## COMMITTEE REPORT DIGEST

#### I. OVERVIEW

BILL NO. 111-31 (COR) - "AN ACT TO ADD A NEW CHAPTER 70 TO DIVISION 6 OF TITLE 5, GUAM CODE ANNOTATED, RELATIVE TO ESTABLISHING THE GUAM INVASIVE SPECIES COUNCIL; TO ESTABLISH THE GUAM INVASIVE SPECIES INSPECTION FEE AND FUND; AND, TO AUTHORIZE THE DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE TO ESTABLISH A BIOSECURITY DIVISION" was introduced by Senator Christopher M. Duenas on March 14, 2011; and was subsequently referred to the Committee on Rules; Federal, Foreign & Micronesian Affairs; and Human and Natural Resources on the same day.

Senator Rory J. Respicio, Chairperson of the Committee on Rules; Federal, Foreign & Micronesian Affairs; and Human and Natural Resources convened a public hearing on Bill 111 on Thursday, April 21, 2011 at 5:37 P.M. in the Legislature's Public Hearing Room to receive public testimony on the measure.

### **Public Notice Requirements**

In accordance with the Open Government Law, notices were disseminated to all senators and to all main media broadcasting outlets on April 14, 2011 and April 19, 2011. Notices were also issued to various public and private entities.

#### II. SUMMARY OF TESTIMONY & DISCUSSION

Senator Respicio called the hearing to order at 5:35 PM, stated that notices were properly made in accordance with the Open Government Laws and introduced Senator Chris Duenas and Senator Aline Yamashita, co-authors of the bill.

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Senator Respicio explained that although Bill No. 111-31 was introduced on March 15, Senators Duenas, Respicio and Judith Guthertz had several meetings with UOG, CQA and Agriculture to look into ways to make sure the Invasive Species Council (contained in the bill) works to address Guam's growing invasive species problem. He wanted to ensure that there was no duplication of services and that there will be clear lines of authority to properly address the needs of the people and island.

**Senator Duenas** gave a brief introduction: in 2005 Gov Camacho promulgated Executive Order 2005-13 relative to invasive species control and interdiction. This gave birth to efforts to deal with invasive species and the need to stand up a bio-security division with emphasis on science and research, which in turn gave rise to Bill 111. The bill formulates a comprehensive approach to dealing with invasive species, creates the Guam Invasive Species Council under Agriculture: to include Prevention, Rapid Response, Eradication, and Education.

Senator Duenas noted the concern of the Department of the Interior regarding biosecurity in the region, including Guam, CNMI and Micronesia. He said that invasive species are devastating Guam, especially inland, and we need all of the help we can get. One of the main objectives on which the military buildup is likely to focus is protection of their assets. The efforts made on behalf of the military could also help the people of Guam, he said. When prevention doesn't work, we have to take care of the eradication, and also pay more attention to the aquatic resources. Sen. Duenas said the bill mirrors what is done in Hawaii, where natural resources are the foundation of their economy, as it is in Guam.

**Senator Respicio** said he was pleased with the participation at the hearing and wanted to reiterate that the proposed Customs User Fee would not be held up by the process, but there needs to be assurance that there should not be duplication of effort by the agencies.

The first to testify were Agriculture Director Maraquita Taitague, Bill Mayfield, Ray Benavente, and Paul Bassler. **Director Taitague** said that Agriculture recognizes the need to prevent biological invasion threats and recognizes CQA's importance as the "first line of defense," and Agriculture's role inland. She said she was present at a one-hour CQA presentation on their efforts and future plans and felt that CQA should be co-chairs alongside Agriculture. She also asked for funding to be identified for an additional entomologist, botanist and plant pathologist, and that both agencies share resources.

**Director Taitague** added that they should try to secure funding first from federal funds and grants, to be shared by both agencies, before imposing the funding source in Section 4, the "Guam Invasive Species Inspection Fee Fund."

Mr. Mayfield said he was in support of the bill, but as a small businessman in Guam for more than 20 years, he was concerned about the added costs. He said the fees were equal to the shipping costs and he has been absorbing the increases over the past four years. He was hoping there would be a way to implement the program without increasing fees.

Ray Benavente, an import specialist, said his background was with Guam Customs. He said he supported the bill and commended the Senators for its introduction. He said that prior notification was necessary, and that new federal laws were on their way to being implemented, including a new food safety act. He said that fees were necessary and should come from the importer and a bonding fee should be required. He said that eradication of "bugs" would be costly, Hawaii appropriated \$2 Million for snake eradication. He recommended that Homeland Security should be the umbrella agency.

**Senator Duenas** said that they would collect over \$2 Million per year at a dollar per ton. Also, the council could go after federal matching funds. He said there may be a blended solution regarding the fees.

Former Department of Agriculture Director Paul Bassler testified next, who is now with the UOG Rhino Beetle task force. He listed a number of invasive species problems: the brown tree snake, cycad scale, vines attacking the forests, etc. and believes this bill takes the first step. Some say the federal government should pay for this, but the problems we have currently are not caused by the buildup. We have to take core of our existing problems then turn to the military so they can pay for what they brought in.

Mr. Bassler said that funding is biggest challenge, and we can't afford to stop. He said the funding source should be the cargo because that is what brings in the threats: people and cargo. The fee is a starting point. When the economy goes up there will be more funding; we may have a 600% increase in traffic during the buildup. He entered into the record a petition with nearly 900 signatures of people of Guam who do not want to see their resources destroyed.

**Senator Respicio** asked Ms Taitague if she had any meetings with Customs or the front office regarding this issue. She acknowledged that there was a meeting with Customs and she believed they have been doing a good job. No one's efforts should be discredited.

**Senator Duenas** asked if she felt that Agriculture should continue to take the lead; she said yes. He agreed that Agriculture is where invasive species eradication belongs.

Senator Silva Taijeron asked Mr. Mayfield about the fees and what they would be if the new fee were imposed. He said the cost would go up about \$600 per 40-foot container, including the new TSA fee and the additional \$1 per ton. Senator Duenas said the fee would not affect exports, only imports. Mr. Mayfield said he brought in an average of about 15 tons per month of fish products, which would equate to a fee of \$15.

**Senator Respicio** asked Ms Taitague if there had been any discussions with the front office about moving PPQ back to Agriculture. She said there had not.

Next to testify were Jessica Nangauta Angelita Mendiola, Bill McDonald, and Anthony Santos. Lou Stein, John Diego,

Ms. Nangauta, an agriculture major at UOG, said she was in support and believed that the task force was necessary to control the invasive species. She said her work with the Rhino Beetle has taken her around the island and people were always asking here about what can be done to deal with the invasive species. She said that the entire road to Ipan was lined with invasive weeds and hopes that this task force will take care of the problems.

Ms. Lou Stein, former president of the Guam Nurserymen's Association, testified that her concern was the plants and fruits they sell. Customers have been asking about the bugs, white flies, worms and other problems. She said she also buys Black Flag and soap and oil to protect plants from the white flies.

Mr. Bill McDonald from Agana Heights, a farmer, said he supported bringing Agriculture back to the front lines to inspect the plants. He said that we received \$2 Million to control the Rhino Beetle and it's still here. He said the same was true for the brown tree snake and the frogs that were everywhere. He mentioned the skunk that had been found and asked, "how does Customs pass a skunk?" He said the importers had to be made responsible for the invasive species. He said the penalty for introducing

invasive species should be increased. He repeated that there should be penalties for violators. He concluded by saying he supported the bill.

Next to testify was **Anthony Santos**, who thanked the Senators and CQA for what they were doing. He said that no one had talked about culture and his generation sees the culture dying, and he knows it's important to protect our island. He is a canine handler for the CRB. He said he goes out every day and he sees the damage that's been done. It's already here and time to do something about the invasive species. It's time to do something now. To not support the bill would be real foolish because the time is here, he said.

