AN ACT TO ADD A NEW §3218 TO CHAPTER 3, ARTICLE 2, TITLE 16 GUAM CODE ANNOTATED, RELATIVE TO THE PROHIBITION OF THE SALE OF TIRES AGED OVER SIX (6) YEARS, THE STATING OF THE DATE OF MANUFACTURE, AND THE MANDATORY POSTING OF THE DANGERS OF AGED TIRES AT THE POINT OF SALE.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF GUAM:

Section 1. Legislative Findings and Intent. I Liheslaturan Guahan finds 2 that a study conducted by Safety Research and Strategies Inc., shows that 3 tires, like any other rubber product, have a limited service life regardless of 4 tread depth and use. As tires age, the rubber components become harder and 5 less elastic and the potential for corrosion and oxidation of the internal steel 6 belts increases, even though there may be no external evidence of 7 deterioration. The dangers of "aged" tires is a little known problem outside of 8 the industry and one that is likely the cause of a significant number of tread 9

separation problems. "Aged" tires are often unsuspectingly put into service 1 after having served as a spare, stored in garages or warehouses, or simply 2 used on a vehicle that is infrequently driven. In many instances these tires 3 show no visible sign of deterioration, and absent any visible indicators, tires 4 with adequate tread depth are likely to be put into service regardless of age. I 5 Liheslaturan Guahan also finds that two major automobile manufacturers, Ford 6 and DaimlerChrysler, began recommending tire replacement after six years, 7 regardless of mileage or remaining tread depth. I Liheslaturan Guahan further 8 finds that a key study on this issue was conducted by the British Rubber 9 Manufacturers Association, which includes many of the same tire companies 10 that produce and sell tires in the United States, and according to the study, 11 association members strongly recommend that unused tires should not be put 12 into service if they are over six years old, and that all tires should be replaced 13 10 years from the date of their manufacture. 14

It is the intent of *I Liheslaturan Guahan* to increase driver awareness as to the dangers of aged tires that are being sold and used on Guam. It is also the intent of *I Liheslaturan Guahan* to mandate all wholesale and retail points of sale to specifically inform buyers of the dangers of aged tires, the dates of manufacture of all tires sold, and to prohibit the sale of tires that are older than six (6) years.

Section 2. A new §3218 is hereby added to Chapter 3, Article 2, 16 GCA to read as follows:

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"§3218. Tire Safety.

- (a) The sale of tires older than 6 (six) years, for use on vehicles operated on the highways and roadways of Guam, shall be prohibited.
- **(b)** All sales of tires shall include a written statement as to the date of manufacture of the tires sold.
- (c) All points of sale on Guam that vend tires shall post in a conspicuous location, in letters at least two (2) inches tall, a statement that indicates the dangers of aged tires. The statement shall be printed as follows:

"WARNING – AGED TIRES CAN FAIL IN USE, CAUSING LOSS OF VEHICLE CONTROL, AND PERSONAL INJURY. TIRES DETERIORATE WITH AGE, EVEN WITH SELDOM OR NO USE. ANY TIRE OLDER THAN SIX (6) YEARS, MAY NOT BE SOLD FOR USE ON VEHICLES OPERATED ON THE HIGHWAYS AND ROADWAYS OF GUAM."

- Section 3. Penalties. Violation of this section shall be a third degree felony.
 - **Section 4. Severability.** If any of the provisions of this Act or the application thereof to any person or circumstance is held invalid, such invalidity shall not affect any other provision or application of this Act which can be given effect without the invalid provision or application, and to this end the provisions of this Act are severable.
