, *or* equivalent Standing  
19 Committee; the Director of the Office of Finance and Budget; the Public  
20 Auditor; the Director of the Bureau of Budget and Management Research;  
21 the Director of Revenue and Taxation; the Director of Administration; the  
22 Administrator of the Guam Economic Development and Commerce  
23 Authority; the Senior Economist of the Department of Labor; the Chief  
24 Planner of the Bureau of Statistics and Plans; and the Administrator of  
25 Research and Evaluation (Research Manager) of the Guam Visitors Bureau.  
26 Said Service *shall* meet from time to time to discuss and develop  
27 recommendations on economic policy, provide technical assistance to the

1 Office of Finance and Budget, and share information relative to the state of  
2 the economy. The Chairperson of the Committee on Ways and Means, or  
3 equivalent Standing Committee, *shall* serve as Chairperson of the Special  
4 Economic Service.

5 **§13109. Executive Branch Accounting, Financial, and Economic**  
6 **Services.** *I Maga'lahañ Guåhan shall* provide the Office of Finance and  
7 Budget with any and all information and services it requires to fully execute  
8 this Chapter.

9 (a) Reports. *I Maga'lahañ Guåhan shall* report to *I Liheslaturan*  
10 *Guåhan* as follows:

11 (1) *No later than thirty (30) days after* the end of each month of  
12 a fiscal year, the revenue tracking for the General Fund, the Tourist  
13 Attraction Fund, Solid Waste Operations Fund (Tipping Fees),  
14 Territorial Education Facilities Fund, and the Guam Highway Fund  
15 for the balance of the fiscal year, based upon the actual collections of  
16 the preceding month, and prepare a comparative statement of "actual"  
17 and "projected" revenues. Such information *shall* be compiled in a  
18 report, in collaboration with the Director of Revenue and Taxation  
19 and the Director of Administration, certified by the Director of the  
20 Bureau of Budget and Management Research, and submitted to the  
21 Speaker of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan no later than thirty (30) days after*  
22 *the end of each month of the fiscal year;*

23 (2) On July 1, 2007, and on a semiannual basis thereafter, the  
24 impact of federal expenditures, including projections of federal  
25 expenditures on Guam, on Guam's economic growth, employment,  
26 tax revenues, and other variables, for the next year compared with the  
27 previous five (5) years; identify significant federal expenditures *or*

1 potential expenditures on Guam affecting military bases, installations,  
2 active duty and retired military personnel within Guam, as well as any  
3 impact of the changes in these expenditures. Such information *shall*  
4 be compiled in a report, certified by a majority of the members of the  
5 Special Economic Service, and submitted to the Speaker of *I*  
6 *Liheslaturan Guåhan*;

7 (3) On July 1, 2007, and on a semiannual basis thereafter, the  
8 impact of tourism expenditures on Guam's economy and employment,  
9 including projections of tourism expenditures on Guam, on Guam's  
10 economic growth, employment, tax revenues, and other variables, for  
11 the next year compared with the previous five (5) years; identify  
12 significant tourism expenditures *or* potential expenditures coming into  
13 Guam affecting tourism as well as the impact of the changes in these  
14 expenditures. Such information *shall* be compiled in a report,  
15 certified by a majority of the members of the Special Economic  
16 Service, and submitted to the Speaker of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan*; and

17 (4) Long-range forecasts of revenues and expenditures for each  
18 of the five (5) years immediately beyond the budget year. Such  
19 information *shall* be compiled in a report, certified by a majority of  
20 the members of the Special Economic Service and submitted to the  
21 Speaker of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan*."

22 **Section 30.** §23 of Public Law 25-176 is hereby *repealed* in its entirety.

23 **Section 31.** Public Law 27-19 is hereby *repealed* in its entirety.

24 **Section 32.** Public Law 27-42 is hereby *repealed* in its entirety.

25 **Section 33.** Public Law 28-149, Chapter II, Part VII is hereby *repealed* in  
26 its entirety.

27 **Section 34.** §58111 of Chapter 58 of 12 GCA is hereby *amended* to read:

1       “§58111. Grounds for Suspension, Rescission *or* Revocation. A  
2 Qualifying Certificate may be suspended, rescinded *or* revoked by *I Maga’lahen*  
3 *Guåhan* upon the recommendation of the Authority for the following reasons:

4           (a) Fraud. Fraud *or* misrepresentation of any material fact in  
5 the application for such Certificate;

6           (b) Noncompliance with Certificate. Failure to comply with  
7 any condition *or* obligation set out in the qualifying certificate, the  
8 Qualifying Certificate law and rules thereof, *or* any laws and rules of  
9 the government of Guam having a direct impact on the beneficiary’s  
10 activities. The Qualifying Certificate beneficiary may correct such  
11 noncompliance within twelve (12) months from the date it was  
12 notified in writing as to the nature of the noncompliance and reasons  
13 for such noncompliance. All benefits *shall* be suspended during this  
14 noncompliance period. Failure to correct such noncompliance within  
15 the period given *shall* result in revocation of the Qualifying  
16 Certificate;

17           (c) Bankruptcy. The filing by *or* against the Beneficiary of a  
18 petition for bankruptcy;

19           (d) Dissolution *or* death. A finding by the Attorney General  
20 that a corporate Beneficiary has been dissolved, that a partnership  
21 Beneficiary has been dissolved, *or* that an individual Beneficiary has  
22 died;

23           (e) Noncompliance with laws and rules. Failure to comply with  
24 any provision of this Chapter *or* with the applicable rules and  
25 regulations of the Authority.”

