AN ACT TO AMEND SECTION 12101(k), ARTICLE 1, CHAPTER 12, TITLE 10 OF THE GUAM CODE ANNOTATED, AMEND AND RENUMBER SECTIONS 12802(a)(iv) AND 12827, ARTICLE 8, CHAPTER 12, TITLE 10 OF THE GUAM CODE ANNOTATED, AMEND SECTION 12809(a), ARTICLE 8, CHAPTER 12, TITLE 10 OF THE GUAM CODE ANNOTATED, AMEND SECTIONS 121201, 121202, 121204, AND TABLE OF CONTENTS OF ARTICLE 12, CHAPTER 12, TITLE 10 OF THE GUAM CODE ANNOTATED, ADD A NEW SECTION 121205, ARTICLE 12, CHAPTER 12, TITLE 10 OF THE GUAM CODE ANNOTATED, AMEND AND RENUMBER SECTION 121205, ARTICLE 12, CHAPTER 12, TITLE 10 OF THE GUAM CODE ANNOTATED, AND ADD SECTIONS 121207 AND 121208 TO ARTICLE 12, CHAPTER 12, TITLE 10 OF THE GUAM CODE ANNOTATED, RELATIVE TO THE LICENSURE OF CLINICAL PSYCHOLOGISTS.

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF GUAM:

- 2 Section 1. Legislative Statement. I Liheslaturan Guåhan finds that the
- 3 current statute of the licensure of Clinical Psychologists needs to be updated
- 4 to meet national standards of the profession, as well as acted upon as a
- 5 companion bill to Article 8, Chapter 12, Division 1, Part 1, Title 10 of the
- 6 Guam Code Annotated, relative to the Allied Health Practice Act.
- 7 Section 2. Section 12101(k), Article 1, Chapter 12, Part 1, Division 1,
- 8 Title 10 of the Guam Code Annotated is hereby amended to read as follows:

"(k) Practice of Clinical Psychology means the assessing and alleviating of emotional and mental disorder in a hospital or clinical setting.

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Practice of Clinical Psychology means rendering to individuals, groups, organizations, or the public any psychological service involving the application of principles, methods, and procedures of understanding, predicting, and influencing behavior, such as the principles pertaining to learning, perception, motivation, thinking, emotions, and interpersonal relationships; the methods and procedures of interviewing, counseling, and psychotherapy; of constructing, administering, and interpreting tests of mental abilities, aptitudes, interests, attitudes, personality characteristics, emotion, and motivation. The application of said principles in testing, evaluation, treatment, use of psychotherapeutic techniques, and other methods includes, but is not limited to: diagnosis, prevention, and amelioration of adjustment problems and emotional, mental, nervous, and addictive disorders and mental health conditions of individuals and groups; educational and vocational counseling; the evaluation and planning for effective work and learning situations; and the resolution of interpersonal and social conflicts."

Section 3. Section 12802(a)(iv), Article 8, Chapter 12, Division 1, Part 1, Title 10 of the Guam Code Annotated is hereby *amended* and *renumbered* to read as follows:

"(iv)(4)Clinical psychology shall mean the subspecialty of psychology which is-primarily concerned with assessing and alleviating emotional, mental and behavioral disorders assessment, diagnosis, and treatment of psychological, emotional, mental, and behavioral disorders with

- 1 special emphasis on the integration of scientific research and therapeutic
- 2 <u>practice</u> in a hospital, institution, or other clinical setting, or other
- 3 <u>settings requiring clinical interventions."</u>
- 4 Section 4. Section 12809(a), Article 8, Chapter 12, Division 1, Part 1,
- 5 Title 10 of the Guam Code Annotated is hereby *amended* to read as follows:
- 6 "§ 12809. Continuing Education Requirements.
- 7 (a) A total of thirty (30) credit hours of continuing education within
- 8 each two (2) year licensure period are required of each licensee to qualify for a
- 9 renewal, except for licensees under Podiatry, and Physician Assistants, which
- 10 requires fifty (50) credit hours of continuing education. At least twenty (20) of
- 11 these credit hours must be in the licensee's specific area of practice. A
- 12 prescribing Clinical Psychologist who has completed an approved APA
- 13 curriculum in psychopharmacology is required to successfully complete the
- 14 APA, FDA & DEA required number of continuing education credit hours in
- 15 psychopharmacology necessary to maintain prescriptive authority. Licensees
- 16 under Speech, Language Pathology require a certain number of contact hours
- 17 in the licensee's specific area of practice within each two (2) year licensure
- 18 period, as specified in Rules and Regulations. The Board shall prorate the
- 19 continuing education credit hour requirements for licenses issued less than
- 20 two (2) years prior to the renewal period."
- Section 5. Section 12827, Article 8, Chapter 12, Division 1, Part 1, Title
- 22 10 of the Guam Code Annotated is hereby amended and renumbered to read as
- 23 follows:
- 24 "§ 12827. §12826. Prescriptive Authority for Allied Health
- 25 Professionals. Consistent with the Food and Drug Administration (FDA)

