AN ACT TO *ADD* A NEW CHAPTER 90A TO TITLE 10, GUAM CODE ANNOTATED, RELATIVE TO PROHIBITING THE IMPORTATION AND SALE OF INGESTIBLE TOBACCO FILM STRIPS, INGESTIBLE TOBACCO STICKS, TOBACCO HARD CANDIES, NICOTINE LOLLIPOPS, NICOTINE LIP BALM, AND NICOTINE WATER.

### **BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF GUAM:**

2 Section 1. Legislative Findings and Intent. *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* finds 3 that tobacco use is the leading cause of preventable, early death in America. Every 4 year in our nation, tobacco causes over four hundred thousand (400,000) deaths, and

eight million six hundred thousand (8,600,000) Americans have chronic illnesses 1 linked to tobacco. A fifty percent (50%) reduction in tobacco use by minors would 2 3 prevent over ten million (10,000,000) of today's children from becoming daily smokers. This would save over three million (3,000,000) of them from premature 4 death due to tobacco-induced disease. A reduction in youth tobacco use would result 5 in approximately Seventy-five Billion Dollars (\$75,000,000,000) in savings 6 attributable to reduced health care costs. Tobacco manufacturers routinely advertise 7 8 to the youth tobacco products as being socially acceptable and healthful. Therefore, it is the intent of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* to prohibit the importation and sale of all orally 9 10 dissolvable tobacco products and nicotine water and nicotine lip balm. In effect, this prohibition will prevent these products from reaching consumers under the age of 11 eighteen (18) years, to whom they are most aggressively being marketed. 12 Section 2. A new Chapter 90A is hereby added to Title 10, Guam Code 13

14 Annotated, to read:

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### §90A100. Title.

This Chapter *shall* be known, and may be cited, as the "Prohibition of
Ingestible Tobacco Film Strips, Tobacco Sticks, Tobacco Hard Candies,
Nicotine Lollipops, Nicotine Lip Balm, and Nicotine Water."

**"CHAPTER 90A** 

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### §90A101. Definitions.

(a) *Distributor* means any person who imports tangible personal property *or* consumable goods and distributes to a retailer for resale.

(b) *Nicotine* means a colorless, oily, water-soluble, highly toxic,
liquid alkaloid, C1 0H1 4N2, found in tobacco and valued as an
insecticide. Nicotine has powerful pharmacologic effects, including
increased heart rate, heart stroke volume, and oxygen consumption by the
heart muscle, as well as powerful psychodynamic effects, such as

euphoria, increased alertness, and a sense of relaxation. Nicotine is also powerfully addictive.

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(c) *Nicotine Lip Balm* means any emollient product infused with any amount of any form of nicotine designed to be used on the lips for the purpose of delivering nicotine into the bloodstream through the mucous membranes.

7 (d) *Nicotine Lollipop* means any sweetened, dissolvable
8 confection infused with any amount of any form of nicotine, and
9 available as a skewered hard candy, for the purpose of delivering nicotine
10 into the bloodstream.

(e) *Nicotine Water* means any bottled drinking water infused
with any amount of any form of nicotine.

(f) Orbs means the brand name of a dissolvable lozenge-type
product made of finely ground and flavored tobacco that melts in the
mouth within thirty (30) minutes.

16(g) Retailer means the seller of tangible personal property or17consumable goods for consumption or use by the purchaser and not for18resale.

(h) *Sticks* means the brand name of a dissolvable toothpickshaped product made of finely ground and flavored tobacco that melts in
the mouth within ten (10) minutes.

(i) *Strips* means the brand name of a dissolvable film-like
product made of finely ground and flavored tobacco that melts in the
mouth within three (3) minutes.

§90A102. Importation of Ingestible Tobacco Film Strips, Tobacco
 Sticks, Tobacco Hard Candies, Nicotine Lollipops, Nicotine Lip Balms, and
 Nicotine Water to Guam Illegal: Punished.

(a) A person commits a felony when he imports, attempts to import, *or* causes to import ingestible tobacco film strips, tobacco sticks, tobacco hard candies, nicotine lollipops, nicotine lip balms, and nicotine water into the territorial jurisdiction of Guam.

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(b) Any ingestible tobacco film strips, tobacco sticks, tobacco hard candies, nicotine lollipops, nicotine lip balms, and nicotine water in violation of this Section *shall* be subject to seizure and forfeiture.

8 (1)Any property subject to forfeiture under this Section 9 shall be seized by a peace officer, including Guam Customs & 10Quarantine Officers, upon process issued by the Superior Court, except that seizure without such process may be made when the 11 12 seizure is incident to an arrest or a search under a search warrant 13 or an inspection under an administrative inspection warrant; the 14 property subject to seizure has been the subject of a prior judgment in a criminal injunction or forfeiture proceeding; or the peace 15 officer has probable cause to believe that the property has been 16 17 used or intended to be used in violation of this Section. In the 18 event of a seizure pursuant to this Subsection, proceedings under Subsection (c) shall be instituted promptly. 19

(c) Property taken *or* detained under this Section *shall not* be
repleviable, but *shall* be deemed to be in the custody of the government
subject only to the orders and decrees of the Court. Whenever property is
seized under the provisions of this Section, the government *shall* destroy
all ingestible tobacco film strips, tobacco sticks, tobacco hard candies,
nicotine lollipops, nicotine lip balms, and nicotine water seized and
forfeited upon order of the Court.

1(d) Any person found guilty of the importation, attempted2importation or causing the importation of ingestible tobacco film strips,3tobacco sticks, tobacco hard candies, nicotine lollipops, nicotine lip4balms, and nicotine water to Guam shall be guilty of a felony and be5subject to imprisonment for not more than five (5) years, a fine not to6exceed Twenty-five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000.00) per incident of7importation, or both such fine and imprisonment.

