



AN ACT TO *ADD* A NEW SUBSECTION (f) TO §84121 OF CHAPTER 84, TITLE 10, GUAM CODE ANNOTATED, RELATIVE TO THE RIGHTS OF INDIVIDUALS WITH HEARING AND SPEECH DISABILITIES TO ACCESS EMERGENCY 911 SERVICES.

1 **BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF GUAM:**

2 **Section 1.** A new Subsection (f) is *added* to §84121 of Chapter 84 of Title
3 10, Guam Code Annotated, to read as follows:

4 “(f) *Access For Individuals With Hearing And Speech Disabilities.*

1 (1) The Guam Fire Department's *Emergency 911 Telephone*
2 *Communications System shall* be accessible to individuals with
3 hearing and speech disabilities.

4 (2) The means for such accessibility *shall* primarily be
5 mobile and landline telephones, but nothing herein shall be construed
6 as to limit the Guam Fire Department from providing access to the
7 *Emergency 911 Telephone Communications System* through other
8 modes of communication.

9 (3) The Guam Fire Department is prohibited from charging
10 additional fees to telecommunications companies and/or their
11 customers for the cost of providing such accessibility. Any costs
12 associated with the implementation of the mandates of this subsection
13 *shall* be funded through existing surcharges.”

14 **Section 2. Effective Date.** The provisions of this Act *shall* be effective
15 thirty (30) days from the date of enactment.



COMMITTEE REPORT DIGEST

I. OVERVIEW

The Committee on Public Safety, Law Enforcement, & Senior Citizens convened the public hearing on January 29, 2010 at 9:20am in *I Liheslatura's* Public Hearing Room. Among the items on the agenda was the consideration of Bill No. 281-30 (LS) – “An act to add a new item (f) to §84121 to Chapter 84 of 10 GCA relative to the rights of individuals with hearing and speech disabilities to emergency 911 services,” sponsored by Senator Telo Taitague.

Public Hearing Requirements

Notices of the hearing were disseminated via facsimile and email to all senators and all main media broadcasting outlets on January 21, 2010 (5-day Notice) and on January 26, 2010 (48-Hour notice) pursuant to meeting the requirements of the Open Government Law. Notice of the hearing was also posted on the Guam Legislature's website.

II. SUMMARY OF TESTIMONIES

Chairman Adolpho B. Palacios, Sr. called the Committee on Public Safety, Law Enforcement, and Senior Citizens to order at 9:20am, welcomed and introduced Senators present. He then allowed the author of the bill, Senator Telo Taitague, to a brief presentation of the bill.

Senator Telo Taitague: After meeting with the Guam Association of the Deaf (GAD) and with President Christopher Pangelinan, who brought these concerns to my office, we are committed in resolving any issue that the hearing impaired has on this island and to also show that we are

here for you. The 911 system on Guam is not in place for the hearing and impaired. However, technology has caught up with the Guam Fire Department, but the intent has not gone further in the capability of texting. What this bill will do is that it will mandate the 911 system to have a number in which you can text for emergency purposes. Hopefully after this bill is passed, the number you will be receiving is a number we can all remember. But rest assured we have already had the fire department put in a number currently being used and that number is 687-0657 for you to use now. I thank the Guam Fire Department and Docomo Pacific for their quick response. After meeting with the GAD community members, within 45 minutes, we were able to obtain this number. With the hope of you today, maybe, by the end of this hearing, we can all come up with a number to remember.

Chairman Palacios called those who are present to testify.

Mr. Manny Cruz, Guam DD Council, In Support, Oral Testimony

I am the executive of the Guam DD Council. I do not have written testimony but I am here to support the three bills with qualifications and I will explain this in written testimony at a later time.

Today, I would like to give you some informal testimony that we are an advocacy council and not a service provider. The federal mandate is to advocate for people with disabilities for system change and to advocate for capacity building. What I see in these bills, are the types of issues that as a council, we fully support, however, we need to look at these bills in depth. These types of disabilities are complex because you have to take a look at the developmental disability versus a disability you get later in life. Some of this would be to address the issues of people with speech difficulties in order to spell out the differences with other disabilities. The police and the fire people do not know the differences between the two. When they perform their duties, they may be violating the rights of individuals because of this lack of training. I would like to combine all three together.

