Relative to recognizing, commending, and congratulating the Sisters of Mercy of the Americas, South Central Community on Guam on the Seventieth (70th) Year Anniversary of its founding on Guam; and to further extending a warm and sincere *Un Dångkolo Na Si Yu'os Ma'åse'* to them for fulfilling the mission of Mother Catherine McAuley on Guam, the Mariana Islands, and Micronesia for the past seventy (70) years.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COMMITTEE ON RULES OF *I*MINA'TRENTAI TRES NA LIHESLATURAN GUÅHAN:

- WHEREAS, the Sisters of Mercy are inspired by the courageous and
- 4 compassionate example of their foundress, Catherine McAuley. The Sisters of Mercy on
- 5 Guam are involved in various ministries, to include: education, pastoral work, prayer
- 6 ministry, and social work; and

1 WHEREAS, on November 5, 1946, three (3) pioneer Mercy Sisters, Sister Mary 2 Inez Underwood, RSM, Sister Mary Louise Wiensenforth, and Sister Mary Annette 3 McBennett of the Sisters of Mercy from Belmont, North Carolina, made up the first 4 group of Mercy Sisters that arrived on Guam; and Bishop Baumgartner asked that the 5 Mercy Sisters establish Guam's first permanent Catholic School; and 6 WHEREAS, on December 12, 1946, the first group of local girls, which consisted 7 of ten (10) novices, entered the Sisters of Mercy and started their postulancy. On 8 December 6, 1947, the small trio of Mercy Sisters continued to recruit young local 9

women into the Mercy community, and accepted twenty (20) local candidates into the

Mercy community in *Hagåtña*. In just a year's time, the growing number of vocations

warranted the building of a second convent in *Tai* to accommodate another ten (10)

novices who entered in 1948; and

WHEREAS, in 1949, the Mercy Sisters extended their ministry to the southern villages of Guam by opening the *Inarajan* Convent, which enabled the Sisters to teach catechism in the parishes of *Inarajan*, *Malojloj*, *Merizo*, and *Umatac*; and Sister Redempta Thomas became the first Superior at the Inarajan Convent. During the same year, the Academy of Our Lady of Guam (AOLG) and Cathedral Grade School both opened, and AOLG is still in operation to this day; and

WHEREAS, during the years 1950 through 1960, the Santa Barbara Catholic School was established in *Dededo*, which remains open to this day; the permanent *Tai* Convent and Novitiate, and the Infant of Prague Nursery were established; the first Final Profession was made; and the new Agaña Convent was dedicated; and

WHEREAS, in 1960, Sister Callista Camacho was appointed as Superior; and Saint Anthony School opened in *Tamuning* with Sister Bernadette Marie serving as the first Principal of the School, which is still in operation and very active to this day; and the Juniorate was established, and Sister Redempta Thomas became the first Directress; and

1 WHEREAS, in 1962, Sister Redempta returned to Belmont, North Carolina; and 2 Sister Margaret Mary Lujan succeeded her as the new Juniorate Directress. During that 3 year, there also was a tragedy as Super Typhoon Karen, a known Category 5 storm, 4 struck Guam and greatly damaged the Tai Convent, which then needed significant 5 renovations; and 6 WHEREAS, in 1963, the late Sister Mary John Madden was appointed to serve as 7 Regional Superior of Guam, a position she held for four (4) years. She was influenced to 8 serve others by her aunt, Mother Mary Raphael Doyle, who was a Sister of Mercy. Sister 9 Mary John entered the Sisters of Mercy in 1930 at the age of sixteen (16); and she 10 received her Bachelor's Degree in History from Belmont Abbey College, and a Master's 11 Degree in History from St. John's University in New York; and 12 WHEREAS, in 1965, several Junior professed sisters were sent to Belmont, North Carolina for college and teacher training; and Sister Mary Louise Weinsenforth returned 13 14 to Belmont after serving on Guam for nineteen (19) years. Also, the Oka Tamuning 15 Convent opened at the location where the Guam Memorial Hospital now stands, and one 16 of its purposes was to serve as the Aspiranture, or residence, for new candidates in the 17 community; and 18 WHEREAS, in 1967, Sister Mary Mark Martinez was appointed as the Regional 19 Superior, the Aspiranture closed, and the *Tai* property was deeded to the Sisters of 20 Mercy; and 21 WHEREAS, in 1971, the Sisters of Mercy-Guam region celebrated its Twenty-22 Fifth (25th) Year Anniversary, and had the First Regional Assembly; and 23 WHEREAS, in 1972, Sister Evelyn Muña was the first elected Regional Superior 24 of the Sisters of Mercy. Sister Evelyn Muña, Sister Mary Cabrini Taitano, and Sister 25 Angela Perez, Mercy Sisters from Guam, had also served at the Belmont headquarters as 26 councilors to the Belmont leadership at different times; and