8 §90A103. Effective Date. This Act *shall* take effect ninety (90) days
9 after its enactment."

### **COMMITTEE REPORT DIGEST**

Bill No. 159-30 (COR), as introduced

### I. OVERVIEW

The Committee on Economic Development, Health & Human Services, and Judiciary conducted a public hearing on July 28, 2009. Among the items on the agenda was the consideration of Bill No. 159-30 (COR) – "An Act to add a new Chapter 90A to Title 10, Guam Code Annotated, relative to the prohibition of importing ingestible tobacco film strips, ingestible tobacco sticks, tobacco hard candies, nicotine lollipops, nicotine lip balm, and nicotine water", introduced by Vice-Speaker Benajmin J.F. Cruz.

### **Public Notice Requirements**

Notices were disseminated via hand-delivery/fax and/or e-mail to all senators and all main media broadcasting outlets on July 21, 2009 (5-Day Notice), and again on July 23, 2009 (48-Hour Notice). Notices were published in the Marianas Variety on July 21, 2009, and again in Marianas Variety on July 24, 2009.

### **Senators Present**

Senator Frank B. Aguon, Jr., Chairman Senator Adolpho B. Palacios, Sr., Vice Chairman Vice-Speaker Benjamin J.F. Cruz, Committee Member Senator Thomas C. Ada, Committee Member Senator Vicente C. Pangelinan

The public hearing was Called to Order at 1:00 PM.

### II. SUMMARY OF TESTIMONY & DISCUSSION

Public hearing of Bill No. 159-30 immediately followed the hearing of Bill No. 150-30, and most of those present came to testify for both.

CHAIRMAN FRANK B. AGUON, JR. convened the public hearing on Bill No. 159-30, and called the first panel to testify.

**Chairman Aguon** asked if, in addition to Bill No. 150-30, Dr. Shieh wished to provide testimony for Bill No. 159-30.

**Dr. Sheih, MD, FACOG,** of Dr. Shieh's Clinic. Provided oral testimony **IN SUPPORT** of Bill No. 150. Dr. Shieh stated that he would be in support of any bill curbing the use of any nicotine infused products.

Vice-Speaker Cruz recognized the time constraints of doctors and asked if members of the panel could provide testimony for Bill No. 159-30.

**Dr. Jarome Landstrom, MD, Guam AMA Delegate** of the Guam Medical Plaza. Provided oral testimony **IN SUPPORT** of Bill No. 159. Dr. Landstrom stated nicotine candies spiked with nicotine is reprehensible. Dr. Landstrom stated that once one is addicted, one is a customer for life. Nicotine products like those addressed in Bill No. 159 target future generations with these tobacco products.

**Dr. Annette M. David, MD, MPH, Chair, Guam Cancer Control Coalition.** Provided oral testimony **IN SUPPORT** of Bill No. 159-30. Dr. David stated strong support for Bill No. 159-30 because it is entirely consistent with what is recommended in the First International Treaty – The Framework Convention for Tobacco Control. Unfortunately, the USA is one of twenty (20) countries of the world that has not signed the treaty. As a result, this legislation is necessary to help protect our children from these products. Currently, there are nicotine-based toothpaste and drinks, in addition to the products in Bill No. 159-30. These are products used to circumvent the smoke-free laws, and tobacco companies realize this because nicotine is a goldmine. Once people become addicted to nicotine, they are addicted for life.

**Dr. Helen J.D. Whippy, Ph.D., Principal Investigator, University of Guam Cancer Research Center.** Provided oral testimony **IN SUPPORT** of Bill No. 150. Dr. Whippy, who is also the Senior Vice President for Academic and Student Affairs, stated that she supports Bill No. 159-30 on behalf of the University of Guam Cancer Research Center, as well as mothers everywhere because there is no redeeming value in any of these products.

Mr. J. Peter Roberto, ACSW, Director, Department of Public Health & Social Services. Provided written testimony IN SUPPORT of Bill No. 159. Mr. Roberto stated we support this legislation to prohibit the illegal importation of tobacco products.

**Senator Pangelinan** stated tobacco is the only legal product that if used properly will kill you. Sen. Pangelinan stated nicotine products like bubble gum shaped in cigarettes from his youth are used to condition people to react via repetition.

Vice-Speaker Cruz asked if in addition to testimony for Bill No. 150-30, any members of the panel had comments related to Bill No. 159-30.

**Chairman Aguon** clarified that it is appropriate for anyone to apply testimony for 159-30 in addition to 150.30.

Mr. Dan Rosenberger, President, Guam American Cancer Society. Provided oral testimony IN SUPPORT of Bill No. 159-30. Mr. Rosenberger stated the Guam American Cancer Society

is in favor of any bill that supports the restriction of usage of tobacco products or tobacco-like products.

### **III. FINDINGS & RECOMMENDATIONS**

The Committee on Economic Development, Health & Human Services, and Judiciary finds that ingestible tobacco products such as those prohibited by this act are intentionally disguised in the form of candies, breath fresheners, lip balms and drinking water; intending to attract and addict youthful consumers who will perpetuate the nicotine and tobacco profitable industry.

Because these items are hazardous to human health, and the packaging of these items are exactly the same as some candies, breath fresheners, moisturizers and drinking water; their intent is clearly to deceive the people of Guam into becoming addicts of tobacco and nicotine, and thus their importation should be prohibited.

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Sticks' means the brand name of a dissolvable toothpick-shaped product
made of finely ground and flavored tobacco that melts in the mouth within 10
minutes.