As far as Bill 281-30, this is what we advocate very much on behalf of those with disabilities. Anytime these rights of individuals are violated, we step in to mediate and to advocate. As far as the 911 issue, if you look at the organization, we have this special accommodation. We had the TDD device, a special telephone for the deaf. I am surprised that the emergency 911 system does not have this device because it is a special device and only people with hearing impairment can use. The number you gave appears like a cell phone number however, with this device, which every telephone company is suppose to provide, should be made available. As far as Bill 281-30, people have the right to call for emergency. If they do not, they are in violation of the American Disabilities Act (ADA) which is law. These are the things that need to be spelled out and based from Federal Law which is very broad and very specific to particular disabilities. The ADA has been amended and it becomes more accessible and spread out with various disabilities.

Bill 282-30 as I look at it is also something that we need to spell out in the bill. The bill uses permissive language which may apply to Revenue & Taxation or not. I see this more for those who have acquired a disability later in life, however a person who was born with the disability and who obtained a license, needs to be much broader.

As far as Bill 293, the only concern is the safety and liability of individuals who own these cars and that safety concerns are involved. If they should have an accident, there are liabilities and a lot of clients with disabilities may be given special accommodations, but some may not. This is a very developing issue and what has been happening out in the public right now for people who close their cars; they may not be hearing things outside the car. I would like to impress to the Committee two issues: 1) reasonable accommodation we need to have/provide for individuals with support and 2) to develop support with scientific knowledge. The technology is available on Guam and they can go to CEDDARS at UOG in which these toys/devices can help them to lead a normal life. People have come to CEDDARS and DISID/DVR, they are required to have these devices. Whatever agency that involves the ADA law, they must create rules and regulations in compliance with the ADA law.

Chairman Palacios allowed Senators to give comments and/or questions.

Senator Taitague asked, what is your position Mr. Cruz? It is very disheartening that we were not able to provide an interpreter for today. It is important that we have an interpreter for these government meetings. Why hasn't your agency advocated helping those with disabilities today? Do you receive any funding for advocacy? The bill currently states that it is hard to get a TDD in a vehicle. When a hearing impaired person is in an accident, this cell phone number can help them text police.

Mr. Manny Cruz stated that we have been working on this with GCC. They teach sign language and we advocate for those with disabilities. We are not a service provider and we have been working with UOG to obtain more interpreters. It is very difficult for people to be interested in going into this, perhaps because it deals with salary. In some of the big workshops, and having to get an interpreter is quite difficult because not many people can do the interpreting. Something like this could be taken care of and a lot of interpreters are either in the classroom and they are not full time interpreters. If this type is important, we need to make this attractive. This is a part of capacity building and we are always looking for interpreters. We only get \$240,000.00 a year which is not much funding. We collaborate a lot and when we work with other organizations, we pull our money together. The service provider is DISID and we push this agency to provide these services. You can also get grants for interpreters. This is what GCC did and they were able to get money.

Senator Ada stated, Mr. Cruz, you mentioned that there is a significant difference for individuals with disabilities; are the two sub groups wide range? There are legal routes that must be taken with regards to these issues. Is TDD a valuable system for one group or another?

Mr. Manny Cruz stated that yes; these disabilities are great and wide. Much of the issue deals with the disabilities being born with the individual or acquired later in life.

Chairman Palacios stated that your organization or DISID, whenever there is a vacancy to hire; there could be a preference for individuals who have a certificate in sign language interpretation. This way, you can extend the services of the department, where you can have an individual to provide as a continuing service to the community to those with hearing and speech impairment. This could be a preferable quality for the next candidate. If one of your staff has this extra certification, then this would be an added quality of the department or advocacy agency. DISID should be able to do this and we shouldn't be going to GCC and UOG to acquire an interpreter.

Mr. Manny Cruz stated that you have to have a full time person and it may not be cost effective if you give the person another job at the department. We defer this comment to DISID. The salary may not be there for individuals, but they usually put them in another place. A lot of these agencies do not have an interpreter as well. The new technology is also available where there an interpreter is not longer needed. Even though the life of the interpreter may not be needed because of technology, it is still important to have a person with these skills.