1       **Section 35. Executive Branch Travel Restrictions.** Funds appropriated  
2 by this Act, *shall not* be used for off-island travel *or* per diem by executive branch  
3 employees and officials except for:

- 4       (a) Travel that is federally funded;
- 5       (b) Travel that is specifically required to administer *or* secure federal  
6 grant programs;
- 7       (c) Travel by *I Maga'lahren Guåhan*, *I Segundu Na Maga'lahren Guåhan*,  
8 Mayors and Vice-Mayors, and other officials to represent the people  
9 of Guam at meetings and functions deemed critical to the well-being  
10 of the people of Guam by *I Maga'lahren Guåhan*, provided that the  
11 Director of Administration *shall* provide a monthly report to the  
12 Speaker of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* on such travel expenses by the 5<sup>th</sup>  
13 day of each subsequent month thereafter;
- 14       (d) Travel to promote tourism on Guam, provided that such travel is paid  
15 for by the Tourist Attraction Fund and is restricted to the General  
16 Manager *or* his designee, Board Members, professional staff of the  
17 Guam Visitors Bureau, and those individuals required for promotional  
18 activities;
- 19       (e) Travel by law enforcement personnel providing escort services for  
20 criminal suspects, detainees, and convicted felons being returned to  
21 Guam for judicial proceedings *or* being transferred to off-island  
22 correctional facilities;
- 23       (f) Travel by medical personnel providing escort services for patients  
24 requiring off-island medical treatment, and other escorts as  
25 specifically authorized by the Department of Public Health and Social  
26 Services pursuant to Guam law;
- 27       (g) Travel necessary for the enforcement of court orders;

- 1 (h) Travel under the Residential Treatment Fund;
- 2 (i) Travel required for employees requiring professional certification and
- 3 training.

4 **Section 36. Wireless Communications Restrictions.** Notwithstanding any

5 other provision of law, no government of Guam funds *shall* be expended for the

6 use of cellular telephones, cellular telephone service and other wireless telephone

7 service. This Section *shall* apply to the expenditure of any *or* all government of

8 Guam funds, *regardless* of source and inclusive of all funds expended by

9 autonomous agencies. Government of Guam funds may be spent on wireless

10 telephone service if the government of Guam will be reimbursed from Federal

11 funds or other grants. This Section *shall not* apply to *I Maga'lahren Guåhan*, *I*

12 *Segundu Na Maga'lahren Guåhan*, the Speaker of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan*, the Chief

13 Justice of the Supreme Court of Guam, the Presiding Judge of the Superior Court

14 of Guam, the Crisis Hotline Program of the Department of Mental Health and

15 Substance Abuse (for official use only), law enforcement officials, and on-call

16 health professionals at the Guam Memorial Hospital Authority, the Department of

17 Mental Health and Substance Abuse, the Department of Public Health and Social

18 Services, the Village Mayors and Vice Mayors, GFD and EMS officials, on-call

19 emergency management personnel and the Guam Medical Examiner.”

20 **Section 37. Restriction on the Home Use of Government of Guam**

21 **Vehicles.** Except where *expressly* permitted by 4 GCA, §1103(c), no government

22 of Guam owned, leased *or* rented vehicles may be driven home by an employee

23 unless such employee is on call as an emergency first responder.

24 **Section 38.** §3111 of Chapter 3, Title 2 GCA is *amended* to read:

25 “§3111. Oaths and Affirmations. The Speaker of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan*,

26 *or* the Chairperson of a Committee, *or* their designee, including the legislative

27 Sergeant-at-Arms *or* Assistant Sergeant-at-Arms, may administer oaths *or*

1 affirmations to a witness in any matter under examination in furtherance of a  
2 legislative proceeding, whether he is under subpoena *or* not, except that oaths *shall*  
3 be administered to all witnesses whenever fiscal matters are under examination.”

4 **Section 39. Revenue Tracking Report.** Section 5 of Chapter V of Public  
5 Law 28-150 is *amended* to read:

6 **“Section 5. Revenue Tracking Report.** The Director of the Bureau of  
7 Budget and Management Research, in collaboration with the Director of Revenue  
8 and Taxation and the Director of Administration *shall* determine, *no later than*  
9 thirty (30) days after the end of each month of Fiscal Year 2007, the revenue  
10 tracking for the balance of the fiscal year, based upon the actual collections of the  
11 preceding month and prepare a comparative statement of the “actual and  
12 “projected” revenues. Such information *shall* be compiled in a report, certified by  
13 each of the aforementioned Directors and submitted to the Speaker of *I*  
14 *Liheslaturan Guåhan* *no later than* thirty (30) days after the end of each month of  
15 the fiscal year. Such reports *shall* be submitted in written and electronic format  
16 and *shall* be posted quarterly on the Bureau of Budget and Management  
17 Research’s website.”

18 **Section 40. Additional Revenues to General Fund.** Except as otherwise  
19 provided for by this Act, exclusive of Guam Fire Department Fees, Alien Labor  
20 Certification Fees and fees deposited into the Better Public Services Fund, all  
21 revenues resulting from adjusted *or* new fees adopted by this Act shall be  
22 deposited into the General Fund.

23 **Section 41.** The Department of Revenue and Taxation *shall* include in its  
24 proposed fiscal year budget the costs, expenses, and attorney fees *or* salaries  
25 necessary for the Office of the Attorney General to provide legal services to the  
26 Department.

1           **Section 42. (a) Authorizing the Solicitation, Acceptance, Use and**  
2 **Administration of Gifts, Bequests and Donations by the Guam Medical**  
3 **Referral Office.** The Administrator of the Guam Medical Referral Office may  
4 solicit, accept, use and administer gifts, bequests and donations on behalf of the  
5 Guam Medical Referral Office. The Administrator *shall* deposit said funds into the  
6 Guam Medical Referral Office Trust Fund created by Subsection (b) hereof. Said  
7 fund *shall* be used for operations of the various Medical Referral Offices outside of  
8 Guam, except for privatized operations in the Republic of the Philippines, for  
9 purposes stated and intended by the donor that are consistent with the duties of the  
10 Guam Medical Referral Office. The Administrator *shall* submit to the Speaker of *I*  
11 *Liheslaturan Guåhan* and the Public Auditor, and post on the office’s website, a  
12 quarterly report identifying each donor and the amounts donated, including the fair  
13 market value of all gifts, bequests and donations, and describing the solicitation,  
14 acceptance, use and administration of gifts, bequests and donations.

