AN ACT TO APPROPRIATE TWENTY-FIVE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$25,000) FROM THE GENERAL FUND TO ALLOW THE GOVERNMENT OF GUAM TO PAY FOR AN INVERSE CONDEMNATION SETTLEMENT PURSUANT TO SUPERIOR COURT OF GUAM CIVIL CASE NO. CV1158-12.

1 **BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF GUAM:**

2 **Section 1. Legislative Finding and Intent.** *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* finds
3 that for over three (3) decades, Vincent C. Castro and Menilia C. Castro
4 (collectively known as the Castros) have been waiting to be compensated for
5 property the government of Guam took in January 29, 1979, and used it to
6 construct a public road. The Castros' property is described as Lot No. 3340-2-2

1 (now known as Lot No. 3340-2-R1), which is 166 ±sq. m., as shown in Exhibit A,
2 and it was used to widen *Chelenko* Road in the municipality of *Sinajana*, and is
3 located in the village of *Ordot*.

4 *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* further finds that there were landowners whose
5 properties were taken through court action to construct *Chelenko* Road, and who
6 were paid for their properties. The government *did not* take the Castros' property
7 in the same or any subsequent court action, yet their property was made part of
8 *Chelenko* Road, and the Castros were never paid for their property. The 1979
9 Declaration of Taking omitted the Castro property. On October 8, 2012, the
10 Castros filed an inverse condemnation complaint against the government of Guam
11 for the unlawful taking of their property.

12 *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* further finds that the Office of the Attorney General
13 has worked with the Castros and their attorney to resolve this long-standing land
14 taking, and have agreed to settle in the amount of Twenty-Five Thousand Dollars
15 (\$25,000).

16 Therefore, *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* intends to appropriate the agreed
17 settlement amount to the Castros, and to comply with the Superior Court Case No.
18 CV1158-12.

19 **Section 2. Authorization to Appropriate.** *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* hereby
20 appropriates the amount of Twenty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000) from the
21 General Fund to the plaintiffs, Vicente C. Castro and Menilia C. Castro, aka Millie
22 D.C. Castro, in the Superior Court Case No. CV1158-12, to provide just
23 compensation and to finally remove the liability that exists within the government
24 of Guam. The Attorney General *shall* settle the case and execute all documents
25 required to ensure the government will not be liable for any additional payments,
26 and secure title to the property. The Castro plaintiffs *shall* be paid in full pursuant
27 to the settlement within ninety (90) days of this Act; and any unpaid settlement

1 amount *shall* accrue interest at the rate of 6.5 % until paid, and said interest
2 amounts are hereby appropriated on a continuing basis.

3 **Section 3. Severability.** If any provision of this Act or its application to
4 any person or circumstance is held invalid, the invalidity *shall not* affect other
5 provisions or applications of this Act which can be given effect without the invalid
6 provision or application and to this end the provisions of this Act is severable.

II. COMMITTEE PROCEEDINGS

Chairman Pangelinan: The next bill is on agenda is Bill No. 248, introduced by myself to appropriate Twenty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000) from the General Fund to allow the Government of Guam to pay for an Inverse Condemnation Settlement pursuant to Superior Court of Guam Civil Case No. CV1158-12.

I have signed up to testify Ms. Kathy Fokas, Assistant Attorney General and Ms. Georgette Bello Concepcion. Mr. Joshua Tenorio has submitted written testimony and Mr. Castro. Welcome.

We will begin with the Attorney General's Office and then proceed with Mr. Castro and his representative.

Testimonies

Ms. Kathy Fokas: Good Morning Senators. My name is Kat Fokas, Assistant Attorney General with the Civil Department at the AG's office. I have been with the office for four years, but this is my first time before you. It is my pleasure.

We have requested of the Appropriations Committee on behalf of DPW an appropriation for \$25,000 to settle a 34-year old inverse condemnation case, which is currently scheduled for trial for February 12, 2014. We have a statute on Guam that requires an appropriation by the Legislature before the AG and certain line agencies can enter a settlement on a case. This is one of those kind of cases. It's an inverse condemnation case. By the way, the statute that requires the appropriation is 1 Guam Code Annotated, Section 18201.