Chairman Palacios stated that GPD, GFD, Rev & Tax, Motor Vehicle are not here today but were notified. I will attempt to bring these authorities together because they will be the agencies to carry out this law.

Mr. Zosef Branch, DISID, DVR, & CAPE Volunteer of GPD, in Support, Oral testimony

I am wearing a hearing aid and I was born with a speech impediment. I am here first because I oppose the bill. There is a federal law which is ADA. Federal law must adhere to Guam and this must be in compliance. ADA is not really recognizable on Guam. I don't know why this is not affecting Guam because it was passed in 1992. Yes, I have problems in what people are saying and the ADA with regards to the 911 system. The person behind the phone really wants to comprehend me. You have people who are deaf and those who are hearing impaired, if you are born with the disability or acquire the disability later in life. It is still the same problem.

I am here in support Bill 281. I am also the in house ADA specialist at DVR and DISID. There is TDD which is portable if you want a TDD for the cars. I am in support of the bills, but what irritates me is that this is Federal Law and why this is not applicable to Guam.

Chairman Palacios stated that essentially, what you are saying Mr. Branch is that you are in support of the bills, but the only issue you are talking about is the ADA federal law. To be able to differentiate people with disabilities and the various kinds of disabilities must be placed on the license. The police officer needs to know for those who have speech impediments versus other kinds of disabilities.

Mr. Branch responded that what you are saying is that you want some form of identification, but how about something on their driver's license? What about people who do not have a license? The Guam ID can be a better route to determine the disabilities.

Chairman Palacios stated that yes; the Guam License/ID card would be the proper identification to get this for the hearing impaired.

Mr. Christopher Pangelinan, Guam Association of the Deaf, In Support, Oral & Written Testimony (*Testimony read by Rennae Meno Perez*)

I am here to speak out on behalf of all the Deaf Community. For a very long time, we have had to struggle with out life and limitations of services provided by the Government. With regards to Bill 281, we have about 100 deaf people living on Guam. Emergency services are very difficult to get to help the Deaf community who do not know how to communicate with someone on the phone or special telephone device. It is very important for us to have a communication system through texting on cell phones or through 911 emergency services. With regards to Bill 282, it is very important for us because it will be someone who will recognize a person with disabilities by using a small symbol or sticker on a driver's license. Emergency responders, upon presentation of the driver's license will see that they will have to communicate through paper and pen or through sign language. With regards to Bill 293, it is very important that we have a symbol on our license plates because if police were to pull us over, we wouldn't be able to communicate with them as well as have emergency vehicles pass us by because we can't hear the siren. (Please see written testimony attached.)

Chairman Palacios stated that I would like to recognize Senator Telo Taitague and it occurred to me that we need to remedy some of the hardships for persons with disabilities. We just want to make sure that the police officers can identify them and these bills will recognize those with disabilities. I will make sure that we will have a mark up meeting with the GPD, GFD, Dept. of Rev & Tax, Motor Vehicle, AG, DISID, DVR and Guam DD with Manny Cruz. I will provide a copy of these bills and give them one week to schedule the meeting and after I will give them a copy of the bill. I urge the members of the association and the Guam association of the Deaf that they are welcome to come to write testimony in my office. For those that are viewing this, the fax number is 472-5022 or you can drop your written testimonies in your mail room or my email address.

Senator Telo Taitague thanked June for coming to the hearing and for providing sign language interpretation because it was a last minute thing. She also stated that this is a beginning of many other issues that we are going to try to address for the hearing impaired and I encourage you to text, sign and write to your senators to support these three bills. I also thank Chairman Palacios who saw the need and urgency to see your needs.

Chairman Palacios concluded the hearing and requested that written testimony be submitted within the next ten (10) days. He adjourned the hearing at 10:20am.

III. WRITTEN TESTIMONIES

1. Mr. Paul R. Suba, Chief of the Guam Police Department, Written Testimony received via hand delivery on December 21, 2009. Chief Suba states that “our Emergency 911 Communications Specialist, Mr. Brad Hokanson, will provide oral testimony for this bill.”

