AN ACT TO REPROGRAM AND APPROPRIATE FUNDS FOR VARIOUS PROGRAMS AND PROJECTS, AND OTHER PURPOSES, FOR FISCAL YEAR 2010.

### BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF GUAM:

- 2 Section 1. Legislative Statement and Intent.
- 3 I Liheslaturan Guåhan wishes to ensure that there is continuity of service in
- 4 the operations of the government of Guam in Fiscal Year 2010 and as such, seeks
- 5 to reprioritize appropriations of funding for various programs and projects to be
- 6 started and completed in FY 2010.

I Liheslaturan Guåhan finds that various health programs require additional funding to maintain the continuity of care for residents who are forced to travel to the Philippines or the United States to receive health care services not available on Guam. In order to maintain adequate services and continuity of care, additional funding is required.

Retirees that purchased Medicare insurance as part of a government of Guam program in Fiscal Year 2009 were *not* reimbursed due to a larger participation in the program than anticipated. These retirees depend on these reimbursements to fund future Medicare insurance premium payments. Should retirees drop out of this program due to problems with reimbursement, then the government of Guam health insurance premiums will rise much faster because by default the government of Guam health insurance will be designated the primary payer to claims currently paid by Medicare.

The Guam Memorial Hospital Authority (GMHA) continues to struggle financially due to providing care to residents without insurance or the ability to pay for services. Vendors continue to notify GMHA of delinquent payables, while some have suspended doing business with GMHA until payment is received. Therefore, *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* wishes to supplement Fiscal Year 2010 appropriations to assist GMHA operations.

I Liheslaturan Guåhan further finds that sections of Public Law 30-55 require reprioritization or adjustments due to information received after its enactment. The changes required in Public Law 30-55 will allow prior year obligation payments; improve the flexibility and ability of Mayors to provide grass cutting services to the Department of Education; provide continued authority to access unexpended resources to repair and maintain the Guam Veterans Cemetery; provide financial expertise assistance to the Department of Education; clearly delineate the funding provided for additional employees for the I Famagu'on-ta

program; and provide resources for a nurse and medication to deliver care to additional clients of the Department of Youth Affairs, added after the start of the fiscal year.

I Liheslaturan Guåhan finds that sports and recreational facilities in the villages of Dededo, Agana Heights, Agat, Mangilao, Inarajan, Talofofo, Merizo, Tamuning and Piti require funding to repair various sports fields, gymnasiums and other facilities in order to provide safe venues for recreation for all residents of the island.

In addition to facilities required within the villages, a planned regional sports complex for southern residents is eligible for private matching grants to complete its development. Thus, in order to provide the same opportunities to practice and participate in sporting events as residents in the north, *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* wishes to continue to support youth programs by extending the existing tax credit matching program to complete development of facilities in the south.

I Liheslaturan Guåhan further finds that retirees are still due money from Rios v. Camacho, Superior Court No. SP0206-93. The recipients of the COLA class continue to be asked to wait for full payment of principal and interest due them. Government of Guam tax receipts and operational expenses continue to challenge its financial managers to identify a funding source to once and for all put to rest the years of injustice caused by denying COLA payments to retirees.

I Liheslaturan Guåhan wishes to identify funds to reduce any principal and interest still due to COLA awardees and to also identify funding to pay COLA awards for OPT OUT retirees that did not participate in Rios v. Camacho, Superior Court No. SP0206-93.

I Liheslaturan Guåhan further finds that the Guam Waterworks Authority (GWA) seeks a loan guarantee from the General Fund to provide funds for GWA's Moratorium Project, to fund certain reserve accounts so that GWA may issue an

