AN ACT TO AUTHORIZE CHAPTER 6 OF TITLE 12 GCA, AND TO AMEND 5405 OF CHAPTER 4 OF TITLE 4 GCA RELATIVE TO THE ESTABLISHMENT OF THE ATURIDÀT ISLA TRANSITU (ISLA TRANSIT AUTHORITY), A PUBLIC CORPORATION, FOR THE PURPOSE OF PROVIDING AFFORDABLE, RELIABLE, AND SUSTAINABLE MODALITIES OF PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION ON THE ISLAND OF GUAM.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF GUAM:

Section 1. Legislative Findings. *I Liheslaturan Guahan* finds that a lack of dependable and accessible mass transportation critically impacts the ability of island residents to access health care, employment and effective participation in the benefits of ensuing military and economic expansions on our island. Residents that do not have access to a vehicle or cannot drive also experience severe restrictions to travel village to village to visit and support family and
 friends.

I Liheslaturan Guahan further finds that Public Law 26-76, which 3 abolished the Guam Mass Transit Authority, has not alleviated the lack of 4 accessible and dependable transportation options for students, seniors, and 5 non-career workers; while artificially depressing opportunities for alternative 6 tourism development at the village level for sustainable economic 7 development beyond the military expansion. The island's mass transit 8 deficiencies, coupled with ever-increasing fuel costs, significantly amplifies 9 the inflationary impact on every Guam household, business, and the mobility 10 of the island's workforce. 11

Since PL26-76 was enacted into law, the administration of Public Transportation has been the responsibility of a small, under-trained staff within the Department of Administration. *I Liheslatura* finds that despite the best efforts of the Department of Administration, a lack of a comprehensive transit strategy has restricted their ability to adequately address the growing transportation needs of our island.

The existing public transportation model is inadequate, wastes financial resources, and misspends human and natural resources, for little or no, return on investments. Existing mass transit funding provides increasingly expensive options for a minimum number of a static ridership level. A new model of transportation is required to deliver access to remote areas with unpaved roads and low ridership for inclusion in transportation programs on Guam, and the region.

I Liheslatura further finds, that the government must establish and ensure a village-based transportation system that is integrated into a core fixed-routes bus transit system. Additionally, it is found that Mayors should play a key role in establishing routes and transportation service needs for their villages and surrounding areas. Mayoral offices should operate dispatch of vehicles, customer service, and data & revenue collections and provide such data and collections to the Isla Transit Authority.

Therefore, it is the intent of I Liheslaturan Guahan to abolish the Guam 8 Mass Transit Authority, management, and structure, replacing it with a new 9 autonomous agency, the Aturidat Isla Transitu (Isla Transit Authority), whose 10 sole mission is to establish, and supervise, a village-based system of shared 11 rides – or public cars; a transportation model using 15-passenger vans which 12 13 shall be in addition to an integrated bus network that meets the needs of the businesses and workers of Guam; and doing so in a manner that contributes 14 to, and promotes, environmentally-friendly and low carbon footprint policies, 15 including prioritized zero-emission goals. 16

Section 2. Chapter 6 of Title 12 of the Guam Code Annotated is hereby
repealed and re-enacted, to read as follows:

Article 1. General Provisions

24 § 6101. Creation.

6	§ 6101. Creation.
7	There is hereby created the Aturidat Isla Transitu (Isla Transit
8	Authority) of Guam, a public corporation and the Setbisio Kareta
9	Pupbliku, a village-based Mass Transit Co-operative Association.
10	§ 6103. Definitions.
11	As used in this Chapter, unless otherwise indicated:
12	(a) Authority means the Aturidat Isla Transitu (Isla Transit Authority) or

14	(b) SKP and/or Co-operative refers to Setbisio Kareta Pupbliku

4 **§ 6104. Purposes.**

5 The purposes for which the Authority is created are to establish, 6 develop, regulate, promote and/or operate a public transportation 7 system within the territory of Guam together with incidental and related 8 facilities and services, including a village hub-based co-operative, using 9 zero-emission vehicles, vans, and mid-sized buses to provide adequate 10 public transportation for all persons residing in or visiting the territory 11 of Guam.