*Strips*' means the brand name of dissolvable film-like product made of
finely ground and flavored tobacco that melts in the mouth within 3 minutes.

# 8 Section 4. § 90A102 Importation of Ingestible Tobacco Film Strips, 9 Tobacco Sticks, Hard Candies, Nicotine Lollipops, Nicotine Lip Balm, and 10 Nicotine Waters to Guam Illegal: Punished

(a) A person commits a felony when he imports, attempts to import, or
causes to import ingestible tobacco film strips, tobacco sticks, hard candies,
nicotine lollipops, nicotine lip balm, and nicotine water into the territorial
jurisdiction of Guam.

(b) Any ingestible tobacco film strips, tobacco sticks, hard candies, nicotine
lollipops, nicotine lip balm, and nicotine water in violation of this Section shall be
subject to seizure and forfeiture.

(1) Any property subject to forfeiture under this Section shall be seized by a 18 peace officer, including Guam Customs Officer, upon process issued by the 19 Superior Court, except that seizure without such process may be made when the 20 seizure is incident to an arrest or a search under a search warrant or an inspection 21 under an administrative inspection warrant; the property subject to seizure has been 22 the subject of a prior judgment in a criminal injunction or forfeiture proceeding; or 23 the peace officer has probable cause to believe that the property has been used or 24 intended to be used in violation of this Section. In the event of a seizure pursuant to 25 this Subsection, proceedings under Subsection (c) shall be instituted promptly. 26

(c) Property taken or detained under this Section shall not be repleviable, but
shall be deemed to be in the custody of the government subject only to the orders
and decrees of the Court. Whenever property is seized under the provisions of this
Section, the government shall destroy all ingestible tobacco film strips, tobacco
sticks, hard candies, nicotine lollipops, nicotine lip balm, and nicotine water seized
and forfeited upon order of the Court.

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(d) Any person found guilty of the importation, attempted importation or
causing the importation of ingestible tobacco film strips, tobacco sticks, hard
candies, nicotine lollipops, nicotine lip balm, and nicotine water to Guam shall be
guilty of a felony and be subject to imprisonment for not more than five (5) years,
a fine not to exceed Twenty-five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000.00) per incident of
importation, or both such fine and imprisonment.

Section 5. § 90A103 Effective Date: This Act shall take effect ninety (90)
 days after its enactment.

*Hafa Adai!* The Department of Public Health and Social Services strongly support Bill 159 (An act to add a New Chapter 90A to Title 10, Guam code Annotated; relative to the prohibition of importing ingestible tobacco film strips, ingestible tobacco sticks, tobacco hard candies, nicotine lollipops, nicotine lip balm, and nicotine water).

This legislation is significant for the appeal of flavored cigarettes or tobacco products has long been associated with young and novice smokers. Tobacco industry research has demonstrated that fruit and candy flavored tobacco products increase the social acceptance of cigarettes, increase the excitement factor for example, sharing flavors, and increase the curiosity to try the product. These products should not be considered safe because are all harmful and extremely addictive.

Flavored regular cigarettes promote youth initiation and help young occasional smokers to become daily smokers. These products might encourage children, teens and young adults to take their first step toward smoking cigarettes. Young people may be attracted to these products due to their novelty, safety claims and the availability of these products in a variety of fruit, candy, cola and chocolate flavors. In addition these products may be easily accessed online, in stores and at mall kiosks where young people often hang out.

Nicotine addiction is one of the hardest addictions to break. The availability and accessibility to unregulated nicotine products that appeal to youth might increase the overall number of individuals who become nicotine dependent for life and later use regular cigarettes.

The World Health Organization (WHO) estimated that, "the marketing and distribution of tobacco products has created an epidemic that has killed approximately 5 million people in 2006.

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As the island's prevention agency we must protect our youth and the many generations to come from the seduction and influence of any form of tobacco use. The Department of Public Health and Social Services (DPHSS), Tobacco Free Guam Program is committed to work with all project partners and stakeholders to ensure that the current and future generations of kids do not become victims of the tobacco use epidemic.

Bill 159, if passed, will strengthen our commitment to a healthier Guam. Si Yu'os Ma'ase.

Approximately 6,100 new cigarette 26 smokers began every day or a total of 2.2 million persons aged 12 or older. Although significantly 27 lower than the 2006 estimate of 2.4 million, this was significantly higher than the estimates of 1.9 28 million for 2002 and 2.0 million for 2003. 29 30 Clean Indoor Air 31 32 According to the American Lung Association (ALA) State of Tobacco Control 2008 report, only 33 two states - lowa and Nebraska - passed comprehensive laws that protect workers and the public 34 from the dangers of secondhand smoke. Pennsylvania also passed legislation in 2008 that prohibits 35 smoking in a number of public places, including restaurants; however, the law still permits 36 smoking in taverns, casinos, private clubs and nursing homes and preempts localities from passing 37 stronger laws that would protect everyone from exposure to deadly secondhand smoke. 38 Comprehensive legislation was introduced in Michigan and Wisconsin, but neither state passed a 39 bill into law. Overall, the ALA report gave 33 states and the District of Columbia passing grades; 40 however, 16 states received an "F" for their weak or ineffective smoke-free laws. 41 42 **Tobacco Excise Taxes** 43 44 In early 2009, as part of the State Children's Health Insurance Program expansion legislation, the 45 federal cigarette tax was raised from 39 cents per pack to \$1.00. This legislation also increased the 46 tax on cigars, smokeless tobacco, and loose tobacco.

