I MINA' TRENTAI UNU NA LIHESLATURAN GUÅHAN 2012 (SECOND) Regular Session

Relative to voicing I Liheslaturan Guåhan's (The Guam Legislature's) continued support for the full implementation of Public Law 110-229; and requesting that the US Secretary of Homeland Security, the Honorable Janet Napolitano, provide for the issuance of a China Visa Waiver Program through her parole authority and the issuance of a broader final rule for the Marianas Visa Waiver Program.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COMMITTEE ON RULES OF I MINA' 1

TRENTAI UNU NA LIHESLATURAN GUÅHAN:

- WHEREAS, the US Congress passed Public Law 110-229, "The Marianas 3
- Visa Waiver Program" to sustain the growth of the region's tourism economy; and 4
- WHEREAS, Guam's tourism industry supports over 18,000 jobs and over 5
- thirty percent (30%) of Guam's economic base; and 6
- WHEREAS, Japanese visitors account for approximately seventy percent 7
- 8 (70%) of visitor travel to Guam; and
- WHEREAS, recent natural disasters in the form of a powerful earthquake, a 9
- massive tsunami, and the potential for widespread radiation exposure, have 10
- 11 continued to test the resilience and resolve of the Japanese people and their
- economy; and 12

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WHEREAS, these disasters have understandably impacted the willingness 1 of the Japanese economy and its people to engage in outbound recreational travel; 2 3 and WHEREAS, industry experts have estimated that Japanese visitor arrivals 4 to Guam may decrease by fifteen to thirty percent (15% - 30%) in the short-term; 5 and 6 WHEREAS, policy leaders in Guam and Washington must take strong, 7 proactive steps to avert an economic downturn; and 8 WHEREAS, in December of 2011, the Department of Homeland Security 9 granted visa parole authority for Russian visitors to come to Guam; and 10 WHEREAS, stakeholders spanning both our local community and the 11 federal government continue to work closely with agencies within the Obama 12 administration to realize a visa waiver program that will also allow for regularly 13 scheduled airlift from the People's Republic of China (PRC) to Guam; and 14 WHEREAS, absent a full China visa waiver for Guam, the use of parole 15 authority with a reduced notification period, linked with effective pre-screening of 16 17 PRC visitors may be a viable option; and WHEREAS, under a model currently used by the Australian government, 18 PRC visitors are required to undergo a pre-clearing process prior to departure, 19 potentially settling the national security issues; and 20 WHEREAS, Guam's inclusion in a China Visa Waiver program will 21 provide our island with the economic stability required for continued growth and 22 expansion of our current tourism market; and 23 WHEREAS, our neighbors in the CNMI have already been granted parole 24 authority, allowing the government of the Northern Marianas to presently receive 25

visitors from China; and

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WHEREAS, this parole authority was granted to provide the CNMI with a measure of economic stability in difficult financial times; and
WHEREAS, Guam must seek inclusion in a China Visa Waiver Program to access an estimated \$1.3 billion in tourism revenues; and

WHEREAS, the US Congress, through its original construction of the "Guam only Visa Waiver Program" recognized conditions unique to Guam; and

WHEREAS, in recognition of these unique conditions, Congress authorized the "broad application of the mainland program" when considering the criteria used to add countries to Guam's Visa waiver list; and

WHEREAS, a country under the former "Guam Only Visa Waiver Program" would be considered for addition to Guam's waiver program as long as that country had a US visa denial rate of 16.9% or lower; and

WHEREAS, the aforementioned allowance was not continued under the existing Marianas Visa Waiver Program and that shortcoming may be mitigated through the use of parole authority thereby allowing a China Waiver Program for Guam; and

WHEREAS, each military base in Guam has its own perimeter and internal security, thereby providing a protection to external threats, security is not limited to the Guam International Airport, but also at each military facility; and

WHEREAS, visitors from China and other areas that may be of concern to the Department of Homeland Security already have access to the island by way of regular visas and the temporary foreign worker program - U.S. employers are able to hire foreign workers on a temporary or permanent basis to fill jobs in United States or its jurisdictions as will be the case in support of the impending military buildup in Guam; and

WHEREAS, the Secretary of Homeland Security has granted the CNMI a China Russia Visa Waiver Program by parole authority, and in so doing, has

demonstrated that security concerns regarding the presence of Chinese or Russian 1 nationals on U.S. soil has already been adequately resolved; and 2 WHEREAS, the congressional intent of Public Law 110-229 must be fully 3 recognized as the existing mandate of the land and should therefore be fully 4 executed; now, therefore, be it 5 RESOLVED, that the Committee on Rules of I Mina' Trentai Unu Na 6 Liheslaturan Guåhan does hereby, on behalf of the people of Guam, petition the 7 Secretary of Homeland Security, the Honorable Janet Napolitano, to immediately 8 exercise her parole authority and permit Guam's inclusion in a China Visa Waiver 9 10 Program thereby recognizing the congressional intent of Public Law 110-229; and be it further 11 **RESOLVED**, that the Speaker and the Chairperson of the Committee on 12 Rules certify, and the Legislative Secretary attest to, the adoption hereof, and that 13 copies of the same be thereafter transmitted to the Honorable Janet Napolitano, the 14 US Secretary of Homeland Security; the Honorable Madeleine Z. Bordallo, 15 Member of Congress - Guam; to the Honorable Joe Wilson, Member of Congress -16 South Carolina; and to the Honorable Eddie B.
