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AN ACT RELATIVE TO THE ADOPTION OF THE PROPOSED RULES AND REGULATIONS FOR NON-EMERGENCY USE OF AMBULATORY SERVICE FOR STAND-BY SUPPORT; FOR CONDUCTING BUILDING INSPECTIONS AND FOR THE REVIEW OF BUILDING PLANS AND ISSUANCE OF PERMITS APPLICABLE TO THE PROPER COMPLIANCE AND ENFORCEMENT OF THE UNIFORM FIRE CODE BY THE GUAM FIRE DEPARTMENT; AND DIRECTING THE SPECIFIC USE OF THE REVENUES GENERATED FOR FUNDING TRAINING OF GUAM'S FIREFIGHTERS, THE PURCHASE OF ESSENTIAL EMERGENCY RESCUE AND LIFE SUPPORT EQUIPMENT, AND PROCURING MEDICAL SUPPLIES.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF GUAM:

Section 1. Legislative Findings and Intent.

I Liheslaturan Guahan finds that the Guam Fire Department for more 3 than a decade has been in the process of pursuing the adoption of its 4 proposed rules and regulations which will provide guidelines and establish 5 service fees for the use of its non-emergency ambulance, building 6 inspection, and fire prevention services. The schedule of fees and fines that 7 will be established through the passage of the rules and regulations would 8 be applicable to the provision of non-emergency service assistance, and 9 would not apply to the regular emergency life-saving and fire-prevention 10

services provided by the Guam Fire Department. Revenues generated as a result of the provision of these non-emergency-related services to the community will be allocated to the Guam Fire Department for the express purposes of procuring necessary supplies, equipment, and materials for the department's firefighters.

I Liheslaturan Guahan further finds that it is critical to ensure that the primary mission of the Guam Fire Department on providing necessary lifesaving and fire-fighting services continue as a public service to the island community.

Although efforts have been made to procure some firefighter equipment over the years, I Liheslaturan Guahan also finds that due to the financial limitations of the government of Guam the Guam Fire Department has not received sufficient necessary funds for the purchase of much-needed firefighting and life-saving equipment and supplies to properly equip every uniformed firefighter with the tools and supplies necessary to effectively carry out their critical services for the people of Guam. The eventual adoption of segments of the Guam Fire Department's rules and regulations would allow for the deposit of necessary fees and fines into the "Fire, Life and Medical Emergency Fund (FLAME)" that would be applied directly toward the procurement of much-needed materials, supplies and equipment for Guam's firefighters. Any additional equipment and supplies for the uniformed firefighters would certainly reinforce the firefighters' ability to save lives, to include their own.

Therefore, it is the intent of I Liheslaturan Guahan to insure the timely adoption of relevant portions of the rules and regulations proposed

by the Guam Fire Department and enable the department to further concentrate on its primary mission of providing life-saving emergency and fire protection services; and continuing its efforts to extend its non-emergency support to the community at a nominal fee. Any revenues generated from the application of these non-emergency fees will be re-invested into the Guam Fire Department to better equip its firefighters with necessary firefighting and life-saving equipment and supplies, thus enhancing the Department's ability to provide the best possible service to the people of Guam.

Section 2. Guam Fire Department Rules and Regulations.

The following provisions on the Rules and Regulations for the Guam Fire Department are hereby adopted to read as follows:

"(a) Guam Fire Department Rules and Regulations.

\$72106 of Title 10, Guam Code Annotated, authorizes the Guam Fire Department to promulgate rules or regulations for a schedule of fees for (1) non-emergency use of an ambulance primarily for transportation, (2) conducting building inspections, reviewing building plans, and (3) issuance of permits. Section 73112 of Title 10, Guam Code Annotated, authorizes the Guam Fire Department to promulgate rules setting forth grace periods within which parties in violation of the Uniform Fire Code shall bring their premises up to code.

