

AN ACT TO AMEND §61531 OF PART 4, ARTICLE 5 OF CHAPTER 61, TITLE 21, GUAM CODE ANNOTATED, RELATIVE TO EXPANDING THE PROVISIONS OF THE AUTOMOBILE PARKING SPACE PROVISION.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF GUAM:

2 Section 1. Legislative Intent. The laws governing automobile parking 3 spaces do *not* recognize the use of motorcycles and mopeds. Residents of our 4 island face the rising cost of gas prices and congestion on our roads. The 5 community is also anticipating the increase in military presence within the next

few years. This will result in more traffic on our roads, prompting residents to 1 2 seek an alternative means of transportation, such as motorcycles, mopeds, scooters, 3 and other motorized two (2) wheeled vehicles. For those who choose such 4 methods, finding parking involves competing with automobile drivers. As we expect an increase in traffic, we can also expect an increase in the use of 5 6 motorcycles, mopeds, and scooters. Currently, there are no designated parking 7 spaces specifically to accommodate traffic and rider safety. It is *I Liheslatura's* 8 intent to designate appropriate areas as parking strictly for operators of motorized 9 two (2) wheeled vehicles.

Section 2. §61531 of Chapter 61 of Title 21, Guam Code Annotated, is
hereby *amended* to read as follows:

12 "§61531. **Automobile Parking Space.** 13 Off-street automobile parking space *shall* be provided as follows: 14 (a) For dwellings, at least one (1) automobile parking space 15 16 for each dwelling unit; For hotels, at least one (1) automobile parking space for 17 (b) each four (4) guest rooms; 18 19 (c)For places of assembly, such as churches, auditoriums or 20 theaters with seating facilities, one (1) parking space for each four (4) seats; 21 (d) For places of assembly, such as restaurants or night clubs 22 without fixed seating facilities, one (1) parking space for each 23 one hundred (100) square feet of customer area in such use; 24 (e) For retail sales of building materials, and goods requiring 25 extensive display areas, industrial buildings and warehouses, 26

1 one (1) parking space for each eight hundred (800) square feet of area in such use, exclusive of loading requirements; 2 3 (f)For retail and wholesale sales and services, exclusive of 4 warehouse activity, at least one (1) space for each one hundred 5 (100) square feet or portion thereof of usable commercial floor 6 area; For professional and business offices, and public 7 (g)8 administration offices, one (1) parking space for each four 9 hundred (400) square feet or portion thereof of floor area; For offices and clinics of healing arts, at least five (5) 10 (h) 11 spaces for each practitioner; For hospitals and nursing homes, at least one (1) space 12 (i) 13 for each two (2) beds; Three (3) spaces for every four (4) employees; 14 (j) (k) To the extent practicable, each of the Subsections (a) 15 through (j) shall provide at least one (1) marked parking space 16 17 for use by bicycles equipped with a motor and motorcycles; (1)Total parking requirements will be a total of all 18 applicable elements in Subsections (a) through (k); 19 20 (m)Appropriate parking space for open space activities, such 21 as: swimming beaches, picnic areas, campgrounds, boating areas, *shall* be determined by the Guam Land Use Commission; 22 A minimum of one (1) bicycle parking space shall be 23 (n)provided for each twenty (20) off-street automobile parking 24 At a minimum, all bicycle parking spaces shall be 25 space. provided in the form of bicycle racks with locking capability. 26

II. COMMITTEE PROCEEDINGS

Testimony

Chairman Pangelinan: We have Mr. Carl Untalan from the Department of Land Management.

Mr. Carl Untalan: thank you again Mr. Chairman and Senators of the Committee. Our response to Bill 30-188 is as follows:

Add a Sub Section to address bicycles, beginning with a new Sub Section (N) and it reads as follows.

Chairman Pangelinan: Thank you very much Mr. Untalan. In Addition to Mr. Untalan, we also have Mr. Roy Nauta and Mr. Herman Ada.

Mr. Ada: Good Morning, My name is Herman Ada and I represent Scooter World.

I would like to thank Senator Espaldon for introducing Bill 188 and we support his efforts to encourage alternative forms of transportation here on island. I would like to read, in print form, some additional benefits we feel would increase scooter riding.

