AN ACT RELATIVE TO PROVIDING FOR THE RECRUITMENT AND HIRING OF 100 NEW UNIFORMED POLICE OFFICERS FOR THE GUAM POLICE DEPARTMENT BY THE YEAR 2013 TO FURTHER ENSURE THE SAFETY OF OUR STREETS AND ₹ NEIGHBORHOODS, PARTICULARLY IN CONSIDERATION OF 1 THE ANTICIPATED INCREASE IN CIVILIAN AND MILITARY POPULATION IN THE UPCOMING YEARS; APPROPRIATING ₹ SUMS **NECESSARY** FOR IMPLEMENTATION AND HIRING OF ADDITIONAL POLICE S OFFICERS IN FISCAL YEAR 2009; AND THROUGH ADDING A 🔊 NEW SECTION §77135 TO CHAPTER 77, DIVISION 3 (PUBLIC SAFETY), TITLE 10, GUAM CODE ANNOTATED; PROVISION SHALL HENCEFORTH BE KNOWN AS THE "ISLAND-WIDE NEIGHBORHOOD PATROL PUBLIC SAFETY PROTECTION ACT OF 2008".

BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF GUAM:

Section 1. Legislative Findings and Intent.

- 2 I Liheslaturan Guåhan finds that the island community has been aware
- 3 of the impending increase in military through the buildup of U. S. Marines
- 4 presence in the upcoming years. It has been estimated that the relocation
- of the Marines component from Japan may reach as high as 8,000
- 6 uniformed Marines personnel to be stationed in Guam, with accompanying
- 7 family members of approximately 10,000 individuals, with a possible total
- 8 of 18,000 additional military-related personnel and family members

1 residing on Guam by the year 2013. Furthermore, it has been estimated 2 that because of the increased military presence on Guam, a corresponding increase in the civilian population to support Guam's expanded military 3 and business community activities may result in an increase in additional 4 civilian personnel beyond the regular census population growth. With this 5 potential increase in military personnel, their family members, and the 6 civilian population, the overall population expansion in the upcoming 7 years result in a noteworthy increase of Guam residents; thus impacting 8 the island infrastructure to include utilities, roads, public safety, education, 9 healthcare services, and Guam's way of life. 10 The most recent Guam Transportation Plan 2030 formulated by the Department of Public Works estimates that due to the impending military relocation 12 complementary population adjustments, the island's population will increase to a level of approximately 225,000 residents by the year 2013, this 14 in their estimates reflect a 23% increase in the population over the course of the succeeding five years in comparison to the island's normal population 16 growth rate.. As existing government-recognized entities review and plan 17 for this anticipated increase in population and the impact to Guam and the island community, it is imperative that immediate efforts commence for addressing the increased requirement for the recruitment, training and 20 proper equipping of law enforcement personnel to address this anticipated increase in population and to more effectively ensure the safety of the island community.

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I Liheslaturan Guahan further finds that the recruitment, training and overall preparation of a new uniformed police officer prior to their official assignment into Guam's streets and neighborhoods entails a somewhat extensive period of time; at times taking a minimum of six months for their initial training and curriculum, and then an additional six months for their on-the-job training to their respective precinct and field assignments. Because this requires at least a full year to ensure that each newly recruited and assigned uniformed police officer is adequately trained and prepared for field work, it is critical that efforts be made for the proper planning and timely recruitment of an adequate number of uniformed police officers to properly serve and protect our island community in the near future and in the years to come.

Therefore, this provision would present an aggressive and proactive outline for the overall increased requirement in uniformed police officers to adequately serve and protect the island community in the years ahead, and establish a straightforward community-wide police officer recruitment master plan that will ensure that Guam has the necessary uniformed police officers protecting our entire island community. Based on the proposed plan, the Guam Police Department will commence the necessary recruitment of such uniformed police officers over the course of the next several years to commence with fiscal year 2009. New uniformed police officers hired subsequent to this Act and in accordance with the provisions set forth herein, shall be assigned to the Neighborhood Patrol Unit of the

- of Guam's men and women in blue who are protecting our community by
- 3 Guam residents.
- 4 Section 2. Island-Wide Neighborhood Patrol Public Safety
- 5 Protection Act of 2008.
- A new Section §77135 is hereby added to Chapter 77, Division 3
- 7 (Public Safety), Title 10, Guam Code Annotated, relative to the Guam Police
- 8 Department, to read as follows:
- 9 "§77135. Island-Wide Neighborhood Patrol Public Safety
- 10 Protection Act of 2008.
- 11 a. This Act shall heretofore be referred to as the "Island-
- wide Neighborhood Patrol Public Safety Protection Act
- of 2008", henceforth referred herein as the Public Safety
- 14 Act of 2008.
- b. The Public Safety Act of 2008 shall provide for the proper
- planning in the recruitment and hiring of new law
- enforcement officers to serve the Guam community
- through the Guam Police Department, and to provide for
- a uniformed police officer personnel master plan which
- shall present the minimal requirement for Guam's public
- safety needs (uniformed police officers) for the entire
- island community over the course of the upcoming years,
- in an effort to address the public safety requirements of

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the local community and the impending population increases anticipated due to the military buildup and the regular increases in the island's population as a result of normal population growth.