- 12 § 6105. Powers.
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The Authority may:

(a) Acquire, construct, reconstruct, purchase, better, extend, improve,
 operate and maintain facilities for the purpose of carrying out its
 mandate.

(b) Acquire by grant, purchase, gift, devise, lease, or permit in accordance with the provisions and subject to the limitations of laws of Guam including 5 GCA Chapter 5, and hold and use any real and personal property necessary, convenient or useful for the carrying out of any of its powers pursuant to the provisions of this Chapter, and to dispose of the same.

(c) To make and enter into contracts, leases, concession agreements and
 permits and to execute all instruments necessary or convenient in the

exercise of its powers, including without limitation, the purchase of
 liability and casualty insurance for Authority purposes, adopt a seal and
 sue or be sued in its own corporate name, and establish a village-based,
 non-profit co-operative, such as is defined in GCA18-13, § 13103.

(d) Employ agents and retain or contract for the services of qualified
consultants, specialists or experts, as individuals or as organizations, to
advise and assist the Authority and its employees, all of which may be
accomplished without regard to the portion of the Personnel Laws
relative to compensation.

(e) Impose, prescribe, revise, and collect fees for the purposes of
 carrying commercial advertisement on or around Authority property.

(f) Establish schedules and fares to control the operation of the
Authority and such schedules and fares may be altered or modified only
after public hearing on any proposed changes, said hearing to comply
with the provisions of the Administrative Adjudication Law and other
legal requirements of Guam.

(g) Adopt such rules and regulations, pursuant to the Administrative
Adjudication Law, as may be necessary for the exercise of powers and
performance of the duties conferred or imposed upon the Authority or
the Commission.

21 (h) Do any and all things necessary to exercise the above powers.

(i) Employ an attorney, enter into contract for legal services, or enter
 into contract with the Attorney General to address legal issues.

(j) Create, within 120-days after establishment of the agency and filling
the Executive Manager's position, an office within the Authority that will coordinate with DPW, the Federal Highway Administration regional office, and
the Federal Transit Administration the production of a long-range Guam
Transit Improvement Program (3-5 years) to include:

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(1) Creation of the *Setbisio Kareta Pupbliku* (SKP)

- 7 (2) Identification of local and Federal funding sources and
 8 programs to fulfill goals and objectives of the Guam Transit
 9 Improvement Program over the term of the program
- (3) Initiate and conclude within the first year of authorization
 the development and establishment of a Fuel (Gasoline) Cooperative for the exclusive supply and use of the Authority and all
 licensed and registered vehicles of the Government of Guam and
 its line and autonomous agencies.
- Funding requests from the Federal Transit administration 15 (4) Bus and Bus-Related Facilities Discretionary Grant Program 16 (5309, 5318) for financing capital projects to include the purchase 17 of buses for fleet and service expansion, bus maintenance and 18 administrative facilities (to be located in Dededo), transfer 19 facilities, acquisition of replacement vehicles, bus rebuilds, bus 20 21 preventive maintenance, passenger amenities such as passenger shelters, village hubs and transit parks at the Mayors' offices, and 22 bus stop signs, accessory and miscellaneous equipment such as 23

mobile radio units, supervisory vehicles, fare boxes, computers
 and shop and garage equipment.

3 (5) The creation of HOV (high occupancy vehicle) lanes or 4 exclusive right-of-ways for ITA and SKP vehicles during the 5 construction of new and expanded highways and roadways on 6 Guam, where feasible.

(k) Present to *I Liheslaturan Guahan* within 180 days a public briefing
outlining the status of the Transit Improvement Program and progress
with relations between federal and local agencies to identify and acquire
funds for the implementation of the Guam Transit Improvement
Program.

(1) It shall further establish and operate a complimentary system of bus
 operations (ITA bus routes) that will operate exclusively on major
 highways and routes, and be responsible for the dispatching of vehicles,
 publish schedules (electronic, online, and print) for such routes.

(m). Create within the Authority a Customer Service Office that will
establish an online publication and produce in print quarterly
newsletters that must include schedules, route maps, data pertaining to
the consumers of the mass transit services for each quarter. Such data
shall include, but not be limited to:

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(1) the amount of consumers utilizing the transit system and cooperative,

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- (2) the type of services used by consumers.