2. Mr. Christopher A. Pangelinan, President, Guam Association of the Deaf, in Support, Written Testimony received via hand delivery on January 29, 2010. I am here to speak out on behalf of all the Deaf Community. For a very long time, we have had to struggle with our life and limitations of services provided by the Government. With regards to Bill 281, we have about 100 deaf people living on Guam. Emergency services are very difficult to get to help the Deaf community who do not know how to communicate with someone on the phone or special telephone device. It is very important for us to have a communication system through texting on cell phones or through 911 emergency services. With regards to Bill 282, it is very important for us because it will be someone who will recognize a person with disabilities by using a small symbol or sticker on a driver’s license. 3. Mrs. Rosanne S. Ada, Director, Department of Integrated Services for Individuals with Disabilities (DISID), Written Testimony received on February 5, 2010. Mrs. Ada’s written testimony is on all three bills, Bills Nos. 281-30, 282-30, and 293-30. In part, regarding Bill No. 281-30, she states that “is it necessary to create a bill (Bill 281-30) to reiterate what is already mandated in the Americans with Disabilities Act? Is it necessary to pass a law to add new items to the Guam Code Annotated to guarantee compliance with the ADA? The ADA also requires that agencies cannot charge the person for the communication aids or services provided. She questioned, was section 3 of the bill written to specifically prohibit GFD from charging the telecommunications companies and/or their customers? *(Please see written testimony attached.)*

4. Mr. Manuel Q. Cruz, Executive Director, Guam Developmental Disabilities Council, written testimony received on February 5, 2010. Mr. Cruz's written testimony is on all three bills, Bills Nos. 281-30, 282-30 and 293-30. In regards to Bill No. 281-30 (LS), Mr. Cruz stated that the provisions of the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) apply. Title II of the ADA prohibits discrimination against qualified individuals with disabilities in all programs, activities, and services of public entities. It applies to all state and local governments, their departments and agencies, and any other instrumentalities or special purpose districts of states and local governments.

The ADA also provides that state and local agencies that provide emergency telephone services must provide "direct access" to individuals who rely on a TDD or computer modem for telephone communication. Telephone access through a third party or through a relay service does not satisfy the requirement for direct access.

IV. FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

The Committee on Public Safety, Law Enforcement, & Senior Citizens finds that Bill 281-30 (COR) intends to require the Guam Fire Department's Emergency 911 Telephone Communications System to be accessible to individuals with hearing and speech disabilities, and the means for such accessibility shall be limited to mobile and landline telephones. The bill also intends to prohibit charging additional fees to telecommunications companies and/or their customers for the cost of providing such accessibility. The effective date for such requirements shall be one (1) year from the date of its enactment.

On February 5, 2010 a mark up meeting occurred regarding Bill 281-30, 282-30, and 293-30 with the Guam Police Department, the Guam Fire Department, the Guam Developmental Disabilities Council, the Department of Revenue & Taxation, the Division of Motor Vehicle, the Attorney General's Office, and the Department of Integrated Services for Individuals with Disabilities (DISID).

Based on the recommendations, the costs associated with 911 is ambiguous because in the current law, this 911 money has been touched and not been used for 911 purposes. The costs to maintain the 911 system is roughly at \$500,000. The 911 equipment we have now accepts only one telecommunications carrier. GFD cannot force the carriers on Guam to become phase 1 and 2 compliant. Once GFD has the equipment, then there are the possibilities of doing a gradual phase into the 911 system. All these issues will be addressed once the 911 system is upgraded which will include texting and the TDD systems. The issue we face today is obtaining a number with a prefix with 911 and to work with cell phone carriers to get a number. The upgrade of the 911 system is \$1.2 million and must be ADA compliant. The Chairman of the Committee on Public Safety, Law Enforcement, and Senior citizens mentioned that appropriation could be made for this service because it stands as a liability on the part of the Government of Guam.

The absolute need to upgrade the system will be found through grants. The Chairman called for another markup meeting with GFD and GPD to discuss the 911 system upgrade.

On February 16, 2010 at 1:30pm in the Chairman's office, GFD and GPD met for the second mark up meeting. An agreement was made to work towards creating another bill that would appropriately address the needs of 911. Major discussion revolved around creating a separate and independent 911 headquarters that would not have agencies in conflict. GFD and GPD will be working closely with the author of Bill 281 to propose legislation for the upgrade and housing of the 911 system. Constituents at the public hearing are aware of the ADA rule but would like our local laws to reflect the Federal mandate. A consensus was made that until the 911 system upgrade is in place, local laws must reflect the ADA Federal mandate. No substitute language was proposed.

