WHEREAS, the Association of Government Accountants (AGA) is a national association with the vision to serve as the premier association in advancing government accountability by supporting the careers and professional development of government finance professionals working in federal, state and local governments as well as the private sector and academia. Founded in 1950, AGA has a long history of being the thought leader for the government accountability profession. Through education,
research, publications, certification and conferences, AGA reaches
thousands of professionals and provides more than one hundred thousand
(100,000) continuing professional education (CPE) hours annually; and

5 WHEREAS, the AGA Guam Chapter was established in 1970 and has since been an active organization in our community. 6 Dr. Doreen Crisostomo, a University of Guam (UOG) accounting professor, has served 7 8 as part of the AGA for several years. She has held various positions, 9 including the Certified Government Financial Management (CGFM) Director for the Guam Chapter, the CGFM Coordinator for the Pacific Rim, 10 and, currently, the Webmaster for the Guam Chapter and the Regional Vice 11 12 President for the Pacific Rim; and

WHEREAS, Dr. Crisostomo received National Recognition for
Chapter CGFM Awards for program years 2009 and 2010; and the National
Regional Coordinator for Certification Award in program year 2011; and
WHEREAS, a few years ago, the AGA launched its Citizen-Centric
Government Reporting Initiative, intended to foster innovative means of

centric based reports detail government finances in a visually appealing,
clear and understandable four-page document. AGA believes that these
reports will make governments more accountable to their citizens, and will
help Americans become better educated and better able to participate in
government activities; and

6 WHEREAS, Dr. Crisostomo first introduced her students to the 7 Citizen-Centric Government Reporting Initiative in her Spring 2009 BA401 8 "Government Accounting" class. Dr. Crisostomo incorporated the initiative 9 into her syllabus to complement classroom learning and give her students 10 exposure to real-world experiences through interacting with our local 11 government agencies to compile various citizen-centric reports (CCR) for 12 each agency involved; and

WHEREAS, Dr. Crisostomo shared the students' work with her colleagues in the AGA Guam Chapter at a Chapter membership meeting; and ; with the support of the association, the students' projects were shared with various members of the 30th Guam Legislature. The legislature incorporated the CCR initiative as a matter of public policy through Bill No. 263-30 (COR) – "An Act Relative to Adopting the Association of

Government Accountants' "Citizen-Centric Government Reporting
Initiative" – which was then signed into law as Public Law No. 30-127 on
April 2, 2010; and

4 WHEREAS, in 2011 AGA National kicked-off their Fifth (5th) Annual 5 Case Challenge, inviting the Government best undergraduate 6 accounting/financial management/business students in the country to compete. Student teams were to collaboratively analyze and offer a written 7 8 response to a case centered on how a U.S. city government creates a citizen-9 centric report. All members of the three highest-scoring teams received a 10 scholarship to attend AGA's National Leadership Conference; and

WHEREAS, Dr. Crisostomo formed a four-member student team from 11 12 her Fall 2011 BA401 "Government Accounting" class. Under the guidance of their faculty advisor, Dr. Crisostomo, the team of Ms. Ruren Clemente, 13 Mr. Edward Brobesong, Ms. Amber Castro and Mr. Garry Yeoh entered into 14 15 the AGA National's competition to prepare a citizen-centric report for the city of Alexandria, Virginia, to include a paper that summarizes the criteria 16 and the justification the team used to decide what information to include 17 18 and exclude in the performance report; and