We're still not doing enough, he said, and added that if we don't do it now what's going to happen to our future generations? He said he was in full support of the bill and hoped that it would go through. Senator Respicio thanked him for his testimony.

Senator Respicio called up Tom Camacho, Ernie Wusstig, David C. Flores and Philip Taijeron from CQA. He noted that Vincent SN Perez had submitted written testimony. For the record Senator Respicio listed UOG students and workers in support of the bill: Vincent Benavente, Marty Hara, Carlo Nededog, Britteny Funes, Ken Leon Guerrero, Jackie Villagomez, Roy San Miguel, Iris San Miguel, and Hugo George.

Ernie Wusstig said he was in support of the bill. He thanked CQA for protecting borders. He said that he didn't want to point any fingers and that the bill should be amended because two heads is better than one. If two are looking, maybe we can catch everything that comes in. He said that he had called Roland Quitugua a few nights earlier when a rhino beetle flew into the room and landed on the table. There were lots of beetles at Batulo road in Dededo. He said that he planted lots of coconuts but they won't be having any coconuts because of the rhino beetle. There are all kinds of bugs in the field where we was working and he doesn't foresee any plants or fruit because of the bugs. He said that two agencies are looking, especially with federal money available, they should be able to take care of the issue.

**Major Vincent SN Perez**, acting director, read from his prepared testimony. He said that CQA recognizes the need for Agriculture to beef up their actions relative to invasive species, but their agency does not support the bill in its present form for the following reasons:

 The bill fails to recognize the importance of Customs on the borders and does not consider Customs as an equal co-chair for the invasive species council;

- The bill creates overlapping functions at the border; and
- The bill reestablishes another layer of bureaucracy relative to inspection of goods and merchandise at the borders.

**Major Perez** said that despite reduced funding, CQA has already established an Agriculture Security Task Force to focus on the threat of invasive species. The task force provides additional capacity for inspection and screening.

He said it would be more beneficial to improve Customs security at the borders and also improve DOAs capabilities for monitoring and combating terrestrial, marine and other invasive species inland. He said that Customs' core duties exist at the border and that their personnel specialize in reviewing and inspecting imported merchandise.

**Major Perez** noted that CQA focus on the detection and interdiction of contraband with canine and bio-security task force personnel. He noted that facility upgrades to further enhance detection and interdiction of agricultural violations through ports of entry, and CQA grant applications will help to solidify the Customs bio-security program.

**Major Perez** pointed out that by absorbing Plant Protection & Quarantine functions, CQA was able to reduce bureaucratic processes and delays. The PPQ officers were cross trained with customs officers. Major Perez hoped the bill would reinforce and expand core competencies in their own areas.

Major Perez made the following recommendations:

- Revise Bill 111-31 to include CQA alongside DoA while maintaining separate and distinct divisions;
- Incorporate language for shared communication, coordination and resources;
- Keep language within current statutory framework;
- Identify and delineate division of responsibilities and use of resources.

**Major David Flores**, acting chief of Customs was next to testify, stating that their funding has remained status quo since 9-11, and they continue to do more with less. They are actively seeking grants but it is a very competitive situation. He said that Agriculture and Customs needed to cooperate and work together to accomplish their goals, and that additional funding was important.

He pointed out that the rules and regulations of the agency also needed to be shored up, not just in the area of illicit drugs, but also relative to invasive species. He used

Hawaii as an example of a jurisdiction where their processes and rules and regulations were up to date and very useful.

**Senator Respicio** pointed out that when PPQ was assimilated into Customs, it was not just funding, but also the personnel. Flores said that it did. They started in 2000 with a \$9M budget but by 2003 their budget was reduced. The PPQ money was absorbed, but the funding did not show significantly in 2005.

**Senator Respicio** pointed out that the budget shortfall has been felt throughout the government, not just at Customs. He said that the overall GovGuam budget has fallen from well over \$600 Million to less than \$400 Million in just a few years. He said that it was his understanding that the \$2 Million that came over to CQA for PPQ was used to supplement Customs operations rather than for PPQ needs for border protection.

**Major Philip Taijeron,** Assistant Chief of CQA said the funds were used for various purposes from just 19 PPQ officers to over 100 officers covering all ports of entry with increased AQI capacity. Sen. Respicio asked about the fee schedule going through the Triple A process and if it would shore up the AQI capacity.

**Major Flores** said the funds were to pay for their current operations. He said that the bottom line is that we need to seek additional funding, and that they have a strategic plan put together by Major Taijeron, that shows what that plan is in addition to current operations.

Major Taijeron said that their testimony was already presented and their points were made, but because people spoke so passionately about bio-security, he wanted to share some information. Invasive species incursion management requires capacity building of resources above the current funding level absorbed when PPQ was transferred to CQA, he said. The bio-security posture required at borders internationally is a new concept. Since the PPQ acquisition, greater management and control of the borders has become necessary, by both Customs and Agriculture. The creation of the bio-security division took place over two years, he said, and added that it is impractical to check every container and piece of cargo that comes in through Guam's ports of entry, although all are screened before being released. Selective inspections must be accompanied by sufficient funding and training, as well as automation.

**Major Taijeron** said that, as of a few years ago, Australia, possibly one of the most strict of all countries, received incursions of 40 invasive species per year. Guam received just

5, so Guam was on a par with larger, better funded areas. He said that there is a mistaken belief that the sole responsibility for border control lies with Customs once it absorbed PPQ, which is not correct. He said that the Department of Agriculture also has responsibilities for providing technical support relating to invasive species, as well as providing assistance by way of the commodities inspectors. The PPQ officers still perform the same functions they performed when they were at Agriculture, and still send their reports to the same person, even though they have changed agencies.

**Major Taijeron** said that going back to the old structure would not solve Guam's problems. The law enforcement aspect is what the island needs to control invasive species because law enforcement seeks to stop and remove the problems it encounters. He suggested that bio-security divisions in both CQA and Department of Agriculture would be advantageous, and is also in opposition to Bill 111.

Senator Respicio asked about the fee schedule currently going through the Triple-A process. Major Taijeron said that the amount would be about \$3 Million per year. Sen. Respicio asked about a proposal that would take the former PPQ officers and establish an Agriculture Security Division. Major Taijeron asked which document Sen. Respicio was reading from. The Senator said it was a proposal to establish an Agriculture Security Division within CQA. Major Taijeron asked to see the document.

Senator Respicio pointed out that they still receive the funding that originally came from moving PPQ to Customs. Major Taijeron said that the funding is no longer looked at in that manner. Senator Respicio said that the proposal to create Agriculture Quarantine Inspectors is of concern to him because one of his regrets was his support of moving PPQ to Customs several years earlier, in an effort to have a unified border protection structure. PPQ was supposed to be a separate division with their dedicated source of funding, with oversight by CQA. Sen. Respicio said that the director of Agriculture at that time felt that the funds would end up being identified as for Customs, and PPQ would be absorbed, and he was correct.

**Major Perez** said that every CQA officer is also a PPQ officer. All officers have a blended skill set, and receive the training to accomplish the tasks of both Customs officers and PPQ officers. Sen. Respicio asked why they were proposing an additional agriculture division when they are still performing the PPQ tasks.

Vice Speaker Cruz asked what kind of training Customs Officers and PPQ officers received. Major Perez said both where cross-trained so they each were able to acquire

each others' skill sets. Vice Speaker Cruz asked if the PPQ officers had specialized training before being moved to Customs. The response was yes they had. Vice Speaker Cruz asked for a detailed breakdown on the training that each Customs and PPQ officer has received.

Vice Speaker Cruz asked about grants applied for and received, and whether training is ongoing, even with the drop in tourism and fees. He asked that CQA provide the chairman the information on education/training/certification of officers and grants applied for and received.

Senator Yamashita thanked Customs for caring and paying attention to their duties. The training efforts were kept up and yet there are still invasive species. Impressed that so many people are present at the hearing, and believes that what is really needed is communication and collaboration. Hopes to be able to further address the issues brought forth by customs. The tension isn't high, so people are not fighting but agreeing upon what is important.

