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AN ACT TO AMEND §§91101, 91102, 91103, 91108 AND 91112, ALL OF CHAPTER 91 OF TITLE 10 GUAM CODE ANNOTATED, TO PROVIDE FOR PRIVACY AND FAMILY DIGNITY UPON ANTICIPATED DEATH OF A TERMINALLY-ILL PATIENT IN A SETTING OUTSIDE OF A HOSPITAL, TO BE KNOWN AS THE "STANLEY EDWARD PALACIOS CRUZ FAMILY COMPASSION ACT", IN MEMORY OF STANLEY'S UNTIMELY PASSING.

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- 8 Section 1. **Legislative Findings and Intent.** I Mina'Bente Nuebi Na 9 Liheslaturan Guåhan understands that the passing of a loved one is a difficult 10 private moment, which our government should intrude into only to the extent necessary to protect the public interest. On the occasion of the passing of the late 11 12 Stanley Edward Palacios Cruz, a minor with a terminal illness who was permitted 13 by his physician to enjoy his final days at home, law enforcement officials 14 performed their duties in a manner according to law and established procedure 15 which family members and responsible medical authorities nevertheless considered 16 unnecessarily intrusive.
 - Chapter 91 of Title 10 of the Guam Code Annotated, known as the "Natural Death Act", creates a fundamental right to control decisions related to one's own medical care, including the withholding or withdrawal of life-sustaining treatment in instances of terminal condition. Despite recent amendments to 10 GCA §3216, concerning Death Registration, and 10 GCA §12332, concerning Pronouncement of Death by a Registered Nurse, both of which anticipate deaths outside hospital settings, Guam law does not fully protect the privacy of patients and their families regardless of where a patient chooses to spend his final days. This Act seeks to protect Guam residents from unwarranted governmental intrusion when death occurs outside hospitals under conditions permitted by law.

1	Section 2. Snort Title. This Act shall be known as the "Stanley Eawara
2	Palacios Cruz Family Compassion Act of 2007."
3	Section 3. §91101(a) of Title 10 of the Guam Code Annotated is hereby
4	amended to read as follows:
5	"(a) The Legislature finds that an adult person has the fundamental
6	right to control the decisions relating to the rendering of his or her own
7	medical care, including the decision to have life-sustaining treatment
8	withheld or withdrawn in instances of a terminal condition or permanent
9	unconscious condition. This right extends to parents and other adults who
10	are legally responsible for the well-being of patients who are unmarried,
11	unemancipated minors."
12	Section 4. A new Paragraph (h) is hereby added to §91101 of Title 10 of
13	the Guam Code Annotated to read as follows:
14	"(h) The Legislature creates, recognizes and supports a patient's
15	right to remove himself from a hospital or other facility upon certification of
16	his anticipated death by his attending physician."
17	Section 5. A new term is added to §91102 of Title 10 of the Guam Code
18	Annotated, entitled "Definitions", to be inserted in alphabetical order with the
19	other items in said Section, and the definition of "Anticipated Death" in Title 10
20	GCA §12332(f), is also amended to read:
21	"Anticipated Death means a death caused by life-limiting illness,
22	infirmity, or disease, as certified by the attending physician that he discussed
23	a prognosis of terminal condition with the patient and the patient's family,
24	and that the patient consented to a 'No Resuscitation' order or has executed
25	a Declaration or an Advanced Directive to that effect."
26	Section 6. A new Subsection (d) is added to §91103 of Title 10 of the

Guam Code Annotated to read as follows:

"(d) A declaration may be made by parents or other adults who are legally responsible for a minor patient who is neither married nor emancipated."

- **Section 7.** §91108(a) of Title 10 of the Guam Code Annotated is hereby *amended* to read as follows:
- 6 "(a) A qualified patient may make decisions regarding life 7 sustaining treatment, including whether to stay in a hospital or healthcare 8 facility, as long as the patient is able to do so."
 - **Section 8.** §91112(i) of Title 10 of the Guam Code Annotated is hereby *amended* to read as follows:
 - "(i) A person shall be considered dead if, in the opinion of a physician, based on ordinary standards of current medical practice, the person has experienced irreversible cessation of spontaneous respiratory and circulatory function. Death occurs when the irreversible cessation of said functions first occurs. A registered nurse may pronounce death if the patient's anticipated death has been certified pursuant to Title 10 GCA §12332. Said certification *shall* be placed in the patient's medical and clinical records and *shall* remain valid for *no more than* one hundred eighty (180) days after its execution and must be renewed every one hundred eighty (180) days to remain valid."
 - **Section 9. Severability.** *If* any provision of this Act or its application to any person or circumstance is found to be invalid or contrary to law, such invalidity shall *not* affect other provisions or applications of this Act which can be given effect without the invalid provisions or application, and to this end the provisions of this Act are severable.