1	additional One Hundred Eighteen Million Dollars (\$118,000,000) in bonds that		
2	will greatly improve the island's water and wastewater system. In order to further		
3	avoid penalties related to previous court orders, I Liheslaturan Guåhan finds that it		
4	is necessary to guarantee a short term loan authorized in §14235 of Article 2 of		
5	Chapter 14 of Title 12, Guam Code Annotated.		
6	Section 2. Short Title. This Act shall be referred to as the "Supplemental		
7	Budget Act of 2010".		
8	Section 3. A new Subsection (d) is added to Section 2 of Public Law 30-		
9	38:		
10	"(d) All unexpended and unencumbered funds shall fund village		
11	projects and other priorities:		
12	(1) One Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$100,000) to the		
13	Dededo Mayor's Office for:		
14	(A) repair of the Hal's Angels Football Field;		
15	(B) repair of other village sports and recreational facilities;		
16	and		
17	(C) maintenance of sports and recreational facilities.		
18	(2) Eighty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$85,000) to the Mayor's		
19	Office of Agana Heights for the purpose of making necessary repairs		
20	to the Agana Heights Gymnasium and Baseball Field.		
21	(3) Eighty Thousand Dollars (\$80,000) to the Agat Mayor's		
22	Office for the purpose of making necessary repairs to the Agat

(5) Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000) to the Inarajan Mayor's Office for the repair of the Inarajan sport facilities' electrical system and light fixtures at the Malojloj multi-purpose court, the Inarajan volleyball court and the Inarajan basketball court.

- (6) Seventy-Three Thousand Six Hundred Dollars (\$73,600) to the Mayor's Office of Talofofo to repair the lighting and electrical system of the Talofofo Baseball Field.
- (7) Twenty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000) to the Merizo Mayor's Office for the sole purpose of repairing restroom facilities and to conduct minor renovations to its Mayoral office and community center.
- (8) Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000) to the Tamuning Mayor's Office for the development, repair and maintenance of village sports and recreational facilities.
- (9) Twenty-Six Thousand Dollars (\$26,000) to the Office of the Mayor of Piti to repair the lighting at the Piti Baseball Field.
- (10) Any of the funds appropriated in Subsection (d) may be used to fund the installation of streetlights for the various village sports and recreational facilities as determined by the respective Mayors."
- **Section 4.** The sum of *Six Hundred Thousand Dollars* (\$600,000) is appropriated from the unreserved fund balance of the Healthy Futures Fund (HFF) to the Medical Referral Office for Contractual Services (Object Class 230).
- **Section 5.** The sum of Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$500,000) is appropriated from the unreserved fund balance of the Healthy Futures Fund (HFF) to the Government of Guam Retirement Fund for Medicare premium reimbursements for retirees living on-island and off-island for Fiscal Year 2009.

1 Any remaining balance from this appropriation shall be carried forward and 2 applied to future Fiscal Year Medicare premium reimbursements.

**Section 6.** The sum of *Five Hundred Thousand Dollars* (\$500,000) is appropriated from the unreserved fund balance of the Healthy Futures Fund (HFF) to the Guam Memorial Hospital Authority for any vendor payables due in excess of one hundred eighty days (180).

**Section 7.** The paragraphs preceding the table in Section 7 of Chapter VIII of Public Law 30-55 are hereby *amended* to read as follows:

"Section 7. Grass Cutting Services for GDOE Schools. Subject to approval and scheduling of the public school principals, the Mayors are responsible for the grass cutting up to eighteen (18) cuts every fiscal year of regular grounds of DOE schools in their respective districts where grass cutting is *not* already subject to an existing contract. Subject to approval of scheduling with the public school principals, the Mayor may contract with a private entity to provide the services authorized by this Section.

The sum of Four Hundred Seventy-four Thousand Seven Hundred Twenty Dollars (\$474,720) is appropriated from the General Fund to the Mayors Council of Guam Revolving Fund for the grass cutting of specified schools of the Department of Education below to be allocated as follows:"

**Section 8.** Section 10 of Chapter VIII of Public Law 30-55 is hereby *amended* to read as follows:

"Section 10. Continuing Appropriation to the Mayors Council. The unexpended balance of the funds appropriated to the Mayors Council for Fiscal Year 2009 *shall not* lapse and is available to the Mayors Council for obligations incurred in Fiscal Year 2009 and expenditures in Fiscal Year 2010."