Everyone knows that scooters burn less fuel and produce fewer green house gases than car. In fact, the environmental advantages of using a scooter begin right from its production and only end when it is disposed at the end of its useful life. Cars are made of large amounts of metal, plastic, paint, fabric, leather, rubber and glass. They have a large net asset battery and contain other toxic fluids such as coolants and lubricants. Many of the surfaces are chemically treated to treat for corrosion protection. Both cars and scooters are getting much better at using recycled materials at production and they are also being made of materials that can be recycled at the end of their useful life. But, scooters as a whole use a whole lot less materials.

The average 50cc scooter weighs around 225 lbs where the average car weighs about 4,000 lbs. That just means a whole lot less material that ultimately has to be re-processed or sent to a landfill. Especially an important advantage to our island. Riding a scooter saves money. Instead of spending \$250 a month on gas for your car. A scooter will only use \$50 for the same amount of distance traveled. This is just the tip of the iceberg in terms of dollars saved when using a scooter compared to a car. If you want to give yourself a \$75 pay raise this year and every year after, all you have to do is sell your car and buy a scooter. Getting rid of that \$300 a month car loan nets you \$3600 for the year;

gas savings can total up \$2400 at current prices. Save another \$1000 off your car insurance since the scooter insurance only costs on average \$100 a year. While we are at it put another \$500 into your pocket on maintenance cost saved operating a scooter That's a savings of \$7500 in your first use with a scooter.

Money better spent on other things like your families. Taking advantage of all these great benefits making it more sense when you consider that 75% of computers drive to work alone. Imagine taking 75% of the morning and afternoon automobile traffic off the streets. With the anticipated military buildup and the associated population growth and the lack of robust public transportation encouraging the use of scooters is one way we can very meaningfully and economically address the issue of traffic congestion.

My last point I want to put out is that riding scooters makes you happy. Using a scooter is the one of the easiest and most affordable way to improve our lives and the planet. But, maybe even more important is the fact that riding a scooter simply makes you happy. I have seen so many faces on customers riding for the first time and the joy of each and every one of their faces is the most important and rewarding part of my job. If you want to learn more, just come visit me and I'll be happy to put a smile on your face. In summary, scooter riding is good for the environment, saves money, reduces traffic congestion makes you happy. Scooter World and the scooter community as a whole will support any legislation that will encourage scooter riding and safe scooter riding, as well.

Chairman Pangelinan: Thank you very much. I wanted to apologize. I did not recognize the author to give an overview, but I will recognize him after Mr. Muna gives his testimony.

Mr. Roy Muna: Thank you Senators for giving me this opportunity to speak. My name is Roy Muna. I recently learned about this bill last night and did not having anything prepared. I was in the area and decided to drop by and see what this bill was about.

I do after reading abit about it commend Senator Espaldon on introducing this. I think it is very timely that you brought this up. I am here as a citizen motorcyclist speaking on the perspective of safety. I think any time legislation that is introduced that encourages safety for motorcyclists and a motorist is a good thing.

This bill allows motorcyclists to have a particular area to park and that will enable the public to understand that there is a designated area. Right now, the motorcyclists are negotiating having to go through the parking lot and find a particular spot. I believe a lot of motorist out there do not conscientiously know that there are motorcyclists parking in those certain areas.

I also believe that as the Marines come in because of their demographics I believe more marines will be riding more motorcyclists. I think its timely that as developments come

up that parking spaces are included in that development. I encourage more legislation of safety of motorcyclists. Thank you.

Chairman Pangelinan: Thank you very much Mr. Muna. I have no questions from the panel. Senator Espaldon.

Senator Jim Espaldon: it is a very simple bill, Mr. Chairman. In essence, what I believe will address what was stated in much of the testimony. It is going to be a growing amount of two-wheeled vehicles on this island, bicycles, motorcycles or scooters.

In fact, during the last term it was you Mr. Chair, who introduced legislation on road improvement projects that will be going on to include bike pass. I would anticipate we are going to see a lot more two-wheeled vehicles. The testimony by Mr. Muna was correct that sometimes those who are driving automobiles sometimes are not conscientious of the fact that, some of the parking slots may be occupied by motorcycles, and immediately turn in.

There have been circumstances where automobiles have rammed into motorcycles parked there and just did not expect it there and this bill designates areas provided for just twowheeled vehicles. The visibility will be better and believe the safety of the vehicles themselves will be protected because they all will be in one place and we will definitely take the recommendation to be located along those lines.