1	(n). Nothing contained in this Section, or by implication in this Chapter

19	(a) The Commission shall consist of nine (9) Commissioners: three (3)
20	shall be appointed by I Maga'lahen Guahan; six (6) shall be selected by
21	the Mayor's Council, with each zone represented by two (2)
22	Commissioners. The persons submitted for consideration by the
23	Mayor's Council shall be an incumbent Mayor or Vice-Mayor. All
24	Commissioners shall be selected with the advice and consent of the

Legislature. Each Commissioner shall serve a term of two (2) years from 1 the expiration of the term for which such Commissioner's predecessor 2 was appointed, and until a successor is appointed and qualified, or in 3 the case of a Commissioner appointed to a newly created membership 4 in the Commission, such Commissioner shall serve a term of two (2) 5 years from the date of initial appointment, and until a successor is 6 appointed and qualified. All vacancies occurring in the office of 7 Commissioner shall be filled by the Governor in the same manner as for 8 full-term appointments, but only for the unexpired term of the 9 Commissioner whose vacancy is being filled. 10

(b) Five (5) Commissioners shall constitute a quorum of the Commission
for the transaction of business. The Commission may adopt rules and
regulations governing the conduct of its affairs. It shall elect a chairman
and vice-chairman from among its members. It shall appoint a secretary
who shall maintain all records and minutes of the Commission.

(c) Each Commissioner shall receive the sum of One Hundred and Fifty 16 Dollars (\$150.00) for his/her attendance at any meeting of the 17 Commission, but such compensation shall not apply to more than two 18 meetings in any one calendar month. No Commissioner shall receive 19 any other compensation for work or duties associated with the 20 Authority and/or Commission, but shall be reimbursed for actual travel, 21 subsistence and out-of-pocket expenses incurred in the discharge of 22 his/her responsibilities, including authorized attendance at meetings 23 held away from Guam. 24

1 (d) No Commission member or officer may travel off-island for 2 meetings held away from Guam without the prior authorization of the 3 Commission and the consent of the Legislative Committee responsible 4 for oversight of the Authority.

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§ 6202. Executive Manager.

6 The Commission shall appoint an Executive Manager, who shall
7 be its chief executive officer.

The Executive Manager shall serve at the pleasure of the 8 (a) Commission for a non-consecutive term of five (5) years. 9 The Commission shall fix his/her compensation, with the advice and consent 10 of the Legislature. If the Executive Manager fails to implement or 11 12 execute the responsibilities of his/her duties, is indicted for malfeasance or any other criminal offense, or shall otherwise fail to comply with the 13 responsibilities established by the Commission for the function and role 14 of Executive Manager, that person shall be relieved of the position and 15 ineligible for any further employment at the Authority as an employee 16 or contractor. This shall hold true for all management level employees 17 of the Authority, or as otherwise outlined within this legislation. Any 18 costs incurred by the Commission to comply with or complete any of 19 the responsibilities herein outlined shall be the sole responsibility of the 20 Executive Manager, and all parties charged with the execution of such 21 duties as compiling and presentation of reports, inventories, etc., and 22 may be collected by all legal means available to the Commission. 23

The Commission shall utilize no less than three (3) governmental (b) 1 or quasi-governmental organizations of reasonable and comparable 2 market size to Guam and with a reasonable history of salary information 3 to establish proposed compensation packages for Authority executive 4 The use of comparative markets shall not management positions. 5 include agencies or organizations outside of the United States or its 6 The salaries for all executive level positions within the territories. 7 Authority shall be established with the advice and consent of I 8 Liheslaturan Guahan. 9

10 (c) The powers of the Executive Manager include:

11 (1) To enforce all rules and regulations of the Authority.

(2) To attend, unless excused by the Commission, all meetings of
the Commission and to submit reports on the affairs of the
Authority as required by the Commission.

(3) To keep the Commission advised on the needs of the Authority
and to approve demands for payment of obligations within the
purposes and amounts authorized by the Commission.