**Section 9.** A new Section 11 of Chapter VIII of Public Law 30-55 is hereby *added* to read as follows:

"Section 11. Authorization to Reallocate Funds. Notwithstanding any other provision of Law, the Mayors Council of Guam (MCOG) is authorized to reallocate funds appropriated in Fiscal Year 2010 Miscellaneous (Object Category 290) into other non-personnel cost object categories within its Base Operational Appropriations and to the MCOG Central Cost Accounts administered by the Department of Administration and projects listed in Public Law 30-38:2(d), for the purpose of ensuring any shortfalls within other specified Object Categories are both funded and authorized for payment. The Executive Director of MCOG shall provide written notification to *I Maga'lahen Guåhan* and *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* within five (5) days of the reallocation of funds authorized herein, and shall specify the Object Categories, Cost Accounts, or projects to which funds were reallocated."

Section 10. Summary of Base Operational Appropriation, Object Categories REG SAL and BENEFITS in Subsection (k) of Chapter V of Public Law 30-55 is hereby *amended* to read as follows:

**Section 13.** A new Subsection (x)(4) of Section 1, Chapter V of Public Law 30-55 is hereby *added* to read as follows:

"(4) The sum of Forty-Thousand Dollars (\$40,000) is appropriated for the normal operations and maintenance of the Guam Veterans Cemetery pursuant to and in accordance with the August 2009 Department of Veterans Affairs National Cemetery Administration's Triennial Report."

1	Section 14. Section 8 of Chapter XIII of Public Law 30-55 is hereby
2	amended to read as follows:
3	"Section 8. Special Fund Transfer. Unless specified in this Act, I
4	Maga'lahen Guåhan is authorized to transfer to the General Fund any cash

"(C) The sum of One Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$100,000) is appropriated from the Indirect Cost Fund to the Bureau of Budget and Management Research for the payment of overtime for the training of Department of Education personnel at the Financial Services Division, and Personnel Services Division, specifically to address deficiencies in personnel management and the financial administration of all funds under the purview of the Department of Education, activity related to the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009, and any other operational costs."

# Section 17. Mandating the Reimbursement of COLA Payments Made in Fiscal Years 2007, 2008 and 2009.

In June 2009, the Government of Guam successfully sold \$246 Million Dollars of bonds, also known as Deficit Bonds, to pay for COLA obligations and *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* wishes to ensure the timely resolution of the payment of remaining unfunded court ordered COLA obligations.

I Liheslaturan Guåhan further finds there are seventy-two (72) retirees who were eligible to be part of the class action suit, Rios v. Camacho, Superior Court No. SP0206-93. These retirees who rendered the same services and worked the same number of years in loyal service to the people of Guam are excluded from any payments resulting from the settlement. These retirees believed that the government will treat them fairly and pay them what is due to them without having

to take the government to court. Some of these retirees have come forward expressing that the documents were legally technical and long and therefore confusing to them. It asked for a signature and return, and some OPT OUT retirees simply executed the document without full realization of its effects. In recognition of these factors and given the small number of retirees who opted out of the court case, and the reasons cited by these retirees, *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* wishes to exercise fairness and include these retirees as beneficiaries of COLA proceeds.

Furthermore, *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* finds that some autonomous agencies and public corporations were *not* included in the list of agencies which were required to reimburse the General Fund for the payment of the annual lump sum COLA by the General Fund to their respective retirees. Autonomous agencies and public corporations are independent component units of the government of Guam that are self-funded through operations. Each autonomous agency and public corporation, *except* the Guam Memorial Hospital Authority, has the capacity to fund the annual cost of living adjustments of its retired employees by identifying and implementing operational efficiencies.

I Liheslaturan Guåhan further finds that after the successful sale of deficit bonds and disbursement of the proceeds in June 2009, a balance of Seventeen Million One Hundred Sixty-one Thousand One Hundred Eighteen Dollars (\$17,161,118) of principal or interest is still owed to qualified retirees based on the judgment rendered in Rios v. Camacho, Superior Court No. SP0206-93, and principal continues to accrue interest at a rate of seven percent (7%).

