Relative to recognizing and commending the individuals and organizations involved in the promotion and education outreach component of Bullying Prevention in Guam, most especially during the observance of the month of October 2011 as "National Bullying Prevention Month".

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COMMITTEE ON RULES OF I

2 MINA'TRENTAI UNU NA LIHESLATURAN GUÂHAN:

- 3 WHEREAS, communities across the country have celebrated National
- 4 Bullying Prevention Month during the month of October, since it was first introduced
- 5 in 2006 by the PACER Center, an organization dedicated to supporting the needs of
- 6 children; and
- WHEREAS, Guam seeks to educate and raise awareness of the bullying
- 8 prevention efforts being undertaken throughout the nation and in our community to

1 ensure our youth do not become part of the mainland statistics, provided by the

2 International Association of Chiefs of Police, which finds that sixty percent (60%) of

boys who are identified as bullies will be convicted of a crime by the time they are

twenty-four (24) years old; or will be among the forty percent (40%) of bullies who

5 have three (3) or more convictions by the same age; and

WHEREAS, according to the 2009 Indicators of School Crime and Safety, one third (1/3) of all students report having been bullied, and four percent (4%) admit to being cyberbullied. Further, twenty percent (20%) of teens say they have been made fun of by a bully; eighteen percent (18%) have had rumors or gossip spread about them; eleven percent (11%) were physically bullied, to include being shoved, tripped, or spat on; six percent (6%) were threatened; five percent (5%) were excluded from activities they wanted to participate in; four percent (4%) were coerced into something they did not want to do; and four percent (4%) had their personal belongings destroyed by bullies; and

WHEREAS, it has been shown that community involvement is critical in effectively reducing the occurrences of bullying, and in encouraging more acceptable behaviors from our children through the education and promotion of positive behavioral alternatives to bullying; and

WHEREAS, it has been recognized that each person in any community plays one (1) of three (3) roles with regards to bullying: being either the bully, the bullied, or the bystander who observes the act; and further recognizing that the bystander who does not become involved in discouraging bullying behavior enables the behavior to continue, and must be educated about the importance of their role in the prevention of bullying; and

WHEREAS, the Cyberbullying Research Center's 2009 statistics show that twenty (20) to twenty-five (25) percent of students have been victims of

1 cyberbullying, and that these students are more likely to suffer from low self esteem

and suicidal thoughts, which is consistent with the rising occurrence of cyberbullying

in Guam, and the rising number of suicides among young people who are similarly

4 bullied; and

WHEREAS, it is the intent of the Judiciary of Guam, the Guam Department of Education and the community to address bullying in Guam and to instill the necessary measures to ensure that all of Guam's students feel safe while attending school, and that they no longer live in fear of being ridiculed, of being physically or emotionally hurt, or of having their belongings damaged or destroyed by bullies; and

WHEREAS, members of the Judiciary of Guam, and the Department of Education, along with community partners and concerned citizens, have joined together to engage our youth in positive activities, and provide educational outreach programs aimed at reducing bullying on Guam; now therefore, be it

RESOLVED, that the Committee on Rules of *I Mina' Trentai Unu Na Liheslaturan Guåhan* does hereby, on behalf of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* and the people of Guam, recognize and commend the many individuals and organizations involved in the promotion and education outreach component of Bullying Prevention in Guam, which encourages the people of Guam to join in the effort to reduce bullying and harassment in our schools and community, and in recognition of the month of October 2011 as "National Bullying Prevention Month;" and be it further
