COMMITTEE REPORT DIGEST

I. OVERVIEW

The Committee on Education and Public Libraries convened a public hearing on June 23, 2011 at 2:00 p.m. in *I Liheslatura*'s Public Hearing Room. Among the items on the agenda was the consideration of Bill No. 192-31 (COR) "An act to add a new § 34102 to Chapter 34 of Title 17, Guam Code Annotated, relative to establishing a scholarship program for economically-disadvantaged students; providing funding sources for the program; and, citing this act as the "Growing Guam's Work Force Scholarship Program," sponsored by Senator Christopher M. Duenas.

II. SUMMARY OF TESTIMONY & DISCUSSION

Speaker Judith T. Won Pat, Ed.D. convened the public hearing to order at 2:00 p.m. and announced the agenda of the public hearing. Bill No. 192-31 (COR) was announced as one of the items on the agenda to be heard by the Committee.

- Senator Duenas stated the intent of the bill is to assist those who are economically disadvantage the financial assistance to attend Guam Community College and to strengthen Guam's Workforce. He summarized how the scholarship program would be administered, funded and who would be qualified to receive the scholarship. He stated he hopes the scholarship program would help those break through barriers to attend a post secondary institution.

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- Mr. Roberto testified in support of the legislation. His testimony is appended to the committee report.
- Ms. Santos testified in support of the bill. Her testimony is appended to the committee report.
- Attorney Brown testified in support of the legislation. He stated the legislation would help plant the seed which would help our community.
- Senator Duenas stated the recommendation of a 2.0 grade point average made by Mr. Roberto would be considered, however it is more likely applicable to be considered in Bill 193.
- Speaker Won Pat, Ed.D. asked Ms. Santos, if the college would be able to handle 500 new registrants.
- Ms. Santos replied there was a 25% student increase compared to last year, which is amounted to over 500 students and we were able to handle that.
- Speaker Won Pat, Ed.D. asked what is the tuition and fee per year per student.
- Ms. Santos replied in the fall semester the tuition per credit is 130 dollars and If a student is taking 4 courses at 3 credits a course, it's about 400 times 4 equals \$1600 plus the fees and so the average is 2000- 2500 per semester. But it depends on what course they take.
- Speaker Won Pat, Ed.D. asked the amount of PELL grant that GCC received.
- Ms. Santos replied 4 million this last semester. She said about sixty five percent of students receive financial assistance.
- Speaker Won Pat, Ed.D asked what happens to students who are recipients of financial aid and are no longer in standing.
- Ms. Santos responded in the first semester, students receive the PELL awards and after their academic standard is reviewed and if they fall below a certain level they are placed under probation and they are warned that if they don't bring up their grades, they will not receive PELL awards after 3rd semester.
- Senator Mabini, Ph.D. stated there are some students who perhaps have some cross enrollment with Guam Trades Academy with GCC. She asked if this bill would prohibit individuals who want to benefit from this scholarship system from attending the trades academy.
- Ms. Santos replied based on what I read, there is no restriction. She stated GCC has a MOU with the Guam Trades Academy and the tuition of any of the approved students from Guam trades academy is paid from the MDF account.
- Speaker Won Pat Ed.D asked the criteria or qualifications to receive the PELL grant.

- Ms. Santos responded first they have to fill out the FAFSA and fill out basic information such as your income and if your dependant your family's income and the PELL award would be based on how many credits you would be taking.
- Speaker Won Pat, Ed.D. asked the difference between the PELL grant and this proposed scholarship program.
- Ms. Santos replied they can receive both. She stated if they receive the PELL and if it is not enough to cover all of their classes, this new scholarship program would be a supplement.
- Speaker Won Pat Ed.D. asked about how does GCC advertise financial aid programs.
- Ms. Santos stated GCC does have sessions before school starts the availability of financial aids and the requirements. She stated GCC has a college access challenge grant program which we are targeting middle and high school students, letting them know there are opportunities available for college.
- Senator Yamashita stated the possibility of GCC and UOG including as a component what financial aid is available as part of the entry application process.
- Speaker Won Pat, Ed.D. asked if there is a repayment for the PELL grant.
- Ms. Santos stated no repayment.
- Mr. Roberto reiterated the importance of allowing a wider group to participate in the scholarship program by placing the GPA at least at 2.0.
- Speaker Won Pat, Ed.D stated there are always a couple of students who are slightly don't meet the criteria and yet they just don't qualify. She asked if GCC find a means to address this issue.

There being no further questions or comments, Speaker Won Pat, Ed.D. concluded the hearing for Bill No. 192-31 (COR).

III. FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

The Committee on Education and Public Libraries has made the following significant amendments to Bill No.192-31 (COR):

- 1. Eligible students shall be a non degree holder.
- 2. First installment payable first semester of the freshman year and the second installment payable the first semester of their sophomore year.

- 3. Service requirement after graduation, failure to fulfill requirements and exceptions.
- 4. Reporting requirements to the Guam Legislature.
- 5. The effective date of this Act shall be the beginning in the 2012-2013 Academic Year.

AN ACT TO ADD A NEW § 34102 TO CHAPTER 34 OF TITLE 17, GUAM CODE ANNOTATED, RELATIVE TO ESTABLISHING A SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM FOR ECONOMICALLY-DISADVANTAGED STUDENTS; PROVIDING FUNDING SOURCES FOR THE PROGRAM; AND, CITING THIS ACT AS THE "GROWING GUAM'S WORK FORCE SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM."

BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF GUAM:

Section 1. Legislative Intent. The Guam Community College offers a wide variety of technical, vocational and other occupational training and education-related courses aimed at developing educated and skilled workers for Guam. The "Growing Guam's Work Force Scholarship Program" seeks to provide economically-disadvantaged students with the ability to experience post secondary education in the hopes that the students assisted will seek other financial means to remain in school and complete a certificate program. The emphasis of offering an enticement to experience higher education could be the difference between a person who needs to immediately work to support his family, and who cannot afford the costs to attend the Guam Community College, and a person who can be of greater benefit to his family with both an exposure to higher education and, perhaps, the job skills to become highly employable.

- Section 2. A new § 34102 is added to Chapter 34 of Title 17, Guam Code Annotated to read:
- **"§ 34102.** Growing Guam's Work Force Scholarship Program, created. (a) There is hereby created the "Growing Guam's Work Force Scholarship Program." Awards granted under this Article shall be granted for AY2012-2013 and thereafter.
- **(b)** Administration of Program. The Guam Community College Board of Trustees *shall* administer this program pursuant to § 34102 of this Chapter.

- (c) Rules and Regulations. All rules and regulations adopted *prior* to the enactment of this Article *shall* remain effective *unless* they are *amended or repealed* by the Board in a manner consistent with § 34102 of this Chapter.
 - (d) Selection Committee. The President of Guam Community College *shall* annually establish an Evaluation and Selection Committee (the Committee).

The Committee *shall* conduct interviews for the purpose of selecting scholarship recipients under the programs listed within this Chapter. The passing of the oral interviews and the meeting of established Guam Community College entrance and academic requirements *shall* constitute the primary criteria for selection of scholarship recipients. The Board may prescribe additional qualifications for admission to the scholarship programs.

Applications for the *Growing Guam's Work Force Scholarship Program shall* be received by April 30 of every year and applicants *shall* be interviewed at a time and place designated by the Committee *prior* to June 30. Awards *shall* be granted *prior* to July 30 in a written notice to the selected applicant, and the applicant's school administrator, if applicable.

- (e) Academic Advisor and Program Contract. Each program scholarship recipient shall have an academic advisor who, with the student, shall develop a complete academic plan that would result in the granting of the applicable degree within the prescribed period of time. This plan shall be examined by the appropriate College official, as determined by the Board, and upon approval, shall constitute a contract between the student and the College.
- (f) Scholarships. The Growing Guam's Work Force Scholarship Program shall consist of students who have declared their intention to attend the Guam Community College. Scholarships may be awarded to eligible students who meet the following criteria:
 - (a) bona fide residents of Guam;

- (b) citizens or permanent resident aliens of the United States;
- (c) seniors or graduates of an accredited high school with a cumulative grade point average of not less than 3.0 on a 4.0 scale, or its equivalent;
- (d) official acceptance to Guam Community College in accordance with its admissions
 policies;
 - (e) must be in financial need, which shall be determined by regulations authorized by § 34102 of this Chapter. In addition, the applicant must complete a 'Free Application for Federal Student Aid' ('FAFSA') form as documentary evidence of need;

Honorable Speaker Won Pat and Committee Members,

I would like to thank you for the opportunity to come before you today to present my testimony in support of Bill No. 192-31, the ""Growing Guam's Work Force Scholarship Program;" Bill No. 193-31, the "Building Guam's Trades Scholarship Program;" and Bill No. 198-31, the "Every Child is Entitled to a Higher Education Scholarship Program."

The Guam Community College lauds the intent of all three of these bills, the first two having been authored by Senator Chris Duenas, and Bill 198-31, co-authored by Senators Duenas and Dr. Aline Yamashita.

GCC does, however, have one recommendation. We highly recommend adding additional language that specifically states, "after exhausting all federal sources that may be available for economically disadvantaged students, such as PELL grants, Workforce Investment Act funding, or other sources." The addition of this phrase into each of these three pieces of legislation will prevent any attempt to supplant federal funds by the use of local resources to provide for these scholarships. In addition, the College recognizes the need to incorporate an assessment tool similar to the nationally recognized WorkKeys System for Job Analysis, Assessment and Training, to support the implementation of these proposed scholarship programs. Such an assessment tool would insure that the student receiving the scholarship would possess the necessary basic educational skills to be able to pursue the training required, and if the student needed additional training, would provide that additional training through a self-study program.

Thank you for the opportunity to testify today. I will be happy to answer any questions you may have about the proposed changes to our enabling legislation at this time.

WRITTEN TESTIMONY ON BILL 192-31

Hafa Adai Senator Duenas, members of the 31st Guam Legislature. On behalf of the Agency for Human Resources Development, thank you for the opportunity to provide testimony on Bill 192-31.

The Agency for Human Resources Development is in support of Bill 192-31 and is recommending that consideration be made to the amend the criteria specifically (c) of Section (f) Scholarships - "cumulative grade point average of not less than 3.0 on a 4.0 scale, or its equivalent; to read:

"cumulative grade point average of not less than 2.0 on a 4.0 scale, or its equivalent';

In 2004, the Agency partnered with the Guam Public School System and the Guam Community College to establish the Passports-to-Careers, a year round learning continuum program designed to take youth through a pipeline system, preparing them for more structured training and providing them with employability skills to meet the needs of employers. The goal of PTC is to prepare high school students in the Career Path with skills and competencies to enter the workforce. This program provides the opportunity for Guam's youth to participate in the job market identified by the power of e3 within the: Construction Trades, Allied Health, and Business Technology industries.

One of three target population we serve is "economically-disadvantaged youth", in our experiences servicing disadvantaged youths, a good percentage of this target population will not be able to meet the proposed cumulative grade point average identified Section (f), thus making it difficult for those who are most in need of this scholarship program not be eligible.

Again, we are in support of Bill 192-31 with the above recommendation to be considered.