The Committee on Public Safety, Law Enforcement, & Senior Citizens hereby reports out **Bill No. 281-30 (LS) as introduced** with the recommendation **TO PASS**.

Ladies and Gentlemen, family, friends and entire Deaf community. My name is Christopher Pangelinan, Guam Association of the Deaf, President. I am here to speak out on behalf for all Deaf Community about bills. A long time, we had been struggle with our life on limit to receive a service from Government. In fact, it is not only one to receive a service but ultimate important to have secure as safe for our life here on Guam.

Bills No. 281 Chapter 84 of 10GCA relative to the rights of individuals with hearing and speech disabilities to emergency 911 services.

In the past, can you picture someone who is deaf person without 911 emergency have no way to access to emergency service. There is about less 100 deaf people who are living on Guam. Include they have Deaf families. That's how lives are at risk every day. Emergency 911 is very difficult to get a service for Deaf people, who doesn't know how to communicate with someone on the phone or special telephone device (Telephone Device for the Deaf). Allow me to show you what is TDD look like. This TDD, we don't use it at all because of technology modem has changed. Entire Deaf community are using Phone Cell to text as of today. Good afternoon, Mr. Chairman and Members of the Committee:

My name is Manuel Q. Cruz. I am the Executive Director of the Guam Developmental Disabilities Council. I come before you to testify in support of **Bill No. 281-30**, which focuses on making sure that the Emergency 911 services are accessible to individuals with hearing and speech disabilities; **Bill No. 282-30**, which would require that the notation "HSD" be printed on the drivers' licenses issued by the Department of Revenue and Taxation to individuals with hearing and speech disabilities; and **Bill No. 293-30**, which seeks to make sure that the Department of Revenue and Taxation issues license plates and/or placards to vehicles owned or operated by individuals with hearing and speech disabilities, but with some reservations/qualifications.

On Friday, January 29, 2010, I had previously appeared before your Committee to verbally testify in support of the three (3) bills. Since I did not fully review and consider the contents and provisions of the bills at the time, I had assured the Committee that I will submit a more formal, written testimony at a later date.

In the meantime, I received a letter from your Committee later on the same day to request and urge my attendance and contribution to the mark-up meeting on these bills today.

Before I present my testimony on each of the three (3) bills, please allow me to give you a brief history and description of the Guam Developmental Disabilities Council (GDDC). As you know, the GDDC is often confused with other GovGuam agencies, such as the Department of Integrated Services for Individuals with Disabilities (DISID) and the Department of Mental Health and Substance Abuse (DMHSA).

The GDDC is a federally-funded GovGuam agency that was established as an independent government entity by Governor Joseph Ada in 1994 when he issued Executive Order No. 94-09, to comply with the provisions of the Developmental Disabilities Assistance and Bill of Rights Act at the time. It is responsible for advocacy, capacity building, and systemic change activities for individuals with developmental disabilities and their families. It serves as an advocate for individuals with developmental disabilities and conduct or support programs, projects, and activities that enhance the quality of life for individuals with developmental disabilities and their families. It is committed to the development of a consumer and family-centered, consumer and family-directed comprehensive system and a coordinated array of

culturally competent individualized supports and services. This system is designed to promote self-determination, independence, productivity, integration, and inclusion in all facets of community life for individuals with developmental disabilities. Please note that the GDDC is not a service provider.

The GDDC is composed of 28 members, consisting of individuals with developmental disabilities, family members of individuals with developmental disabilities, and representatives of GovGuam agencies and non-profits that provide services to individuals with developmental disabilities and their families. All Council members are appointed by the Governor. The Council has the responsibility to assure that individuals with developmental disabilities and their families participate in the design of and access to needed community services, individualized supports, and other forms of assistance. The Council identifies the needs of individuals with developmental disabilities and their families by soliciting public input and develops and implements a state plan to promote positive, systemic change to address those needs.

With this short background, I am now prepared to comment on the three (3) bills for your consideration:

Bill No. 281-30, relative to the rights of individuals with hearing and speech disabilities to Emergency 911 services.