Therefore, it is the intent of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* to mandate that the Government of Guam Retirement Fund (GGRF), the Guam Visitors Bureau (GVB), the Guam Economic Development Authority (GEDA), the University of Guam (UOG), the Guam Community College (GCC), the Guam Power Authority (GPA), the Guam Waterworks Authority (GWA) and the Port Authority of Guam

- 1 (PAG) reimburse the General Fund for COLA payments made in Fiscal Years
- 2 2007, 2008 and 2009 to fund the principal and interest still owed to eligible retirees
- 3 based on the following table:

Section 18. Mandate of Reimbursements. The GGRF has determined that the total amount of Fiscal Years 2007, 2008 and 2009 COLA payments issued to retirees by the General Fund on behalf of autonomous agencies *not* required to reimburse the General Fund is Four Million Eight Hundred Ninety-five Thousand Dollars (\$4,895,000).

- (a) The GGRF shall reimburse the General Fund for COLA payments made to retirees of the GGRF as follows:
  - (1) from Fiscal Year 2007, the amount of Twenty-eight Thousand Six Hundred Dollars (\$28,600);
- (b) The GVB shall reimburse the General Fund for COLA payments made to retirees of the GVB as follows:
  - (1) from Fiscal Year 2007, the amount of Eight Thousand Eight Hundred Dollars (\$8,800);

Any autonomous agencies or public corporations mandated in this Section that have already reimbursed or already paid COLA for any amounts in the specified fiscal years are *not* required to repay said amount.

Any remaining COLA reimbursement mandated in this Section due from the UOG and GCC after the offset of monies due them from the General Fund for Fiscal Year 2009 and prior shall not be required.

The Government of Guam Retirement Fund and the Department of Administration *shall* prepare an official report *no later than* thirty (30) days of enactment of this Act that details the funding source of payments to autonomous agency and public corporation retirees during Fiscal Years 2007, 2008 and 2009.

### Section 19. Inclusion of Retirees in COLA Payments.

Notwithstanding any other provision of law, *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* hereby deems those retirees who initially opted out and are *not* covered by the settlement agreement in Rios v. Camacho, Superior Court No. SP0206-93, are eligible for payment under the same terms and conditions as the certified class. Interest *shall not* be accrued or paid for any payments due to OPT OUT retirees.

The GGRF *shall* determine the amount of award due to these OPT OUT retirees and reduce the amount by ten percent (10%) to promote parity by accounting for attorney fees awarded in Rios v. Camacho, Superior Court No. SP0206-93.

OPT OUT retirees who accept payment authorized in this Section *shall* irrevocably and unconditionally release and forever discharge the government of Guam from all charges, complaints, claims, demands, liabilities, obligations, actions and causes of action of any kind or nature, including for attorneys' fees, interest, expenses and costs actually occurred, that exist or have accrued, whether known or unknown, suspected or unsuspected, arising out of or relating to Rios v.

Camacho, Superior Court No. SP0206-93.

1 Section 20. Authorization to Use COLA balance. Upon the conclusion of 2 COLA case Rios v. Camacho, Superior Court No. SP0206-93, the GGRF 3 performed audits of the individual accounts, which resulted in payments due of 4 One Hundred Twenty-one Million Five Hundred Forty-three Thousand Eight 5 Hundred and Two Dollars (\$121,543,802) to the COLA class. The GGRF is 6 hereby authorized to use the balance of One Million Four Hundred Fifty-six Thousand One Hundred Ninety-eight Dollars (\$1,456,198) from appropriations 7 8 made in Public Laws 29-04, 29-19, 28-151 and 30-7, less COLA payments for 9 obligations listed in Section 22(a) of this Act.

Section 21. A total of Three Million One Hundred Sixty-nine Thousand One Hundred Dollars (\$3,169,100) from the reimbursements referred to in Section 18 of this Act is hereby appropriated as follows:

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- (a) Two Million Twenty-one Thousand Three Hundred Forty-seven Dollars (\$2,021,347) to claimants set forth in Title 5, Guam Code Annotated, Chapter 6, Article 4, §6404(d)(1) and (2);
- 24 (b) One Million One Hundred Forty-seven Thousand Seven
  25 Hundred Fifty-three Dollars (\$1,147,753) for retirees authorized by
  26 Section 19 of this Act.

