Relative to expressing *I Liheslaturan Guåhan*'s unequivocal support for H.R. 4345, cited as the *National Community Service Improvement Act of 2015*, to extend participation eligibility in National Service Programs to citizens of the Federated States of Micronesia, the Republic of the Marshall Islands, and the Republic of Palau who are admitted to the United States under the terms of the applicable nation's Compact of Free Association with the United States, as introduced in the United States House of Representatives by the Honorable Congresswoman Madeleine Z. Bordallo of Guam, and co-sponsored by Congresswoman Tulsi Gabbard of Hawaii, and Congressman Gregorio Kilili C. Sablan of the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands.

1 BE IT RESOLVED BY I MINA'TRENTAI TRES NA LIHESLATURAN

2 **GUÅHAN:**

3 WHEREAS, a renewed focus on fostering volunteerism in America led to the

4 passage of the National and Community Service Act of 1990 (U.S. Public Law 101-

610, 101st U.S. Congress, November 16, 1990) and its succeeding amendment, the *National and Community Service Trust Act of 1993* (U.S. Public Law 103-82, 103rd
U.S. Congress, September 21, 1993), which established the Corporation for National
and Community Service (CNCS, or Corporation), a new independent federal agency
that carried the responsibility of mobilizing Americans into service through the
Corporation's core National Service Programs (NSPs): AmeriCorps, Senior Corps,
and the Social Innovation Fund; and

8 WHEREAS, by June 1995, AmeriCorps was established on Guam, operating 9 as a program under the Governor of Guam's Community Outreach-Federal 10 Programs Office (GCO-FPO). A decade later, Governor Felix P. Camacho issued 11 Executive Order No. 2005-22, which created a National and Community Service 12 Commission, known as the Serve Guam! Commission (SGC), allowing Guam to 13 more effectively operate national service programs, such as AmeriCorps, on the 14 island; and

WHEREAS, since the program's establishment on Guam, AmeriCorps has been connecting its volunteers with opportunities to give back to their local communities and the nation through a wide array of service projects. As a result, over one thousand two hundred (1,200) individuals on Guam have participated in AmeriCorps through SGC, collectively garnering over one and a half million service hours and Three Million Six Hundred Seventy Thousand Dollars (\$3,670,000) in Segal AmeriCorps Education Awards; and

WHEREAS, since the passage of the *Compact of Free Association Act of 1985* (U.S. Public Law 99-239, 99th U.S. Congress, January 14, 1986), citizens of the Freely Associated States (FAS), comprised of the Federated States of Micronesia, the Republic of the Marshall Islands, and the Republic of Palau, who have been admitted to the United States under the terms of the applicable nation's Compact of Free Association (COFA) with the United States, have been eligible to work and study in the United States as non-immigrants for an unlimited length of
time, thus essentially becoming a part of their host communities. As a result, COFA
participation in AmeriCorps programs on Guam has been strong since the inception
of SGC, dating back to 2009; and

5 WHEREAS, however, despite its legislative intent to revive national civic engagement, the National Community and Service Act of 1990 contains language in 6 7 Section 137(a)(5), 42 U.S.C. 12591(a)(5) that presently limits participation in NSPs, 8 stipulating that "an individual shall be considered a participant in a national service 9 program [...] if the individual [...] is a citizen or national of the United States or 10 lawful permanent resident of the United States." Further, under CNCS regulations 11 relative to eligibility requirements for an AmeriCorps member, an individual must be able to furnish documentation of citizenship or residency status listed under 45 12 13 C.F.R. 2522.200; and

14 WHEREAS, the admission of COFA non-immigrants into AmeriCorps 15 programs in Guam is in line with the purpose of the National and Community Service 16 Act of 1990 to renew the ethic of civic responsibility and the spirit of community 17 throughout the United States, and to expand educational opportunities by rewarding 18 individuals who participate in national service with an increased ability to pursue 19 higher education or job training. However, as a consequence of the federal law 20 relative to participation in the CNCS' NSPs, at least thirty-four (34) FAS participants 21 were unable to provide citizenship or immigration documentation that satisfies the 22 AmeriCorps citizenship requirement and were disqualified in 2015; and

WHEREAS, among the disqualified COFA non-immigrants were several active members of the Guam Academy Charter School's AmeriCorps *Guåhan* Academy Youth Project. Through their participation in the Guam Department of Education Extended Day (DEED) program, FAS members served as critical mentors to primary and secondary education (K-12) students, twenty-three percent (23%) of

which were from the Freely Associated States, helping children and youth of their 1 2 respective communities to attain academic achievement; and

3 WHEREAS, through the AmeriCorps program coordinated by the cultural 4 dance coalition Pa'a Taotao Tano' (A Way of Life of the People of the Land), FAS members actively promoted the preservation of Guam's cultural and historical 5 6 landscape through participation in a cultural arts program dedicated to educating K-7 12 students on indigenous cultural activities such as song, dance, chant, and 8 weaving. Moreover, these participants fostered environmental stewardship and 9 conservation efforts on Guam by restoring dilapidated public spaces and educating the community of environmentally conscious practices; and 10