This is an inverse condemnation case, which requires an appropriation. Many of you are aware of eminent domain or condemnation cases, which is when the government goes in and takes someone's land and is required under both the Organic Act and the United States Constitution to pay just compensation.

This case is a little different. This is when the property owner comes forward and says, government you took my land and you haven't paid me. So, they are the plaintiffs in this case. These property owners have been patiently waiting for over 34 years for some action by the government. Normally, a case this old would be barred by the statute of limitations. But we have a very special inverse condemnation statute on Guam, which tolls the statute of limitations; means it stops it and it allows this case to come forward. That statute by the way is 7 Guam Code Annotated, 11311.1. After these property owners went through the administrative level and eventually filed a complaint in the Superior Court, we met with them and we agreed that liability exists. Many years ago when the government took some land and I will allow the property owner to describe exactly where that land is, we took all the neighboring lands and paid the neighbors and although we took Mr. Castro's land we never named him on the condemnation complaint.

Since we've established that liability exists, the next step is to determine what is just compensation. How much should the government pay the Castros? We've evaluated the exposure for the government should this case proceed to trial and under the law, the Castros are

entitled to the fair market value of the little piece taken and because this is what's called partial take, they are also entitled to any damages to the remainders. So, we have gone through all those numbers, we looked at the amount that the people were paid 34 years ago because that's the value that applies; the value at the time of the taking. If we were to proceed to trial in addition to just compensation obviously the government would have its own expert witness fees, we would have to hire an appraiser, we would have to pay for an expert report and that special statute that I referred to earlier also would require that government to pay the property owners 6% interest from the date of take in 1979 to the date the judgment is paid, which is 34 years of interest at 6% per annum calculated in simple interest terms.

That special statute would also require the government of Guam to pay the property owner's attorney fees. So, as you can see if we proceed to trial, the government's exposure in this case gets higher and higher. Therefore, we worked with the property owners to avoid protracted litigation and have agreed on a settlement amount of \$25,000 as just compensation. That amount would include the 6% interest for all those years. It would also include the property owner's attorney's fees.

Very importantly, the Director of DPW the taking authority has agreed to the settlement amount and they submitted a letter, which we provided to the Appropriations Committee stating that they agree on the settlement amount, however they do not have the funding available, which is why we have come to you today. We are in full support of this and ask that the bill be passed and I thank you for your time, Senators.

Chairman Pangelinan: Thank you very much, Kat. Ms. Georgette Bello Concepcion.

Ms. Georgette Bello Concepcion: My name is Georgette Bello Concepcion. I am in private practice and I represent the landowners, Mr. and Mrs. Vicente Castro. With me today is my client, Mr. Castro and we are here to testify in favor of the bill and we thank Senator Pangelinan for working with my office and the AG's office for getting it before this body.

I wanted Mr. Castro to come today so that you have a face to the name on the bill. Mr. Castro and his wife are an elderly couple and they have been seeking recourse for what's called this inverse condemnation for more than 30 years. They came to me in early 2012 and I wasn't sure so I did my research and talking with him and making sure there is no statute of limitations as Ms. Fokas had said and surprisingly there was no statute of limitations for anything taken before 1994, I believe. So, we filed under the Government Claims Act and the government has 6 months to act on that and as expected the Attorney General's Office did nothing. Then after the 6 months had lapsed, we filed a complaint in the Superior Court of Guam. But we have been able to work with the AG's office in agreeing that yes, there is a taking and the only question under the law is what is the value of that taking.

Ms. Fokas has done an excellent job in explaining how we arrived at the number. My client is willing to do that. Unfortunately, it took this long for Mr. Castro to hire an attorney to get to where it is today. Now, we are almost to the end and so we ask that you support the bill so Mr. Castro and his wife can receive the compensation – not that they are asking for it, but they are entitled to under Guam law. Thank you.