The bill is proposing to add a new item (f) to Section 84121 of Chapter 84 of 10 GCA, relative to the *Guam Emergency 911 Telephone Communications System*. Section 84121 provides for the designation of the Guam Fire Department as the lead agency with the authority and responsibility to administer and operate the emergency 911 telephone communication system.

As a public entity within the Government of Guam, the provisions of the **Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA)** apply. Title II of the ADA prohibits discrimination against qualified individuals with disabilities in all programs, activities, and services of public entities. It applies to all State and local governments, their departments and agencies, and any other instrumentalities or special purpose districts of States and local governments.

The ADA also provides that State and local agencies that provide emergency telephone services must provide "direct access" to individuals who rely on a TDD or computer modem for telephone communication. Telephone access through a third party or through a relay service does not satisfy the requirement for direct access. Where a public entity provides 911 telephone service, it may not substitute a separate seven-digit telephone line as the sole means for access to 911 services by non-voice users. A public entity may, however, provide a separate seven-digit line for the exclusive use of non-voice callers in addition to providing direct access for such calls to its 911 line.

Please note that the ADA requires the establishment of telephone relay services for individuals who use telecommunication devices for deaf persons (TDD's) or similar devices. The Federal Communications Commission (FCC) has issued regulations specifying standards for the operation of these services.

Based on the requirements of the ADA, subparagraphs (1) and (2) of the bill may need to be reviewed for compliance. Subparagraph (3) also needs to be reviewed further for applicability.

Bill No. 282-30, relative to drivers' licenses issued to individuals with hearing and speech disabilities.

The bill is proposing to add a new Section 3117 to Chapter 1 of 16 GCA. We support the intent and purpose of the bill to make sure that individuals who are deaf, hearing impaired or speech-impaired, and can operate a motor vehicle safely, can obtain a driver's license. Having the notation "HSD" placed on the person's driver's license is a good idea to make parking a vehicle easier for individuals with disabilities and to enable them to have more ready access to their destination.

Bill No. 293-30, relative to vehicles owned or operated by individuals with hearing and speech disabilities.

The bill is proposing to add a new Section 7177 to Chapter 7 of 16 GCA. It is not clear why the Department of Revenue and Taxation did not include individuals with speech and/or hearing disabilities in the special issuance of license plates or decalcomania and/or placards. We support the bill.

This concludes my testimony.

On behalf of all the individuals with developmental disabilities on Guam, I want to thank you, Mr. Chairman and Members of the Committee, for giving me the opportunity to testify today.



Dear Senator Palacios:

Thank you for the invitation to comment on Bills 281-30, 282-30, and 293-30 addressing the needs and concerns of individuals with hearing and speech disabilities with regard to calling "911," notation of the driver's license, and notation of vehicle license plates.

One thought I had as I read the bills was, "Is it necessary to create a bill to reiterate what is already mandated in the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA)?" For instance Bill 281-30, Section 1 (f) (1) states that the Guam Fire Department's (GFD) Emergency 911 Telephone Communications System shall be accessible to individuals with hearing and speech disabilities. Is it necessary to pass a law to add new items to the Guam Code Annotated to guarantee compliance with the ADA? The ADA also requires that agencies cannot charge the person for the communication aids or services provided. Was section (3) of the bill written to specifically prohibit GFD from charging the telecommunications companies and/or their customers?

In regard to Bill 282-30, I feel that the word "may" in Section 1 (b) should be "shall," requiring residents of Guam who are deaf, hearing-impaired or speech-impaired to have the notation placed on their driver's license, much like those with other restrictions who are required to indicate their restrictive code on their license. The responsibility should fall on the licensee to self-identify and present certain medical proof as indicated in the bill when applying for or renewing his/her driver's license. However, I recommend that HSD not be used; but instead, like the other restrictions, use a number. This way, not every sales person, bank teller or prospective employer who needs to see a driver's license will know that the individual has a disability. This could cause the individual to be discriminated against and opens opportunities for the individual to be taken advantage of. On the other hand, when safety officers ask to see the individual's license, they should be aware that the restrictive number indicates a hearing and/or speech disability.