- 1 Rules and Regulations, the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) license
- 2 and the license issued by the Board, physician assistants may prescribe any
- 3 <u>licensed drug and 'Schedule Drugs II V' controlled substances that fall</u>
- 4 within the scope of practice of his or her supervising physician, as defined in
- 5 the Rules and Regulations of the Board. Any drug issued by a physician
- 6 assistant shall be subject to a reasonable quantitative limitation consistent
- 7 with FDA and DEA Rules and Regulations.
- Physician assistants, podiatrists, and veterinarians must maintain a
- 9 valid Federal Drug Enforcement Administration certification and a valid
- 10 Guam Control Substance Registration from the Department of Public Health
- 11 and Social Services. A veterinarian may not prescribe controlled substances
- 12 for human use and shall only prescribe, dispense or administer a controlled
- 13 substance in good faith for use by animals within the course of his
- 14 professional practice. Such a prescription shall be dated and labeled: "For
- 15 <u>animal use only."</u>
- 16 A clinical psychologist and physician assistant Clinical Psychologist
- 17 may administer, <u>order</u>, <u>and prescribe</u> and dispense any licensed <u>psychotropic</u>
- 18 drug as a delegated authority of the Collaborative Practice Agreement ('CPA').
- 19 Any psychotropic drug issued by a Clinical Psychologist shall be subject to a
- 20 reasonable quantitative limitation consistent with FDA and DEA Rules and
- 21 Regulations. To qualify for prescriptive authority, the Allied Health
- 22 Professional Clinical Psychologist must have all of the following:
- 23 (1) a valid Federal Drug Enforcement Administration ('DEA')
- 24 certification;

(2) a current Guam Control Substance Registration from Department
 of Public Health and Social Services;

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- (3) Collaborative Practice Agreement ('CPA') approved by all of the following three (3) boards: the Board of Allied Health Examiners ('BAHE'), the Board of Pharmacy ('BOP'), and the Board of Medical Examiners ('BOME');
- The CPA shall always have a physician available, preferably the (4) physician signing for the CPA, but an alternate physician shall be designated during his/her absence. (The Allied Health Professional Clinical Psychologist must submit a scope of practice list of drugs, and the CPA for approval by the BAHE, BOP and BOME. At the discretion of the board(s), the Allied Health Professional Clinical Psychologist and his collaborative physician may be requested to be present for evaluation of the applicant's prescriptive authority. The Allied Health Professional Clinical Psychologist shall not include any drug on the list that he or she is not competent to prescribe or drugs that are not routinely administered within his/her scope of practice. The Board of Pharmacy or Board of Medical Examiners has the authority to amend the list of drugs.
- (5) The <u>Clinical Psychologist's</u> prescriptive authority of the Allied Health Professional shall be revoked for an invalid Guam or Federal DEA registration, and In addition, prescriptive authority may be revoked for any violation of this Act and its rules and regulations as determined by the <u>Guam Board of Allied Health</u>

5	standards as established by the Middle States Association of Colleges and
6	Secondary Schools, the New England Association of Colleges and Secondary
7	Schools, the North Central Association of Schools and Colleges, the Western
8	Association of Schools and Colleges, or by other recognized accrediting
9	agencies.entities.
0	(a)(b) 'Clinical Psychologist' means a person who has received training in
1	clinical psychology from an accredited school in the U.S. and has completed
12	the internship requirements. who graduated from a clinical psychology
13	program from an accredited school in the United States and has received the
14	education and training, as well as completion of an internship program.
15	(b)(c) 'Clinical Psychology' means a subspecialty branch in psychology
l 6	which is primarily concerned with assessing and alleviating assessment

18	disorders with special emphasis on the integration of scientific research and

(c) 'Fee' means any charge, monetary or otherwise, whether paid

directly, or on a prepaid capitation basis, by a third party, or a charge assessed

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by a facility for services rendered.