15           **(b) Creation of a Guam Medical Referral Office Trust Fund.** There is  
16 hereby created, separate and apart from other funds of the government of Guam, a  
17 special fund known as the “Guam Medical Referral Office Trust Fund.” The Fund  
18 *shall* not be commingled with the General Fund *or* any other funds of the  
19 government of Guam. The Administrator of the Guam Medical Referral Office  
20 *shall* be the administrator of the Fund, may issue warrants of expenditure and *shall*  
21 maintain a record of all donations and expenditures.

22           **Section 43.** Section 4 Chapter IV Part I of Public Law 28-150 is hereby  
23 *amended* to read:

24           **“Section 4. Transfer Authority of *I Maga’lahen Guahan.*** *I Maga’lahen*  
25 *Guahan* is authorized to transfer funds between Fiscal Year 2007 General Fund  
26 Executive Branch appropriations provided that he *shall* transfer no more than  
27 fifteen percent (15%) of the appropriations made to the Department of Law, the

1 Mayors Council, the University of Guam, the Guam Community College, the  
2 Guam Public School System and the Guam Public School System Operations  
3 Fund. *I Maga'lahaen Guahan* shall provide a monthly report to the Speaker of *I*  
4 *Lihaslaturan Guahan* on all transfers from *or* to the Special Funds, the Department  
5 of Law, the University of Guam, the Guam Community College, the Guam Public  
6 School System, and the Guam Public School System Operations Fund during the  
7 previous month. Said report *shall* include, but *not be limited to*, amounts  
8 transferred, agencies *or* special funds from which funds are transferred to *or* from,  
9 and the reason for the transfer. Failure to provide the report by the 20<sup>th</sup> day of the  
10 month following the transfer *shall* terminate the transfer authority under this  
11 Section.”

12       **Section 44. Additional Revenues.** Notwithstanding §7120, Chapter 7 of  
13 Title 22 GCA and Section 44 of Chapter 6 of this Act, the sum of Five Hundred  
14 Thousand Dollars (\$500,000) collected from the additional revenues from  
15 registration fees for non-immigrant temporary workers for Fiscal Year 2007 *shall*  
16 be deposited into the Treasury of Guam to the credit of the General Fund for the  
17 payment of General Fund obligations.

18       **Section 45. Reductions.** The appropriations for the departments and  
19 agencies’ operations contained in Chapters III and IV of this Act *shall* be further  
20 reduced by the respective amounts itemized in the attached Appendix.”

21       **Section 46. Prohibition on the Use of Appropriations to Fill Vacant**  
22 **Positions.** Upon the effective date of this Act, appropriations made by Public Law  
23 28-149, Public Law 28-150 *or* this Act *shall not* be used to hire full-time  
24 employees to fill vacant positions within the departments, agencies, and  
25 instrumentalities of the Executive Branch of the government of Guam, except for:

- 1 (a) teachers, guidance counselors, school librarians,  
2 school health counselors, one-to-one school aides  
3 for children with special needs, special education  
4 professionals;
- 5 (b) attorneys; investigators and legal support  
6 personnel;
- 7 (c) nurses and doctors;
- 8 (d) temporary survey workers employed by the  
9 Department of Labor for the purpose of conducting  
10 employment surveys;
- 11 (e) licensed health care professional ancillary service  
12 positions at the Guam Memorial Hospital  
13 Authority, the Department of Mental Health and  
14 Substance Abuse, and the Department of Public  
15 Health and Social Services;
- 16 (f) faculty positions of the University of Guam and  
17 the Guam Community College;
- 18 (g) youth service workers and youth service worker  
19 assistants; and
- 20 (h) uniformed police, fire, corrections and related  
21 public safety positions;
- 22 (i) positions within the Mayors Council of Guam;
- 23 (j) positions appointed directly by *I Maga'lahen*  
24 *Guåhan*;
- 25 (k) revenue agents and other positions within the  
26 Department of Revenue and Taxation related to the

1 collection of government revenue and processing  
2 of income tax returns; and

3 (1) federally funded positions (at least 50% matching  
4 and 100%).”

5 **Section 47.** Section 4104 of Chapter 4, Division 1 of Title 17 Guam Code  
6 Annotated is hereby *amended* to read as follows:

7 **§4104. Standards for Curriculum and Textbook Adoption.** In order to  
8 ensure that the students of Guam's public and private schools receive adequate  
9 textbooks according to their varying scholastic abilities, the following curriculum  
10 and textbook adoption standards are prescribed:

11 (a) The Guam Education Policy Board adopt policies on the curricular needs  
12 of the school system, taking into account:

13 (1) The varying scholastic abilities of students;

14 (2) The varying vocational interests of students upon completing  
15 secondary education; and

16 (3) The changing societal expectations of education.

17 The Board *shall* adopt policies pertaining to the review, adoption and  
18 procurement of instructional materials, equipment and supplies including textbooks  
19 and related materials for use by all students attending school in Guam.

20 (b) The Board *shall not* delegate *or* negotiate the responsibility conferred in  
21 subsection (a) of this Section unless:

22 (1) The delegation of this duty is for expert *or* professional work  
23 activities leading up to and in preparation for the adoption of a multiple  
24 listing of textbooks; *or*

25 (2) The delegation of this duty is for expert or professional work  
26 activities leading up to curriculum adoption; or

27 (3) Duties are specified by law to be shared.