(c) The Government of Guam Retirement Fund *shall not* disburse appropriations in this Section to COLA class awardee estates or OPT OUT Retiree estates, *except* pursuant to a court order for distribution or *unless* heirs are otherwise legally determined.

#### Section 22. COLA Disbursement Provisions.

- (a) The disbursement provisions for the authorization in Section 20 and appropriations in Section 21 are as follows: Principal or Interest from principal owed to claimants set forth in Title 5 Guam Code Annotated, Chapter 6, Article 4, §6404(d)(1) starting with the claimant with the lowest initial award from the class settlement, followed by the next lowest initial award and repeating this disbursement methodology until all the funds appropriated and authorized are exhausted.
- (b) Payments to retirees pursuant to in Section 19 *shall not exceed* Twenty Thousand Dollars (\$20,000) each from the appropriation in Section 21 of this Act. Notwithstanding 5 GCA 6404(d) or 5 GCA 22415 or prior laws authorizing COLA payments to retirees, current and future payments to OPT OUT retirees pursuant to Section 19 of this Act *shall not exceed* the total amounts listed for each retiree in the attached Exhibit "A" and amounts due *shall not* accrue interest.
- **Section 23.** §8137 (g) of Article 1, Chapter 8 of Title 4, Guam Code Annotated, is *amended* to read:
  - "(g) For Fiscal Year 2002, separately, the Guam Power Authority, the Guam Telephone Authority, the Guam Waterworks Authority, the A. B. Won Pat International Airport Authority, the Guam Economic Development Authority, the Guam Housing Corporation, the Government of Guam Retirement Fund, the Port Authority of Guam, and the Guam Visitors Bureau *shall* remit to the Government of Guam Retirement Fund an amount

equal to the number of employees which are retired from each entity multiplied by the amounts of: (1) Four Thousand Two Hundred Thirty-eight Dollars (\$4,238.00), known as the sum of the One Thousand Two Hundred Dollars (\$1,200.00), One Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$1,500.00), Seven Hundred Dollars (\$700.00) and Eight Hundred Thirty-eight Dollars (\$838.00) supplemental annuity benefits formerly contained in various General Appropriation Acts; and (2) One Thousand One Hundred Dollars (\$1,100.00), known as the latest cost of living adjustment. Each of the above listed entities shall also remit to the Government of Guam Retirement Fund the amounts necessary to defray the cost of Medicare premiums for Retirees of those agencies and their survivors who are eligible to receive social security income benefits and are required under the government of Guam group health insurance program to pay such premiums to continue to participate in such health insurance program, failing which they are excluded therefrom (to continue existing programs contained in the monthly payments).

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The remittances required herein *shall* be made in two (2) equal installments and shall be due on or before December 31st and March 31st, respectively. The Government of Guam Retirement Fund shall promulgate, continue and amend, if necessary, previous administrative procedures to ensure the proper submission, receipt and accounting of all sums remitted in conformance with this section."

**Section 24.** §23104(a)(1) of Chapter 23, Title 5, Guam Code Annotated, is *amended* to read as follows:

"§23104 (a)(1) If the employee is the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, a member of the Legislature, a Judge, or a Mayor or Vice-Mayor,

the rates are One Hundred Thirty Percent (130%) of the basic per diem rates;"

Section 25. Summary of Base Operational Appropriation, Object Categories REG SAL, BENEFITS, SUP. & MAT, Chapter III, Part III, Section 1 of P.L. 30-55 is hereby *amended* to read as follows:

**Section 26.** A new Section 6 of Chapter III, Part III of Public Law 30-55 is hereby *added* to read as follows:

"Section 6. Appropriations for New I Famagu'on-ta Wraparound Care Teams. Notwithstanding any other provisions of law, the sum of One Hundred Seventy-one Thousand Eight Hundred Sixty-two Dollars (\$171,862) is appropriated from the General Fund to the Department of Mental Health and Substance Abuse, Child and Adolescent Service Division to fund two (2) new I Famagu'on-ta Wraparound Care Teams, consisting of two (2) Care Coordinators; two (2) Psychiatric Social Workers II; two (2) Social Workers III; one (1) Community Program Aide II; one (1) Psychiatric Social Worker II; and one (1) Social Worker II.