In order to keep within the spirit of Public Law 22-51, requiring the department, agencies, and instrumentalities of the government of Guam to "periodically review all fees which are charged by the actual cost of delivering such services," the fees contained in Subsection (c) of this

(b) Approval of fees for services provided by the Guam Fire Department. The following rules and regulations establishing the fees for the services listed below are hereby approved:

"GUAM FIRE DEPARTMENT RULES AND REGULATIONS

ARTICLE I

AMBULANCE SERVICES (NON-EMERGENCY)

CHAPTER 1 - GENERAL PROVISIONS

- A. SCOPE. To establish the Guam Fire Department's policy, rules and regulations, and fee Schedule for the non-emergency use of Ambulance Services.
- **B. DEFINITION.** For the purpose of this Chapter, the following definitions apply:
 - 1. Ambulance Services is the use or temporary deployment of the department's ambulance or its attending E.M.T. or its attending E.M.T. personnel to treat or transport sick or injured persons, ambulatory or non-ambulatory, to or from a medical facility; or remain on alert status at events, concerts, games, races, promotions, functions, or activities requiring the same presence.
 - **2.** *Non-emergency Service* is that which does not fall under the definition of "Emergency Service" as defined below by the American College of Emergency Physicians.

The following examples would demonstrate the need for urgent or unscheduled medical care in the prudent layperson's opinion based on an average knowledge of medicine and health. This list is not intended to be all encompassing for all medical conditions or situations that may arise and should be used only to conceptually embrace of an unlimited number of medical abnormalities that could constitute an emergent situation based on the person's current physical or mental condition.

Examples of these services (Emergency Services) would include the following:

Evaluation or management of:

· Acute or Significant pain.

- · Any trauma (less than 72 hours from time of incident) and/or complications of trauma (regardless of time).
- · Acute infection or sepsis.
- · Shock or impending shock.
- · Obstetrical crisis and/or labor
- · Bleeding or threats of hemorrhage.
 - · Any condition resulting in admission of the patient to a hospital or nursing home within 24 hours.
 - · Suspected abuse or neglect of any person could result in temporary or permanent physical or psychological harm.
 - · Any illness or injury that would cause loss or impairment of the following systems: integumentary, musculoskeletal, HEENT,

- respiratory, gastrointestinal, genitourinary, nervous, or cardiovascular.
 - · Congenital defects or abnormalities in an infant.
 - · A patient suspected to be suffering from a mental illness and/or posing an apparent danger to the safety of himself, herself and others.
 - · Any Acute or significant symptom(s) that might indicate a condition that constitutes a threat to the patient's or family's physical or psychological well-being requiring prompt medical attention preventing possible deterioration, disability or death.

C. SCHEDULING, STAND-BY SERVICES.

- 1. Persons requesting for an ambulance stand-by Service must call the E.M.S./Rescue Bureau Office at least two weeks (14 days) in advance. The following information must be provided:
- a. Name of person requesting.

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- **b.** Type of Activity being conducted.
- **c.** Location of "Stand-By Service."
- **d.** Time and duration of request.
- **e.** Name of organization requesting.
- f. Name of contact person and telephone number.
- **g.** Complete mailing address.
- 2. The caller requesting the service will be given a Stand-By Service Request Number which will be used for future reference.

- 3. The Guam Fire Department will contact the person requesting the Stand-By Service at least one week or seven (7) days prior to the activity date for confirmation.
- 4. Stand-By Services may be cancelled by calling the E.M.S./Rescue Bureau at least twenty-four (24) hours prior to the stand-by. If a service is not cancelled accordingly, the minimum first hour charge will be assessed.
- 5. Fees for Stand-By Services shall not be assessed for government sponsored activities, i.e. school sports, etc., unless the event is being coordinated and sponsored by an entity outside of the government of Guam and generating funds therein during the event while utilizing government facilities and premises.

See Chapter 2 of Article 1: Fee Schedule for Stand-By Services and Non-Emergency Patient Transport Services.

D. FEES, "STAND-BY SERVICES."

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- 1. A minimum one (1) hour fee will be charged for all Stand-By Services. After the first hour, hourly fees will be charged for each additional hour or each fifteen (15) minutes (one-fourth the hourly rate) portions thereof of ambulance Stand-By Services.
- 2. Fees will be charged from the time a unit arrives at a stand-by until the time the unit leaves the scene.
- 3. Adjustments will be made to the charges should G.F.D. be unable to meet the scheduled time or must remove a unit from a stand-by.
- 4. A Stand-by Service which is not cancelled prior to the required twenty-four (24) hour notice, will be billed for one (1) hour of service.