- 'Foreign School' means any college or division of a university in a country other than the United States that offers the degree of doctor in clinical 2 3 psychology.
 - 'License' means that the person named on the certificate has been found qualified to engage in the practice of clinical psychology, and has been awarded a license by the Board to practice clinical psychology.
 - 'Practice of Clinical Psychology' means: (f)

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- a person who represents himself to be a clinical psychologist-when (1)he holds himself out to the public by any title or description of services incorporating the words 'clinical psychology,' 'clinical psychologist,' or offers to render or renders services as defined below to individuals, groups, organizations or the public.
 - (2) the rendering to individuals, groups, organizations or the public any psychological service involving the application of principles, methods and procedures of understanding, predicting and influencing behavior, such as the principles pertaining to learning, perception, motivation, thinking, emotions and inter-personal relationships; the methods and procedures of interviewing, counseling and psychotherapy; constructing, administering and interpreting tests of mental abilities, aptitudes, interests, attitudes, personality characteristics, emotion and motivation, and of assessing public opinion;
 - the application of said principles and methods, including, but not (3) limited to, diagnosis, prevention and amelioration of adjustment problems, and emotional and mental disorders of individuals and

groups, hypnosis, educational and vocational counseling, personnel selection and management, the evaluation and planning for effective work and learning situations, advertising and market research and the resolution of interpersonal and social conflicts; or psychotherapy by the use of learning, conditioning methods and $\left(4\right)$ emotional reactions, in a professional relationship, to assist a person or persons to modify feelings, attitudes and behavior, which are intellectually, socially or emotionally mal-adjustive or

ineffectual.

(d) 'Institution of higher education' means any accredited institution of higher education in the United States, including a professional school that offers a full-time doctoral course of study in psychology as defined in the rules of the Board. Institutions of higher education outside the United States will be evaluated on a case-by-case basis by the board.

(3)(e) 'Internship' means a training program that is supervised by a doctoral level, licensed clinical psychologist, or approved by the American Psychological Association and can be demonstrated to be of high quality. an American Psychological Association (APA) approved or recognized training program that is supervised by a doctoral level, licensed Psychologist or Psychiatrist.

(f) 'Psychotropic medication' means a controlled substance or drug that may not be dispensed or administered without a prescription and that are recognized and customarily used for the management for mental and emotional disorders.

- § **121202**. **Qualifications for Licensure.** Each applicant for licensure shall comply with all of the following requirements:
- 3 (a) The applicant must have shall possess a doctorate doctoral degree 4 in clinical psychology from an accredited college or university of the U.S. 5 accredited by the American Psychological Association. Applicants who have
- 6 obtained their academic degree outside of the United States or its territories
- 7 must have their academic degree validated by the Board as equivalent to a
- 8 doctorate level degree conferred by a regionally accredited college or
- 9 university in the United States;
- 10 (b) The applicant must have completed two (2) years of internship, of which at least one (1) year must be after receiving the doctorate: *and*
- 12 (c) The applicant must have successfully completed <u>passed the</u> 13 Examination for Professional Practice in Psychology (EPPP) administered by a 14 state, territory or district of the United States, as <u>specified in Rules and</u> 15 <u>Regulations</u>."
- Section 7. Section 121204, Article 12, Chapter 12, Part 2, Division 1, Title 10 of the Guam Code Annotated is hereby *amended* to read as follows:
- "§ **121204.** Exceptions to Licensure Requirements. (a)—No person may practice clinical psychology on Guam who is *not* licensed as a clinical psychologist by the Board. *However*, these rules and regulations shall *not* be construed to prohibit the following:
- 22 (1)(a) an employee of a government of Guam agency or Federal government agency performing his official duties;
- 24 (2)(b) a clinical psychologist regularly licensed in another state of the U.S. consulting with a licensed clinical psychologist on Guam; *or*