1 (c) The Board *shall* establish a standing committee of the Board called the  
2 Textbook Selection Committee (the *Committee*), which *shall* be chaired by a  
3 member of the appointed by the chairperson of the Board and *shall* consist of four  
4 (4) additional members, who may *or* may not be members of the Board appointed  
5 by the chairperson of the Committee. The chairperson *shall* make appointments  
6 from both the public and the private school sectors. The Board *shall* also establish  
7 two subcommittees, one of which *shall* be composed of educators from the public  
8 schools and the other of educators from the private schools. Each subcommittee  
9 *shall* examine textbooks and make recommendations thereon to the Committee,  
10 which will then make recommendations for adoption *or* disapproval of the  
11 proposals to the Board. Textbooks and other instructional materials adopted for  
12 each grade and subject field *shall* come from a multiple listing to meet the varying  
13 ability levels of elementary and secondary students in the territory. The Board *shall*  
14 also establish a textbook adoption calendar setting forth the subjects *or* courses for  
15 each grade level that are to be selected and ordered each year, on a rotation basis,  
16 *not to exceed* seven (7) years of continuous use for any one (1) textbook, and the  
17 critical dates to be met each year. In addition, the Board *shall* establish a similar  
18 but separate calendar for the textbook ordering process which will ensure that new  
19 and replacement textbooks are available in the classroom for the opening of school  
20 each year.

21 (d) It *shall* be the duty of the Committee to:

22 (1) Establish the criteria for the selection of texts for use by students  
23 attending public and private schools in Guam and ensure that such criteria  
24 are met;

25 (2) Review the curriculum changes and textbook adoption proposals  
26 submitted to it by the subcommittees, and make recommendations to the

1 Board to adopt *or* disapprove proposals of the subcommittees, and state the  
2 reasons therefore;

3 (3) Review the list of textbooks requested by the public and private  
4 schools for the next school year to ensure that the textbooks were selected  
5 from the multiple listing of textbooks adopted by the Board;

6 (4) Recommend to the Board the amount of advance appropriation  
7 necessary to purchase the textbooks; and

8 (5) Ensure that the textbook adoption calendar and the textbook  
9 ordering calendar established by the Board are adhered to.

10 (e) No school official or member of any committee or subcommittee created  
11 by the Board *shall* accept any emolument, money, *or* other valuable thing, *or* any  
12 inducement to directly *or* indirectly introduce, recommend, vote for, *or* otherwise  
13 influence the adoption *or* purchase of any textbooks *or* other instructional  
14 materials. Anyone who violates any of these prohibitions *shall* be guilty of a  
15 misdemeanor and *shall* be removed from the position occupied.

16 (f) The Board *shall* select and adopt a multiple list of textbooks for use by  
17 elementary and secondary grades. The list of textbooks *shall* be based on the  
18 recommendations of the subcommittees established pursuant to subsections (c) and  
19 (d) of this Section. The list *shall* consist of textbooks for each subject matter *or*  
20 course that address the varying scholastic abilities of students in Guam's schools.  
21 The Board *shall* act on the recommendation of the subcommittees and Committee  
22 within thirty (30) days after submission.

23 (g) It is the policy of the Board that no public funds *shall* be expended to  
24 purchase religious *or* sectarian books, *or* books used for religious *or* sectarian  
25 purposes.

26 **Section 48.** Pursuant to the Personnel Rules and Regulation of the  
27 Department of Administration, no permanent classified employee of any

1 department *or* agency of the government of Guam *shall* be subject to layoff *or*  
2 furlough before the following categories of employees within said department *or*  
3 agency have been first subjected to layoff *or* furlough. All layoff *or* furlough  
4 actions *shall* be imposed in the following order:

- 5 1. Part time, short term *or* seasonal employees (unclassified employees  
6 shall be considered short term *or* seasonal);
- 7 2. Provisional employees;
- 8 3. Temporary *or* limited term employees; and
- 9 4. Probational (initial) employees.

10 **Section 49.** Review of Business Privilege Tax Exemptions. Each business  
11 privilege tax exemption authorized in §26203 of 11 GCA *shall* be evaluated by the  
12 Legislative Tax Review Commission pursuant to Chapter 11 of 2 GCA, using the  
13 principles of economic efficiency, equity, simplicity, administrative feasibility,  
14 accountability and regarding the purpose of economic growth. The Commission  
15 *shall* provide its evaluation of said exemptions and make recommendations for  
16 permanent repeal *or* reauthorization thereof to *I Maga'lahaen Guåhan* and *I*  
17 *Liheslatura no later than September 1, 2007.*

1 **Chapter VII**

2 **Supplemental Funding**

3 **Section 1. Repeal of §26201(b), (c) and (d) of 11 GCA.** (a) Legislative  
4 Intent. *I Liheslaturan Guahan* finds that §26201(b), (c) and (d) of Title 11 of the  
5 Guam Code Annotated were enacted to provide an incentive to retailers who  
6 choose to make the Business Privilege Tax (formerly known as the Gross Receipts  
7 Tax) visible to its customers as a result of the temporary increase of the said tax  
8 pursuant to Public Law 27-05. *I Liheslaturan Guahan* finds that the  
9 aforementioned Subsections should be repealed since the temporary increase of tax  
10 has been repealed. *I Liheslaturan Guahan* finds that it is in the best interest of the  
11 people of Guam to repeal the incentive contained herein, and that the revenues  
12 generated from the repeal of this Section *should* be appropriated to fund critical  
13 public services of the government of Guam.

14 (b) **Repeal.** §26201(b), (c) and (d) of Chapter 26 of 11 GCA are hereby  
15 *repealed.*

16 (c) **Notification.** The Director of Revenue and Taxation *shall* notify in  
17 writing all persons who have previously used §26201(b), (c) and (d)  
18 of their repeal.