See Chapter 2 of Article 1: Fee Schedule for Stand-By Services and Non-Emergency Patient Transport Services.

E. GUAM FIRE DEPARTMENT'S RESPONSIBILITY.

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- 1. The Guam Fire Department's primary medical mission is to emergency patients. Therefore, no ambulance can be said to be dedicated to a Stand-By Service. The Guam Fire Department will do its best to have its unit arrive promptly and remain at the location for the time duration requested. If a unit must be pulled from a Stand-By Service to respond to an Emergency, the G.F.D. will do its best to replace that unit within fifteen (15) minutes. If this is not possible, appropriate adjustments will be made to the stand-by charges based on the time a unit returns to the scene.
- 2. The Guam Fire Department will schedule an ambulance for each Stand-By Service Requested, however, at the time of the service, if an ambulance is not immediately available because of an emergency, the department has the option to temporarily replace the unit with another patient transport. An ambulance will be placed at the scene as soon as possible upon availability.
- 2. Should an ambulance unit not be available at all for the entire duration of the Stand-By Service due to shortage of ambulances, other units manned by Emergency Medical Technicians such as Engine Companies and Rescue Units may be utilized for such Stand-By services.

F. COLLECTION OF FEES, NON-EMERGENCY AND OTHERS.

<u>1</u>. The Guam Fire Department shall prepare an invoice immediately upon the request for service and present it to the individual or organization requesting the service. Payment shall be requested prior to the provision of such services.

Should payment be received, an appropriate written receipt shall be rendered to the individual or organization representative requesting the service.

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The Fire Chief shall provide for a central location for the filing of any and all requests for the use of Guam Fire Department non-emergency services, whereupon payment can be received and properly accounted for at all times. Should there be any transaction activity for the day, a written accounting of all forms of payment(s) received shall be conducted prior to the conclusion of the day, and appropriate arrangements be made for immediate and daily rendering of such funds to the Department of Administration for deposit into the special fund.

Copies of all documents reflecting the request for services and the forms of payment shall be maintained by the Guam Fire Department.

- 2. Should payment not be received upon the rendering of such services, a copy of the invoice shall be mailed to the requesting organization or individual within five (5) days of the service provided. Payment shall be due no later than thirty (30) days of the statement date.
- <u>2.</u> All payment shall be remitted to the Treasurer of Guam, who shall deposit these collections in the Guam Fire Department's Capital Outlay Revolving Fund.
- <u>3.</u> Penalty charges shall be assessed on delinquent accounts. Subsequent reminder notices shall reflect such charges, which are due within fifteen (15) days of the date of the issuance.

G. FIRE SERVICES APPEAL.

Any person seeking relief from a decision, action or inaction of a member of the Guam Fire Department on matters concerning this article shall present, in writing, an appeal and recommended solution to the Fire Chief. The Fire Chief shall investigate the matter, and accordingly, determine the course of action. Written appeals require that the Fire Chief notify the appellant in writing of the Fire Chief's decision.

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CHAPTER 4 - ASSESSMENT AND COLLECTION OF FEES/FINES.

- 1. Payment. Permits may be obtained and fees paid at the One-Stop Permit Center. Any and all fines imposed shall be paid at the Traffic Violations Bureau of the Superior Court of Guam.
 - 2. To Schedule inspections contact GFD Fire Prevention Bureau
 - 3. Information to be provided by applicant. Please bring the following items:
 - a. Inspection reports. (if applicable)
 - b. Driver's License or an acceptable identification card.
- 4. Outstanding fees. The department shall implement necessary measures to collect on outstanding fees, to include the following:
 - a. Written notification to Business License Branch, Department of Revenue and Taxation.
 - b. Non-issuance of permit.
 - c. Refer matter for collection to the Office of the Attorney General.

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CHAPTER 5 - BUILDING AND FACILITY FIRE SAFETY INSPECTIONS.

The Guam Fire Department (GFD) shall implement reasonable measures necessary to ensure the proper and continuous compliance with fire code requirements, to include times other than permit renewal dates or notification of possible inspections; protect the integrity of the Fire Prevention Program; and address other citizen concerns or complaints.