Then again, it is just to provide the vehicles and the drivers and to see a lot more twowheeled vehicles on this island and they need an appropriate place to park. This bill will also help conserve space a more efficiently parking space where one motorcycle does not occupy one whole space reserved for a car. You can park two motorcycles in a slot used for the same amount of space.

I think this is just an approach in efficiency and plan going forward. I appreciate the testimony. Mr. Chair if I may just ask one question to Mr. Ada and this is more for statistical purposes. The industries growth projections over the past year since scooters have been introduced.

Mr. Ada: We are approaching one-year business this October. This past year we sold close to six hundred scooters already.

Senator Espaldon: This is only the first year for your company.

Mr. Ada: Yes.

Senator Espaldon: And there are other companies that do sell other scooters as well.

Mr. Ada: I believe there are three other companies. The sells have not slowed down much since our opening. We also have been pushing another business that is our scooter

rentals. That too of the business has been growing. In addition to regular riders out there we also have rentals.

Senator Espaldon: that is a good point. Mr. Muna in terms of the location of these parking spaces, do you have recommendations on where these two-wheeled vehicles slots should be?

Mr. Muna: obviously would want parking spaces right up in the front, preferably with some cover and lighting. Practically I think if they are going to retrofit the parking lot I do not suspect the building owners are going to rush out and paint lines right up in the front by the handicapped area.

In going around Asia and looking at different commercial buildings that have motorcycle slots it might not be appealing to see many motorcycles lined up in the front door and I imagine not too far away from the building. I think if it is just designated, I think they are going to do many good for the public just from the safety aspect of it and the public are aware that there are more motorcyclists in this general area.

At that point people would be more safe and motorcyclists would be more safe.

Senator Espaldon: Thank you.

Chairman Pangelinan: Yes, Mr. Untalan.

Mr. Untalan: if I can just make one comment. This is just for clarification. What we recommended here are for those two-wheeled bicycles not for motorcycles. Those two-wheeled bicycles are preferably better up front in the establishment and I can agree with Mr. Muna. It should not be reserved as in for disabled persons but certainly be not far from the establishment because there the easiest to steal.

If you have a parking area far out all by itself, you stand to have a situation with it if there is a criminal activity. Perhaps it should be in a lighted area but not certainly upfront.

Senator Tina Muna Barnes: I just like to base on Mr. Ada and Muna's testimony this is a start up for making accommodations for motorcycles, bicycles and scotters to that affect. BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF GUAM:

2 Legislative Intent. The laws governing automobile parking spaces do not Section 1. recognize the use of motorcycles and mopeds. Residents of our island face the rising cost of gas 3 prices and congestion on our roads. The community is also anticipating the increase in military 4 presence within the next few years. This will result in more traffic on our roads, prompting residents 5 to seek an alternative means of transportation such as motorcycles, mopeds, scooters, and other 6 motorized two wheeled vehicles. For those who choose such methods, finding parking involves 7 competing with automobile drivers. As we expect an increase in traffic, we can also expect an 8 increase in the use of motorcyles, mopeds, and scooters. Currently, there are no designated parking 9 spaces specifically to accommodate traffic and rider safety. It is the legislature's intent to designate 10 appropriate areas as parking strictly for operators of motorized two wheeled vehicles. 11

We are in receipt of your Letter, dated September 21, 2009, Subject: Public Hearing Notice. Our comments to the specific Bills are as follows:

BIII 30-187 (COR) – AN ACT TO ZONE THE PREVIOUSLY UNZONED LOT NUMBER 2436-7 IN THE MUNICIPALITY OF MANGILAO TO HEAVY I NDUSTRIAL (M-2) ZONE

CURRENT M-2 USE PER 21 GCA, CHAPTER 61, §61310.

Pursuant to the above reference, the M-2 Zone allows for permitted uses in the in Light Industrial (M-1) zones such as: Junk yards (with special provisions); and any other uses not specifically prohibited by law, including those which are or may be objectionable, obnoxious, or offensive by reason of odor, dust, smoke, noise, gas fumes, cinders, vibration, or water-carried waste. In this respect, "M-2" zones represent the highest land use intensity permitted in the allowable use hierarchy; so much so that *any* residential uses in the "M-2" zone require an approved Conditional Use Permit through the Guam Land Use Commission. Thus, designation of lots for "M-2" zoning has historically been desirable in areas isolated from other uses.