Senator Duenas expressed his content at the progress that has been made. Happy that all the concerns are highlighted because Customs' concerns are that important. It was non-intentional to leave out Customs. Thinks the amendments are workable. Asked Customs a question that pertains to DOA, so he has to wait till DOA comes back on the panel. Asked Major Perez for his current rate of inspection. 100% of the containers do get screened at the port of entry. There are no figures for actually breaking the tag present.

**Major David Flores**: stated that there were 82,000 containers that came in last fiscal year. Invited the committee to come out and join Customs so that they can see exactly what Customs does.

**Senator Respicio** informs them that Senator Guthertz is really interested in the bill even though she wasn't able to be present, and how they were trying to find other ways in order to appropriate money to Customs. There are programs developed to take care of the invasive species problem beyond the border. This hearing was not an indictment on Customs.

Major David Flores: qualifies how invasive species can be easily bought online.

Senator Respicio asks Customs to stay back to listen to Roland Quitugua.

**Director Taitague** clarifies that she doesn't want to be the lead, she wants to work together with Customs because two heads are better than one.

**Senator Duenas** asks for clarification that the fee schedule, as had been testified, is for augmentation of current operations.

Senator Respicio asked about the status for the director of Customs and Quarantine cause he hasn't seen a packet for Sgambelluri. If Major Perez isn't the acting director he's the acting chief so they aren't sure what's going on. Calls on Mr. Quitugua to testify.

Mr. Roland Quitugua greets each of the senators present. He represents the Northern Guam Soil and Water Conservation District. He likes that bill 111 has finally been introduced because it's been a long time coming. Most of the hearing has been about money, whether or not it can be afforded. The reality is that we cannot afford not to do it. It is cheaper to keep it out than to fight it once it's crossed our borders. It's important to work together, but they are working on it in the corner of their desks because Guam hasn't put it at the forefront. Describes how he believes the whole system should work. It's probably best fit for the invasive species coordinator to be placed at the University of Guam Center for Island Sustainability.

**Senator Duenas** jokes that if the bill is a good bill, then it was his idea. If it gets messed up, then he doesn't know who drafted it. Should Department of Agriculture be the stewards for this program?

Mr. Quitugua thinks that Department of Agriculture should be the steward, but he doesn't care who the program goes to, all that matters is that they do a better job than what is being done now.

**Senator Duenas** says that if the bill gets passed, the farmers aren't going to go to Customs to ask for help, they are going to go to Department of Agriculture and ask for help.

Mr. Quitugua explains that the reason he doesn't care what department it goes to cause he asks himself the question "is it good for Guam?" cause if it's good for Guam, then it's good for him.

Mr. Bill McDonald wants every cargo that comes to Guam to come in a container and fumigate it. If we can't fumigate, then do 100% inspection. Customs and Quarantine are not agriculture specialists, so let Customs concentrate on their expertise, and let Agriculture deal with their specialties. Bill 111 deals with the financial side of what they are trying to do.

Mr. Bassler adds that Bill 111 does not take away AQI from Customs. He doesn't think it was an intent to create a controversy between agencies, but the controversy stems when more than one agency has to control the borders. There is clearly a suggestion of duplication in Customs' proposal and bill 111. The idea is that that specialized team receive specialize training all the time. Once again offers support to 111.

**Mr. Quitugua** says that people think that we aren't that bad cause Hawaii is catching 40 invasive species compared to our 2 to 5, but they find 40 is because they are LOOKING for 40. We could double ours if we were looking for it.

Discussions end and **Senator Respicio** then allows Customs to present a picture display depicting their current efforts at combating invasive species.

Mr. Jason Paulino makes a presentation of the plant inspection station, maritime inspection, biosecurity advisory threat, and airport interceptions using poster boards.

Senator Respicio adjourned the public hearing at approximately 8:05 PM.

#### III. FINDINGS & RECOMMENDATIONS

After extensive discussions with the authors, Committee members, representatives of the Governor's Office, government agencies and community stakeholders, the introduced version of Bill 111-31 was revised to reflect various amendments requested and various amendments deemed necessary to strengthen the mandates and mechanisms put in place by the Bill, to meet the intent of the legislation. A mark-up copy of the Bill, reflecting all the changes made, is included with the Committee Report.

The Committee on Rules; Federal, Foreign & Micronesian Affairs; and Human & Natural Resources hereby reports out BILL NO. 111-31 (COR) AS SUBSTITUTED, with the recommendation TO DO PASS.

AN ACT TO ADD A NEW CHAPTER 70 TO DIVISION 6 OF TITLE 5, GUAM CODE ANNOTATED, RELATIVE TO ESTABLISHING THE GUAM INVASIVE SPECIES COUNCIL; TO ESTABLISHING THE GUAM INVASIVE SPECIES INSPECTION FEE AND FUND; AND TO AUTHORIZING THE DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE TO ESTABLISH A BIOSECURITY DIVISION.

### BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF GUAM:

**Section 1. Legislative Findings and Intent.** *I Liheslatura* finds that island ecosystems are particularly vulnerable to the destructive power of invasive pests. The unimpeded spread of invasive species is one of the greatest threats to Guam's economy, natural environment, and the health and lifestyle of its people. Invasive pests can cause millions of dollars in crop losses, the extinction of native species, the destruction of native forests, and the spread of disease.

There is increasing traffic of cargo being transported into Guam without a high priority for inspection of invasive species. It is most notable that there is also a lack of aquatic monitoring, or rapid response measures, to handle incidences of invasive species discovered at our ports of entry and inland. Thus the growing potential threat increases each year that enforcement and monitoring is not mandated and, most importantly, carried out. This Act aims to combat terrestrial, marine and freshwater invasive species that have been introduced into Guam and caused widespread havoc on our island and aquatic ecosystems.

Currently, officers of the Guam Customs and Quarantine Agency provide the "First Line of Defense" for the island by enforcing local and federal laws and regulations. They are also responsible for protecting our borders, securing ports of entry and facilitating trade, commerce and travel. These are many obligations for one department to enforce, and are certainly of utmost priority. However, it is the intent of *I Liheslatura* to put a higher priority on inspection and surveillance of invasive species by creating a Biosecurity Division under the Department of Agriculture for the protection of our natural resources from biological invasion and threats, and the protection of our geographical area from invasion by unwanted organisms.

The *I Liheslatura* further finds that nationally, invasive species councils have mobilized efforts to combat invasive species through funding sources generated by fees at all ports of entry, penalties for violations, eradication funding and government assisted grants.

Furthermore, this Act will place the value of our precious resources as a top priority in order to combat harmful invasive species that have the potential to devastate our environment, agriculture, and livelihood of our people.

Section 2. A new Chapter 70 is added to Division 6 of Title 5, Guam Code

- § 70101. Short Title. This Chapter shall be known as the *Guam Invasive Species*Council Act of 2011.
  - § 70102. Guam Invasive Species Council, established. The Guam Invasive Species Council (GISC) will be established for the special purposes of protecting Guam from alien species that threaten our economics, culture, ecosystem and human health and providing policy direction,

- 1 coordination, and planning among government of Guam departments and federal agencies to prevent
- 2 the introduction of invasive species and the monitoring, control and eradication of invasive species
- 3 throughout the island of Guam.

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- 4 § **70103. Duties of Council.** The Council shall:

Such plan shall be submitted to *I Liheslaturan Guahan* no later than sixty (60) calendar

- days from the date of enactment of this Act, and shall be subject to legislative approval. Should I
- 2 Liheslaturan Guahan fail to act within sixty (60) calendar days from the date of submittal, such plan
- 3 shall be deemed approved; and
  - (1) Perform all functions necessary to effectuate the mission of the Council.

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## § 70104. Composition of Council.