19 **Section 2. Revenues Realized.** Notwithstanding the adopted revised  
20 revenue estimate for Fiscal Year 2007 contained in Chapter 2 of this Act, *I*  
21 *Liheslaturan Guahan*, the Guam Legislature, adopts the sum of Two Million  
22 Dollars (\$2,000,000) as additional revenue for the government of Guam resulting  
23 from the repeal of §26201(b), (c) and (d) of Title 11 of the Guam Code Annotated.

24 **Section 3. Appropriations.** In addition to the appropriations contained in  
25 the other Chapters of this Act and Public Law 28-149 and Public Law 28-150, the  
26 sum of Two Million Dollars (\$2,000,000) is hereby appropriated from the General

1 Fund from revenues resulting from the repeal of §26201(b), (c) and (d) of Title 11  
2 of the Guam Code Annotated as follows:

3 (a) University of Guam - \$500,000, of which \$25,000 is appropriated  
4 to the School of Business and Public Administration to fund the  
5 Commission on Modernization of the Government of Guam  
6 created by the Miscellaneous Provisions Section of this Act;

7 (b) Guam Community College - \$250,000;

8 (c) Department of Revenue and Taxation - \$500,000;

9 (d) Public Defender Service Corporation - \$150,000;

10 (e) Department of Public Health and Social Services - \$600,000.”

1 **Chapter VIII**

2 **Section 1. Severability.** *If* any provision of this Act or its application to  
3 any person or circumstances is held invalid, the invalidity shall *not* affect other  
4 provisions or applications of this Act which can be given effect without the invalid  
5 provision or application, and to this end the provisions of this Act are severable.

### ARTICLE I

#### AMBULANCE SERVICES (NON-EMERGENCY)

#### CHAPTER 1 - GENERAL PROVISIONS

1  
2  
3  
4  
5     **A. SCOPE.** To establish the Guam Fire Department's policy, rules or  
6 regulations, and fee Schedule for the **non-emergency** use of Ambulance Services.

7     **B. DEFINITION.** For the purpose of this Chapter, the following  
8 definitions apply:

9         1.     *Ambulance Services* is the use or temporary deployment of the  
10 department's ambulance or it's attending Emergency Medical Technician  
11 (EMT), to treat or transport sick or injured persons, ambulatory or non-  
12 ambulatory, to or from a medical facility; or remain on alert status at events,  
13 concerts, games, races, promotions, functions, or activities requiring the  
14 same presence.

15         2.     *Non-emergency Service* is that which does not fall under the  
16 definition of "Emergency Service" as defined by the American College of  
17 Emergency Physicians.

18         The following examples would demonstrate the need for urgent or  
19 unscheduled medical care in the prudent layperson's opinion based on an  
20 average knowledge of medicine and health. This list is not intended to be all  
21 encompassing for all medical conditions or situations that may arise and  
22 should be used only to conceptually embrace an unlimited number of  
23 medical abnormalities that could constitute an emergent situation based on  
24 the person's current physical or mental condition.

25         Examples of these services (Emergency Services) would include the  
26 following:

27         Evaluation or management of:

- 1       · Acute or Significant pain.
- 2       · Any trauma (less than seventy-two (72) hours from time of incident)

- 6       · Obstetrical crisis and/or labor
- 7       · Bleeding or threats of hemorrhage.
- 8       · Any condition resulting in admission of the patient to a hospital or
- 9       nursing home within twenty-four (24) hours.
- 10      · Suspected abuse or neglect of any person could result in temporary or
- 11      permanent physical or psychological harm.
- 12      · Any illness or injury that would cause loss or impairment of the
- 13      following systems: integumentary, musculoskeletal, HEENT, respiratory,
- 14      gastrointestinal, genitourinary, nervous, or cardiovascular.
- 15      · Congenital defects or abnormalities in an infant.
- 16      · A patient suspected to be suffering from a mental illness and/or

- 18      · Any Acute or significant symptom(s) that might indicate a condition
- 19      that constitutes a threat to the patient's or family's physical or
- 20      psychological well-being requiring prompt medical attention preventing
- 21      possible deterioration, disability or death.

**C. SCHEDULING, STAND-BY SERVICES.**

- 22           1. Persons requesting for an ambulance stand-by Service must call the
- 23           Emergency Medical Services/Rescue Division Office at the least two (2)

1 weeks (fourteen (14) days) in advance for scheduling. The following  
2 information must be provided:

- 3 a. Name of person requesting.
- 4 b. Type of Activity being conducted.
- 5 c. Location of "Stand-By Service."
- 6 d. Time and duration of request.
- 7 e. Name of organization requesting.
- 8 f. Name of contact person and telephone number.
- 9 g. Complete mailing address.

10 2. The caller requesting the service will be given a Stand-By Service  
11 Request Number which will be used for future reference.

12 3. The Guam Fire Department will contact the person requesting the  
13 Stand-By Service at least one (1) week or seven (7) days prior to the activity  
14 date for confirmation.

15 4. Stand-By Services may be cancelled by calling the E.M.S./Rescue  
16 Division at least twenty-four (24) hours prior to the stand-by. If a service is  
17 not cancelled accordingly, the minimum first hour charge will be assessed.

18 See Chapter 2 of Article 1: Fee Schedule for Stand-By Services and  
19 Non-Emergency Patient Transport Services.

20 **D. FEES, "STAND-BY SERVICES."**

21 1. A minimum one (1) hour fee will be charged for all Stand-By  
22 Services. After the first hour, hourly fees will be charged for each additional  
23 hour or each fifteen (15) minutes (one-fourth the hourly rate) portions  
24 thereof of ambulance Stand-By Services.

1           2. Fees will be charged from the time a unit arrives at a stand-by until  
2 the time the unit leaves the scene.

3           3. Adjustments will be made to the charges should Guam Fire  
4 Department be unable to meet the scheduled time or must remove a unit  
5 from a stand-by.