At the same time that we require deaf, hearing-impaired or speech-impaired drivers to identify themselves on their license, Guam Safety Officers should be provided the opportunity to take sign language training and be aware of the attached practical suggestions for communicating effectively with persons who are deaf or hard of hearing developed by the U.S. Department of Justice for law enforcement personnel. The suggestions can be found at <http://www.ada.gov/lawenfcomm.pdf>.

I am not in support of Bill 293-30, which requires license plates or decalcomania and/or placards to be issued to individuals with speech and/or hearing disabilities. This identification of persons with disabilities may assist traffic enforcement officers, but it also declares to everyone else that this individual has a disability. This could make them easy prey for criminals and subject to harassment.


My question is what is the purpose to identify individuals with speech and/or hearing disabilities to traffic enforcement officers? Most officers motion motorists with hand signals. Should an officer be close enough to communicate with the individual, the individual could show the officer his/her driver's license, which would have the required restrictive code on it should you follow my recommendation for Bill 282-30. The only time I could think of that identification of an individual with a speech and/or hearing disability may be helpful, is if an ambulance is behind the vehicle and the vehicle is not pulling off the road. Even then, the identification of the vehicle as that being driven by an individual with a speech and/or hearing disability will not rectify the problem, it only helps the ambulance driver understand why the vehicle is not yielding. In this case, should an officer pull the individual over for failing to yield to the ambulance, the driver can then show the officer his/her license with the restrictive code.

Many persons with disabilities do not want to be labeled as such. Just like everyone else, they do not want to have attention called to them before they even commit a violation.

Again, basic sign language training should be offered to safety officers in addition to ensuring that they are aware of the attached practical suggestions for communicating effectively with persons who are deaf or hard of hearing.

Your agency has adopted a specific policy regarding communicating with people who are deaf or hard of hearing. It is important to become familiar with this policy.

Requirements for Effective Communication

The ADA requires that . . .

- Law enforcement agencies must provide the communication aids and services needed to communicate effectively with people who are deaf or hard of hearing, except when a particular aid or service would result in an undue burden or a fundamental change in the nature of the law enforcement services being provided.
- Agencies must give primary consideration to providing the aid or service requested by the person with the hearing disability.
- Agencies cannot charge the person for the communication aids or services provided.
- Agencies do *not* have to provide personally prescribed devices such as hearing aids.
- When interpreters are needed, agencies must provide interpreters who can interpret effectively, accurately, and impartially.
- Only the head of the agency or his or her designee can make the determination that a particular aid or service would cause an undue burden or a fundamental change in the nature of the law enforcement services being provided.

Your agency's policy explains how to obtain interpreters or other communication aids and services when needed.

Communicating with People Who are Deaf or Hard of Hearing

Officers may find a variety of communication aids and services useful in different situations.

- Speech supplemented by gestures and visual aids can be used in some cases.
- A pad and pencil, a word processor, or a typewriter can be used to exchange written notes.
- A teletypewriter (TTY, also known as a TDD) can be used to exchange written messages over the telephone.
- An assistive listening system or device to amplify sound can be used when speaking with a person who is hard of hearing.
- A sign language interpreter can be used when speaking with a person who knows sign language.
- An oral interpreter can be used when speaking with a person who has been trained to speech read (read lips).
Note: Do *not* assume that speech reading will be effective in most situations. On average, only about one third of spoken words can be understood by speech reading.
- The type of situation, as well as the individual's abilities, will determine which aid or service is needed to communicate effectively.

Practical Suggestions for Communicating Effectively

- Before speaking, get the person's attention with a wave of the hand or a gentle tap on the shoulder.
- Face the person and do not turn away while speaking.
- Try to converse in a well-lit area.
- Do not cover your mouth or chew gum.
- If a person is wearing a hearing aid, do not assume the individual can hear you.
- Minimize background noise and other distractions whenever possible.
- When you are communicating orally, speak slowly and distinctly. Use gestures and facial expressions to reinforce what you are saying.
- Use visual aids when possible, such as pointing to printed information on a citation or other document.
- Remember that only about one third of spoken words can be understood by speech reading.
- When communicating by writing notes, keep in mind that some individuals who use sign language may lack good English reading and writing skills.
- If someone with a hearing disability cannot understand you, write a note to ask him or her what communication aid or service is needed.
- If a sign language interpreter is requested, be sure to ask which language the person uses. American Sign Language (ASL) and Signed English are the most common.
- When you are interviewing a witness or a suspect or engaging in any complex conversation with a person whose primary language is sign language, a qualified interpreter is usually needed to ensure effective communication.
- When using an interpreter, look at and speak directly to the deaf person, not to the interpreter.
- Talk at your normal rate, or slightly slower if you normally speak very fast.
- Only one person should speak at a time.
- Use short sentences and simple words.
- Do not use family members or children as interpreters. They may lack the vocabulary or the impartiality needed to interpret effectively.

