AN ACT TO AMEND §66104.2 OF CHAPTER 66, TITLE 10, GUAM CODE ANNOTATED, RELATIVE THE **EMPLOYMENT OF CIVILIAN** TO **VOLUNTEER POLICE RESERVE OFFICERS.**

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF GUAM:

Section 1. Legislative Findings and Intent. I Liheslaturan Guåhan finds that P.L. 31-211, which was enacted in May 2012, recognized the important 3 role Civilian Volunteer Police Reserve ("CVPR") officers have in the 4 preservation of peace and order in our island community. CVPR officers meet 5 6 similar qualifications as police officers, and are provided training which 7 mirrors the standards for police officers. 8 I Liheslatura further finds that P.L. 31-211 authorized the Guam Police Department ("GPD") to employ CVPR officers on a temporary, full-time 9 status, should a critical need arise because of military deployment of regular, 10 full-time police officers. Given the personnel needs of GPD, I Liheslaturan 11 12 Guåhan finds the employment of CVPR officers critical to sustaining an 13 adequate police force level.

I Liheslaturan Guåhan finds, however, that GPD has an insufficient number of CVPR officers who have attained at least two thousand eighty (2,080) cumulative service hours and who are available to fulfill the agency's needs. And, according to GPD's volunteer service command, most CVPR officers that have accumulated two thousand eighty (2,080) service hours are full-time employees in the public and private sectors. GPD's volunteer service command has recently communicated this matter to the Chairman of the Committee on Public Safety, Law Enforcement and Judiciary, and has further recommended that an amendment be made to current statute relative to the required number of cumulative service hours.

It is, therefore, the intent of *I Lihelsatura* to adjust the number of cumulative service hours required of CVPR officers in order to be employed on a temporary, full-time basis, when a need arises due to military deployment of regular, full-time police officers. The adjustment from two thousand eighty (2,080) hours to five hundred (500) hours reflects the number of field/on-the-job training hours required of CVPR officers to complete, prior to being eligible to work solo. During the field/on-the-job training, CVPR officers remain under the close supervision and guidance of a full-time, experienced officer.

- **Section 2. Authorization for Full-Time CVPR Officers.** §66104.2 of Chapter 66, Title 10, Guam Code Annotated, is hereby *amended*, to read:
- 22 "§ 66104.2. Authorization for Full-Time CVPR Officers.

The Guam Police Department (GPD) may employ CVPR Officers on a temporary, full-time basis, if such Officers are active members and have attained at least two thousand eighty five hundred (2,080500) cumulative service hours, if a critical need arises because of military activation of police officers or absence due to a long-term disability status which has been certified by a medical doctor. The GPD may exercise this authority provided its authorized budget for personnel is not exceeded. The CVPR shall return to volunteer status pursuant to this Chapter when the incumbent returns from military service or long-term disability, or at the discretion of the Chief of Police. CVPR Officers may only serve as equivalent of Police Officer I and be compensated hourly only as a Police Officer I, Step I, and shall be eligible to receive sick leave, and be eligible for the Government of Guam Health Insurance Program, and shall not be eligible for a stipend as a Reserve Officer for the duration of their temporary employment by the Department."

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Section 3. Effective Date. This Act shall be effective upon enactment.