The following provides the procedures for:

A. Inspections for Occupancy Clearance.

B. Inspections for New Permits.

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- C. Inspections for Permit Renewals
- D. Unannounced Inspections for Existing Permit Holders.
- 4 E. Unannounced Inspections for other regulations in the U.F.C.
- 5 First Inspection. The inspector shall conduct the inspection for code compliance. If
- 6 code compliance has not been achieved, except for new permit applicants, the
- 7 following may result: inspection fee assessed and/or a citation issued. Re-inspections
- shall be made until code compliance has been obtained, providing reasonable time,
- 9 dependent on the hazard and danger created by the violation and the complexity of
- the work to be done. In all cases, an inspection report shall be filled out and a copy
- given to the responsible person.
- 2 **Re-Inspection(s).** The inspector shall conduct the inspection for code compliance and
- assess a re-inspection fee. If code compliance has not been achieved, re-inspections
- 4 will be made after providing reasonable time, dependent on the hazard and danger
- 5 created by the violation and the complexity of the work to be done, until code
- compliance has been obtained. A citation may also be issued and/or the establishment
- 7 closed. In all cases, an inspection report shall be filled out and a copy given to the
- 8 responsible person.

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A. INSPECTIONS FOR OCCUPANCY CLEARANCE

- Inspections for Occupancy Clearance will be conducted after completion of
- construction of new or renovated buildings. This inspection is not considered a First
- 2 Inspection and does not include a permit fee. (See Fee Schedule for Permits). Fees for
- 3 inspections for Occupancy Clearance include Plan Review and inspections up to
- 4 issuance of Fire Safety Certificate. (See Fee Schedule for Occupancy Clearance on
- 5 Chapter 3).

The Uniform Fire Code authorizes the Fire Chief to issue "Conditional

² Clearance" for Occupancy Clearance. Conditional Clearances are granted with a

specified time frame given for applicant to come into full compliance with the Fire

Code. Inspections conducted upon full compliance of the code or expiration of

conditional clearance, whichever occurs first, will be assessed a re-inspection fee.

B. INSPECTIONS FOR NEW PERMITS.

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New permits must be preceded by an inspection for code compliance. There is no charge for this First Inspection, it is included in the permit fee which must be received by the G.F.D. at the One Stop Building Permit/Business Service Center, before a permit is issued. See Fee schedule for Permit.

If code compliance cannot be achieved during this inspection, the inspector shall schedule a re-inspection, providing reasonable time, dependant on the hazard and danger created by the violation and the complexity of the work to be done, until code compliance has been obtained. A fee will be charged for each re-inspection. See Fee Payment Schedule for Inspections.

C. INSPECTIONS FOR PERMIT RENEWALS.

All permit renewals must be preceded by an inspection for code compliance. If not in compliance, the inspector shall schedule a re-inspection, providing reasonable time, dependant on the hazard and danger created by the violation and the complexity of the work to be done, until code compliance has been obtained. A fee will be charged for each re-inspection. See Fee Payment Schedule for Inspections.

A citation may be issued for imminent life hazards and/or repeat violations within the past two (2) years. A citation normally will not be issued on the First Inspection. Citations for violations will generally be issued upon re-inspection(s).

5 Exception: Citations issued for violations which present imminent life hazards such as

trespassing in a closed area, smoking in closed or restricted areas, failure to obey the lawful orders of a fire inspector, faulty equipment or procedures, repeat violations, and violations of a similar nature will not require prior notice.

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There is no charge for the First Inspection, it is included in the permit fee, which must be received by the G.F.D. at the One Stop Building Permit/Business License Service Center before a permit is renewed. (See Fee Schedule for Permits).

In all cases, an inspection report shall be filled out and a copy given to the responsible person.

D. UNANNOUNCED INSPECTIONS FOR EXISTING PERMIT HOLDERS.

Unannounced inspections may be conducted for code compliance by any designated official of GFD on any building and premises, business, activity, engagement, or function regulated by the applicable code at reasonable times.