**Section 27.** A new Subsection (r)(4) of Section 1, Chapter V of Public Law 30-55 is hereby *added* to read as follows:

"(4) Appropriations to the Department of Youth Affairs for Nurse and Medication. Notwithstanding any other provision of the law, the sum of One Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$150,000) is appropriated from the General Fund to the Department of Youth Affairs to fund medication for clients, and to fund one (1) Nurse qualified to dispense prescribed medication, or contracted nurse services to accomplish the same."

**Section 28.** A new Section 23 of Chapter XIII of Public Law 30-55 is hereby *added* to read as follows:

# "Section 23. Authorization to Make Payments of Prior Year Obligations.

Notwithstanding any other provision of law, all government of Guam agencies in Chapter V are authorized to utilize Fiscal Year 2010 appropriations to pay for prior year obligations. Payments of prior year obligations with Fiscal Year 2010 appropriations *shall only* be authorized from the same object class category as the prior year obligation. *I Maga'lahen Guåhan shall* submit a report to the Speaker of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* on the fifth (5<sup>th</sup>) day of every month detailing any payments of prior year obligations made pursuant to this Section. Said report *shall* enumerate the amount of each payment and funding source used to pay said obligations."

# Section 29. General Fund Guarantee for the Guam Waterworks Authority Loan.

The government of Guam hereby guarantees all payments due for a maximum ten (10) year term that would be due under the Thirty Million Dollar (\$30,000,000) credit facility issued by the Guam Economic Development Authority on behalf of the Guam Waterworks Authority (GWA) authorized under \$14235 of Article 2 of Chapter 14 of Title 12, Guam Code Annotated, for the purpose of securing a Thirty Million Dollar (\$30,000,000) loan to provide funds for the Moratorium Project, fund certain reserve accounts and other purposes

- 1 approved by the Consolidated Commission on Utilities. This Guarantee is a
- 2 general obligation of the government of Guam, subject to the full faith and credit
- 3 of the government of Guam. The Guarantor consents to any and all extension of
- 4 time and waiver or modification of obligations guarantied hereunder.
- 5 Section 30. GWA Default. In the event that the Guam Waterworks
- 6 Authority defaults on any payments for loans authorized under §14235 of Article 2
- 7 of Chapter 14 of Title 12, Guam Code Annotated, and the Government of Guam by
- 8 virtue of its Loan Guarantee in Section 29 of this Act pays any principal or interest
- 9 toward said loan, the following provisions *shall* apply:
- 10 (a) The Guam Waterworks Authority *shall* repay the General Fund
- the full value of any payments made plus annual interest at a rate which is
- three percent (3%) above the existing Bank Note rate and a default fee equal
- to an additional five percent (5%) of each defaulted amount.
- 14 (b) The obligation will continue to be subordinate to GWA's 2005
- 15 Series Bond Indenture.
- Section 31. Refunding of Loan. Any outstanding balance of the loan
- 17 authorized in §14235 of Article 2 of Chapter 14 of Title 12, Guam Code
- 18 Annotated, and obligations incurred under provisions in Section 30 of this Act
- 19 shall be refunded or repaid as part of the next Water and Wastewater System
- 20 Revenue Bond issue for the next series of GWA capital improvement projects after
- 21 September 30, 2015. The General Fund guarantee authorized in Section 29 of this
- 22 Act shall end upon retirement of the loan authorized in §14235 of Article 2 of
- 23 Chapter 14 of Title 12, Guam Code Annotated.
- Section 32. A new Subsection (o)(4) of Section 1, Chapter V of Public Law
- 25 30-55 is hereby *added* to read as follows:
- 26 "(4) Department of Corrections Collections. The Department of
- 27 Corrections is authorized for its Fiscal Year 2010 operations to expend *up to*

the level of revenues collected for the Corrections Revolving Fund in Fiscal Year 2010 for overtime and special pay."

Section 33. Severability. If any provisions of this Act or the application thereof to any person or circumstance is held invalid, such invalidity shall not affect any other provision or application of this Act which can be given effect

without the invalid provision or application, and to this end the provisions of this

7 Act are severable.