### 1 Youth Tobacco Issues

2 3 The greatest hurdle to reducing tobacco use among youth is the tobacco industry's continued creation and promotion of products that have strong appeal to youth and the industry's use of 4 5 deceptive marketing practices. The Campaign for Tobacco Free Kids, American Lung Association, 6 American Heart Association, and the American Cancer Society released the Big Tobacco's Guinea 7 *Pigs* report in February 2008 that clearly outlines the potential danger of these new products. 8 According to this report, lack of government regulation has allowed the tobacco industry free rein 9 to design and market their products. Among the points made in the report were:

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- 11 Tobacco manufacturers can introduce new products, secretly modify existing products with 12 new designs and ingredients, and make unproven health claims without regard for the impact 13 on public health;
- 14 Flavor and product modifications not only make the product more appealing to kids, but often • 15 produce additional carcinogens; and
- Manipulation of nicotine and other chemicals increases addictiveness and harm; and misleading 16 • claims discourage smokers from quitting and thus cost countless lives. 17
- 18

19 The report concluded that, because of this lack of government oversight, the tobacco industry has 20 been able to counter declining smoking rates and growing restrictions on smoking by unleashing a 21 new generation of tobacco products.

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23 AMA ACTIVITIES

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25 **Professional Standards Activities** 

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27 Reducing tobacco use and increasing physician cessation counseling for patients who smoke is a major component of the AMA's Healthy Lifestyles Initiative. The AMA released a physician's 28 toolkit, AMA Healthier Life Steps<sup>4</sup>, that enables physicians and patients to make positive, 29 30 coordinated lifestyle changes in the four behaviors which lead to the leading causes of death and illness in the United States: smoking, excess or risky alcohol use, poor nutrition and eating 31 behaviors, and physical inactivity. The toolkit provides a guide to physicians on how to assess 32 patients' readiness to change and how to counsel them. The toolkit also includes brief patient 33 34 screening forms, actions plans and tips on change, a health behavior tracking calendar and office 35 reminder posters. 36

37 Additional linkages are provided on the AMA web site to federal smoking cessation and brief 38 alcohol intervention resources for physicians and as part of the EPoCH (Educating Physicians on 39 Challenges and Controversies in Health) series. Several new supportive videos and CME modules 40 are available<sup>5</sup>:

1 As part of the our participation in the Building Healthier Chicago initiative, the AMA developed a 2 PowerPoint presentation for the Chicago Medical Society to use for member education about how 3 to utilize the smoking cessation Quitline.

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5 The AMA also houses a project funded by the Environmental Protection Agency to reduce 6 children's exposure to secondhand smoke. This project works with physicians and other clinicians 7 to counsel parents about the health risks associated with exposure and provide assistance to help 8 families adopt and enforce smoke-free home and car policies. As part of the project, staff 9 developed and received approval for the first performance improvement CME on secondhand 10 smoke in the country. This practice management project is being tested with five physicians 11 representing a diverse range of patient population and geographic settings. In addition, 25 AMA 12 medical student chapters have been recruited to make presentations to Head Start parents educating 13 them about secondhand smoke exposure and offering advice and assistance in eliminating this 14 health risks.

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16 In May 2008, the AMA hosted a press conference led by Dr. Maves and Dr. Davis for the national 17 release of the Public Health Service's Treating Tobacco Use and Dependence Clinical Practice Guideline 2008 Update<sup>6</sup> and released an updated version of a physician's pocket guide for helping 18 19 patients to quit smoking. In addition, the AMA continued to participate in the National School 20 Board Association/CDC National Consortium on Tobacco Use Prevention Through Schools and to 21 support the AMA Alliance's "ScreenOut" program to remove cigarette use in movies targeted to 22 children.

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24 Advocacy

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The AMA was engaged in numerous tobacco control activities. Highlights include:

28 Actively supporting passage of the State Children's Health Insurance Program expansion 29 legislation through which the federal cigarette tax was raised from 39 cents per pack of 30 cigarettes to \$1.00. This was a substantial victory due to the great impact that tax increases 31 have on reducing tobacco use.

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33 Continuing to work with other advocacy organizations, including the Center for Tobacco Free 34 Kids, the American Cancer Society, the American Heart Association, and the American Lung 35 Association, to secure passage of legislation to allow the FDA to regulate tobacco product 36 labeling, sales, distribution, advertising and promotion. This legislation would provide a major 37 tool to reduce the appeal of cigarette products to youth by eliminating flavoring added to these 38 products. Additional major features of the proposed legislation were that: a) all new tobacco 39 products would require pre-market approval; b) standards would be set forth for the sale of 40 modified risk tobacco products, and c) the Secretary of Health and Human Services would be 41 required to: 1) establish tobacco product standards to protect the public health, reserving to 42 Congress the power to ban any tobacco products or reduce the nicotine level to zero, and 2) to take specified actions, including public notification and recall, against unreasonably harmful 43 44 products. For the first time this legislation was passed by the House of Representatives and 45 passed out of the Senate HELP Committee, but it was not voted upon by the full Senate before 46 the end of the Congressional Session. It is expected that it will be reintroduced during 2009.

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48 Signing on to a letter sent jointly with four other organizations, the Center for Tobacco Free 49 Kids, the American Cancer Society, the American Heart Association, and the American Lung 50 Association, to encourage the CVS Corporation to continue its internal discussions about

51 stopping the sale of tobacco products in its pharmacies. The letter pointed to the examples of

l	the Wegman grocery chain and the Target Corporation, which have already stopped selling
2	tobacco products.
3	
4	• Joining an amicus brief filed by the Center for Tobacco Free Kids with the U.S. Supreme Court
5	in Altria v. Good, a case brought by three smokers from Maine as a class action, alleging fraud
6	under Maine's Unfair Trade Practices Act. This was based on false statements by Altria and its
7	Philip Morris USA unit in deceptive advertisements that suggested "light" cigarettes were safer
8	than regular ones. The Supreme Court ruled that federal tobacco labeling requirements do not
9	preempt state law fraud statutes. This ruling will bolster dozens of other lawsuits claiming
10	billions of dollars in damages.

