Relative to petitioning the United States Congress to pass H.R. 1490 and S. 791, which will *amend* the Radiation Exposure Compensation Act of 1990 to include Guam, and to improve and increase compensation for those affected by ionizing radiation.

BE IT RESOLVED BY I MINA'TRENTAL UNU NA LIHESLATURAN

- 2 GUÅHAN:
- 3 WHEREAS, the United States Government and the Atomic Energy
- 4 Commission conducted nuclear tests in the South Pacific from 1946 to 1962; and

1 WHEREAS, the Atomic Energy Commission detonated sixty-seven (67) 2 nuclear devices, with a total yield of one hundred eight thousand four hundred ninety-3 two point two (108,492.2) kilotons in or around the Marshall Islands; and 4 WHEREAS, no less than ten (10) of those detonations yielded between five (5) 5 to ten (10) megatons of radioactive material from the center of the explosion to the height of between twelve (12) to fifty-five (55) miles into the jet-stream; and 6 7 WHEREAS, on October 31, 1952 (GMT), Operation Ivy was conducted on 8 Elugelab Island ("Flora") in the Enewetak Atoll, in which the first true thermonuclear 9 H-bomb (a 10.4 megaton device) code named Mike was detonated, destroying the 10 entire island leaving behind a six thousand two hundred forty (6240) foot across and 11 one hundred sixty-four (164) foot deep crater in its stead; and WHEREAS, in ninety (90) seconds the mushroom cloud climbed to fifty-seven 12 thousand (57,000) feet into the atmosphere, and within thirty (30) minutes had 13 stretched sixty (60) miles in diameter, with the base of the mushroom head joining the 14 15 stem at forty-five thousand (45,000) feet; and WHEREAS, Guam is located approximately one thousand two hundred (1,200) 16 17 miles directly west of the test sites; and 18 WHEREAS, the jet-stream travels generally westward from the Marshall 19 Islands; and WHEREAS, radioactive material as fine as dust particles drop onto land 20

WHEREAS, radioactive particles have led to increased health and environmental problems in such areas within the jet-stream path; and

surfaces and enters the food and water supplies, which is consumed by local

WHEREAS, Charles Bert Schreiber, Lt., USN-Ret., in his sworn testimony regarding the fallout of the first hydrogen bomb tests of 1952, stated that Geiger

- 1 readings indicated significant radiation found its way to Guam from the detonation of
- 2 Ivy Mike; and
- WHEREAS, the National Research Council Committee's analytical findings as
- 4 noted in page 328 of their report corroborates Lt. Schreiber's testimony; and
- 5 WHEREAS, reports from the United States Navy indicated full knowledge of
- 6 the situation and failed to warn the local population; and
- WHEREAS, ships present during the nuclear testing were decontaminated in
- 8 Guam harbors with acidic detergents, and the runoff from the operations went directly
- 9 in the local fishing and reef environments; and
- 10 WHEREAS, on October 15, 1990, former President George H. Bush signed
- 11 into law H.R. 2372 (Public Law 101-426), relative to the "Radiation Exposure
- 12 Compensation Act" (RECA); and
- WHEREAS, the law covered those who were affected by nuclear fallout during
- 14 atmospheric testings in Nevada and the Marshall Islands; and
- 15 WHEREAS, RECA established the Radiation Exposure Compensation
- Program (RECP) with the Civil Division of the Department of Justice to administer its
- 17 responsibilities under the Act; and
- 18 WHEREAS, a trust fund was instituted and One Hundred Million Dollars
- 19 (\$100,000,000) was appropriated for claim compensations of persons meeting a
- 20 specific health criteria; and
- WHEREAS, in April 1992, RECP began processing claims; and
- WHEREAS, on July 10, 2000, an amendment to RECA broadened the scope of
- 23 eligibility for benefit coverage to include new victim categories and modify the
- 24 eligibility criteria for compensation; and
- WHEREAS, the amendment set forth to extend the time period for
- 26 consideration and compensation, and include other individuals related to nuclear