- The Council shall be composed of Department Directors or their representatives from the Guam Department of Agriculture (GDOA), Customs and Quarantine Agency (CQA), the Department of Administration (DOA), the Bureau of Statistics and Plans (BSP); the Homeland Security Advisor; the Administrator of the Guam Environmental Protection Agency; the Executive Manager of the A. B. Won Pat Guam International Airport Authority; the General Managers of the Jose D. Leon Guerrero Port Authority of Guam and the Guam Visitors Bureau; the University of Guam Associate Director of Extension and the Director of the the Western Pacific Tropical Research
  - **(b)** The Council may invite additional public and private sectors members to serve on sub-committees with significant responsibilities concerning invasive species, and may prescribe special procedures for their participation.
  - (c) The Council shall be chaired by a newly formed position called the Guam Invasive Species Coordinator, who will be hired out of the University of Guam under the University Center for Island Sustainability. Funding for the Guam Invasive Species Coordinator will come from the Guam Invasive Species Inspection Fee Fund.

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§ 70105. Government of Guam Agency Duties. (a) Each government of Guam agency whose actions may affect the status of invasive species shall, to the extent practicable and permitted by law: (1) identify such actions; (2) subject to the availability of appropriations, and within the Administration's budget limits, use relevant programs and authorities to: (i) prevent the introduction of invasive species; (ii) detect and respond rapidly to mitigate the population of such species in a cost-effective and environmentally sound manner; (iii) monitor invasive species

populations accurately and reliably; (iv) provide for restoration of native species and habitat conditions in ecosystems that have been affected; (v) conduct research on invasive species and develop technologies to prevent introduction and provide for environmentally sound control of invasive species; and (vi) promote public education on invasive species and the means to address them; (3) not authorize, fund, or carry out actions that it believes are likely to cause or promote the introduction or spread of invasive species in Guam, the United States, or elsewhere, unless, pursuant to guidelines that it has prescribed and that have been approved by the Council, the agency has determined and made public its determination that the benefits of such actions clearly outweigh the potential harm caused by invasive species; and that all feasible and prudent measures to minimize risk of harm will be taken in conjunction with the actions.

(b) Government of Guam agencies shall pursue the duties set forth in this section in consultation with the Guam Invasive Species Council, consistent with the Guam Invasive Species Management Plan and in cooperation with stakeholders, as appropriate. The agencies shall report on their participation as detailed in § 70107(c) of this Chapter.

§ 70106. Conduct of Meetings. The council shall meet *no less than* quarterly to discuss and assess progress, and to recommend changes to the invasive species programs based on the results of current risk assessments, performance standards, and other relevant data. A simple majority of voting members of the council shall constitute a quorum to do business; and any action taken by the council shall be by a simple majority of the voting members.

§ 70107. Guam Invasive Species Management Plan (GISMP). (a) The Council shall prepare and issue the Guam Invasive Species Management Plan, which shall detail and recommend performance-oriented goals and objectives and specific measures of success for government of Guam agency efforts concerning invasive species. The Plan shall recommend specific objectives and measures for carrying out each of the government of Guam agency duties established in § 70105 of this Chapter, and shall set forth steps to be taken by the Council to carry out duties assigned to it under § 70103. The Plan shall be developed through a public process and in consultation with government of Guam agencies and stakeholders.

**(b)** The Plan shall include a review of rapid response protocols, existing and prospective approaches and authorities for preventing the introduction and spread of invasive species in Guam,

including those for identifying pathways by which invasive species are introduced and for minimizing the risk of introduction via those pathways, and shall identify research needs and recommend measures to minimize the risk that introductions will occur. Such recommended measures shall provide for a science-based process to evaluate risks associated with introduction and spread of invasive species and coordinate a systematic risk-based process to interdict, identify, and monitor pathways that may be involved in the introduction of invasive species. If recommended measures are not authorized by current law, the Council shall develop and recommend to the Governor through legislative proposals for necessary changes in authority.

- (c) The Council shall update the Plan biennially and shall concurrently evaluate and report on the success in achieving the goals and objectives set forth. The Plan shall identify the personnel, other resources, and additional levels of cooperation needed to achieve the Plan's identified goals and objectives, and the Council shall provide each edition of the Plan and each report on it to the Bureau of Budget and Management Research (BBMR). Additionally, progress reports shall be submitted annually to the Office of the Governor. Within eighteen (18) months after measures have been recommended by the Council in any edition of the Plan, each government of Guam agency whose action is required to implement such measures shall either take the action recommended or shall provide the Council with an explanation as to why the action is not feasible. The Council shall assess the effectiveness of this plan no less than once every three (3) years after the Plan is issued and shall report to the BBMR on whether the Plan should be revised."
- Section 3. Guam Invasive Species Inspection Fee, established. (a) There is imposed a fee for the inspection, quarantine, and eradication of invasive species contained in any freight, including, but not limited to, marine commercial container shipment, air freight, or any other means of transporting freight, foreign or domestic, that is brought into Guam. The fee shall be paid by the person responsible for paying the freight charges to the transportation company, who shall collect the fee and forward the payment to the Department of Agriculture at the port of disembarkation; provided that the transportation company shall not be liable for any fee that is not paid by the person responsible for paying the freight charges to the transportation company.
- **(b)** A fee of One Dollar (\$1.00) per ton, or any fraction thereof, shall be imposed on all freight brought into Guam.

1 (c) All fees collected shall be deposited in the Guam Invasive Species Inspection Fee 2 Fund.

Section 4. Guam Invasive Species Inspection Fee Fund, created. (a) There is hereby created, separate and apart from other funds of the government of Guam, a fund to be known as the "Guam Invasive Species Inspection Fee Fund" (hereinafter "the Fund") which shall not be commingled with the General Fund. All payments shall be made payable to "The Guam Invasive Species Inspection Fee Fund" and monies shall be kept in a separate bank account established by the Director of the Department of Agriculture. All expenditures of the Fund shall be made exclusively by appropriation of I Liheslaturan Guåhan. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, any funds appropriated to the Department of Agriculture pursuant to this Chapter shall be administered by the Director of the Department of Agriculture. The Director of the Department of Agriculture shall be the Certifying Officer of such funds. The Fund shall not be used as a pledge of security or as collateral for government loans. The Director of the Department of Agriculture shall make a quarterly report to I Maga'lahen Guåhan and I Liheslaturan Guahan of the condition of, and activity within, the Fund.

(b) The fees collected shall be expended to: (i)provide for an invasive species coordinator and a Biosecurity Division within the Department of Agriculture to provide inspection, quarantine and eradication of invasive species contained in any freight brought to Guam; (ii) suppress and eradicate invasive species present in Guam; and (iii) develop the Guam Invasive Species Management Plan and its updates.

Section 5. Biosecurity Division, authorized. The Department of Agriculture is authorized to create a Biosecurity Division to provide for the inspection, quarantine, and eradication of invasive species contained in any freight, including, but not limited to, marine commercial container shipments in efforts to address invasive species coming to, and already present in, Guam. The Biosecurity Division will take the lead role for the Government of Guam in efforts towards prevention, control, monitoring, rapid response, eradication, enforcement and education of invasive species in Guam. The Director of the Department of Agriculture shall prepare a budget plan, including projected personnel needs and other items, and submit it as part of the Fiscal Year 2012 budget request for the Department of Agriculture.

Section 6. Severability Clause. If any provisions of this Act or the application thereof to any person or circumstance is held invalid, such validity shall not affect other provisions or applications of the Act which can be given effect without the invalid provision or application, and to this end the provisions of this Act are severable.

# Interagency Biosecurity Task Force Work Plan

# Guam November 10, 2009

#### Summary

Industry stakeholders expressed concern to their representatives that there was a need to improve the biosecurity of Guam, especially port of entry inspections. Guam's Northern and Southern Soil and Water Conservation Districts established a committee with Guam Customs and Quarantine Agency, Guam Department of Agriculture, Guam Department of Homeland Security, and USDA APHIS PPQ. Efforts of this committee resulted in a framework plan to provide a comprehensive biosecurity program. A key component of that plan is to create a partnership task force between USDA APHIS PPQ, Guam Customs and Quarantine Agency, and Guam Department of Agriculture that establishes a seamless connection between port of entry inspections, exotic pest surveys, and the ability to respond to a disease or pest introduction. Implementation and success of the plan is dependent upon legislative action to establish certain service fees and authorities.