12	<ul> <li>Issuing a press release commending Wal-Mart's efforts to establish an affordable smoking</li> </ul>

At the 2008 Interim Meeting of the House of Delegates, Resolution 901, "Tobacco Control Content 1 2 in Electronic Health Records," was referred to the Board of Trustees. The resolution was 3 introduced by the American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP) and the American Academy of Family Physicians (AAFP) as part of a Smokefree Clinical Practice and Policy Collaborative involving the 4 5 American Medical Association (AMA), AAP, and AAFP. 6 7 Resolution 901 asks: 8 9 That our American Medical Association advocate that all electronic health records should 10 include templates that ask physicians and other clinicians and/or their practice teams to 11 collect information about tobacco use, secondhand smoke exposure, cessation interest and 12 past quit attempts; and 13 14 That our AMA also advocate for inclusion of automatic prompts that remind physicians and 15 other clinicians to act to encourage quitting, advise about maintaining smoke-free 16 environments for children and adults, and connect patients and families to appropriate 17 cessation resources and materials as part of the template. 18 19 DISCUSSION OF ISSUE 20 21 Tobacco use remains the number one preventable cause of death in the United States claiming the 22 lives of 440,000 people annually. This includes the 53,000 who die from secondhand smoke 23 exposure. An estimated 60 percent of U.S. children aged 3-11 years-or almost 22 million 24 children-are exposed to secondhand smoke, primarily in the home. The 2006 report, The Health 25 Consequences of Involuntary Exposure to Tobacco Smoke: A Report of the Surgeon General<sup>1</sup>, 26 recommended the complete elimination of smoking in indoor spaces and called on parents to create 27 smokefree home and car environments. Children exposed to secondhand smoke are at an increased 28 risk for sudden infant death syndrome (SIDS), acute respiratory infections, ear problems, and more 29 severe asthma. Smoking by parents causes respiratory symptoms and slows lung growth in their 30 children. Children who are exposed to secondhand smoke are inhaling many of the same cancer-31 causing substances and poisons as smokers. Because their bodies are developing, infants and 32 young children are especially vulnerable to the poisons in secondhand smoke. Secondhand smoke 33 exposure can cause children who already have asthma to experience more frequent and severe 34 attacks.

1 Physicians play a major role in changing patients' behaviors. Surveys of patients reveal that they 2 expect physicians to address behavior issues and welcome the opportunity to work with their 3 physician in changing an unhealthy behavior or adopting a healthier behavior or treatment. 4 Physicians can influence patients to think about a behavior, plan for a change and eventually 5 implement that change. This counseling might not result in an immediate beneficial outcome, but 6 can make a tremendous impact over time. 7 8 Extensive evidence of the successful physician intervention in patient behaviors is seen for tobacco 9 and alcohol use. The US Preventive Service Task Force<sup>2</sup> (USPSTF) found empirical evidence that

brief smoking cessation interventions, including screening and brief counseling (less than 3
 minutes) plus cessation aids, are effective in increasing the proportion of smokers who successfully
 quit smoking and remain abstinent after one year.

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In May 2008, the US Public Health Service (USPHS) released *Treating Tobacco Use and Dependence: 2008 Update*<sup>3</sup>. Researchers for these clinical guidelines found that at least 70
percent of smokers see a physician each year. Moreover, 70 percent of smokers report wanting to
quit, and almost two-thirds of smokers who relapse want to try quitting again within 30 days.
Finally, smokers cite a physician's advice to quit as an important motivator for attempting to stop
smoking.

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21 Unfortunately, clinicians and health systems do not capitalize consistently on the opportunity to

intervene. According to the National Committee for Quality Assurance's *State of Health Care Quality Report*<sup>4</sup>, while there has been some improvement in tobacco dependence clinical

intervention for the insured population, provision of specific help with quitting smoking is

inconsistently provided. Recent Healthcare Effectiveness Data and Information Set (HEDIS) data

26 showed that only 39 percent of smokers reported that their clinician discussed either medications or

27 strategies to quit (www.web.ncqa.org/tabid/59/Default.aspx). As one step to improve the provision

28 of preventive and early intervention services, the Physician Consortium for Performance

29 Improvement's "Preventive Care & Screening Physician Performance Measurement Set<sup>5</sup>,"

approved in September 2008, includes measures for "Tobacco Use: Screening & Cessation
 Intervention."

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The first step to treat tobacco use and dependence is to identify tobacco use. The effective 33 34 identification of tobacco use by itself not only opens the door for successful interventions (e.g., 35 clinician advice and treatment) but also guides clinicians to identify appropriate interventions based on patients' tobacco use status and willingness to quit. Based on these findings, the USPHS 2008 36 37 Update recommends that clinicians and health care systems use the office visit for universal 38 assessment and intervention. It recommends that every patient who presents to a health care 39 facility be asked if s/he uses tobacco, that all tobacco users be advised to quit, and the willingness 40 of all tobacco users to make a quit attempt at this time be assessed.

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42 The USPHS tobacco treatment guidelines also address children and secondhand smoke exposure.

43 They recommend that clinicians ask parents about tobacco use and offer cessation advice and

44 assistance. Assessing children's exposure to secondhand smoke and assisting parents in its

45 elimination would have a short-term and long-term health benefit for the child. A review of the

46 studies conducted by the USPHS expert panel showed that giving parents information on the harms

of secondhand smoke reduces childhood exposure to such smoke and may reduce parental smokingrates.