(4) To devote his/her entire time to the business of the Authority,
to select and appoint the employees of the Authority, except as
otherwise provided in this Chapter, and to plan, organize,
coordinate and control the services of such employees in the
exercise of the powers of the Authority under the general direction
of the Commission.

- (5) To perform such other and additional duties as the
 Commission may require.
- 3 § 6203. Personnel

(a) The Commission, pursuant to 4 GCA Chapter 4, shall establish rules
and regulations governing the selection, promotion, performance
evaluation, demotion, suspension, dismissal and other disciplinary
action for employees of the Authority.

8 (b) The Executive Manager shall be an unclassified employee. No person 9 employed by the Authority on a limited term contract shall be a 10 classified employee. All employees of the Authority and Co-operative 11 shall be considered non-classified employees.

- (c) Each employee of the Authority shall be eligible to become a member
 of the Government of Guam Retirement Fund pursuant to 4 GCA
 §8105(d).
- (d) Each employee of the Authority shall be eligible to participate in any
 government of Guam health and life insurance plan.

(e) The employer's contribution to the Government of Guam Retirement
Fund that is assessed by the Fund's Commission of Trustees for the
benefit of Authority employees who are members of the Fund shall be
paid by the Authority. The employer's contribution to the Worker's
Compensation Fund that is assessed by the Worker's Compensation
Commission for the benefit of Authority employees shall be paid by the
Authority.

(f) No persons with outstanding traffic violations, a criminal record or 1 prosecution of moving violations shall be considered for employment at 2 the Authority as a driver, or may be permitted to own a license or 3 membership in the Co-operative, or in any other manner be authorized 4 to operate or handle Authority vehicles or such transit equipment 5 insured by the Authority. No persons with a felony conviction, or 6 having been adjudicated, or in the process of adjudication for criminal 7 activities while in public service on Guam, the United States or its 8 territories shall qualify for the position of Executive Manger, Assistant 9 10 Executive Manager, or any other management position within the Cooperative or the Authority. 11

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§ 6204. Fondo Aturidàt Isla Transitu (Isla Transit Authority Fund).

The Commission shall adopt and maintain a system of accounting, 13 (a) which is in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles 14 applicable to transportation authorities. There is established a fund to be 15 known as the "Isla Transit Authority Fund" which the Authority shall 16 maintain separate and apart from other funds of the government of 17 Guam, and independent records and accounts shall be maintained in 18 connection therewith. All monies received by the Authority from 19 whatever source derived shall be deposited in the Isla Transit Authority 20 21 Fund. All expenditures, except as otherwise provided by law, shall be made from said Isla Transit Authority Fund. The Commission shall 22 establish the means by which to ensure an annual audit of the Authority 23 and SKP. 24

1 (b) It shall be the responsibility of the Executive Manager to ensure 2 that the Isla Transit Authority Fund is audited annually by an 3 independent certified public accountant or by the Office of the Public 4 Auditor and the report presented to the Commission. Failure to adhere 5 to this provision shall be cause for immediate dismissal from the 6 Executive Manager's position, subject to the vote of no less than five (5) 7 Commissioners.

The Commission shall make the annual audit in a report to the 8 (c)Governor and to the Legislature, which shall also include information 9 concerning the administration of the affairs of the Authority. It shall 10 present an annual report within one hundred (100) days after the end of 11 each fiscal year and, if requested by the Governor or the Legislature, 12 shall present special reports within thirty (30) days after the end of each 13 intervening quarter. The financial information presented in such reports 14 shall be in accordance with the system of accounts adopted by the 15 Commission and published in a newspaper of general circulation within 16 the territory of Guam. 17

18 §6205. Limited Liability.

(a) To the extent that any liability of the government of Guam or of the
Authority or of the Co-operative is covered by a policy or policies of
insurance, the Government waives the limitation of liability found in 5
GCA §6301; provided, that the Government shall not be liable in
damages for tort in any amount which exceeds the coverage of

insurance and the limitation of liability contained in \$6500.13 of the
 Government Code.

(b) All claims made against any policy of insurance purchased by the
Authority shall be made in accordance with the procedures and time
limitations set forth in the Government Claims Act, except that all
claims not in excess of the face amount of the policy shall be presented
to the Executive Manager of the Authority, who shall present the same
to the insurance carrier, carriers or to their designated agents for
processing.