Chairman Pangelinan: Thank you very much, Ms. Bello Concepcion. Mr. Castro I want to apologize on behalf of this government for not responding to your case. I know we've been working on your case to try and resolve this matter. We worked with the Attorney General's Office; we had a couple of meetings prior to you filing the case. My understanding was that we were going to proceed with the payment of it. We had DPW there, we had the Attorney General there, we dug up the old records, and we verified the fact that your property was in fact taken without being part of the condemnation process. We thought originally it was part of the condemnation process, additional records revealed it was not and the government just took it. DPW assured us that they were going to be able to find the money to make the payment to settle it. The Attorney General was going to do so and it just kept rolling and rolling.

I know you went to the Congresswoman Office's as well trying to get some action.

Mr. Vicente Castro: Even went to the Lt. Governor.

Chairman Pangelinan: What we have today is we will put this kind of mistreatment of its citizens by this government, by the entire system not any one individual. Nobody said, let's not pay Mr. Castro. The entire system just wasn't able to come together to resolve your problem for the last 34 years. We attempted to do so. We worked with it, unfortunately we weren't able to conclude that administrative process. You have in fact exhausted all administrative processes and you have to be exhausted and frustrated – 34 years of taking a look at the property and knowing everyone else got paid but you. Yet, you don't have use of your property.

With Kat bringing the attention to our office and Georgette acting on your behalf pushed the issue forward with regards to the legal process. I think this will finally allow us to close this chapter. It's not about the amount; it's not a huge amount of money considering what we have done to you. But, I want to thank you for working with this government to come to, what I agree would be a fair end to this chapter. I certainly will ask all my colleagues for their support on this.

Mr. Vicente Castro: You see the problem here is that when they did that (land take) in 1979, they identified my lot property, both lots but they didn't put our name. Another problem is when I tried to apply for a sewer connection, an inspector came from GWA (was PUAG), so the problem is that I guess the reason the government took that piece of land is because the sewer is on private property. They even told me that you can connect your sewer line free; you don't have to apply because they came into your property. I guess that's the reason why it happened. It just took me 30-some years to solve it. My only hope and my only best weapon is to hire her (Atty Bello Concepcion) and I know I will get paid. Thank you.

Chairman Pangelinan: Thank you and I am sure she appreciates that. I think you made the right decision. She has been very cooperative on your behalf and a good advocate for you.

Ms. Georgette Bello Concepcion: For the record, I have not been paid, yet. Mr. Castro is an elderly man and being Chamorro --- at first I wasn't sure and actually Public Works or the AG's office, I forget who initially said there was no taking. So, Mr. Castro felt like he was going crazy. After more meetings with Ms. Fokas and someone else from your office we got to the point

where we said, ok there is no taking but at that point we had no choice because we already filed a lawsuit. We just want him to be justly compensated as required by the law. Nothing more, nothing less.

Chairman Pangelinan: Thank you very much.

Speaker Judith Won Pat: On behalf of the Guam Legislature and the entire government, we want to apologize to you, Mr. Castro and your wife. I am happy that this final settlement – you and your wife are still able to realize this and it's not after the fact. It pains us to hear that this is actually happening with our own people when we, as a government and a legislature have always gone to the federal government to do the exact same thing – to ask for just compensation for our lands taken. I am glad that the government is setting such an example to be better and correct the wrongs that we've done. So, I thank you, your wife and your family for your perseverance and I happy that the legislature apologized to you, as well. We wish you the best and thank you to the Attorney General. I loved your explanation. When I read the bill, I didn't understand it, but when you walked us through - I thank you for working closely with the attorney and the families to bring justice to Mr. and Mrs. Castro. Thank you very much, Mr. Chairman.

Chairman Pangelinan: Thank you very much, Speaker Won Pat.

Senator Aline Yamashita: Thank you, Mr. Chair. Thank you for showing us that the system can work and for helping us understand. For everybody to come together and the courage, Mr. Castro for you and your family for reaching out and making sure that things happen and for approaching Speaker Ben and saying, we need help in doing this. Sometimes it's easier to give up and say, never mind. You are teaching us that it might have taken 34 years but it can work. We appreciate that very much and I do apologize. We shouldn't have had to do like this. But, it is going to work out, so thank you.