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50 Many Electronic Health Record (EHR) systems and paper intake/medical history forms include 51 smoking as a health indicator and screen for current smoking behavior and number of cigarettes

smoked. Unfortunately, these forms stop short of including information on family exposure to
 secondhand smoke as well as information on quit attempts if the person is a smoker.

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**USE OF EHRs AND PROVIDER PROMPTS** 

Use of EHR systems allow physicians to capture data from a patient interaction in a structured way
and can automatically prompt users to act on that information if needed. Data can be captured in a
variety of ways, but templates are often used to efficiently, yet comprehensively organize medical
history and risk factors. Automated prompts such as alerts and reminders are often used to prompt
a specific action by the user.

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12 Studies<sup>6-10</sup> have shown mixed results on the effectiveness of automated clinical reminders in EHRs 13 for routine health maintenance services and preventive care tests in ambulatory settings. The 14 authors of a research paper in the Journal of the American Medical Informatics Association 15 (JAMIA)<sup>11</sup> found that the effectiveness of clinical reminders was impeded by lack of role-based 16 reminders, using reminders while not with the patient, workload, lack of flexibility in the reminder, 17 and poor interface usability. The study confirmed findings from previous research suggesting that 18 clinician adherence to reminders is variable and declines over time. In order to increase the 19 effectiveness of clinical reminders in EHR systems, the authors recommended that the number of 20 reminders should be limited and that reminders must be embedded directly into the typical 21 workflow.

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23 Early users of EHR systems often found that the data capture process was time consuming and 24 overwhelming in busy ambulatory environments. Alerts and reminders have also been criticized 25 by users as being cumbersome and frustrating. In a study conducted by Kaiser Permanente (Center for Health Research Kaiser Permanente Northwest)<sup>12</sup>, user acceptance of alerts and reminders was 26 27 assessed by internal medicine, pediatrics, and family practice specialists. While endorsing 28 electronic reminders and their utility, participants stated that reminders must be integrated into the 29 workflow of the physician, simple to respond to, directed to the appropriate user for the necessary 30 task, and clinically relevant.

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32 The mere presence of EHR systems does not ensure that higher quality of care is being provided. 33 EHR systems can be a powerful tool to organize large amounts of data, but often require a different 34 documentation style than many physicians are accustomed to and can be cumbersome if not 35 designed properly. Simply because EHR systems can capture, organize and query a large amount 36 of patient data does not mean that users know how to most effectively use that information. There 37 are enormous pressures on physicians to manage more health information within ever increasing 38 time constraints, and research has shown that the effectiveness of automated prompts decrease 39 when the user must respond to a large number of prompts. Therefore, it is critical that there be a 40 balance between the amount of data captured at the point of care and the ability of clinicians to use 41 that data in a meaningful way to impact health outcomes. EHR system design has improved, but 42 there is still much to learn about how users interact with the EHR system, the attributes of a 43 successful template, and how automated prompts can be integrated into the clinical practice to 44 impact health outcomes.

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### 46 CONCLUSION

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48 There is no question that tobacco use and exposure to secondhand smoke are important health

49 issues and that physicians need improved information systems that enable them to provide more

50 timely and effective counseling to patients on the risks of tobacco use. These systems are also

51 needed for an extensive number of medical conditions and behaviors that physicians regularly deal

1 with their patients. Once an automated prompt for one of these is included on an EHR system or 2 paper form, however, there will be demands for more prompts, which will likely result in a 3 diminished use of the prompts. For that reason, a balance must be found between the need for 4 patient information and the manner in which it is collected. 5 6 One possible solution could be systems with a limited number of prompts in broader categories. 7 These prompts could provide menus dealing with specific conditions or behaviors that a physician 8 could select. For example, there could be a prompt on "Alcohol, Tobacco, and Drug Use" that 9 contained menus for each area. In that way, a physician could drill down to a specific item without 10 being presented with an overwhelming set of prompts for each condition or behavior. 11 12 RECOMMENDATIONS 13 14 The Board of Trustees recommends that the following recommendations be adopted in lieu of

- 15 Resolution 901 (I-08), and that the remainder of this report be filed.
- That our American Medical Association encourage physicians to capture information from all their patients on tobacco use, secondhand smoke exposure, cessation interest, and past quit attempts. (New HOD Policy)
- 21 2) That our American Medical Association encourage the development of EHR systems that
   22 provide physicians with the ability to capture information on specific health behaviors
   23 deemed appropriate by the physician and that provide physicians the option to utilize
   24 automated reminders to benefit their patients. (New HOD Policy)

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### **RELEVANT AMA POLICY**

### H-30.958 Ethyl Alcohol and Nicotine as Addictive Drugs

The AMA (1) identifies alcohol and nicotine as drugs of addiction which are gateways to the use of other drugs by young people; (2) urges all physicians to intervene as early as possible with their patients who use tobacco products and have problems related to alcohol use, so as to prevent adverse health effects and reduce the probability of long-term addition; (3) encourages physicians who treat patients with alcohol problems to be alert to the high probability of co-existing nicotine problems; and (4) reaffirms that individuals who suffer from drug addiction in any of its manifestations are persons with a treatable disease. (Res. 28, A-91; Reaffirmed by CSA Rep. 14, A-97)