- 1 (3)(c) a person who is a regular student in clinical psychology or a
- 2 related field performing duties or functions assigned by his instructors, or
- 3 who is working under the direct supervision of a licensed, clinical
- 4 psychologist."
- 5 Section 8. A New Section 121205 is hereby added to Article 12, Chapter
- 6 12, Part 2, Division 1, Title 10 of the Guam Code Annotated and the following
- 7 section is hereby *renumbered* to read as follows:
- 8 "§ 121205. Scope of Practice. The practice of clinical psychology
- 9 <u>includes</u>, but is not limited to:
- 10 (a) observation, description, evaluation, interpretation, and
- 11 modification of human behavior by the application of psychological
- 12 principles, methods and procedures, for the purposes of preventing or
- 13 eliminating symptomatic, maladaptive, or undesired behavior and of
- 14 enhancing interpersonal relationships, work and life adjustment, personal
- 15 effectiveness, behavioral health and mental health;
- 16 (b) psychological testing and the evaluation or assessment of personal
- 17 characteristics such as intelligence, personality characteristics such as
- 18 intelligence, personality, abilities, interests, aptitudes and neuropsychological
- 19 functioning;
- 20 (c) psychoanalysis, psychotherapy, hypnosis, biofeedback and
- 21 <u>behavior analysis and therapy;</u>
- 22 (d) diagnosis and treatment of mental and emotional disorder or
- 23 disability, alcoholism and substance abuse, disorders of habit or conduct, as
- 24 well as of psychological aspects of physical illness, accident, injury or
- 25 <u>disability; and</u>

- 1 (e) psychoeducational evaluation, therapy, remediation and
- 2 consultation."
- 3 Section 9. Section 121205, Article 12, Chapter 12, Part 2, Division 1,
- 4 Title 10 of the Guam Code Annotated is hereby amended and renumbered to
- 5 read as follows:
- 6 "§ 121205. § 121206. Prescriptive Authority.
- 7 (a) A clinical psychologist Clinical Psychologist may administer,
- 8 order, and prescribe and dispense any licensed drug in accordance with
- 9 §12827 §12826 of Chapter 12 of Title 10 of the Guam Code Annotated and any
- 10 other rules and regulation established by the Board.
- 11 (b) Prescriptive authority of a licensed Clinical Psychologist shall
- 12 automatically renew upon the renewal of the license of the Clinical
- 13 Psychologist with proof of completion of approved APA, FDA, and DEA
- 14 curriculum in psychopharmacology, as defined in the Rules and Regulations
- 15 of the Board.
- 16 (c) If any Clinical Psychologist fails to meet any of the foregoing
- 17 requirements for prescriptive authority, the Board may revoke the
- 18 prescriptive authority of that Clinical Psychologist. In the event of such a
- 19 revocation, a Clinical Psychologist shall have thirty (30) days to appeal the
- 20 denial of prescriptive authority to the Board in writing. The Board is required
- 21 to respond in writing to any appeal of such revocation of prescriptive
- 22 <u>authority within thirty (30) days of receipt of such a request."</u>
- 23 Section 10. New Sections 121207 and 121208 are hereby added to Article
- 24 12, Chapter 12, Part 2, Division 1, Title 10 of the Guam Code Annotated:

1	"§ 121207. Collaborative Practice Agreement ('CPA'). To qualify for
2	prescriptive authority, a Clinical Psychologist must enter into a CPA with a
3	Guam licensed physician with experience in the provision of psychotropic
4	medication. The collaborating physician is not required to be physically
5	located at the same location as the Clinical Psychologist.
6	§ 121208. Termination of Collaborative Practice Agreement. Either
7	the Clinical Psychologist or physician may terminate by mutual agreement or
8	a CPA unilaterally. The Clinical Psychologist must give notice of the
9	termination of any CPA between a Clinical Psychologist and physician to the
10	boards. The prescriptive authority of a Clinical Psychologist is suspended
11	until a CPA is re-entered with a physician."
12	Section 11. Severability. If any provision of this Law or its application
13	to any person or circumstance is found to be invalid or contrary to law, such
14	invalidity shall not affect other provisions or applications of this Law, which
15	can be given effect without the invalid provisions or application, and to this
16	end the provisions of this Law are severable.