Lot 2436-7 - Surrounding Zones and Uses:

To the east of Lot 2436-7 lays the former AMELCO Corporation compound, identified as basic Lot 5292. The expanse of Lot 5292 extends across Route 15 (southbound) and onto Lot 5293-3 (Parcels "A" & "B"), better known as the Hawaiian Rock Products quarrying and manufacturing facility. The current zoning of these parcels are M-2 pursuant to Zoning Map Amendment No. F3-67S50 with a heavy industrial use activities on site. To the north and west of the subject lot are Lots 2453 (former Radio Barrigada Boundary) and Lot 2436-6, respectively and are "un-zone. Surrounding land use beyond the existing M-2 zone properties and its activities, are sporadic residential, commercial uses and a recreational use, which is the Mangilao golf course facility, and agricultural-residential development to the north and interior of the Kenny's Café Road.

Assessment:

The immediate area is unique as it maintains one of the few heavy industrial zones on Guam. In this respect, the establishment of the M-2 zoning of Lot 2436-7 will be a contiguous extension of allowable uses within the designation and would have compatible uses as that found on lot 5292 (AMELCO) and the Hawaiian Rock Operations directly across Route 15. Furthermore, the property fronts a major arterial route (Route 15), which locates it away from any interior lots that would be more conducive for residential uses.

Given the location of Lot 2436-7 and the heavy industrial uses already in existence that is adjacent/or abuts the subject lot, we have no objection to the establishment of the zoning designation of "M-2."

BIII 30-188 (COR) – AN ACT TO AMEND §61531 IF CHAPTER 61. TITLE 21, GUAM CODE ANNOTATED, RELATIVE TO EXPANDING THE PROVISIONS OF THE AUTOMOBILE PARKING SPACE PROVISION

We have reviewed Bill 188-30 (COR), "Act to Amend §61531 of Chapter 61, Title 21, Guam Code Annotated, relative to expanding the provisions of the Automobile Parking Space provision" and supports the legislative intent to "designate appropriate areas as parking strictly for operators of motorized two wheeled vehicles." Continuation of Letter RE: DLM Comments on Bills: 30-187 (COR); 30-188 (COR); 201-30 (COR); 218-30 (LS) September 25, 2009 Page 3 of 5

The Department, as the support staff for the Guam Land Use Commission, recognizes that parking regulation should be written to allow maximum creativity and flexibility of design and provide an opportunity for business owners / developer to accommodate the unique characteristics of individual properties.

Moreover, the Department lauds the intent of Bill 30-188 (COR) but also recognizes that the existing parking regulations also do not comprehensively look at bicycles or human powered machines. The Department recommends the following changes:

Amend Page 2, Line 16 to 18:

(k) To the extent practicable, each of the sub items (a) through (j) shall provide at least one (1) marked parking space for use by bicycles, bicycles with motors, bicycle equipped with a motor (ref Chapter 1, 16 GCA (Vehicles) and motorcycles.

Add a subsection to address bicycle:

(n) A minimum of one bicycle parking space shall be provided for each 20 off-street automobile parking spaces. At a minimum, all bicycle parking spaces shall be provided in the form of bicycle racks with locking capability. Bicycle parking facilities shall be designed and installed to include:

1. Spaces that are a minimum of 2 feet by 6 feet per bicycle

2. The minimum number possible of potential conflict points between bicycles and motor vehicles

<u>3. Lighting</u>

4. Provision for locking of bicycles to the rack or bicycle locker

5. Adequate spacing for access to the bicycle and locking device when the spaces are occupied.

<u>6. Where possible, bicycle parking shall be located within view of building entrances /windows and/or security.</u>

BIII 201-30 (COR) – AN ACT TO AMEND SUBITEM (h) OF TITLE 21, GUAM CODE ANNOTATED CHAPTER 61 61503, RELATIVE TO EXCEPTIONS TO YARD AND AREA REGULATIONS

Bill 201-30, is " An Act to Amend Sub item (h) of Title 21 Guam Code Annotated, Chapter 61, Section 61503, Relative to Exceptions to Yard and Area Regulations." The intent of this Bill is to allow accessory buildings or structures to be located and maintained in any front, side or rear yard provided that such buildings or structures are to be used exclusively for purposes relative to connections to island electric power, to include standby generators and other alternative power connections for net metering purposes; to provide that such building or structures shall be located at or near the point that electric power is provided by the Guam Power Authority, and if located in a side or rear yard, the walls may be erected on the rear and/or side lot lines, and such buildings or structures shall not exceed one hundred fifty (150) square feet of floor space and the roofs thereof shall not project beyond the lot lines and shall be sloped in such a manner as to prevent rain runoff from flowing to adjacent property.