### H-490.913 Smoke-Free Environments and Workplaces

On the issue of the health effects of environmental tobacco smoke (ETS) and passive smoke exposure in the workplace and other public facilities, our AMA: (1) (a) supports classification of ETS as a known human carcinogen; (b) concludes that passive smoke exposure is associated with increased risk of sudden infant death syndrome and of cardiovascular disease; (c) encourages physicians and medical societies to take a leadership role in defending the health of the public from ETS risks and from political assaults by the tobacco industry; and (d) encourages the concept of establishing smoke-free campuses for business, labor, education, and government;  $\dots$  (3)  $\dots$  (e) urges eliminating cigarette, pipe, and cigar smoking in any indoor area where children live or play, or where another person's health could be adversely affected through passive smoking;  $\dots$ . (CSA Rep. 3, A-04; Appended: Sub. Res. 426, A-04)

### H-490.917 Physician Responsibilities for Tobacco Cessation

Cigarette smoking is a major health hazard and a preventable factor in physicians' actions to maintain the health of the public and reduce the high cost of health care. Our AMA takes a strong stand against smoking and favors aggressively pursuing all avenues of educating the general public on the hazards of using tobacco products and the continuing high costs of this serious but preventable problem. Additionally, our AMA supports and advocates for appropriate surveillance approaches to measure changes in tobacco consumption, changes in tobacco-related morbidity and mortality, youth uptake of tobacco use, and use of alternative nicotine delivery systems. In view of the continuing and urgent need to assist individuals in smoking cessation, physicians, through their professional associations, should assume a leadership role in establishing national policy on this topic and assume the primary task of educating the public and their patients about the danger of tobacco use (especially cigarette smoking). Accordingly, our AMA: ... (2) supports (a) development of an anti-smoking package program for medical societies; (b) making patient educational and motivational materials and programs on smoking cessation available to physicians; and (c) development and promotion of a consumer health-awareness smoking cessation kit for all segments of society, but especially for youth; (3) encourages physicians to use practice guidelines for the treatment of patients with nicotine dependence and will cooperate with the Agency for Health Research and Quality (AHRQ) in disseminating and implementing evidence-based clinical practice guidelines on smoking cessation, and on other matters related to tobacco and health; (4) (a) encourages physicians to use smoking cessation activities in their practices including (i) quitting smoking and urging their colleagues to quit; (ii) inquiring of all patients at every visit about their smoking habits (and their use of smokeless tobacco as well); (iii) at every visit, counseling those who smoke to quit smoking and eliminate the use of tobacco in all forms; ... (5) (a) supports efforts to identify gaps, if any, in existing materials and programs designed to train physicians and medical students in the behavior modification skills necessary to successfully counsel patients to stop smoking; (b) supports the production of materials and programs which would fill gaps, if any, in materials and programs to train physicians and medical students in the

behavior modification skills necessary to successfully counsel patients to stop smoking; (c) supports national, state, and local efforts to help physicians and medical students develop skills necessary to counsel patients to quit smoking; (d) encourages state and county medical societies to sponsor, support, and promote efforts that will help physicians and medical students more effectively counsel patients to stop smoking; (e) encourages physicians to participate in education programs to enhance their ability to help patients quit smoking; (f) encourages physicians to speak to community groups about tobacco use and its consequences; and (g) supports providing assistance in the promulgation of information on the effectiveness of smoking cessation programs; (6) (a) supports the concept that physician offices, clinics, hospitals, health departments, health plans, and voluntary health associations should become primary sites for education of the public about the harmful effects of tobacco and encourages physicians and other health care workers to introduce and support healthy lifestyle practices as the core of preventive programs in these sites; and (b) encourages the development of smoking cessation programs implemented jointly by the local medical society, health department, and pharmacists; and (7) (a) believes that collaborative approaches to tobacco treatment across all points of contact within the medical system will maximize opportunities to address tobacco use among all of our patients, and the likelihood for successful intervention; and (b) supports efforts by any appropriately licensed health care professional to identify and treat tobacco dependence in any individual, in the various clinical contexts in which they are encountered, recognizing that care provided in one context needs to take into account other potential sources of treatment for tobacco use and dependence. (CSA Rep. 3, A-04; Appended: Res. 444, A-05; Reaffirmed: BOT Rep. 8, A-08)

### **D-478.996 Information Technology Standards and Costs**

. .

Our AMA will: (1) encourage the setting of standards for health care information technology whereby the different products will be interoperable and able to retrieve and share data for the identified important functions while allowing the software companies to develop competitive systems; (2) work with Congress and insurance companies to appropriately align incentives as part of the development of a National Health Information Infrastructure (NHII), so that the financial burden on physicians is not disproportionate when they implement these technologies in their offices; (3) review the following issues when participating in or commenting on initiatives to create a NHII: (a) cost to physicians at the office-based level; (b) security of electronic records; and (c) the standardization of electronic systems; (4) continue to advocate for and support initiatives that minimize the financial burden to physician practices of adopting and maintaining electronic medical records; and (5) continue its active involvement in efforts to define and promote standards that will facilitate the interoperability of health information technology systems. (Res. 717, A-04; Reaffirmation, A-05; Appended: Sub. Res. 707, A-06; Reaffirmation A-07)

Chronicle, Continental Airings has notified 310 of its pilots that they may be furloughed in the coming weeks.

The Chronicle report cited a letter to officials of the Air Line Pilots Association (Continental chapter) that nearly 7 percent of its 4,500 pilots may be laid off.

ALPA is the bargaining agent for the 4,000 pilots of Continental Airlines and is the world's oldest and largest pilot union, representing 64,000 pilots at 43 as pept. 20 based on beinging.

The furloughs are expected to be temporary but may last at least six months in duration.

Last Wednesday, Continental Airlines reported a second quarter 2009 net loss of \$213 million, which the company said requires the adoption of cost-cutting measures, including the elimination of 1,700 positions across the company.