10 (c) If a claim is in excess of the applicable insurance coverage, then the 11 Executive Manager of the Authority shall also present a copy of the 12 claim to the Attorney General, who shall then coordinate the claim as 13 between the Government and the insurance carriers, and who shall 14 represent the Government in the event of a dispute between the 15 Government and the insurance carriers. In the event of said dispute, the 16 Attorney for the Authority shall represent the interests of the Authority.

(d) Each policy of insurance written covering the Authority or its
interest shall contain a clause waiving any defense of sovereign
immunity, which may be raised against the payment of the claim by
carrier.

(e) The Executive Manager shall publish, in a newspaper of general
 circulation in Guam, within ten (10) days after the effective date of any
 policy of insurance purchased, a statement indicating the existence of

any such policy and a notice informing the public where claims may be filed."

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§ 6206. Transfer of Funds.

The total amount in the Public Transit Fund at the time of this act's effective date shall be transferred to the Isla Transit Authority Fund.

6 § 6207. Transfer of Records, Equipment, Designation as State Agency.

(a) Upon the effective date of this act, the Department of Administration
shall transfer possession of all books, records, papers, maps, plans,
documents, offices, equipment, supplies, money, funds, appropriations,
licenses, permits, agreements, contracts, claims, judgments, land, and
other property, real or personal, connected with the administration of,
or held for the benefit or use of, the former Guam Mass Transit
Authority to establish Isla Transit Authority.

(b) No less than ninety (90) days after the effective date of this act, the 14 Department of Administration shall account for the location, disposition 15 (where applicable), and condition of buses, vans, and other vehicles 16 used for transportation and service by the former GMTA by providing 17 the Commission and the Legislature with an inventory of such vehicles. 18 The Director of the Department of Administration, and his/her 19 designate, shall be held accountable for such inventory to the fullest 20 extent allowed by the law. Failure to comply with this provision may 21 result in a reduction of salary and other punitive measures as required 22 to recoup the costs incurred by the Commission and/or Legislature to 23 ascertain such documentation. 24

(c) For the purposes of receiving federal funding for the operations of a
 mass transit system, the designation of State Agency is hereby
 designated to be within the Isla Transit Authority.

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§ 6208. Appropriation.

5 The sum of five million, five hundred thousand dollars 6 (\$5,500,000) is hereby appropriated from the Guam Highway Fund to 7 the Isla Transit Authority Fund for the purpose of providing initial 8 funding for the Isla Transit Authority, office space, personnel, and the 9 establishment of the *Setbisio Kareta Pupbliku*, to be set-up and established 10 within one hundred (100) days after the authorization of the 11 Commission.

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§ 6209. Severability.

13 If any provision of this Law or its application to Any person or 14 circumstance is found to be invalid or contrary to existing law, such 15 invalidity shall not affect other provisions or applications of this Law 16 which can be given effect without the invalid provisions or application, 17 and to this end the provisions of this Law are severable.

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Article 3. Operations.

19 § 6301. Setbisio Kareta Pupbliku (SKP) Structure.

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§ 6301. Setbisio Kareta Pupbliku Structure.

(a) The Commission shall be seated within 100 days of enactment of
this legislation, and shall create the *Setbisio Kareta Pupbliku* (SKP)
establishing it as a means of linking neighborhoods within villages, and
village-to-village, by using 15-passenger vans. SKP shall be based
within the villages and come under the day-to-day operational purview
of the Mayors' offices upon establishment.

(b) The Commission shall divide the island into three (3) zones,
North, Central, and South. The three largest villages within each zone
shall qualify as hubs and be the sites where SKP vehicles shall be
stationed and quartered. Smaller villages will have no less than one (1)
15-passenger van committed to servicing their communities from the
closest hub.

14 (c) The Commission shall solicit bids and proposals for the 15 procurement of thirty (30) 15-passenger vans and forward such data to 16 the Chief Procurement Officer's office, with a copy to the pertinent 17 committee chair at *I Liheslaturan Guahan* to ensure that all vehicle specs 18 meet existing Guam laws relative to fuel economies and bid package 19 specifications.