### Purpose and Need

Biosecurity is a set of preventive measures designed to reduce the risk of intentional or unintentional establishment of diseases, pests, or agents that may cause harm to the environment or economy and to ensure that terrestrial and marine ecologies sustaining people, plants, or animals are maintained. Biosecurity requires the cooperation of scientists, technicians, policy makers, law makers, and enforcement officials.

Protection of terrestrial and marine ecosystems on Guam has a direct impact to food production, human health, and island aesthetics that industries (including tourism and military) and residents depend upon for their very existence.

The Interagency Biosecurity Task Force will provide a needed component of a comprehensive biosecurity system that has seamless coverage and enforcement, which will provide the level of protection necessary to maintain or enhance the valuable natural resources of Guam.

#### Background

Biosecurity has been rapidly evolving on Guam as in other parts of the world. Guam Department of Agriculture and Customs and Quarantine Agency began providing biosecurity services in 1980 through port of entry agriculture inspections. Inland programs such as smuggling interdiction, pest surveys, and exotic pest control and eradication projects have evolved recently within the Department of Agriculture while the use of detector dogs and a plant inspection station augment both agencies functions.



Recent incursions of exotic pests into Guam such as the Papaya mealybug, Betel nut bud rot, and the Coconut rhinoceros beetle and knowledge of animal/human disease risks such as avian influenza, West Nile virus, and Swine flu have highlighted the importance of providing a comprehensive biosecurity program to avoid disasters with potentially unrecoverable economic consequences.

Guam established an invasive species committee and addresses regional issues through participation on the Regional Invasive Species Council. The University of Guam has

increasingly been working in cooperation with USDA APHIS PPQ and Guam Department of Agriculture on biosecurity issues and projects.

The Military buildup in Guam and the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands will result in a manifold increase in the amount of cargo and people arriving in Guam and the CNMI and will have similar regional effects. This increase of goods and people will significantly increase the risk of marine and terrestrial invasive species arriving in Guam and the CNMI as well as being transported throughout the region.

Industry stakeholders expressed concern to their representatives that there was a need to improve the biosecurity of Guam, especially port of entry inspections. Guam's Northern and Southern Soil and Water Conservation Districts, as a result of stakeholder concerns and with concurrence from the Administration, established a committee with members from the two districts, Guam Customs and Quarantine Agency, Guam Department of Agriculture, Guam Department of Homeland Security, and USDA APHIS PPO. Efforts of this committee have resulted in a framework plan to provide a comprehensive biosecurity program. The program builds upon existing cooperative relationships between USDA APHIS PPQ, Guam Department of Agriculture, Guam Customs and Quarantine Agency, the University of Guam, and the Guam Invasive Species Advisory Committee. A key component of that plan is to create a partnership task force between USDA APHIS PPO. Guam Customs and Quarantine Agency, and Guam Department of Agriculture that establishes a seamless connection between port of entry inspections, exotic pest surveys, and the ability to respond to a disease or pest introduction with immediate eradication or control strategies. Implementation and success of the plan is dependent upon legislative action to establish certain service fees and authorities.

#### Current Situation

An agriculture inspection at the ports of entry is the responsibility of Guam Customs and Quarantine Agency and inland surveys, inspections, and mitigation work is the responsibility of Guam Department of Agriculture. Coordination of biosecurity functions is not optimum due to factors of independent missions. USDA APHIS PPQ provides guidance, training, and program oversight to both agencies with respect to Federal authorities. Guam Customs and Quarantine Agency lacks resources and scientific expertise to provide services at the level expected by stakeholders. Guam Department of Agriculture lacks the resources to carry out a comprehensive biosecurity program. There is a mix of functions conducted by regulatory officers under the authorities promulgated through legislation for Guam Department of Agriculture and USDA APHIS PPQ.

The principal barrier to carrying out an effective biosecurity program is funding at an appropriate level, commensurate with the service and protection provided, from the appropriate sources. Primary program funding should be collected through service fees from beneficiaries that present a biosecurity risk, such as cargo and passenger fees.

#### Benefits of a Task force

Formation of the task force will respond to stakeholder concerns by unifying Customs and Quarantine Agency with Guam Department of Agriculture under the direction of USDA APHIS PPQ. This realignment will cause less confusion to employees by having one point of direction focused on the specific mission of biosecurity. Permanent identifiers at the Inspection Facility will expedite release of imported material that is suspect of having an actionable exotic pest. All Customs Officers will continue to inspect and clear items of agriculture concern but will have highly knowledgeable specialists to assist in non-routine decisions and where specialized procedures for agriculture inspection are required.

The ability to provide training will be realized by concentrating higher level knowledge requirements to task force officers. APHIS leadership combined with dedicated trainers and a manageable number of officers to schedule for training will lead to the necessary level of competency throughout the agency that has been difficult to reach under past relationships.

Communication improvements will be realized by establishing a direct chain of command from task force supervisors to agency chiefs and providing daily interaction between task force officers and other Custom's officers. Improved communications will provide Guam Department of Agriculture with information necessary to improve program delivery and dependent services. Work accomplishment records will be maintained daily and summaries made available to stakeholders, while protecting personal or confidential information, through website access.

Task Force participants will primarily serve a support function to port of entry inspections and not an essential staffing element of Customs and Quarantine Agency to carry out its mission. As such, up to one-half of task force personnel may be available for temporary assignment to support an emergency operation without compromising the primary goal of the task force. Emergency operations may include, but are not limited to, providing startup resources to pest eradication projects, providing inspection personnel for refugee inspections or military maneuvers, and assisting Customs with special enforcement blitzes.

Overtime costs to importers associated with agriculture inspection should be reduced by having additional inspection staff to manage workloads within regular schedules.

#### Objective

The objective of the following is to identify the operational aspects of implementing an interagency biosecurity task force with USDA Animal and Plant health Inspection Service, Plant Protection and Quarantine (APHIS), Guam Customs and Quarantine Agency (CQA), and Guam Department of Agriculture (GDA) that will carry out specialized activities and oversight of all Agriculture Quarantine Inspection (AQI) work, which includes enforcement of both Guam Agriculture and APHIS regulations. The task force shall be referred to as the Interagency Biosecurity Task Force.

The task force will not remove the existing duties or responsibilities of CQA officers, but will enhance and strengthen the program by providing professional expertise to the daily decisions and specialized procedures involved in clearing means of conveyance and items of agricultural risk as a means of safeguarding against the introduction of exotic pests into Guam.

#### Role of APHIS

APHIS will lead the task force by providing direct operational control of resources assigned to the task force by CQA and GDA. APHIS will continue to support CQA and GDA in other cooperative areas by providing advice and guidance on technical aspects of quarantine procedures, to define basic requirements of cooperator responsibilities, to provide clarification of APHIS policy and authority, and to facilitate processes.

#### Role of CQA and GDA

CQA and GDA will make provisions for the necessary administrative, logistic, and funding aspects to provide the resources, including personnel, equipment, and supplies to form a functional task force. Administrative responsibility will remain with each individual agency.

CQA, GDA, or APHIS personnel assigned to the task force may be recalled to their respective agencies when deemed necessary by that agency.

