

Dear Senator Pangelinan,

Re: Bill No. 329-31


I was not able to attend your public hearing for Bill No. 329-31 last week, however, please accept my written comments for your consideration.

As I understand the bill, it aims to amend Article 5, Chapter 71, Title 10 in as much as unarmed security guarding companies will not require general liability insurance however armed security guarding will require \$150k of general liability insurance.

We find that the pre-amble rationale does not support the proposal for unarmed security officers not to require general liability insurance in as much as the role of security officers in general business has matured and in many instances the risk to the officer or the risks that the officer may present to the customer or general public are as high as they have ever been. As there are training, testing and industry licensing standards in the U.S. mainland for all security officers, whether armed or non-armed, no such standards have been established on Guam. We might also consider the litigious environment we live in today and \$150k insurance coverage is barely adequate for the most frivolous of claims.

We do agree that insurance limits need to be reviewed and that the limit should be increased across the board for armed and unarmed security officers. Our opinion is that there should be a policy of not less than \$1,000,000 for any security agency activity. Almost all commercial security contracts require insurance levels well in excess of \$150k and many in the region of \$2 - \$5m.

We believe that any security agency that would consider operating without GL Insurance is irresponsible within the industry; we strongly oppose such a bill supporting this level of irresponsibility.





I will be very happy to meet with you and discuss this bill and any other safety and security related initiatives you may have affecting our industry.