Senator Frank Aguon: I think, Mr. Castro you have really stepped forward in trying to address this particular situation. I commend you for doing that. I know that Speaker Pangelinan on land issues for a number of terms now and this has always been an issue that has been discussed regularly is how do we get either private property owners or the government of Guam to step in and identify properties that have not been properly condemned but have been used by the government for public benefit. By virtue of you stepping forward and recognizing that and pursuing this and seeking the assistance of Georgette and the Attorney General's Office is commendable on your part and I recognize that. I just hope that this will serve as an impetus for other private property owners who have recognized that the government has taken their property for public benefit and it's either the government return those properties, if it's not being utilized or ultimately compensate the family owners because this is 30 years too late in terms of properly compensating you and your family. I thank you for your patience and I thank you for allowing the government to use your property for the last 30 years without proper compensation. Hopefully by passage of this legislation, we will be able to close the book on your property. I commend you and thank you for stepping forward. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Chairman Pangelinan: Thank you and Si Yu'os Ma'ase, Senators. To the Attorney General's Office, thank you for very much for your presence this morning. To Georgette Bello Concepcion and of course Mr. Castro, Si Yu'os Ma'ase.

Thank you very much for your testimony. This concludes the testimony on Bill No. 248. There being no additional individuals to present any additional testimony, this Committee will continue to remain open for the acceptance of any additional information or public testimony on the bill discussed. 1 **Section 1. Legislative Finding and Intent.** *I Liheslaturan Guahan* finds
2 that for over three decades, Vincent C. Castro and Menilia C. Castro (collectively
3 known as the Castros) have been waiting to be compensated for property the
4 government of Guam took in January 29, 1979 and used it to construct a public
5 road. The Castros property is described as Lot No. 3340-2-2 (now known as Lot
6 No. 3340-2-R1), 166 sq. m. ± as shown in Exhibit A and was used to widen
7 Chelenko Road in the municipality of Sinajana, located in the village of Ordot.
8 *I Liheslaturan Guahan* further finds that there were landowners whose

10 for their property. The government did not take the Castro's property in the same
11 or any subsequent court action, yet their property was made part of Chelenko road
12 and the Castros were never paid for the property. The 1979 Declaration of Taking
13 omitted the Castro property. On October 8, 2012, the Castros filed an inverse
14 condemnation complaint against the government of Guam for the unlawful taking
15 of their property.



1 *I Liheslaturan Guahan* further finds that the Office of the Attorney General
2 has worked with the Castros and their attorney to resolve this long standing land
3 taking and have agreed to settle in the amount of Twenty-Five Thousand Dollars
4 (\$25,000).

5 Therefore, *I Liheslaturan Guahan* intends to appropriate the agreed
6 settlement amount to the Castros and to comply with the Superior Court Case No.
7 CV1158-12.

8 **Section 2. Authorization to Appropriate.** *I Liheslaturan Guahan* hereby
9 appropriates the amount of Twenty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000) from the



JURISDICTIONAL FACTS

The Court has jurisdiction over this matter pursuant to 7 GCA §§ 3105 and

11311.1.

1. Plaintiffs, Vicente C. Castro and Menilia S. Castro aka Millie C. Castro
(hereinafter collectively as "Plaintiffs") are residents of Guam and are the owners of Lot
No. 3340-2-2 (now Lot No. 3340-2-R1) and Lot No. 3340-2-3 (now Lot No. 3340-2-3-
R1), in the municipality of Sinajana, Guam.

2. The Department of Public Works is an agency of Defendant Government
of Guam.

1 3. Defendant Government of Guam (hereinafter "Defendant") has been
2 vested with the power of eminent domain pursuant to the Organic Act of Guam.

3 4. Plaintiffs filed a claim for unlawful taking pursuant to the Government
4 Claims Act (P.L. 17-29) on March 29, 2012 which was denied as more than six months
5 have passed without disposition of Plaintiffs' claim by Defendant.

6 5. Plaintiffs' claim for unlawful taking is not time barred pursuant to 7 GCA

9 **CLAIM FOR UNLAWFUL TAKING**

10 6. On or about December 21, 1977, Plaintiffs executed a Right of Entry
11 Agreement" (hereinafter "Agreement") wherein they grant Defendant Government of
12 Guam, Department of Public Works permission to enter upon said lot "to construct and
13 maintain The Chelenko Road."