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The uniformed police officers within the Guam Police Department existent on the date of the enactment of this Act is approximately 307 officers. For an estimated local population of 175,877 in 2008, this represents approximately one uniformed police officer protecting Guam's streets for every 573 residents. Based on the national average of police officer to population ratio provided by the Bureau of Justice Statistics Data, International Association of Chiefs of Police, the ratio for the size of Guam's 2008 estimated population should be 1.9 police officers for every 1000 Guam residents. According to this national ratio, Guam should have no less than 334 uniformed police officers within the Guam Police Department in 2008. This insufficient ratio of representation of uniformed police officers to population must be addressed directly and increased to more closely reflect the national average, and to ensure that it no longer decrease exponentially and place unnecessary additional strain on the Guam Police Department and the

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police officers. According to the Guam Transportation Plan 2030 prepared by the Department of Public Works, Guam's population is estimated to increase over the next five years by approximately 23%, from today's normal projected population estimate of 2008, to a level of 225,000 Guam residents in the year 2013. Therefore, using this particular formula as of the date of this Act, and with the anticipated increase in Guam's population for both civilian and military personnel in the years ahead with an estimate of no less than 225,000 individuals residing in Guam to include military and family personnel, and individuals working and providing support services to the military and local business community, the revised minimum uniformed police officers required by the year 2013 should be 428. This provision recognizes that the 2010 Census will be conducted shortly, and would provide more accurate estimates on the population estimates in the years ahead. Based on this rough population estimate of 225,000 in the year 2013, the minimum number of uniformed police officers needed within the Guam Police Department to provide the same level of public safety services being provided on the date of this Act (i.e., for every 573 citizens) would be 393

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uniformed police officers. This would translate into no less than 86 new officers to be recruited by the Guam Police Department by the year 2013. To better reflect the national quota of uniformed police officers to residents, this plan proposes that the Department increase its personnel not only by the minimum requirement of 86 as outlined above, but by a minimum of 100 additional uniformed police officers by the year 2013. The recruitment of these necessary police officers would be phased in and spread out through the succeeding five through 2013, making it feasible for the government of Guam to provide sufficient financing for the additional personnel and their complementary operational funding requirements. The additional 100 new uniformed police officers is a positive movement toward improving Guam's ratio of police officers per 1000 residents to a more acceptable level for providing necessary public safety protection services, and increasing the visibility and accessibility of law enforcement officials throughout our community. The implementation of this provision should therefore bring the Guam Police Department's uniformed police officer personnel strength from a present-day total of 307 to a minimum of 407

3	d.	In an effort to increase the uniformed police officers in the
4		Guam Police Department to more closely reflect the
5		national accepted ratio of police officers to residents and
6		to provide adequate police protection, the Department
7		shall recruit 100 additional uniformed police officers in
8		accordance with the following annualized schedule over
9		the course of the next five years:
10		i. Fiscal Year 2009, 20 new uniformed police
11		officers,
12		j. Fiscal Year 2010, 20 new uniformed police
13		officers,
14		k. Fiscal Year 2011, 20 new uniformed police
15		officers,
16		l. Fiscal Year 2012, 20 new uniformed police
17		officers.
18		m. Fiscal Year 2013, 20 new uniformed police
19		officers.
20		The recruitment of the 100 new uniformed police officers,
21		as authorized herein, shall be exclusive of police officer
22		positions filled on the date of the passage of this Act.
23		Any and all uniformed police officer positions within the

Guam Police Department that are filled as of the date of the adoption of this provision, shall continue to remain within the Department, and shall be subject to the Chief of Police's discretion in maintaining and appropriately recruiting for such positions. The aforementioned uniformed police officer positions authorized herein are hereby approved, and shall be subject to annual legislative funding appropriations.

The Chief of Police shall provide in the Guam Police Department's annual budgetary submissions the funding requirement for the effective and timely recruitment and training of the additional uniformed police officer positions as outlined herein, and to include the sum of no less than One Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$100,000.00) for operational and training requirements specifically related to the preparation of these additional neighborhood patrol police officers.

Any funds appropriated from any fiscal year for the above mentioned positions shall be available to the Guam Police Department for the uses as specified herein for that specific fiscal year, and shall carry-forward into subsequent fiscal years and be available to the

Department until such time said funds are fully expended.

Any and all of the new uniformed police officer positions

Any and all of the new uniformed police officer positions recruited in accordance with the authorization provided herein shall be assigned to the Neighborhood Patrol Unit of the Guam Police Department for a minimum term of no less than five years prior to any subsequent assignments within the Department, thus further reinforcing the preservation of peace and the protection of our island's citizens and streets."

Section 3. Appropriation for Fiscal Year 2009 for the initial implementation of the Island-wide Neighborhood Patrol Public Safety Protection Act of 2008.

The sum of Six Hundred Thirty Thousand Dollars (\$630,000.00) is hereby appropriated from the General Fund in Fiscal Year 2009 to the Guam Police Department for the recruitment of the additional uniformed police officer positions as specifically outlined in this Act for fiscal year 2009 only. The required funds identified herein reflect the following breakdown:

- 20 Police Recruits \$26,500 (incl benefits) X 20 = \$530,000.00
- Operational Training Funds = \$100,000.00
- Total Funding Requirement (FY '09) \$630,000.00
- 23 The funds appropriated above shall be available to the Guam Police

- 1 Department for the uses as specified herein, and shall carry-forward into
- 2 subsequent fiscal years and be available to the Department until such time
- 3 said funds are fully expended.
 - Section 4. Severability Clause.
- If any of the provisions of this Act or the application thereof to any
- 6 person or circumstance is held invalid, such invalidity shall not affect any
- 7 other provision or application of this Act which can be given effect without
- 8 the invalid provision or application, and to this end the provisions of this
- 9 Act are severable.