## Personnel Minimum Requirements

Task force personnel need to possess a certain level of academic skill and interest in order to adequately research and interpret manual and regulatory direction. Participants assigned to the task force by CQA and GDA will have a minimum of three years prior experience as an APHIS cooperator or two years post high school education in a science or agriculture field of study. The Port Director will conduct a qualification and peer review before approval is granted for each individual nominated to participate as a task force member. While filling vacancies, if there are not enough applicants that meet the requirement, review and approval should be sought prior to job offering. CQA and GDA personnel preferably shall be permanently assigned to the task force but may be rotated after a period of 18 months; or less under special circumstances. All task force participants must have adequate security clearance to have access to ports of entry, military installations, and APHIS IT equipment,

#### **Number of Personnel**

The goal of each agency is to provide personnel to the task force as soon as practical and obtain full task force staffing within one year. CQA will provide 1 supervisor and 15 agriculture specialists. CQA will also provide 4 canine teams, however these teams shall remain under the supervision of the CQA Canine Unit to ensure the welfare and proficiency of the dogs. Daily operational assignment of the canine teams will be coordinated between the task force supervisors and the Canine Unit. GDA will provide 1 supervisor, 12 biosecurity officers, 1 botanist, 1 plant pathologist, and 1 entomologist. These numbers are based upon an analysis of a minimum number of officers needed to staff each work shift at each location, taking into account the additional people needed to fill in for leave and training. APHIS will provide one Plant Health Safeguarding Specialist (PHSS) to the task force as Team Leader.

#### Chain of Command

One permanent supervisor (STFO) from each CQA and GDA will report administratively to the Chief of their respective agency and functionally to the APHIS Port Director. The Team Leader will provide daily guidance and leadership to the supervisors. The

supervisors would be expected to work together in a unified manner in directing the work activities and training for the task force. If differences arise that can not be mutually agreed to then the APHIS Port Director will provide direction. In certain instances a meeting between the agency Chiefs, Supervisors, and APHIS may be called to resolve an issue; or a meeting between agency Directors, depending upon the nature of the issue. Task force officers (TFO) from each of the agencies would report administratively to their respective supervisor with the exception of the canine handlers (discussed later in the canine section). STFOs will be assigned functional areas on a rotating basis such as maritime and air. TFOs assigned to a functional group would take daily direction from that group supervisor irrespective of agency affiliation. An individual TFO may be selected as lead for a specific specialty such as outreach, civil penalties or an area requiring accountability to maintain program focus.

Agency supervisors and officers having other principle duties at domestic and port work locations shall abide by decisions made by a TFO regarding AQI dispositions. A TFO shall not have superseding authority over port of entry release conditions. TFOs shall have superseding hold or seize authority for AQI dispositions, however, if AQI dispositions are release and CQA dispositions require otherwise, then CQA dispositions shall supersede. In the event of a strong disagreement, the item should be placed on hold and the incident reported to the STFO at the earliest opportunity for resolution at the proper level.

#### Reports

STFOs would share responsibility for the completion of monthly Work Accomplishment Data (WADS) reports and will be given access to enter data in the APHIS national database. STFOs and the PHSS will work collaboratively to develop and document Standard Operating Procedures (SOP) that are agreeable and workable between all agencies. STFOs and PHSS will jointly investigate AQI related complaints and provide reports to the agency Directors. A web database will be created to provide stakeholders with interception information that does not contain personal or confidential business information. Assistance from the University of Guam will be requested to develop the database. CQA and GDA will identify any additional specific reporting requirements for their agency.

#### Training

APHIS and GDA will provide AQI training directly to the task force on a regular and reoccurring basis. The TFOs will improve the proficiency of CQA officers' performance in AQI duties through on-job training and cooperative work. CQA will provide training to GDA task force participants to the extent that they can recognize when an item or circumstance needs referral to a Custom's officer.

#### Workspace

Work space for the task force will be incorporated within existing APHIS, CQA, and Inspection Station space. An office located on the naval station is being pursued by APHIS. No additional office space is anticipated although there may be need for additional desks or equipment. Consideration for the task force should be incorporated into any future expansion plans at Guam International Airport, the Port of Guam, and the Plant Inspection Station.

## Vehicles and Equipment

Sharing of resources, where the division is fair and equitable to each agency needs to be defined. Additional needed resources need to be identified.

#### Roles and Responsibilities

The role of the task force is to supplement the existing work performed by CQA officers, fill existing gaps in program effectiveness, and generally be responsible for AQI activities. In order to work efficiently the task force will need to have the backing and support of all agencies. TFOs would be expected to pursue identification skill for arthropod families and plant pathogens found during routine interceptions. The following outline is a suggested starting point for defining specific duties and the division of work to provide optimal service. The outline below is presented by work locations with a separate description for the canine unit and is a general starting point for understanding how the task force will operate. Adjustments and refinements will be made collectively by the STFOs and APHIS and referred for interagency review.

### General TFO Duties and Responsibilities

- o Review manifests and target inspections based upon risk analysis
- o Provide oversight with regard to AQI inspections and decisions
- o Complete data entry for AQI accomplishments
- o Complete violation forms, maintain violation log book
- o Provide oversight for garbage compliance monitoring
- o Safeguard and dispose of seized material
- o Increase the AQI knowledge of CQA officers
- o Inspect seized fruits and vegetables for pests or symptoms of disease, prepare specimens, complete forms, and transport specimens for identification
- o Complete agriculture disposition forms
- o Transport held propagative material to the Plant Inspection Facility
- o Attend AQI training and maintain proficiency in manual reference
- o Ensure electronic manuals are current at work stations
- O CQA Officers will perform clearance and inspections at the port or approved consignee locations. TFOs may provide agriculture inspection and clearance when a physical inspection is not required for other Custom's purposes and has been released by CQA except for an

agriculture hold. TFO authority to release is limited to the actual authority of the officer or delegated authority as an APHIS Officer and will not supersede nor circumvent CQA authority with regard to overall release of items or clearance of means of conveyance. Specific procedures shall be written to clarify release protocol.

## Air Passenger

- Two TFOs will be assigned per shift, one each from CQA and GDA and in addition to general responsibilities will perform the following duties:
  - o Inspect and release propagative material meeting the baggage exemption rule
  - o Provide support for Anderson AFB as needed
  - o Assist canine handlers in interviews and escorting passengers to secondary inspection

#### Air Cargo

Two TFOs will be assigned per shift, one each from CQA and GDA

#### Port of Guam

- Two TFOs, one each from CQA and GDA, will be assigned to the Port
- GDA TFO will do agriculture vessel clearance at the Naval Station when ship boarding by an unarmed officer is warranted.

## Plant Inspection Facility

- Two TFOs per shift will be assigned to the Plant Inspection Facility and in addition to general responsibilities will perform the following duties:
  - o Inspection of propagative material
  - o Clearance of Phytosanitary Certificates and CITES documents
  - o Ensure all requirements for entry are met for propagative material
  - o Monitor treatments
  - Communicate status of shipments to consignee.

#### Anderson AFB

One TFO may be assigned to Andersen Air Force Base.

#### Post Office

 One CQA Officer would continue to staff Guam Main Postal Facility. Support from TFOs would be made available upon notification of need.

### Canine Unit

Since the canine unit is a very specialized group the canine handlers would report
to their CQA Canine Supervisor. The Canine Supervisor has received APHIS
training for agriculture dogs and is responsible for maintaining the proficiency of
the canine teams. The Canine Supervisor will work closely with the STFOs for
scheduling work and addressing any problems.

 GDA canine teams will be retrained to support domestic agriculture inspection work upon release from the CRB Program and will parallel CQA participation guidelines.

#### **Action Items**

APHIS to backfill the vacant PHSS position.

Stakeholders, GDA, with CQA support to pursue legislation to establish a Biosecurity Division and Biosecurity Officer series; being uniformed officers having authority to provide off-duty services and inspection services at any location on Guam.

Stakeholders, GDA with CQA support to pursue legislation to add off-duty service authority to other Plant Inspection Facility staff.

CQA to revisit airport service fee, adjust, and allocate an appropriate percentage to support the task force and Plant Inspection Facility as appropriate.

Stakeholders, GDA, and CQA to pursue legislation to establish a maritime cargo service fee to fund an appropriate percentage of the task force and an invasive species program with a portion of monies set aside for immediate response to new pest introductions.