6           4. A Stand-by Service which is not cancelled prior to the required  
7 twenty-four (24) hour notice will be billed for one (1) hour of service.

8           See Chapter 2 of Article 1: Fee Schedule for Stand-By Services and  
9 Non-Emergency Patient Transport Services.

#### 10 **E. GUAM FIRE DEPARTMENT'S RESPONSIBILITY.**

11           1. The Guam Fire Department's primary medical mission is to  
12 emergency patients. Therefore, no ambulance can be said to be dedicated to  
13 a Stand-By Service. The Guam Fire Department will do its best to have its  
14 unit arrive promptly and remain at the location for the time duration  
15 requested. If a unit must be pulled from a Stand-By Service to respond to an  
16 Emergency, the Guam Fire Department will do its best to replace that unit  
17 within fifteen (15) minutes. If this is not possible, appropriate adjustments  
18 will be made to the stand-by charges based on the time a unit returns to the  
19 scene.

20           2. The Guam Fire Department will schedule an ambulance for  
21 each Stand-By Service Requested, however, at the time of the service, if an  
22 ambulance is not immediately available because of an emergency, the  
23 department has the option to temporarily replace the unit with another

1 patient transport. An ambulance will be placed at the scene as soon as  
2 possible upon availability.

3 3. Should an ambulance unit not be available at all for the entire  
4 duration of the Stand-By Service due to shortage of ambulances, other units  
5 manned by Emergency Medical Technicians such as Engine Companies and  
6 Rescue Units will be utilized for such Stand-By services.

7 **F. COLLECTION OF FEES.**

8 1. An invoice will be mailed to the requesting organization or  
9 individual within fifteen (15) days of the service provided. Payment is due  
10 within thirty (30) days of the statement date.

11 2. All payment shall be remitted to the Treasurer of Guam, who  
12 shall deposit these collections in the Guam Fire Department's Fire, Life and  
13 Medical Emergency Fund ("FLAME").

14 3. Penalty charges will be assessed on delinquent accounts.  
15 Subsequent reminder notices shall reflect such charges, which are due within

19 **G. SCHEDULING, NON-EMERGENCY PATIENT TRANSPORT**

21 1. Requests for non-emergency patient transport services will be

23 a. Routine Scheduled Transports.

1           i. This category will include all transports which can be  
2 scheduled at east forty-eight (48) hours ahead of time. Examples may  
3 be: weekly therapy, doctor's appointments, lab services, etc.

4           ii. An individual may request for a Routine Scheduled  
5 Transport by calling the Emergency Medical Services/Rescue  
6 Division Office at least twenty-four (24) hours in advance.

          iii. Individuals should schedule the patient transport at the same time  
as they are scheduling the appointment with the clinic or lab to ensure that  
transport service is available at the proposed appointment time.

          iv. If this coordinated scheduling is not done, and there are multiple  
transports and conflicting schedules, a patient may be requested to change  
his appointment time or date.

          v. The Guam Fire Department will call the contact person, on the day  
of the scheduled transport, to verify and confirm the service requested.

          vi. A person requesting a Routine Scheduled Transport service, who  
does not cancel the same before an ambulance checks out to the requested  
location, will be charged as provided for in Chapter 2 – Fee Schedule for  
Ambulance Stand-by and Non-Emergency Patient Transport Services,  
Section(4).

**b. Unscheduled Transport.**

          i. This category will include all transports which cannot be scheduled  
forty-eight (48) hours ahead of time. (Examples may be: transport of

patients' release from Guam Memorial Hospital, special transports from G.M.H. to lab for inpatients, etc.).

ii. Individuals may request for unscheduled transports by contacting the Guam Fire Department Integrated Emergency Communications Center (E 9-1-1/Fire Dispatch).

iii. Requests received with less than twelve (12) hours notice will be entertained as best as possible by the Guam Fire Department Ambulance service. Emergency responses will take priority and non-emergency services may be delayed.

iv. A person(s) requesting a Routine Schedule Transport Service, who does not cancel the same before an ambulance checks out to the requested location, will be charged as provided in Chapter 2 – Fee Schedule for Ambulance standby and Non-Emergency Patient Transport Services, Section(4).

See Chapter 2 Article 1: Fee Schedule for Stand-By Services and Non-Emergency Patient Transport Services.

2. All requests for transports shall comply with the following procedures.

a. Upon calling the appropriate office to request the transport, the following information must be provided:

- i. Name of person requesting.
- ii. Location/address of patient pick-up.
- iii. Location/address of the destination to transport the patient.
- iv. Time of scheduled appointment (if applicable)
- v. Time of requested pick-up
- vi. Name and phone number of contact person.

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vii. Patients' complete mailing address.

viii. Name of an insurance carrier (if any).

b. Individual requesting services should notify the intended receiving party (doctors' office, clinic, lab, etc.) that appointment times be flexible as the Guam Fire Department cannot guarantee an arrival time at the destination.

c. Patients must be accompanied by an appropriate family member or care giver.

d. If the patient is unaccompanied and staff and facilities (wheelchair, stretcher, etc.) are not available at the receiving facility to monitor the patient, the G.F.D. ambulance crew will remain with the patient, however, additional fees for this service will be charged.

See Chapter 2 of Article I: Fee Schedule for Stand-by Services and Non Emergency Patient Transport Services.

3. The caller requesting the service will be given a Non-Emergency Transport Service number which will be used for future reference to the request.

**H. FEES, NON-EMERGENCY TRANSPORT SERVICES.**

1. Fees for all non-emergency transports will be charged a flat trip rate, regardless of distance or time required for transport; except that Wait Time Fees will be added to the charge if the allotted time stipulated below is exceeded.

2. The Trip Rate will encompass travel time to the pick-up point, a maximum fifteen (15) minute wait and load time at the pick-up point, travel time from the pick-up point to the delivery point, and a maximum fifteen (15) minute wait and off-load time.