14 7. The Government required Plaintiffs' permission to enter their property to
15 survey the property as to the location of the proposed road.

16 8. Pursuant to the Agreement "it was understood and agreed that the
17 owner(s) will receive compensation for the said land upon completion of an appraisal the
18 Government will cause to be made which would estimate the fair market value of the

20 6. In 2009, Plaintiffs engaged the services of an appraiser as to Lot No.
21 3340-2-2 (now Lot No. 3340-2-R1) and it was not until then did Plaintiffs learn the
22 government had taken a portion of their property without being compensated accordingly.

24 7. The area of Lot No. 3340-2-2 (now Lot No. 3340-2-R1) was reduced from

1,015 square meters to 589 square meters.

8. Plaintiffs also learned that their adjacent property, Lot No. 3340-2-3 (now Lot No. 3340-2-3-R1), had also been reduced in size.

9. The area of Lot No. 3340-2-3 (now Lot No. 3340-2-3-R1) was reduced from 929 square meters to 763 square meters.

10. Defendant did not obtain a Right of Entry Agreement from Plaintiffs in 1977 as to Lot No. 3340-2-3 (now Lot No. 3340-2-3-R1) as Defendant had done with regard to Lot No. 3340-2-2 (now Lot No. 3340-2-R1).

11. Plaintiffs have paid property taxes on these properties based on the original sizes of the lots.

12. Plaintiffs have been denied the use and enjoyment of their property as their property continues to be used as public easement.

13. Since the date of entry onto Plaintiffs' land and continuing to the date of the filing of this action Defendant, Plaintiffs have not been justly compensated for the unlawful taking of their property by Defendants nor has Defendant made any offers of compensation.

14. Further, to date, Defendant has failed to institute eminent domain proceedings so that damage to Plaintiffs' property could be assessed.


15. Defendant's actions have resulted in the taking of Plaintiffs' private property for public use since 1977 for public use pursuant to Defendant's right of eminent domain.

WHEREFORE, Plaintiffs respectfully request:

1. Judgment against Defendant for damages in an amount to be proven at trial;



10. Plaintiff's claims are barred, in whole or in part, by plaintiff's failure to comply with the Government Claims Act;
11. Plaintiff's request for attorneys' fees fails to state an actionable claim, as there is no statutory or contractual basis for any such award;
12. Plaintiff's claims are barred, in whole or in part, by the doctrine of payment;
13. Plaintiff's claims are barred, in whole or in part, by the doctrine of release; and
14. Plaintiff's claims do not state facts upon which a claim for relief for damages or just compensation may be maintained.

WHEREFORE, Defendant prays for the following relief:


1. That the Plaintiff take nothing in this action;

Dear Senator Pangelinan:

Background

This case involves an inverse condemnation filed in the Superior Court of Guam by Vincent C. Castro and Menilia C. Castro *aka* Millie C. Castro (collectively, the "Castros"). The taking occurred on January 29, 1979 and related to the widening of Chelenko Road, Municipality of Sinajana, located in the village of Ordot. For the road widening project, the Government of Guam acquired property from the two neighboring properties, but for some inexplicable reason, the Government did not list the Castro property in the 1979 eminent domain case.

For many years the Castros have been seeking resolution of this matter with the Government of Guam. The Castros have waited patiently for a response from the Government while knowing that their neighbors received compensation over three decades ago. And the Government has been using the property for the entire time. Moreover, the Castros have continued to pay real estate taxes on the property.

Through their lawyer, Attorney Georgette Bello Concepcion, the Castros filed a claim against the Government under the Government Claims Act. The claim was properly filed pursuant to 5 G.C.A. Chapter 6 in order to exhaust their administrative remedies before seeking relief from the court. No action was taken by the Government on the Castro's government claim. Thereafter, through their counsel, the Castros filed a verified complaint in the Superior Court on October 12, 2012 which was served on the Government, along with a summons.

Since the filing of the Complaint, our office has met with the Castros and their attorney. Based on the title work done, and meetings held with personnel from Land Management and the

Rights-of-Way Division of the Department of Public Works, we have concluded that the Castros are correct in their assertion that the land in question was taken by the Government without compensation.