- 1 exposure, such as uranium miners, uranium millers, ore transporters, "downwinders,"
- 2 and onsite participants; and
- 3 WHEREAS, according to the Department of Justice and in accordance with
- 4 Code of Federal Regulation Title 28, part 78 Claims under the Radiation Exposure
- 5 Compensation Act, Subpart E-Eligibility Criteria for Claims by Onsite participants,
- 6 Guam meets the eligibility criteria from the wash down of military vessels/aircraft
- 7 from the nuclear testings conducted at the Pacific Proving Grounds Marshall Islands;
- 8 and
- 9 WHEREAS, after a meeting in 2004 between Guam leaders, Ms. Dianne
- 10 Spellberg, Assistant Director for Civil Division, RECP, and Dr. Evan B. Douple,
- 11 Director of the Board on Radiation Effects Research Committee, it was determined
- that Guam was eligible for onsite participants and "downwinders"; and
- WHEREAS, that meeting resulted in the submission of a statutory amendment
- 14 by Congresswoman Madeleine Z. Bordallo to the U.S. Congress to amend Title
- 15 28CFR79, Subpart E, Section 79.40 in order to include the population of Guam;
- WHEREAS, Ms. Isaf Al-Nabulsi PhD., Senior Study Director of the Board on
- 17 Radiation Effects Research (BRER) invited W. Chris Perez M.D., Dr. Wesley
- 18 Youngberg MPH, Mr. Robert N. Celestial, and Delegate Madeleine Z. Bordallo to
- 19 attend a committee hearing in Washington, D.C.; and
- WHEREAS, a Guam delegation, composed of Delegate Bordallo, Senator
- 21 Carmen Fernandez and Mr. Robert Celestial, presented oral testimony and submitted
- documented evidence before the Committee to Assess the Scientific Information for
- 23 the Radiation Exposure Screening and Education Program, under the auspices meeting
- of the National Research Council and mandated by Congress; and
- WHEREAS, I Liheslaturan Guåhan had transmitted Resolution No. 73 (EC) in
- 26 2005, Resolution No. 5 (EC) in 2007, and Resolution No. 30-62 (COR) in 2009 to the

- 1 U.S. Congress and the President of the United States in support of the delegation's
- 2 findings and testimony to extend the inclusion of Guam in the RECP; and
- 3 WHEREAS, on April 12, 2011, Senator Tom Udall (NM) and Congressman
- 4 Ben Lujan (NM) introduced S. 791 and H.R. 1490, respectively, to amend the
- 5 "Radiation Exposure Compensation Act of 1990"; and
- 6 WHEREAS, the amendment will expand the "downwind" areas to include all
- 7 of Arizona, Nevada, New Mexico, Colorado, Idaho, Montana, and Utah for the
- 8 Nevada Test Site; New Mexico for the "Trinity" Test Site; and Guam for the Pacific
- 9 tests; and
- 10 WHEREAS, the amendment, if passed, would allow for all claimants equal
- 11 compensation of One Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$150,000), regardless if they
- are milers, miners, ore transporters, onsite participants or "downwinders"; and
- WHEREAS, the amendment to the Act, known as the "Radiation Exposure
- 14 Compensation Act Amendments of 2011", will extend the fund for nineteen (19) years
- 15 from 2011; now therefore, be it
- 16 **RESOLVED,** that *I Mina'Trentai Unu Na Liheslaturan Guåhan* (the 31st Guam
- 17 Legislature) does hereby, on behalf of the people of Guam, petition the United States
- 18 Congress to amend the "Radiation Exposure Compensation Act of 1990", Public Law
- 19 101-426, as amended by Public Law 101-510, 3139 (42 US.C. 2210) and Public Law
- 20 106-245, via the passage of H.R. 1490 and its companion bill, S. 791, which seeks to
- 21 increase and improve the compensation to Guam and the other states covered by the
- 22 Act; and be it further
- 23 **RESOLVED**, that the Speaker certify, and the Legislative Secretary attest to,
- 24 the adoption hereof, and that copies of the same be thereafter transmitted to the
- 25 Honorable Senator Patrick J. Leahy, Chairman, Committee on the Judiciary, United
- 26 States Senate; to the Honorable Senator Chuck Grassley, Ranking Member,