3. If the wait, by the ambulance crew, at the time of pick-up or delivery exceeds fifteen (15) minutes, a fee per each fifteen (15) minutes will be charged.

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4. Any Wait Time will be based on the ambulance crew's arrival at the scene time and en route to location time, or the arrival at location time and ready for service time, as received and recorded by the Guam Fire Department Integrated Emergency Communications Center – E 9-1-1/Fire Dispatch.

**I. COLLECTION OF FEES, NON-EMERGENCY TRANSPORT SERVICES.**

1. An invoice will be mailed to the requesting organization or individual within fifteen (15) days of the service provided. Payment is due within thirty (30) days of the statement date.

2. All payment shall be remitted to the Treasurer of Guam, who shall deposit these collections in the Guam Fire Department's Fire, Life and Medical Emergency Fund "FLAME", Title 10 GCA §72106.

3. Penalty charges will be assessed on delinquent accounts. Subsequent reminder notices shall reflect such charges, which are due within fifteen (15) days of the date of issuance.

See Chapter 2 of Article 1: Fee Schedule for Stand-By Services and Non-Emergency Patient Transport Services.

**J. COLLECTION OF FEES, EMERGENCY TRANSPORT SERVICES.**

1. An invoice will be mailed to the individual or the individual's Health Insurance Company within fifteen (15) days of the service provided. Payment is due within thirty (30) days of the statement date.

2. All payment shall be remitted to the Treasurer of Guam, who shall deposit these collections in the Guam Fire Department's Guam Fire Department's Fire, Life and Medical Emergency Fund "FLAME", Title 10 GCA §72106.

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3. Penalty charges will be assessed on delinquent accounts. Subsequent reminder notices shall reflect such charges, which are due within fifteen (15) days of the date of issuance.

**K. SERVICES APPEAL.**

Any person seeking relief from a decision, action or inaction of a member of the Guam Fire Department, on matters concerning this article, shall present, either verbally or in writing, an appeal and recommended solution to the Fire Chief. The Fire Chief shall investigate the matter, and accordingly, determine the course of action. Written appeals require that the Fire Chief notify the appellant in writing of the Fire Chief's decision. Verbal appeals will require that the appellant make contact with the Fire Chief for notification of the Fire Chief's decision.

3. Information to be provided by applicant.

Please bring with you the following items:

- a. Inspection reports. (if applicable)
- b. Driver's License or an acceptable identification card.

4. Past due fees. The department will take necessary measure to obtain collection of past due fees including the following:

- a. Notification to Business License Branch, Department of Revenue and Taxation.
- b. Non-issuance of permit.
- c. Refer matter for collection to the Office of the Attorney General.

**CHAPTER 5 – INSPECTIONS**

The Guam Fire Department (G.F.D.) will take reasonable measures to ensure that uniform fire code compliance is continually maintained and not just occasionally on or about

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permit renewal date or on notice of inspection possibility; protect the integrity of its Fire Prevention Program; and address citizen concerns or complaints.

**The following provides the procedures for:**

- A. Inspections for Occupancy Clearance.
- B. Inspections for New Permits.
- C. Inspections for Permit Renewals
- D. Unannounced Inspections for Existing Permit Holders.
- E. Unannounced Inspections for other regulations by the Uniform Fire Code.

**First Inspection.** The inspector *shall* conduct the inspection for code compliance. *If* code compliance has not been achieved, except for new permit applicants, the following may result: inspection fee assessed and/or a citation issued. Re-inspections *shall* be made until code compliance has been obtained, providing reasonable time, dependent on the hazard and danger created by the violation and the complexity of the work to be done.

In all cases, an inspection report shall be filled out and a copy given to the responsible person.

**Re-inspection(s).** The inspector *shall* conduct the inspection for code compliance and assess a re-inspection fee. *If* code compliance has not been achieved, re-inspections will be made after providing reasonable time, dependent on the hazard and danger created by the violation and the complexity of the work to be done, until code compliance has been obtained. A citation may also be issued and/or the establishment closed.

In all cases, an inspection report *shall* be filled out and a copy given to the responsible person.

**A. INSPECTIONS FOR OCCUPANCY CLEARANCE**

Inspections for Occupancy Clearance will be conducted after completion of construction of new or renovated buildings. This inspection is not considered a First

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Inspection and does not include a permit fee. (See Fee Schedule for Permits). Fees for inspections for Occupancy Clearance include Plan Review and inspections up to issuance of Fire Safety Certificate. (See Fee Schedule for Occupancy Clearance on Chapter 3).

The Uniform Fire Code authorizes the Chief, Fire Prevention Division, hereinafter known as: *Fire Marshal* to issue "Conditional Clearance" for Occupancy Clearance. Conditional Clearances are granted with a specified time frame given for applicant to come into full compliance with the Fire Code. Inspections conducted upon full compliance of the code or expiration of conditional clearance, whichever occurs first, will be assessed a re-inspection fee.

#### **B. INSPECTIONS FOR NEW PERMITS**

New permits must be preceded by an inspection for code compliance. There is no charge for this First Inspection; it is included in the permit fee which must be received by the G.F.D. at the One Stop Building Permit/Business Service Center, before a permit is issued. See Fee schedule for Permit.

*If* code compliance cannot be achieved during this inspection, the Inspector *shall* schedule a re-inspection, providing reasonable time, dependant on the hazard and danger created by the violation and the complexity of the work to be done, until code compliance has been obtained. A fee will be charged for each re-inspection. See Fee Payment Schedule for Inspections.

#### **C. INSPECTIONS FOR PERMIT RENEWALS**

All permit renewals must be preceded by an inspection for code compliance. *If* not in compliance, the inspector shall schedule a re-inspection, providing reasonable time, dependant on the hazard and danger created by the violation and the complexity of the work to be done, until code compliance has been obtained. A fee will be charged for each re-inspection. See Fee Payment Schedule for Inspections.