AN ACT TO ADD A NEW CHAPTER 90A TO TITLE 10, GUAM CODE ANNOTATED, RELATIVE TO THE PROHIBITION OF IMPORTING INGESTIBLE TOBACCO FILM STRIPS, INGESTIBLE TOBACCO STICKS, TOBACCO HARD CANDIES, NICOTINE LOLLIPOPS, NICOTINE LIP BALM, AND NICOTINE WATER.

## **1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF GUAM:**

Section 1. Legislative Findings and Intent. I Liheslaturan Guåhan finds 2 that tobacco use is the leading cause of preventable, early death in America. 3 Every year in our nation, tobacco causes over 400,000 deaths, and 8,600,000 4 Americans have chronic illnesses linked to tobacco. A 50 percent reduction 5 in tobacco use by minors would prevent over 10,000,000 of today's children 6 from becoming daily smokers. This would save over 3,000,000 of them 7 from premature death due to tobacco-induced disease. A reduction in youth 8 tobacco use would result in approximately \$75,000,000,000 in savings 9 attributable to reduced health care costs. Tobacco manufacturers routinely 10 advertise to the youth tobacco products as being socially acceptable and 11 healthful. Therefore, it is the intent of I Liheslaturan Guåhan to prohibit the 12 importation and sale of all orally dissolvable tobacco products and nicotine 13

water and nicotine lip balm. In effect, this prohibition will prevent these
 products from reaching consumers under the age of 18, to whom they are
 most aggressively being marketed.

## Section 2. A new Chapter 90A is hereby added to Title 10, Guam Code Annotated, to read:

- § 90A100 This Chapter shall be known and may be cited as 'Prohibition of
  Ingestible Tobacco Film Strips, Tobacco Sticks, Hard Candies, Nicotine
  Lollipops, Nicotine Lip Balm, and Nicotine Water'
- 9 Section 3. § 90A101 Definitions:

*Distributor* means any person who imports tangible personal property or
 consumable goods and distributes to retailer for resale.

*Nicotine* 'means a colorless, oily, water-soluble, highly toxic, liquid
alkaloid, C1 0H1 4N2, found in tobacco and valued as an insecticide. Nicotine has
powerful pharmacologic effects including increased heart rate, heart stroke
volume, and oxygen consumption by the heart muscle as well as powerful
psychodynamic effects such as euphoria, increased alertness, and a sense of
relaxation. Nicotine is also powerfully addictive.

*Nicotine Lip Balm*' means any emollient product infused with any amount
 of any form of nicotine designed to be used on the lips for the purpose of
 delivering nicotine into the bloodstream through the mucous membranes.

*Nicotine Lollipops'* means any sweetened, dissolvable confection infused
with any amount of any form of nicotine and available as a skewered hard candy,
for the purpose of delivering nicotine into the bloodstream.

*Nicotine Water*' means any bottled drinking water infused with any amount
 of any form of nicotine.

'Orbs' means the brand name of dissolvable lozenge-type product made of
finely ground and flavored tobacco that melts in the mouth within 30 minutes.

*Retailer*' means the seller of tangible personal property or consumable
 goods for consumption or use by the purchaser and not for resale.

*Sticks*' means the brand name of a dissolvable toothpick-shaped product
made of finely ground and flavored tobacco that melts in the mouth within 10
minutes.

*Strips*' means the brand name of dissolvable film-like product made of
finely ground and flavored tobacco that melts in the mouth within 3 minutes.

8 Section 4. § 90A102 Importation of Ingestible Tobacco Film Strips,
 9 Tobacco Sticks, Hard Candies, Nicotine Lollipops, Nicotine Lip Balm, and
 10 Nicotine Waters to Guam Illegal: Punished

(a) A person commits a felony when he imports, attempts to import, or
causes to import ingestible tobacco film strips, tobacco sticks, hard candies,
nicotine lollipops, nicotine lip balm, and nicotine water into the territorial
jurisdiction of Guam.

(b) Any ingestible tobacco film strips, tobacco sticks, hard candies, nicotine
lollipops, nicotine lip balm, and nicotine water in violation of this Section shall be
subject to seizure and forfeiture.

(1) Any property subject to forfeiture under this Section shall be seized by a 18 peace officer, including Guam Customs Officer, upon process issued by the 19 Superior Court, except that seizure without such process may be made when the 20 seizure is incident to an arrest or a search under a search warrant or an inspection 21 under an administrative inspection warrant; the property subject to seizure has been 22 the subject of a prior judgment in a criminal injunction or forfeiture proceeding; or 23 the peace officer has probable cause to believe that the property has been used or 24 intended to be used in violation of this Section. In the event of a seizure pursuant to 25 this Subsection, proceedings under Subsection (c) shall be instituted promptly. 26

(c) Property taken or detained under this Section shall not be repleviable, but
 shall be deemed to be in the custody of the government subject only to the orders
 and decrees of the Court. Whenever property is seized under the provisions of this
 Section, the government shall destroy all ingestible tobacco film strips, tobacco
 sticks, hard candies, nicotine lollipops, nicotine lip balm, and nicotine water seized
 and forfeited upon order of the Court.

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(d) Any person found guilty of the importation, attempted importation or
causing the importation of ingestible tobacco film strips, tobacco sticks, hard
candies, nicotine lollipops, nicotine lip balm, and nicotine water to Guam shall be
guilty of a felony and be subject to imprisonment for not more than five (5) years,
a fine not to exceed Twenty-five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000.00) per incident of
importation, or both such fine and imprisonment.

Section 5. § 90A103 Effective Date: This Act shall take effect ninety (90)
 days after its enactment.