GDA, APHIS, and CQA to pursue Farm Bill 10201 funding to cover a portion of the start up expenses. – done

Stakeholders and GDA to pursue legislation to establish civil penalties for violations relative to Guam Agriculture regulations.

CQA to pursue, through the Department of Interior, Office of Insular Affairs, return to Guam of Federal civil penalties that have been and are collected into the U.S. general fund.

Pursue any other possible funding sources to cover start up expenses.

CQA and GDA to pursue hiring personnel in order to provide qualified officers to the task force.

CQA and GDA to assign STFOs as soon as possible to further develop the work plan, operational procedures, and identify equipment and logistical needs.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF GUAM:

Legislative Statement. I Liheslatura finds that island ecosystems are Section 1. particularly vulnerable to the destructive power of invasive pests. The unimpeded spread of invasive species is one of the greatest threats to Guam's economy, natural environment, and the health and lifestyle of its people. Invasive pests can cause millions of dollars in crop losses, the extinction of native species, the destruction of native forests, and the spread of disease.

There is increasing traffic of cargo being transported into Guam without a high priority for inspection of invasive species. It is most notable that there is also a lack of aquatic monitoring, or rapid response measures, to handle incidences of invasive species discovered at our ports of entry and inland. Thus the growing potential threat increases each year that enforcement and monitoring is not mandated and, most importantly, carried out. This Act aims to combat terrestrial, marine and freshwater invasive species that have been introduced into Guam and caused widespread havoc on our island and aquatic ecosystems.

invasive species; and that all feasible and prudent measures to minimize risk of harm will be taken in conjunction with the actions.

- (b) Government of Guam agencies shall pursue the duties set forth in this section in consultation with the Guam Invasive Species Council, consistent with the Guam Invasive Species Management Plan and in cooperation with stakeholders, as appropriate. The agencies shall report on their participation as detailed in § 70107(c) of this Chapter.
- § 70106. Conduct of Meetings. The council shall meet *no less than* two times annually to discuss and assess progress, and to recommend changes to the invasive species programs based on the results of current risk assessments, performance standards, and other relevant data. A simple majority of voting members of the council shall constitute a quorum to do business; and any action taken by the council shall be by a simple majority of the voting members.
- § 70107. Invasive Species Management Plan. (a) The Council shall prepare and issue the Guam Invasive Species Management Plan, which shall detail and recommend performance-oriented goals and objectives and specific measures of success for government of Guam agency efforts concerning invasive species. The Plan shall recommend specific objectives and measures for carrying out each of the government of Guam agency duties established in § 70105 of this Chapter and shall set forth steps to be taken by the Council to carry out duties assigned to it under § 70103. The Plan shall be developed through a public process and in consultation with government of Guam agencies and stakeholders.
- (b) The first edition of the Plan shall include a review of existing and prospective approaches and authorities for preventing the introduction and spread of invasive species on Guam, including those for identifying pathways by which invasive species are introduced in order to diminish the risk of introduction. It shall identify research needs and recommend measures to minimize the risk where introductions might occur; such recommended measures shall provide a science-based process to evaluate risks associated with the introduction and spread of invasive species. It will coordinate a systematic risk-based process to identify, monitor, and interdict pathways that may be involved in the introduction of invasive species. If recommended measures are not authorized by current law, the Council shall develop and recommend to the Governor, through its Co-Chairs, legislative proposals for necessary changes in authority.

(c) The Council shall update the Plan biennially and shall concurrently evaluate and report on the success in achieving the goals and objectives set forth. The Plan shall identify the personnel, other resources, and additional levels of cooperation needed to achieve the Plan's identified goals and objectives, and the Council shall provide each edition of the Plan and each report on it to the Bureau of Budget and Management Research (BBMR). Additionally, progress reports shall be submitted annually to the Office of the Governor. Within 18 months after measures have been recommended by the Council in any edition of the Plan, each government of Guam agency whose action is required to implement such measures shall either take the action recommended or shall provide the Council with an explanation of why the action is not feasible. The Council shall assess the effectiveness of this order no less than once each 3 years after the order is issued and shall report to the BBMR on whether the order should be revised."

- Section 3. Guam Invasive Species Inspection Fee, established. (a) There is imposed a fee for the inspection, quarantine, and eradication of invasive species contained in any freight, including but not limited to marine commercial container shipment, air freight, or any other means of transporting freight, foreign or domestic, that is brought into Guam. The fee shall be paid by the person responsible for paying the freight charges to the transportation company, who shall collect the fee and forward the payment to the Department of Administration at the port of disembarkation; provided that the transportation company shall not be liable for any fee that is not paid by the person responsible for paying the freight charges to the transportation company.
- (b) A fee of One Dollar (\$1.00) per ton, or any fraction thereof, shall be imposed on all freight brought into Guam.
- (c) All fees collected shall be deposited in the Guam Invasive Species Inspection Fee Fund.
- Section 4. Guam Invasive Species Inspection Fee Fund, created. (a) There is hereby created, separate and apart from other funds of the government of Guam, a fund to be known as the "Guam Invasive Species Inspection Fee Fund" (hereinafter "the Fund"). The Fund shall not be commingled with the General Fund and shall be kept in a separate bank account. All expenditures of the Fund shall be made exclusively by appropriation of I Liheslaturan Guahån (the Guam Legislature). Notwithstanding any other provision of law, any funds appropriated to the Department of Agriculture pursuant to this Chapter shall be administered by the Director of Agriculture. The

Director of Agriculture shall be the Certifying Officer of such funds. The Fund shall not be used as a pledge of security or as collateral for government loans. The Director of Administration shall make a quarterly report to *I Maga'lahen Guahån* (the Governor of Guam) and *I Liheslatura* (the Legislature) of the condition of, and activity within, the Fund.

- **(b)** The fees collected shall be expended to: (i) support efforts to provide inspection, quarantine and eradication of invasive species contained in any freight brought to Guam; (ii) support efforts to eradicate invasive species present on Guam by means of a rapid response team; and (iii) develop the Guam Invasive Species Management Plan and its updates.
- Section 5. Biosecurity Division, authorized. The Department of Agriculture is authorized to create a Biosecurity Division to function as its first responders in efforts to address invasive species coming to, and already present on, Guam. The Director of Agriculture shall prepare a budget plan, including projected personnel needs and other items, and submit it as part of the Fiscal Year 2012 budget request for the Department of Agriculture.
- Section 6. Severability Clause. However, it is the intent of I Liheslatura to put a higher priority on inspection and surveillance of invasive species by creating a Biosecurity Division under the Department of Agriculture for the protection of our natural resources from biological invasion and threats, and the protection of our geographical area from invasion by unwanted organisms.

The Guam Legislature Libeslatura further finds that nationally, invasive species councils have mobilized efforts to combat invasive species through funding sources generated by fees at all ports of entry, penalties for violations, eradication funding and government assisted grants.

Furthermore, this Act will place the value of our precious resources as a top priority in order to combat harmful invasive species that have the potential to devastate our environment, agriculture, and livelihood of our people.



My name is Mariquita Taitague and I am the Director of the Department of Agriculture. Thank you for the opportunity to testify on Bill 111 an act relative to establishing the Guam invasive species Council under the Department of Agriculture.

The Department of Agriculture recognizes the need to place a higher authority on inspection to prevent biological invasion and threats, however we also recognize the importance of Customs and Quarantines role in their efforts in providing the "First Line of Defense" as well as the Department of Agricultures role for inland inspections and surveillance.

I had the opportunity along with other stake holders to a one (1) hour presentation given by Customs and Quarantine showing there efforts and future plans in protecting our borders. I was impressed by their efforts and feel it would be critical to include Customs and Quarantine as co chairs along side of the Department of Agriculture in this legislation.

We support the intent of Bill 111 but we are not in support of this Bill in its present form.