Typically, a claim for inverse condemnation arising so many years ago would be barred by the statute of limitations. However, on Guam we have a special statute which tolls the statute of limitation for condemnations occurring between 1950 and 1994 for which either no compensation or grossly inadequate compensation was given. *See* 7 G.C.A. § 11311.1. Since the taking of the Castro Property occurred on January 29, 1979, the Castro's inverse condemnation claim is not time barred by virtue of 7 G.C.A. § 11311.1. Having determined that liability exists on the Government, the next question is to determine the amount of just compensation to be paid to the Castros.

Government's Exposure - Just Compensation

For purposes of determining just compensation in an eminent domain case, the property taken is valued as of the date of the taking. In this case, the date of value is January 29, 1979. According to our records, the 1979 land values paid to the two neighboring property owners were \$9.00 per sq. m. (to the owners of Lot 3336-New-1-G) and \$8.25 per sq. m. (to the owners of Lot 3244-1G). For settlement purposes, using a value of \$9.00 per sq. m., the value of the part taken from the Castros (i.e., 1.66 sq. m.) would yield an amount of \$1,494.00.

When the government takes only a portion of a larger tract of land, just compensation consists of the fair market value of the part taken, as well as any damages to the remaining property in the landowner's possession resulting from the government's activities on the condemned land. Typically, damages between 10%-50% as a result of dust and noise from the traffic are customary in such cases. For settlement purposes, using a damages percentage of 25% applied to the remaining property (i.e., \$9.00 x 25% x 763 sq. m.) would yield an amount of \$1,717.00.

In addition to just compensation, the special Guam statute referred to previously (7 G.C.A. § 11311.1) allows the landowners to recover simple interest at a rate of 6% per annum from the date of take (January 29, 1979) until judgment is paid. The statute also requires the Government to pay the landowners' attorney fees. All of these factors must be taken into account in assessing the settlement value of this case. Applying a 6% interest rate on the above amounts for a period of 34 ½ years, yields an amount of \$6,647. The Government recognizes that the Castros have overpaid property taxes for all of these years and agrees that they should be reimbursed.

If this case proceeds to trial, we would also need to retain an expert appraisal witness to produce an appraisal report and testify. Trial would be expected to last approximately 5 days. Land Management and the Rights-of-Way Department of the Department of Public Works would have to prepare trial exhibits and be prepared to testify at trial.

Based on the following calculations, we would expect the Government's exposure in the case to be between \$27,000.00 and \$42,000.00:

Exposure based on \$9.00 per sq. m. and 25% damages:

With the inclusion of expert witness fees these amounts would increase between \$5,000.00 and \$10,000.00, bringing the Government's exposure to upwards of \$52,000.00.

Reasonable Settlement Amount

Based on the foregoing, 7 months ago, in May 2013, we recommended a reasonable settlement amount to be in the area of \$20,000.00 to \$25,000.00, inclusive of all interest and attorneys' fees payable to the Castros. This case is set for trial in the Guam Superior Court on February 12, 2014. Through their attorney, the property owners have recently indicated that they would accept a settlement amount of \$25,000.00. In order to avoid trial and the Government's added exposure and costs associated therewith, this Office recommends the case be settled for \$25,000.00, inclusive of all interest and attorneys' fees payable pursuant to 7 G.C.A. § 11311.1.

DPW's Request for Appropriation

Before the Attorney General's Office may settle this case, legislative approval or a specific appropriation must be made. See 1 G.C.A. §18201.¹ DPW agrees with our settlement

¹1 G.C.A. §18201 provides:

No office, department, instrumentality, agency, institution, board, bureau, commission, council, authority, committee of territorial government or branch of the government of Guam may enter into any consent decree, stipulated order or other settlement agreement with any party seeking a claim against the government of Guam, that requires the payment of cash, financing, or future financing of the government of Guam without the approval of *l Liheslatura* [the Legislature] or specific appropriation for that claim. Any proposed settlement agreement, supra, that requires legislative appropriation or authorization, by an Office, Department, Instrumentality, Agency or Branch, purporting a consent decree, stipulated order or

recommendation, however has advised this office that it does not have any funding available to assist in the payment of this settlement. *See* letter dated December 18, 2013, from DPW Director to Office of the Attorney General, enclosed herewith.