If not in compliance, the inspector shall schedule a re-inspection, providing reasonable time, dependent on the hazard and danger created by the violation and the complexity of the work to be done, until code compliance has been obtained. A fee will be charged for this inspection (only if a violation is noted) and each re-inspection. Citation may also be issued for imminent life hazards and/or repeat violations within the Past two (2) years.

Citations normally will not be issued on the First Inspection. Citations for violations will generally be issued upon re-inspection(s). EXEMPTION: Citations Issued for violations which present imminent life hazards such as trespassing in a closed area, smoking in closed or restricted areas, failure to obey the lawful orders of a fire inspector, faulty equipment or procedures, repeat violations, and violations of a similar nature shall not require prior notice.

In all cases, an inspection report shall be filled out and a copy given to the

responsible person.

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E. UNANNOUNCED INSPECTIONS FOR OTHERS REGULATED BY THE UFC.

Unannounced inspections may be conducted by any designated official of GFD on any building and premises, business, activity, engagement, or function regulated by the applicable code at all reasonable times.

If not in compliance, the inspector shall schedule a re-inspection after providing reasonable time, dependent on the hazard and danger created by the violation and the complexity of the work to be done, until code compliance has been obtained. A fee will be charged for this inspection (only if a violation is noted) and each re-inspection. Citation may also be issued for imminent life hazards and/or repeated violations within the past two (2) years.

Citations normally will not be issued on the First Inspection. Citations for violations will generally be issued upon re-inspection(s). EXCEPTIONS: Citation issued for violations which present imminent life hazards such as trespassing in a closed area, smoking in closed or restricted areas, failure to obey the lawful orders of a fire inspector, faulty equipment or procedures, repeat violations, and violations of a similar nature will not require prior notice.

In all cases, an inspection report shall be filled out and a copy given to the responsible person.

ARTICLE III

CHAPTER 1 – PERMISSIBLE TIMEFRAMES FOR COMPLIANCE WITH THE UNIFORM FIRE CODE.

Section §73112 of Title 10, Guam Code Annotated, authorizes the Guam Fire Department to promulgate rules setting forth permissible timeframes within which parties not in conformance with Uniform Fire Code shall bring their premises up to

- code. The following grace periods have been established within which existing buildings shall be brought to conformance with the Uniform Fire Code.
- A. Life-Safety Requirements for Existing Buildings, Other Than High Rise Structures.
 - Within 12 months after the owner of an existing building or facility, other than a high rise structure, has been notified of life-safety violations, plans for eventual compliance shall be submitted and approved by the Guam Fire Department, and within 18 months thereafter the work shall be completed or the building shall be vacated until made to conform.

B. Life-Safety Requirements for Existing High Rise Buildings.

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Plans and specifications requiring necessary alterations for compliance with the UFC shall be filed with the Fire Chief within 12 months of being notified of any life-safety violations. Should the provided timeframe for appropriate correction of no more than 18 months be physically impractical or pose an undue hardship, an extension of time for compliance may be granted beyond 18 months upon the submission of specific plans for complete resolution, and any extension shall be based upon the showing of good cause and subject to the filing of an acceptable systematic progressive plan of correction with the Chief.

9 C. Appeals on Uniform Fire Code Compliance Requirements.

Appeals on the determination and decisions of the Fire Chief in applying the provisions of this code may be made through a written appeal directly with the Board of Appeals as established by Sections 103.4. of the Uniform Fire Code.

Section 3. Application of Revenues Generated to Provide Direct Support for the Purchase of Necessary Firefighting Tools, Supplies, Life-Saving Medical Equipment, and for Required Firefighter Certification Training. Any funds generated through the enforcement and application of the provisions contained herein shall be deposited into the "Fire, Life and Medical Emergency Fund (FLAME) as established through §72106 of Chapter 72, Title 10, Guam Code Annotated, for the express purposes of funding the purchase of essential emergency rescue and firefighting vehicles, emergency life support and medical equipment, supplies and equipment necessary for the proper enforcement of fire-safety permits and the Uniform Fire Code, and training for uniformed firefighter personnel within the Guam Fire Department.

Section 4. Severability.

If any provision of this Law or its application to any person or circumstance is found to be invalid or contrary to law, such invalidity shall not affect other provisions or applications of this Law which can be given effect without the invalid provisions or application, and to this end the provisions of this Law are severable.
