AN ACT TO SUSPEND THE USE OF ELECTRONIC OR **VOTING** MECHANICAL **MACHINES ELECTIONS** UNTIL THEIR **USE** CAN DEMONSTRATED BE ACCURATE TO AS AND EFFECTIVE AS TRADITIONAL PAPER BALLOTS

BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF GUAM:

2 Section 1. Statement of Legislative Findings and Purpose. I Mina Bente Ocho Na 3 Liheslaturan Guahan finds that the publicity about problems in the voting process, both 4 in Guam and the 50 states, have been growing since our own 1998 elections and the 5 2000 Presidential elections in the United States. I Liheslatura finds that the use of 6 Electronic Voting Machines has proven to be a magnet for criticism across the country, 7 leading many voters, national and state political parties, and voting rights organizations 8 to believe that such devices have increased the likelihood that some voters have been 9 disenfranchised by their use because of computation errors and software errors causing 10 the incorrect tabulation of votes. I Liheslaturan Guahan has determined that the use of Electronic and Mechanical 11 12 Voting Machines have been at the center of many voting problems across the United 13 States and in Guam in recent years, their use having become more prevalent at the 14 urging and support of the Federal Government. Frequent complaints from voters and poll workers alike include the apparent loss of votes, inaccurate or improper registering 15 of actual votes cast, erasure of memory chips holding voting data, improper 16

programming, improper instructions from the on-site staff of the Guam Election

1 Commission (GEC), inability of voters to select the candidate of their choice, and other 2 problems.

I Liheslaturan Guahan therefore finds that the use of Electronic or Mechanical Voting Machines in Guam elections should be suspended until such time that the GEC is able to train qualified staff, properly educate the public and establish adequate protocols for handling possible problems, such that the use of Electronic or Mechanical Voting Machines in Guam will be no more problematic than using paper ballots.

Section 2. Temporary Suspension of the use of Electronic or Mechanical Voting Machines. On the effective date of this Act, the use of Electronic or Mechanical
Voting Machines in any election conducted by the Guam Election Commission (GEC) is
suspended, *except* as provided in Section 3 of this Act.

Section 3. Lifting of Suspension. Such suspension shall remain in place until:

- **a.** The GEC determines, through extensive testing, and development of comprehensive training procedures, that all GEC staff employees to be situated at polling sites on each election day will be properly trained; and
- **b.** The GEC develops an island-wide education program to inform and demonstrate to voters the proper use of such machines, and such education program is tested on an actual election day or days to determine the program's effectiveness as delineated in Section 5 of this Act; and
- c. The GEC facilitates the conduct of tests to determine the integrity of the Electronic or Mechanical Voting Machines with an independent entity or organization as deemed appropriate by the GEC; and
- **d.** The results and analysis of such testing, training and education can demonstrate that Electronic or Mechanical Voting Machines can be utilized by the people of Guam in a manner that can be shown to be as accurate and

effective as traditional paper ballots, and the results, analysis and data obtained at such testing, training and education has been reported to *I Maga'lahen Guahan* and *I Liheslaturan Guahan*, and *I Liheslaturan Guahan* enacts legislation to repeal such suspension.

Section 4. Suspension not Applicable to Machines Used to Count Paper Ballots. For the purposes of this Act, Electronic or Mechanical Voting Machines means the electronic or mechanical devices at which voters cast votes. Nothing in this act shall be construed to mean that Electronic or Mechanical devices shall not continue to be used for the sorting and counting of paper ballots already cast by voters.

Section 5. Testing of Electronic or Mechanical Voting Machines. At each election conducted by the GEC subsequent to the effective date of this act, the GEC shall test the veracity of Electronic or Mechanical Voting Machines through the establishment of one or more "Testing Sites" which shall be located near actual polling sites. Only voters who have already completed voting may be recruited to participate in tests on electronic or mechanical voting machines. Additionally, GEC may also establish "Testing Sites" in other locations and at other times which are not concurrent with Guam elections, in order to better familiarize voters with Electronic or Mechanical Voting, and to further test such machines in heavy use situations. Testing shall always duplicate staffing and conditions similar to that which voters will encounter at actual polling sites, including procedures followed by GEC staff and instructions given to voters. All data collected at such testing sites shall be stored safely by GEC until the results of each election test are evaluated and reported.