11 WHEREAS, in the same manner, many crucial members of Sanctuary 12 Incorporated of Guam's (Sanctuary, Inc.) AmeriCorps Ayuda Para I Komunidåt 13 (Help for the Community) program were among the disqualified FAS participants. 14 In a coordinated effort involving Sanctuary, Inc.'s programs for runaway and 15 disadvantaged youth, these participants worked closely with Guam Department of 16 Education middle schools to assist underprivileged and at-risk youth with their 17 assignments, engage students in community service, and facilitate family 18 involvement. Furthermore, COFA participants of Sanctuary, Inc.'s AmeriCorps program received training in cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR), first aid, and the 19 20 Community Emergency Response Team (CERT), becoming critical members of the 21 first responder community and, consequently, strengthening Guam's disaster relief 22 and emergency management system; and

23 WHEREAS, through JusticeCorps, a division of AmeriCorps that works to 24 ensure equal access to the legal system, COFA volunteers were actively involved 25 with several services within the Judiciary of Guam, to include accommodating self-26 represented court users, maintaining the Judiciary's electronic case management 27 system, and assisting with all probation services available to juvenile offenders. The 1 two (2) COFA non-immigrants who volunteered to serve at JusticeCorps - one 2 carried experience from the Pohnpei Judicial System and the other had served a 3 deployment in Afghanistan in the United States Marine Corps - were disqualified 4 based on their residency status as Pohnpeian COFA non-immigrants despite their 5 work experience, military service, and pursuit of education at the University of 6 Guam; and

7 WHEREAS, with their deep commitment to civic engagement, the COFA 8 volunteers participating in the island's various AmeriCorps programs had 9 demonstrated that they were not merely individuals seeking stipends in exchange for 10 a few hours of service learning: they were teachers, social workers, first responders, 11 veterans, and culturally conscious citizens seizing the opportunity to contribute to 12 the community that has become their home; and

13 WHEREAS, despite the numerous community service hours these COFA non-immigrants had accumulated, the CNCS suspended payment of the living 14 15 allowance stipend owed to these individuals and called for the repayment of stipends 16 paid to former members who were similarly ineligible to participate based on their 17 residency status. Although allowed to receive federal Pell Grants and enlist in the U.S. Armed Services, these COFA non-immigrants who willingly volunteered to 18 meet the critical needs of the island were refused the opportunity to serve as crucial 19 20mentors to their respective communities; and

WHEREAS, upon learning of this federal action, Vice Speaker Benjamin J.F.
Cruz, recognizing the injustice in the exclusion of such aspiring COFA nonimmigrants, requested assistance from Congresswoman Madeleine Z. Bordallo,
Guam Delegate to the U.S. House of Representatives, on March 31, 2015, to remedy
the situation; and

WHEREAS, Congresswoman Bordallo, in response, agreed that otherwise eligible COFA non-immigrants should not be barred from collecting stipends and awards through their participation in NSPs, and pledged to pursue a legislative
 solution; and

WHEREAS, as an immediate remedy to the suspension of payments, the 33rd
Guam Legislature included in the *General Appropriations Act of 2016* (Guam Public
Law 33-66, September 5, 2015) an appropriation of Forty Thousand Dollars
(\$40,000) to the University of Guam to cover the stipend payments withheld from
the disqualified volunteers; and

8 Bordallo, with WHEREAS, Congresswoman along co-sponsors 9 Congresswoman Tulsi Gabbard of Hawaii and Congressman Gregorio Kilili C. 10 Sablan of the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands, introduced the 11 National Community Service Improvement Act of 2015 (H.R. 4345, 114th U.S. 12 Congress, January 7, 2016) which amends Section 137(a)(5) of the National Community and Service Act of 1990, 42 U.S.C. 12591(a)(5) to expand the eligibility 13 14 criteria for NSP participation to include COFA non-immigrants, thus effectively 15 eliminating the CNCS's discrimination of such individuals who, in spite of their 16 residency status, are desirous to improve their lives and help strengthen their host 17 communities through service and volunteerism; now therefore, be it

RESOLVED, that I Mina'Trentai Tres Na Liheslaturan Guåhan does hereby, 18 19 on behalf of the people of Guam, declare its unequivocal support for H.R. 4345, 20 cited as the National Community Service Improvement Act of 2015, relative to 21 extending participation eligibility in National Service Programs to citizens of the 22 Federated States of Micronesia, the Republic of the Marshall Islands, and the 23 Republic of Palau who are admitted to the United States under the terms of the 24 applicable nation's Compact of Free Association with the United States, as 25 introduced in the U.S. House of Representatives by the Honorable Congresswoman 26 Madeleine Z. Bordallo of Guam, recognizing that through such legislation, COFA 27 non-immigrants in the United States can participate in CNCS programs to engage in service training, and therefore develop the skills essential to enter the workforce and
 become upstanding members of their respective local communities; and does further
 urge the Members of the 114th U.S. Congress to support the passage of H.R. 4345;
 and be it further

5 **RESOLVED,** that the Speaker certify, and the Legislative Secretary attest to, 6 the adoption hereof, and that copies of the same be thereafter transmitted to the 7 Honorable Congresswoman Madeleine Z. Bordallo, Guam Delegate to the U.S. 8 House of Representatives; to the Honorable Congresswoman Tulsi Gabbard, Hawaii 9 Delegate to the U.S. House of Representatives; to the Honorable Congressman 10 Gregorio Kilili C. Sablan, CNMI Delegate to the U.S. House of Representatives; and 11 to the Honorable Edward J.B. Calvo, *I Maga'låhen Guåhan*.