We provide our recommendations as follows:

Reference line 23, page 2, recommend the word <u>"FRONT</u>" be added After the words "...<u>and if located in a</u>" and before the word <u>"side."</u>

Reference line 1, page 3, recommend word <u>"FRONT</u>" be added After the words <u>"....erected on the</u>" and before the word <u>"rear."</u>

Reference line 2, page 3, where it states <u>"shall not exceed on hundred</u> <u>Fifty (150) square feet...</u>" recommend it be changed to read "...<u>shall not</u> <u>exceed three hundred twelve (312) square feet of floor space...</u>"

We inform this body that the predominant inquiry from the general public and our first hand experiences at DPW One-Stop Permit clearance as it concerns "*accessory type uses*" have been those of a residential related use such as the location of a detached "Carport/garage", gazebos, swimming pools and its related accessories, power pedestals; and unmanned telecommunications relay stations that is either existing or proposed to be located on the front one-half portion of the lot.

Accordingly, we recommend that vehicle shelters such as a detached carport/garage, be allowed in the front ½ of the lot provided the it is 15' feet from the front lot line and zero feet only one side only; we further recommend gazebos, swimming pools and its related accessory structures be allowed and can be located and maintained at minimum of 5' from the front lot line; and zero feet at the side or rear lot line and further provided that no roof overhang constructed shall extend over any lot line and that any water runoff shall be contain on the subject lot. we further recommend including power pedestals and unmanned telecommunications substations be located on the front, side or rear lot lines whereby connection to the public power system best serves the structure(s) or development on the property.

Lastly, since there are existing structures in each of these accessory types as mentioned above as well as those not mentioned but are considered as "accessory uses", we recommend that they be allowed to exist and be deemed as "grand fathered" for the purposes of compliance provided, at minimum that no roof overhang shall extend over lot lines; that water Runoff is contained within the subject lot and that the existing accessory use(s) shall not be expanded.







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ACT TO AMEND §61531 OF CHAPTER 61, TITLE 21, GUAM CODE ANNOTATED, RELATIVE TO EXPANDING THE PROVISIONS OF THE AUTOMOBILE PARKING SPACE PROVISION.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF GUAM:

2 Section 1. Legislative Intent. The laws governing automobile parking spaces do not recognize the use of motorcycles and mopeds. Residents of our island face the rising cost of gas 3 prices and congestion on our roads. The community is also anticipating the increase in military 4 presence within the next few years. This will result in more traffic on our roads, prompting residents 5 to seek an alternative means of transportation such as motorcycles, mopeds, scooters, and other 6 motorized two wheeled vehicles. For those who choose such methods, finding parking involves 7 competing with automobile drivers. As we expect an increase in traffic, we can also expect an 8 increase in the use of motorcycles, mopeds, and scooters. Currently, there are no designated parking 9 spaces specifically to accommodate traffic and rider safety. It is the legislature's intent to designate 10 11 appropriate areas as parking strictly for operators of motorized two wheeled vehicles.

12	Section 2.	§61531 Chapter 61 of GCA is hereby <i>amended</i> to read as follows:

 - (h) For offices and clinics, of healing arts, at least five (5) spaces for each practitioner;
 - (i) For hospitals and nursing homes, at least one space for each two (2) beds;
- (j) Three spaces for every four (4) employees.
 - (k) To the extent practicable, each of the subitems (a) through (j) shall provide at least one (1) marked parking space for use by bicycles, bicycles with motors, and motorcycles.
- (l) Total parking requirements will be a total of all applicable elements in paragraphs (a) through (k);
 (m) Appropriate parking space for open space activities such as: swimming beaches, picnic areas, comparounds, beating errors, shall be determined beach