(d) The Commission will be responsible for the recommendation and
 approval of all SKP and ITA transit vehicles. SKP and ITA may not
 acquire transit or service vehicles without the expressed prior without
 the written authorization of the Commission and Guam's Chief
 Procurement Officer. No vehicle purchase may be approved without

first providing to the office of the Chief Procurement Officer a complete
 life cycle cost-benefit analysis, which shall include projected fuel costs
 per unit, as well as projected maintenance and service costs.

The Authority shall develop a long-range plan to the feasibility of creating from SKP an owner-operated co-operative organization by 2014. Initial vehicle purchases – except the ADA-compliant ramp vans shall be turned over to the co-operative association at such time with no further obligation from the newly formed co-operative.

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§ 6302. Authority Structure.

The Commission shall be seated within 100 days of enactment of 10 (a) this legislation, and shall create Aturidat Isla Transitu (Isla Transit 11 Authority). The Commission shall within 180 days after authorization 12 submit for approval, with the advice and consent of the Guam 13 Legislature, and approval of the Governor, select a General Manager, 14 and the proposed Executive team for ITA, to include, but not be limited 15 to, Director of Operations, Special Assistant for Integrated Resources, 16 17 and Marketing and Communications Director.

(b) The General Manager of ITA shall be responsible for executive
management, and is personally and professionally accountable for
executive administration, general operations, governmental relations,
and fiduciary management of overall Authority responsibilities. The
General Manager supervises the Director of Operations, Director of
Marketing & Communications, Special Assistants and Executive and
Management personnel.

The Director of Operations shall establish and oversee two 1 (c) divisions of ITA; Fleet Services and Schedules and Routes. The Director 2 of Operations will propose within 180 days of authorization and filling 3 of this position a budget and personnel needs proposal to the 4 Commission and General Manager of ITA. The Director of Operations 5 6 and the Special Assistant for Integrated Resources will submit to the Guam Legislature, through the General Manager's office, a Bus Service 7 plan with a Core Fixed Route Network that is serviced on thirty- (30-) 8 and sixty- (60-) minute frequencies and/or headways. The Director of 9 Operations is authorized, with the consent of the General Manager, to 10 adjust frequency and headway for individual vehicles in order to meet 11 and develop consumer demand. The Authority shall establish a transfer 12 system and ridership incentive program at the launch of transit service 13 14 implementation by ITA.

15 (b) The Special Assistant for Integrated Resources shall coordinate within ITA Local and Federal efforts as much is as is feasible and 16 allowable by law, including but not limited to the Department of 17 Defense, Department of Energy, Department of Transportation, 18 Department of the Interior, the Federal Highway Authority, Department 19 of Public Works, and any all agencies, government and private offices 20 involved in the development and planning of mass transit, public 21 transportation, and policy on transportation and energy consumption 22 The Special Assistant shall make a quarterly report to the 23 Guam. General Manager, the Commission, and submit a copy to the Guam 24

Legislature and the Office of the Public Auditor without fail. Reports are due no more than forty-five (45) days after the end of the quarter, based on a fiscal calendar year. The Special Assistant shall be removed by the Commission for failing to comply with the reporting requirements twice within one fiscal calendar year.

The Director of Marketing and Communications shall, upon 6 (C) authorization and assuming the position, establish within 30 days a 7 department plan to include internet, information design, and 8 management structure. This office is responsible for the publication and 9 access of public information to the public through electronic, cyber, and 10 include schedules, 11 print mediums to routes, public policy communications, media access, and governmental relations and 12 requests. 13

ITA shall develop a plan within one hundred and eighty (180) 14 (d)15 days for implementing adequate mass transit service within twenty-four (24) months of approval from the Commission, and the advice and 16 consent of the Guam Legislature. The mass transit plan shall include 17 application of requests for Federal Transportation Administration 18 funding to include, but not limited to, 5309 and 5318 funds for the 19 20 acquisition of new vehicles and the construction of maintenance service 21 facilities for ITA and SKP vehicles.