What Situations Require an Interpreter?

Generally, interpreter services are not required for simple transactions – such as checking a license or giving directions to a location – or for urgent situations – such as responding to a violent crime in progress.

Example: An officer clocks a car on the highway going 15 miles per hour above the speed limit. The driver, who is deaf, is pulled over and is issued a noncriminal citation. The individual is able to understand the reason for the citation because the officer points out relevant information printed on the citation or written by the officer.

Example: An officer responds to an aggravated battery call and upon arriving at the scene observes a bleeding victim and an individual holding a weapon. Eyewitnesses observed the individual strike the victim. The individual with the weapon is deaf. Because the officer has probable cause to make a felony arrest without an interrogation, an interpreter is not necessary to carry out the arrest.

However, an interpreter may be needed in lengthy or complex transactions – such as interviewing a victim, witness, suspect, or arrestee – if the person being interviewed normally relies on sign language or speech reading to understand what others are saying.

Example: An officer responds to the scene of a domestic disturbance. The husband says the wife has been

beating their children and he has been trying to restrain her. The wife is deaf. The officer begins questioning her by writing notes, but her response indicates a lack of comprehension. She requests a sign language interpreter. In this situation an interpreter should be called. If the woman's behavior is threatening, the officer can make an arrest and call for an interpreter to be available later at the booking station.

It is inappropriate to ask a family member or companion to interpret in a situation like this because emotional ties may interfere with the ability to interpret impartially.

Example: An officer responds to the scene of a car accident where a man has been seriously injured. The man is conscious, but is unable to comprehend the officer's questions because he is deaf. A family member who is present begins interpreting what the officer is saying.

A family member or companion *may* be used to interpret in a case like this, where the parties are willing, the need for information is urgent, and the questions are basic and uncomplicated. However, in general, do not expect or demand that a deaf person provide his or her own interpreter. As a rule, when interpreter services is needed, it must be provided by the agency.



Communicating with People Who Are Deaf or Hard of Hearing

ADA Guide for Law Enforcement Officers

As a law enforcement officer, you can expect to come into contact with people who are deaf or hard of hearing. It is estimated that up to nine percent of the population has some degree of hearing loss, and this percentage will increase as the population ages.



A driver who is deaf writes on a pad of paper to communicate with an officer.

Under the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA), people who are deaf or hard of hearing are entitled to the same services law enforcement provides to anyone else. They may not be excluded or segregated from services, be denied services, or otherwise be treated differently than other people. Law enforcement agencies must make efforts to ensure that their personnel communicate effectively with people whose disability affects hearing. This applies to both sworn and civilian personnel.





1 **BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF GUAM:**

2 **Section 1.** A new item (f) is *added* to §84121 of Chapter 84 of 10GCA to read as

5 “(f) *Access For Individuals With Hearing And Speech Disabilities.* (1) The Guam Fire
6 Department’s *Emergency 911 Telephone Communications System* shall be accessible to
7 individuals with hearing and speech disabilities.

8 (2) The means for such accessibility shall be limited to mobile and landline telephones.
9 Nothing herein shall be construed as to limit the Guam Fire Department from providing
10 access to the *Emergency 911 Telephone Communications System* through other modes
11 of communication.

12 (3) The Guam Fire Department is prohibited from charging additional fees to
13 telecommunications companies and/or their customers for the cost of providing such
14 accessibility. Any costs associated with the implementation of the mandates of this
15 paragraph shall be funding through existing surcharges.”

1 **Section 2. Effective Date.** The provisions of this act shall be effective one (1)
2 year from the date of enactment.