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Citation may also be issued for imminent life hazards and/or repeat violations within the past two (2) years. Citation normally will not be issued on the First Inspection. Citations for violations will generally be issued upon re-inspection(s).

**Exception: Citation issued for violations which present imminent life hazards such as trespassing in a closed area, smoking in closed or restricted areas, failure to obey the lawful orders of a fire inspector, faulty equipment or procedures, repeat violations, and violations of a similar nature will not require prior notice.**

There is no charge for the First Inspection; it is included in the permit fee, which must be received by the G.F.D. at the One Stop Building Permit/Business License Service Center before a permit is renewed. (See Fee Schedule for Permits).

In all cases, an inspection report *shall* be filled out and a copy given to the responsible person.

### **D. UNANNOUNCED INSPECTIONS FOR EXISTING PERMIT HOLDERS**

Unannounced inspections may be conducted for code compliance by any duly authorized official of the Guam Fire Department on any building and premises, business, activity, engagement, or function regulated by the applicable code at all reasonable times.

*If* not in compliance, the Inspector *shall* schedule a re-inspection, providing reasonable time, dependent on the hazard and danger created by the violation and the complexity of the work to be done, until code compliance has been obtained. A fee will be charged for this inspection (only if a violation is noted) and each re-inspection. Citation may also be issued for imminent life hazards and/or repeat violations within the past two (2) years.

Citations normally will not be issued on the First Inspection. Citations for violations will generally be issued upon re-inspection(s).

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**EXEMPTION:** Citations Issued for violations which present imminent life hazards such as trespassing in a closed area, smoking in closed or restricted areas, failure to obey the lawful orders of a fire inspector, faulty equipment or procedures, repeat violations, and violations of a similar nature will not require prior notice.

In all cases, an inspection report *shall* be filled out and a copy given to the responsible person.

**E. UNANNOUNCED INSPECTIONS FOR OTHERS REGULATED BY THE UNIFORM FIRE CODE.**

Unannounced inspections may be conducted by any duly authorized official of the Guam Fire Department on any building and premises, business, activity, engagement, or function regulated by the applicable code at all reasonable times.

*If* not in compliance, the inspector *shall* schedule a re-inspection after providing reasonable time, dependent on the hazard and danger created by the violation and the complexity of the work to be done, until code compliance has been obtained. A fee will be charged for this inspection (only if a violation is noted) and each re-inspection. Citation may also be issued for imminent life hazards and/or repeated violations within the past two (2) years.

Citations normally will not be issued on the First Inspection. Citations for violations will generally be issued upon re-inspection(s).

**EXCEPTIONS:** Citation issued for violations which present imminent life hazards such as trespassing in a closed area, smoking in closed or restricted areas, failure to obey the lawful orders of a fire inspector, faulty equipment or procedures, repeat violations, and violations of a similar nature will not require prior notice.

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In all cases, an inspection report *shall* be filled out and a copy given to the responsible person.

**ARTICLE III**

**CHAPTER 1 – GRACE PERIODS FOR COMPLIANCE WITH THE UFC.**

*§73112 of 10 Guam Code Annotated authorizes the Guam Fire Department to promulgate rules setting forth grace periods within which parties not in conformance with Uniform Fire Code shall bring their premises up to code.* The following grace periods have been established within which existing buildings *shall* be brought to conformance with the Uniform Fire Code.

**A. Life-Safety Requirements for Existing Buildings Other Than High Rise.**

Within eighteen (18) months after the owner of an existing building other than a high rise has been notified of life-safety violations, plans for compliance shall be submitted and approved, and within eighteen (18) months thereafter the work shall be completed or the building shall be vacated until made to confirm.

**B. Life-Safety Requirements for Existing High Rise Buildings**

Plans and specifications for the necessary alterations *shall* be filed with the Chief within the time periods are not physically practical or pose an undue hardship. The granting of an extension of time for compliance shall be based upon the showing of good cause and subject to the filing of an acceptable systematic progressive plan of correction with the Chief.

**C. Appeals**

Appeals of the determinations of the Chief in applying the provisions of this code may be made by an appeal directed to the board of appeals as established by Sections 103.4. of the Uniform Fire Code."

**Section 2. Severability.** *If any provision of this Law or its application to any person or circumstance is found to be invalid or contrary to law, such invalidity shall not affect other*

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provisions or applications of this Law which can be given effect without the invalid provisions  
or application, and to this end the provisions of this Law are severable.

*Hafa Adai!* Pursuant to Section 7.01 of Rule VII of *I Mina' Bente Ñuebe Na Liheslaturan Guåhan's* Standing Rules, I respectfully request that the public hearing requirement and those prescribed under 5 GCA, §8107 and §8108, as exempted by your authority as Speaker of *I Liheslatura* and under the emergency requirements issued by Attorney General Opinion 78-02, for Bill No. 74 (EC): "AN ACT TO AMEND PUBLIC LAW 28-149 AND PUBLIC LAW 28-150 RELATIVE TO MAKING APPROPRIATIONS FOR THE OPERATIONS OF THE EXECUTIVE, LEGISLATIVE AND JUDICIAL BRANCHES OF THE GOVERNMENT OF GUAM FOR THE FISCAL YEAR ENDING SEPTEMBER 30, 2007; TO AMEND THE REVENUES ESTIMATE FOR FISCAL YEAR 2007; TO AUTHORIZE I MAGA'LAHEN GUÅHAN TO TAKE OUT A LINE OF CREDIT; AND FOR OTHER MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS," which was introduced for *I Liheslatura's* immediate consideration, be waived and that this legislation be placed on the agenda of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan's* Regular Session on March 23, 2007. Prompt action by *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* on Bill No. 74 (EC) is essential to ensure the continuation of public services for the island.