(e) ITA will submit a plan to include a completely zero-emission fleet
 by 2015, using electric vehicles and fuel cell technology applications
 where and when feasible. ITA will eliminate all diesel fuel vehicles and

standard and/or large buses and replace them with midibus type
 vehicles, short buses and resort style buses.

(f) ITA may not acquire transit or service vehicles without the
expressed prior without the written authorization of the Commission
and Guam's Chief Procurement Officer. No vehicle purchase may be
approved without first providing to the office of the Chief Procurement
Officer a complete life cycle cost-benefit analysis, which shall include
projected fuel costs per unit, as well as projected maintenance and
service costs.

(g) ITA vehicles operate from 5 a.m. to 2 a.m., Sunday through
 Thursday and holidays; 24-hours on a modified schedule Fridays and
 Saturdays. SKP vehicles operate from 4 a.m. to midnight, but may
 changed as needed to develop and meet consumer demand.

14 (h) ITA shall be established as a public corporation.

15 § 6303. Personnel.

Each village Mayor's office shall be staffed with no less than two 16 (2) full-time Authority positions to co-ordinate and monitor SKP and 17 ITA schedules and compliance, provide for public information on 18 schedules and village routes. Village hubs will be provided with the 19 funding to provide for no less than four (4) Authority staff positions or 20 as may be needed to staff the office during hours of operations; 21 individual Mayor's offices may establish and be accountable for 22 establishing the working hours for assigned Authority positions. 23

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§ 6304. Equipment.

The Authority with the advice and consent of the Commission 2 (a) shall acquire for SKP, thirty (30) 15-passenger vans and no less than six 3 (6) ADA-compliant ramp vans, as available on Guam through local 4 businesses. Ten (10) shall be assigned to zones in the North and Central 5 portion of Guam; five (5) shall be assigned to the Southern zone. Five 6 vans shall be held as Reserve vehicles when regularly scheduled vans 7 are out of service. Reserve vans may not be assigned to any zone for a 8 period of more than 45 days. Vans that are permanently out of service 9 may be replaced by a reserve vehicle, which in turn must be replaced 10 within 4 days after being permanently assigned to a zone. 11

(b) As routes and loops are extended, new vehicles shall be purchased
to meet those demands. For every five (5) vans there shall be one (1)
van purchased and maintained as a reserve unit.

(c) The Authority must plan a fleet that will utilize only zero-emission
buses and be fully implemented by the year 2014. The Authority may
not purchase standard, articulated, or large-size diesel buses. Only midsize or midi-buses may be purchased for use on ITA routes. The
Authority shall phase out existing inventory and replace them with
zero-emission electric, midi-buses.

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§ 6305. Planning, Routes, Fares, and Schedules.

(a) Major activity centers within each village shall be mapped by the
Mayors of Guam and submitted to the Commission for use in finalizing
village routes, headways, and transfer points. This data shall also be

used for the establishment of a routes map that is to be made available
to the public through the offices of island Mayors (print), on all SKP and
ITA vehicles, as well as online. Route maps shall include shopping
centers, major employers, schools and colleges, government offices, and
hospitals and clinics.

6 Factors such as headways, running times, number of vehicles, (b)loops, and short turns shall be taken into consideration when planning 7 schedules and routes. SKP loops will be run no less than once per hour 8 per vehicle, except on Sunday and legal holidays. If route planning has 9 an option of extending either of two routes into a new subdivision after 10 the establishment of SKP charter routes, scheduling considerations shall 11 be the deciding factor regarding which of the routes should be extended. 12 All SKP loops and routes shall utilize transfers worth 50% cash 13 (c)value of the established one-way; these transfers may be used to connect 14 15 to other SKP or ITA vehicles in order to complete one-way travel. Transfers within a zone are valid only for return trips and may not be 16 17 used one week after issue.

(d) The Komision Aturidàt (Commission) shall establish a starting
fare base for all SKP and ITA routes at two-dollars (\$2.00) per ride; the
Commission may adjust from time to time, as is deemed feasible by the
Commission, or as requested by the General Manager of the Authority,
the prevailing fare rates for individual or entire routes and networks.
The Commission must hold a public hearing and publish intent to

- 1 increase or decrease any fare no less than three (3) times over a period of
- 2 ninety- (90-) days prior to such actions.