1	WHEREAS, in 1975, the Convent and Nursery moved to a new building in
2	Perezville, Oka Tamuning, where it stands today; and
3	WHEREAS, in 1980, Sister Francis Jerome Cruz was elected as Regional
4	Superior; and
5	WHEREAS, in 1981, the Inarajan Convent reopened; and it was also the year of
6	the celebration of the One Hundred Fiftieth (150th) Year Anniversary of the Sisters of
7	Mercy worldwide; and
8	WHEREAS, in 1983, Sister Evelyn Muña was elected to the North Carolina
9	Regional Council; and
10	WHEREAS, in 1986, the Mercy Sisters assumed responsibility for Bishop
11	Baumgartner Middle School in Sinajaña. The school, which was originally called Saint
12	Jude School, began in 1955 under the guidance of the Franciscan Sisters of Perpetual
13	Adoration, in partnership with the Saint Jude parish; and
14	WHEREAS, in 1986, the first two (2) candidates from Chuuk entered the Sisters
15	of Mercy; and
16	WHEREAS, in 1988, Sister Mary Cabrini Taitano was elected as Regional
17	Superior, and the Mercy Associates Program was inaugurated; and
18	WHEREAS, in 1989, the Rota Mission opened and Sister Mary Benedict San
19	Nicolas, Sister Mary Carmelita Peredo, and Sister Mary Veronica Chargualaf were sent
20	there; and Sister Mary Benedict San Nicolas, a Mercy Sister and native of Rota, founded
21	the Eskuelan San Francisco de Borja on that island. Several Mercy Sisters had staffed
22	that school for a number of years until it was turned over to another administration; and
23	WHEREAS, in 1991, the Mercy Convent in Saipan opened; and the Institute of
24	the Sisters of Mercy of the Americas had a founding event in Buffalo, New York; and
25	WHEREAS, in 1992, the Mercy Heights Nursery was renovated, and the Infant of
26	Prague Nursery was severely damaged by Typhoon Omar; and

1	WHEREAS, in 1994, the Belmont-Guam Task Force Study was completed, and					
2	the new Inarajan Convent was dedicated; and					
3	WHEREAS, in 1995, the Cathedral Grade School merged with Bishop					
4	Baumgartner Middle School and moved from Agaña to Sinajaña, and the new entity was					
5	renamed as the Bishop Baumgartner Memorial School; and					
6	WHEREAS, in 1996, Sister Angela Perez was elected as Region President and the					
7	Sisters of Mercy-Guam region celebrated its Golden Jubilee; Sister Mary Underwood					
8	returned to Guam; and the Chuuk Mission opened with Sister Mary Cabrini Taitano and					
9	Sister Grace Joseph serving as the first Mercy Sisters there; and					
10	WHEREAS, in 1997, the Golden Jubilee of the first group of Sisters from the					
11	Guam community was celebrated; and					
12	WHEREAS, in March 1998, Sister Mary Underwood passed away; and					
13	WHEREAS, in 2000, the Fiftieth (50th) Year Anniversary of Santa Barbara					
14	Catholic School and the Infant of Prague Nursery/Kindergarten was celebrated; and					
15	WHEREAS, in 2001, the Institute of the Sisters of Mercy of the America's Tenth					
16	(10th) Year Anniversary was celebrated with initial conversations around re-imagination					
17	and reconfiguration of new communities in the Institute; and					
18	WHEREAS, in 2002, Mercy sponsored Ministries, Mercy Action Marianas, Ltd.,					
19	and two (2) nurseries incorporated in the Saipan and Rota Missions closed; and					
20	WHEREAS, in 2003, the Mercy Care Center opened and the Mercy Sisters took					
21	over the Alee Shelter Ministry; and					
22	WHEREAS, in 2004, Sister Mary Cabrini Taitano was elected as Guam Region					
23	President, and the Institute Justice Solidarity Retreat was held in Chuuk and Guam; and					
24	WHEREAS, in 2005, Saint Anthony School celebrated its Forty-Fifth (45th) Year					
25	Anniversary; and					

1 WHEREAS, in 2006, the emerging "South Central Community" (Baltimore, 2 Cincinnati, Guam, Jamaica, North Carolina, and St. Louis) was named at the Joint 3 Leadership Team meeting held in Nashville, Tennessee; and 4 WHEREAS, on November 5, 2006, the Sisters of Mercy-Guam Region celebrated 5 its Sixtieth (60th) Year Anniversary with a Eucharistic celebration at the *Dulce Nombre* 6 De Maria Cathedral-Basilica with special guest, Sister Mary Waskowiak, Institute 7 President; and WHEREAS, on November 11, 2006, the Sisters of Mercy worldwide celebrated 8 9 its One Hundred Seventy-Fifth (175th) Year Anniversary with the promotion for the cause 10 of the beatification of their Foundress, Venerable Catherine McAuley; and 11 WHEREAS, in September 2008, the Sisters of Mercy South Central Community 12 was formed, and is made up of the former regional communities of Baltimore, 13 Cincinnati/Jamaica, St. Louis, and North Carolina/Guam. The Sisters of Mercy of the 14 Americas, South Central Community unites more than seven hundred (700) sisters in the 15 Institute; and 16 WHEREAS, the work of the Mercy Sisters extends throughout Micronesia. They 17 have ministered in Saipan, Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands, as 18 administrators and teachers at Mt. Carmel School; and they currently work in Chuuk, 19 Federated States of Micronesia, at the Saramen Chuuk Academy. In the past, the Mercy 20 Sisters have worked for the Caroline Islands Diocese; and some *Chamorro* Sisters have 21 also worked in the U.S. mainland; today, there are four (4) Mercy Sisters from Guam 22 working there. On Guam, the Mercy Sisters have worked extensively in Catholic schools and parishes as administrators and teachers. They are involved in several offices of the 23 24 Archdiocese of Agaña, and they hold various positions at local institutions, to include the 25 University of Guam, the Guam Community College, Guam Memorial Hospital, Catholic

Social Service, Alee Shelter, the Guam Department of Education, and the Senior Citizens

Division of the Department of Public Health and Social Services. At one time, the

1 number of Sisters serving with the Sisters of Mercy in the Guam region was around sixty-

six (66), and today there are some forty-five (45) Sisters in the region; now therefore, be