Therefore, DPW is requesting an appropriation of \$25,000 to settle this 34-year old inverse condemnation case: *Castro v. Government of Guam*; Superior Court of Guam Civil Case No. CV1158-12. In light of the imminent trial date, DPW also requests that the bill relating to this appropriation be presented to the Legislature at the next scheduled Legislative session.



The taking occurred on January 29, 1979 and related to the widening of Chelenko Road, Municipality of Sinajana, located in the village of Ordot. I. Introduction

This memorandum seeks settlement authority for a condemnation which occurred almost 34 ½ years ago. Please pay particular attention to Section VI below regarding prerequisites to obtaining settlement authority from government agencies.

This case involves an inverse condemnation filed in the Superior Court of Guam by Vincent C. Castro and Menilia C. Castro *aka* Millie C. Castro (collectively, the "Castros"). The taking occurred on January 29, 1979 and related to the widening of Chelenko Road, Municipality of Sinajana, located in the village of Ordot. For the road widening project, the Government of Guam acquired property from the two neighboring properties, but for some inexplicable reason, did not list the Castro property in the eminent domain case. A copy of the 1979 Declaration of Taking omitting the Castro property is attached as Exhibit A.

II. The Castro Property

The Castro Property includes Lot No 3340-2-2 (now known as Lot 3340-2-R1). The area of the taking is 166 sq. m. ±, and is shown as the cross-hatched area on Exhibit B.

III. Procedural Aspects

For many years the Castros have been seeking resolution of this matter with the Government of Guam. The Castros have waited patiently for a response from the Government while knowing that their neighbors received compensation over three decades ago. And the Government has been using the property for the entire time. Moreover, the Castros have continued to pay real estate taxes on the property.

The Castros hired a lawyer, Attorney Georgette Bello Concepcion, and filed a claim against the Government under the Government Claims Act. The claim was properly filed pursuant to 5 G.C.A. Chapter 6 in order to exhaust their administrative remedies before seeking relief from the court. No action was taken by the Government on the Castro's government claim. Thereafter, through their counsel, the Castros filed a verified complaint in the Superior Court on October 12, 2012 (attached as Exhibit C) which was served on the Government, along with a Summons (attached as Exhibit D).

Since the filing of the Complaint, our office has met with the Castros and their attorney. Based on the title work done, and meetings held with personnel from Land Management and the Rights-of-Way Division of the Department of Public Works, we have concluded that the Castros are correct in their assertion that the land in question was taken by the government without compensation.

In this case, the date of value is January 29, 1979. The Government of Guam has not obtained an appraisal, however land values are available for the acquisitions of the two neighboring properties as of January 29, 1979. Namely, the owners of Lot 3336-New-1-G were

paid \$9.00 per sq. m. and the owners of Lot 3244-1G were paid \$8.25 per sq. m. While the Government would assert that there is no damage to the remainder property, at trial the Castros will inevitably argue damages between 25-50% as a result of dust and noise from the traffic, as is customary in such cases.

In addition to just compensation, the special Guam statute referred to previously (7 G.C.A. § 11311.1) allows the landowners to recover simple interest at a rate of 6% per annum from the date of take (January 29, 1979) until judgment is paid. The statute also requires the Government to pay the landowners' attorney fees. All of these factors must be taken into account in assessing the Government's exposure in this case should it proceed to trial.

If this case proceeds to trial, we would also need to retain an expert appraisal witness to produce an appraisal report and testify. Trial would be expected to last approximately 5 days. Land Management and the rights-of-way department of the Department of Public Works would have to prepare trial exhibits and be prepared to testify at trial.

Based on the following calculations, we would expect the Government's exposure in the case to be between \$27,000.00 and \$42,000.00. With the inclusion of expert witness fees these amounts would increase between \$5,000.00 and \$10,000.00, bring the Government's exposure to upwards of \$52,000.00.

V. Reasonable Settlement Amount

Based on the foregoing, we judge a reasonable settlement to be in the area of \$20,000.00 to \$25,000.00, inclusive of all interest and attorneys' fees payable to the Castros.