We humbly request the following amendments be made to reflect:

- The inclusion of the Guam Customs and Quarantine as an equal co-chair to the Guam Invasive Species Advisory Council.
- 2. To identify funding for an additional entomologist, botanist and plant pathologist.
- 3. To insure both Agencies share resources.
- 4. To revisit Section 4 regarding funding source only after attempts have been made to secure funding through federal funds or grants, and that funding will be shared by both agencies whether awarded to Customs and Quarantine or Agriculture for the Bio Security Task Force.

We appreciate your support in these recommendations to allow both agencies to work together in protecting our island.

#### **TESTIMONY on Bill 111-31**

Submitted by: Maj. Vincent S.N. Perez

Title: Acting Director, Guam Customs & Quarantine Agency

Hafa adai and good evening Senators. I am Major Vincent Perez. I am temporarily the Acting Director of the Guam Customs & Quarantine Agency while Col. Ralph Sgambelluri is currently off island attending a management conference.

I am here representing the views of the Agency as it relates to this Bill.

Customs recognizes the need to increase enforcement efforts relating to invasive species interdiction and response on Guam and is currently taking proactive steps in that direction. The Agency recognizes the need for Agriculture to increase its resources in the establishment of a Bio-security division, and invasive species council.

However- the Agency is not in support of this bill in its present form.

I will present the reasons for opposition to Bill 111-31 in its present form; then I will expand on those reasons; and finally I will present Recommendations to enhance and improve the capacities of the Bill.

The Agency is in opposition of this bill in its present form for the following reasons:

**First**- this bill as written fails to recognize the important and inherent role that Customs has regarding agriculture and the role it plays in the Bio-security program at the borders. No regard was given to identify Customs as an equal co-chair on the Guam Invasive Species Council that this bill addresses. The legislation provides no reference within the legislation on the role that Customs has at the border.

**Second-** the bill is aimed at creating overlapping functions and authorities at the border which are contrary to current statutes and is a significant departure from the bio-security program worked on between Customs and the Department of Agriculture.

And finally- if enacted upon, it serves to re-establish another layer of bureaucracy when it comes to the inspection and clearance of goods and merchandise at the borders.

#### CQA IS AN INHERENT PART OF THE BIO-SECURITY PROGRAM

The Agency's inspection protocols ensure the inspection of all articles and people passing through Guam's borders. Although the Agency has reduced capabilities because of limited manpower, resources, and funding, the Agency has established an Agriculture Security Task Force to focus on this threat. This Task Force provides an additional capacity in the inspection and screening process further enhancing current capabilities at the Ports of entry.

As a collaborative effort, it is more beneficial to enhance current capabilities for Customs as well as build capacity for the Department of Agriculture. Improving Customs capabilities at the borders, in addition to building capacity for the Department of Agriculture will ensure that bio-security enforcement is done at the border and monitoring is done inland to combat potential and current terrestrial, marine and other invasive species into Guam. This allows all border related issues pertaining to invasive species to be handled by Customs. Any inland issues with regard to the monitoring and surveillance of invasive species will be handled by the Department of Agriculture This synergistic approach allows much more protection against potential threats.

As a collaborator for USDA and the Department of Agriculture, Customs' core competency exists in border management and enforcement and is comprised of personnel who specialize in the art and techniques of reviewing and inspecting imported merchandise for compliance with applicable import requirements;

The Agency utilizes as part of its enforcement capabilities functional programs that are specialized and geared towards heightening its effectiveness in the detection and interdiction of contraband in violation of agricultural laws through the utilization of Agricultural Detection Canine, and the Customs Bio-security Task Force personnel.

The Agency has established facility upgrades designed to further enhance its detection and interdiction of agricultural violations through our ports of entry. (i.e. PACAIR Facility, x-ray machines under DOI Grant, etc.)

In addition, the Agency is currently applying for a grant from the Department of the Interior that will help solidify the Customs Biosecurity Program at the border. This proposal is currently under review by the Governor's Office.

### CURRENT STATUTE AND ORIGINAL BIO-SECURITY PROGRAM PROPOSAL

Current statutes empowered Customs with the enforcement of agricultural laws at our borders. Because of redundancies passengers, goods, and commodities were exposed to a longer, bureaucratic, and time consuming process.

These bureaucratic issues were reduced when statute enabled Customs to absorb the Plant Protection & Quarantine functions. This expanded Agriculture's capabilities. During this early period, 19 Plant Protection & Quarantine Inspectors were assimilated and cross trained as well as having 119 customs officers trained and certified in plant protection and quarantine enforcement- exponentially increasing the scope and effectiveness for protecting our borders;

This bill should reinforce the current framework of our core competencies and perhaps expand them within each of our own areas.

Rather than increasing the capabilities for one entity while reducing the other, expanding capabilities both at border and inland would be much more effective. Expanding both capacities will minimize bureaucracy and ensure timely delivery of services.

#### **CQA RECOMMENDATIONS**

Customs recommends the following:

- 1. REVISE BILL 111-31- to Include the Customs & Quarantine Agency alongside the Department of Agriculture while maintaining separate and distinct divisions of enforcement at the border and in-land.
- 2. Incorporate language for shared communication, coordination, and sharing of resources;
- 3. Keep Bill within the current statutory framework;
- 4. Finally- Identify and delineate the division of responsibilities and explain how each entity will utilize its resources.

Mr. Chairman and members of this committee, I am sad to say that our beautiful island is infested with non-indigenous pests that are destroying the fabric of our island's agricultural industry. Mr. Chairman and members of the committee, our island would not have these epidemic pest problems if quarantine measures had been properly supported and effectively carried out in the past. As we move forward to increase tourist numbers, pending military build-up and the economic benefits for our island society that flow from these efforts, we must continue to be mindful of the possibility to bringing in detrimental organism that hitchhike along with the many aircraft and ships that arrive on Guam. Our beautiful island, our agricultural industry, indeed the basis of our culture, must remain constantly guarded to prevent any additional organisms from arriving and taking roots here.

A successful agricultural industry is a multi-million dollar operation. Economic indicators project 1.5 million visitors will visit our island yearly. Assuming 1 in 50 Japanese tourists could purchase a gift carton of melon containing 4 fruits; this would represent an annual market of about 50 tons of premium quality fruits. Similar market may also be expected for fruits such as papaya, tangerine, star apple and guava. However, at present selling

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fruits to returning Japanese tourists is out of the question while the destructive pest is present in the Marianas.

The presence of destructive pests on Guam and the surrounding islands is considered a major impediment to agricultural development for two reasons: Significant damage to cash crops and quarantine measures which prohibit shipments of fresh fruits and vegetables to potential markets. In order for our island community to fully develop its agricultural industry, it is incumbent upon the leaders of Guam to look at various methods of eradicating this pest that is destroying the fabric of our agricultural industry. I firmly believe that the intent of Bill 111-31 will do the job.

## **Definition of Invasive Species?**

Over the last few years there has been an ever increasing emphasis on invasive species. Our surroundings are changing because of them. Not only are invasive species threatening our agriculture and our forests, they are also causing major impacts to several of our major cities. Outbreaks of medfly in California and Florida have at times been widespread and costly. In New York City and Chicago, thousands of ornamental trees have been destroyed at a cost of several millions in an attempt to eradicate the Asian Long-horned beetle

So just what is an invasive species? An unofficial definition could be that an invasive species is a species that does not naturally occur in a specific area and whose introduction does or is likely to cause economic or environmental harm or harm to human health.

Official U.S. definitions regarding invasive species were provided in Executive Order 13112 signed by President William Clinton on February 3, 1999.

"Invasive species" means an alien species whose introduction does or is likely to cause economic or environmental harm or harm to human health.

"<u>Alien species</u>" means, with respect to a particular ecosystem, any species, including its seeds, eggs, spores, or other biological material capable of propagating that species, that is not native to that ecosystem.

"Species" means a group of organisms all of which have a high degree of physical and genetic similarity, generally interbreed only among themselves, and show persistent differences from members of allied groups of organisms.

"<u>Ecosystem</u>" means the complex of a community of organisms and its environment.




