AN ACT TO ESTABLISH THE ADMINISTRATIVE RULES AND REGULATIONS OF THE DEPARTMENT OF **PUBLIC** HEALTH & SOCIAL **SERVICES** RELATIVE TO THE GUAM FOOD CODE, UNDER A NEW ARTICLE 4A- GUAM **FOOD** CODE, CHAPTER 4- PUBLIC HEALTH AND SANITATION, DIVISION 1, TITLE 26, GUAM ADMINISTRATIVE **RULES PROVIDED AND** REGULATIONS, AS PURSUANT TO A NEW §23101.1 ADDED TO CHAPTER 23, PART 1, DIVISION 2, TITLE 10, GUAM CODE ANNOTATED.

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## BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF GUAM:

Section 1. Legislative Findings and Intent. *I Liheslaturan*Guåhan finds that the administrative rules and regulations for food service establishments and operations within the food service industry is in the public interest as such pertains to health and safety.

I Liheslaturan Guåhan finds that the proposed administrative rules and regulations pursuant to this Act establishing the Guam Food Code, as provided pursuant to Chapter 1, Division 1, Title 10, Guam Code Annotated, is appropriate and necessary. However, I Liheslaturan Guåhan finds that there is need for a clearer statutory policy mandate specifically authorizing the establishment of a Guam Food Code. This is accomplished by adding a new §23101.1 to Chapter 23, Part 1, Division 2, Title 10, Guam Code Annotated, mandating the Promulgation of Rules and Regulations

health by providing to consumers food that is safe, unadulterated, and honestly presented; as provided pursuant to Section 2 of this Act.

I Liheslaturan Guåhan takes due note that pursuant to the mandate of Executive Order 2000-20, the Department of Public Health and Social Services (DPHSS) has been coordinating the operations of the Guam Food Safety Task Force (GFSTF) since 2004 to promote food safety and to develop a comprehensive food safety plan with the assistance of the task force. The members of the GFSTF include representatives from the DPHSS. other local and federal regulatory agencies, Guam Legislature, healthcare community, food industry, social welfare organization, academia, and the military.

Further, E.O. 2000-20 outlined 8 missions of the GFSTF, and one of the missions required the task force to advise and recommend to the DPHSS the adoption and implementation of a food code. After several meetings, discussion, and reviews by the GFSTF, the initial draft of the Guam Food Code, crafted by the DPHSS, was adopted by the members in August 2006. This draft closely mirrored the 2001 Model Food Code, which was developed by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration. Over the next two years, DPHSS attempted to finance the Economic Impact Statement that was required of all proposed regulations seeking promulgation pursuant to the Administrative Adjudication Law (AAL).

In January 2008, at the request and encouragement of the GFSTF, DPHSS began revising and updating the draft Guam Food Code to reflect the 2005 Model Food Code. The final proposed Guam Food Code was finally completed in 2010; however, the Economic Impact Statement could still not be conducted due to financial constraints. As a result, a public hearing could not be pursued in accordance to the AAL.

During the May 19, 2010 Quarterly Meeting of the GFSTF, a motion was made and approved by the members to transmit the proposed Guam Food Code to the 30<sup>th</sup> Guam Legislature's Committee on Health & Human Services, which at the time had oversight of the DPHSS (and is also a member of the GFSTF representing the 30<sup>th</sup> Guam Legislature). The members sought to have the proposed Code adopted via legislation rather than wait for DPHSS to acquire the funding for the Economic Impact Statement. The proposed food code has now, once again, been submitted to the 31<sup>st</sup> Guam Legislature for consideration. 

Further, *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* takes due note that the Department of Public Health & Social Services, in spearheading the Guam Food Task Force in the development of the proposed guidelines addressed herein, made a good faith effort to be inclusive of the affected stakeholders in the food service industry. The proposed rules and regulations is a work product which has to great extent incorporated input from affected stakeholders in the industry.

It is the intent of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* to provide for the initial establishment of the administrative rules and regulations for Guam Food Code.

Further, so as to insure that the rules adopted pursuant to this Act remain pertinent to and consistent with the needs of the community, it is the intent of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* to provide an authorization and mandate for the Department of Public Health & Social Services to regularly review the rules adopted pursuant to this Act, and as appropriate promulgate amendments thereto pursuant to Article 3 - Rule Making Procedures, of Chapter 9, Title 5, Guam Code Annotated.

Section 2. A new §23101.1 is hereby added to Chapter 23, Part 1,

- 1 Division 2, Title 10, Guam Code Annotated, to read:
- 2 "§23010.1. Promulgation of Rules and Regulations Establishing
- 3 the Guam Food Code. The Director shall develop and promulgate rules
- 4 and regulations relative to establishing a Guam Food Code. The purpose of
- 5 the Guam Food Code shall be to safeguard public health and provide to
- 6 consumers food that is safe, unadulterated, and honestly presented. The
- 7 Code shall, at a minimum, establish definitions; sets standards for
- 8 management and personnel, food operations, and equipment and facilities;
- 9 and provides for food establishment plan review, permit issuance,
- inspection, employee restriction, and permit suspension."
- Section 3. Adoption of Rules. Notwithstanding any other provision
- of law, rule, regulation and Executive Order, the rules and regulations of the
- 13 Department of Public Health & Social Services for the Guam Food Code,
- 14 attached hereto and incorporated as **Exhibit "A"**, is hereby *adopted* by I
- 15 Mina'Trentai Na Liheslaturan Guåhan, and shall be codified under a new
- 16 Article 4A- Guam Food Code, of Chapter 4- Public Health and Sanitation,
- Division 1, Title 26, Guam Administrative Rules and Regulations.
- Section 4. Amendment of Rules. The Department of Public Health
- 8 Social Services shall, at a minimum of every five years, and pursuant to
- 20 Article 3- Rule Making Procedures, of Chapter 9, Title 5, Guam Code
- 21 Annotated, review and amend the administrative rules and regulations
- 22 adopted pursuant to Section 3 of this Act.
- Section 5. Severability. If any provision of this Act or its application
- 24 to any person or circumstance is found to be invalid or contrary to law, such
- 25 invalidity shall *not* affect other provisions or applications of this Act which
- 26 can be given effect without the invalid provisions or application, and to this

- 1 end the provisions of this Act are severable.
- Section 6. Effective Date. The administrative rules and regulations
- 3 adopted pursuant to Section 3 of this Act, and all other provisions of this
- 4 Act, shall become immediately effective upon enactment.