VI. DPW's Certification

Before the Attorney General's Office may settle a case, the agency involved in the case must certify that the following statute has been complied with:

No agency shall contract or agree to spend money for goods or services or in settlement of a lawsuit or claim in excess of the amount appropriated by I Liheslatura (the Legislature) to that agency for such goods, services, claim, or settlement, and BBMR shall not allot funds to that agency for the payment of any amount towards such goods, services, claim, or settlement if the total amount of goods, services, claim, or settlement is more than the amount appropriated or amount allotted by BBMR. Any contract or agreement made in violation hereof shall be void. Any agency head or certifying officer who knowingly contracts or agrees to spend any money in excess of said allotments shall be guilty of a misdemeanor.

P.L. 31-77:XII Section 13.

Under the statute, a settlement cannot be entered into unless the total amount of the settlement amount has been appropriated or allotted by BBMR. Therefore, to move forward with the settlement of this Superior Court case, I must receive your settlement authority and a certification that the above-referenced law has been complied with.

Please forward a letter to me providing settlement authority and the necessary certification and we will pursue settlement of this matter, including drafting and/or filing the necessary releases, title documents and court papers. Please feel free to call me with any questions you may have.



10. Defendant did not obtain a Right of Entry Agreement from Plaintiffs in 1977 as to Lot No. 3340-2-3 (now Lot No. 3340-2-3-R1) as Defendant had done with regard to Lot No. 3340-2-2 (now Lot No. 3340-2-R1).

11. Plaintiffs have paid property taxes on these properties based on the original sizes of the lots.

12. Plaintiffs have been denied the use and enjoyment of their property as their property continues to be used as public easement.

13. Since the date of entry onto Plaintiffs' land and continuing to the date of the filing of this action Defendant, Plaintiffs have not been justly compensated for the unlawful taking of their property by Defendants nor has Defendant made any offers of compensation.

14. Further, to date, Defendant has failed to institute eminent domain proceedings so that damage to Plaintiffs' property could be assessed.

15. Defendant's actions have resulted in the taking of Plaintiffs' private property for public use since 1977 for public use pursuant to Defendant's right of eminent domain

1 WHEREFORE, Plaintiffs respectfully request:

- 2 1. Judgment against Defendant for damages in an amount to be proven at
3 trial;
- 4 2. Reimbursement of property taxes overpaid by them in accordance with the
5 reduction in size of each of Plaintiffs' properties since December 21, 1977;
- 6 3. Interest as allowed under the laws of Guam for said damages as of
7 December 21, 1977
- 8 4. Injunctive relief precluding Defendant from further actions injurious to
9 Plaintiffs' property;
- 10 4. Attorney's fees and costs of suit as allowed pursuant to 7 GCA § 1111.1;

- 13 5. Such other and further relief as the court may deem just and proper.





BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF GUAM:

Section 1. Legislative Finding and Intent. *I Liheslaturan Guahan* finds that for over three decades, Vincent C. Castro and Menilia C. Castro (collectively known as the Castros) have been waiting to be compensated for property the government of Guam took in January 29, 1979 and used it to construct a public road. The Castros property is described as Lot No. 3340-2-2 (now known as Lot No. 3340-2-R1), 166 sq. m. ± as shown in Exhibit A and was used to widen Chelenko Road in the municipality of Sinajana, located in the village of Ordot.

I Liheslaturan Guahan further finds that there were landowners whose property were taken through court action to construct Chelenko road and were paid for their property. The government did not take the Castro's property in the same or any subsequent court action, yet their property was made part of Chelenko road and the Castros were never paid for the property. The 1979 Declaration of Taking omitted the Castro property. On October 8, 2012, the Castros filed an inverse condemnation complaint against the government of Guam for the unlawful taking of their property.

1 *I Liheslaturan Guahan* further finds that the Office of the Attorney General
2 has worked with the Castros and their attorney to resolve this long standing land
3 taking and have agreed to settle in the amount of Twenty-Five Thousand Dollars

5 Therefore, *I Liheslaturan Guahan* intends to appropriate the agreed
6 settlement amount to the Castros and to comply with the Superior Court Case No.


