#### COMMITTEE REPORT DIGEST

#### I. OVERVIEW

The Committee on Education and Public Libraries convened a public hearing on September 28, 2012 at 4:00 p.m. in *I Liheslatura*'s Public Hearing Room. Among the items on the agenda was the consideration of Bill No. 509-31 (COR) - An act to add a new Chapter 15A of Division 3, Title 17 Guam Code Annotated relative to the Student Financial Assistance Programs

#### II. SUMMARY OF TESTIMONY & DISCUSSION

**Speaker Won Pat, Ed.D.** convened the public hearing to order at 4:05 p.m. and announced the agenda of the public hearing for Bill No. 509-31 (COR).

- Speaker Won Pat, Ed.D. stated that nationwide with college enrollment growing, student debt has stretched to a record number of U.S. households — nearly 1 in 5 — with the biggest burdens falling on the young and poor. The analysis by the Pew Research Center found that 22.4 million households, or 19 percent, had college debt in 2010. That is double the share in 1989, and up from 15 percent in 2007, just prior to the recession — representing the biggest three-year increase in student debt in more than two decades. The increase was driven by higher tuition costs as well as rising college enrollment during the economic downturn. The biggest jumps occurred in households at the two extremes of the income distribution. More well-off families are digging deeper into their pockets to pay for costly private colleges, while lower-income people in search of higher-wage jobs are enrolling in community colleges, public universities and other schools as a way to boost their resumes.

Because of the sluggish economy, fewer college students than before are able to settle into full-time careers immediately upon graduation, contributing to a jump in debt among lower-income households as the young adults take on part-time jobs or attend graduate school, according to Pew. As a share of household income, the debt burden was the greatest for the poorest 20 percent of households, or those making less than \$21,044. In all, 40 percent of U.S. households headed by someone younger than age 35 owed college debt, the highest share of any age group.

"Comparing the debt to their economic resources, the lowest-income fifth of households are the ones experiencing the greatest stresses," said Richard Fry, a senior economist at Pew who analyzed the numbers. Noting that college enrollment has continued to climb since 2010, Fry added: "Until college enrollment peaks, I would not expect the amount of outstanding student debt to level off."

The study released Wednesday is based on the Survey of Consumer Finances, conducted every three years and sponsored by the Federal Reserve."The last thing we want for our young people is to have to deal with an overwhelming student loan debt because they wanted to get an education. This is why I think this proposed legislation is very timely and one of the main reasons I worked closely with UOG to get this bill introduced quickly.

As a summary, this bill proposes to make some fundamental changes to the Student Financial Assistance Programs currently administered by University of Guam. The bill would allow the University, through its Board of Regents, more control over the programs and would ultimately provide financial assistance to more of our people to attend the University of Guam.

In Article 2 concerning the Merit Award, the bill proposed to keep the program but eliminate the offisland provision.

In Article 3, the PROTECH Award is renamed the Jesus U. Torres Professional and Technical Awards and makes several program changes taken from an earlier bill introduced by Vice Speaker Cruz. The revised award will increase the dollar amounts for students who are pursuing an MD, a Doctorate in Dental Surgery or Dental Medicine, a Doctorate Clinical Psychology, and a Doctorate in Veterinary Medicine, from \$25,000 per academic year to \$35,000. The bill also will allow students to attend a non-US medical school if the school is in the World Health Organization medical school listing approved by the Guam Board of Medical Examiners or the Council on Medical Education and Hospitals of the American Medical Association. The service requirement remains the same, for every \$10,000 that a student receives; he will have to work on Guam for one year.

In Article 4, the bill proposes a new program called the Higher Education Financial Assistance Program. The program will award to a student who meets certain residency, academic, and financial need criteria, an amount between \$500 to \$3,000 per academic year towards a bachelor's degree. The amount awarded to a student will depend on their financial need determined by filling out the Free Application for Federal Student Aid or FAFSA. That award scale would be determined by the Board of Regents and can be adjusted to keep in step with the federal guidelines of the Pell grant award. This is the program I expect our students will benefit from the most.

Also in this legislation, the Government of Guam Student Loan program will be discontinued beginning in the 2013-2014 academic year. Savings from this program will be used to fund the Higher Education Financial Assistance Program.

The Doc Sanchez Program, The Yamashita Teacher Corp, The Nursing Training Program will continue under this legislation, but with greater control by the Board of Regents of the University of Guam. The University of Guam is best able to determine the specific criteria for these programs as they are more aware of the daily academic challenges and needs of our students.

That in a nutshell is Bill 509-31(COR), let's hear from individuals present who would like to offer testimony.

- **Dr. Underwood** expressed support of the legislation. Thank you for the opportunity to provide testimony on bill 509-31. I am in testifying in favor of the proposed legislation. I believe this is a good step forward in assisting more of our students in obtaining their undergraduate degree at the University of Guam.

The most important aspect of this legislation is the shift in control of the financial assistance program to the University. We feel strongly that we are better able to address academic issues and assess education needs of the community much quicker and in "real-time" without having to go through additional legislation. This flexibility allows us to examine the needs of the community and make adjustments to the programs with regards to amounts awarded, entry dates, benefits, and others.

An example of where this increased control would have been beneficial is in our Teacher Corp program where we are now inundated with certain type of teachers that Guam DOE cannot accommodate. Midyear adjustments and multiple entry dates into the program could not be possible under the current law.

Another example is the current way we award local and federal student aid. Greater control of local aid means that we can tightly package federal financial aid with local aid - giving a potential UOG student a clearer picture of how much total financial assistance she will receive if she attends UOG. Most schools do this. The most we can do, is tell students their potential federal aid. It's hard to compete with a school that can outline a total financial aid package for a student that meets most of their financial needs.

Currently, the application for the Government of Guam programs is separate from the federal programs and often is more cumbersome and more complex than its federal counterpart. This level of complexity delays or deters students from applying for government of Guam aid.

Finally, this legislation recognizes the hard work of the students, staff, faculty and administrators over the past 60 years in making UOG the natural choice for our students. We no longer need to send our people off-island to get a good quality education. When the original SFAP legislation was introduced, it made sense that we allowed our best and brightest to go off-island to obtain a quality education. Today, quality education can be obtained at the University of Guam.

- Mr. Duarte explained that the proposed bill would change the application process. Students before they graduate from high school they would be able to know how much they can receive from both federal and local programs before they are admitted to the university. He stated that the deadline the government programs is April 30<sup>th</sup> and most of our graduates they don't meet the deadline and they have to wait the following academic year and the application processes is so tedious and discourages individuals from applying.
- Speaker Won Pat, Ed.D. asked how many students are attending the university.
- Dr. Underwood responding by stating that the university has over 3700 students enrolled.
- Speaker Won Pat, Ed.D asked how many students are receiving financial aid
- Mr. Duarte replied that 75 percent of the students.
- Speaker Won Pat, Ed.D. commented that the legislation would increase the number of financial aid recipients.
- Mr. Duarte replied that the number of recipients of the government of Guam scholarship would increase.
- **Dr. Underwood** stated the bill would strategically affect more students. Instead of giving 300 students \$3000 each, we are able to give 900 students \$1000 each and we are able to get more service commitment at the end and we are leveraging more financial aid from the federal side and this become one composite view. He further stated that this would put the first level on financial aid on the federal government and the local government will make up the difference.
- Speaker Won Pat, Ed.D. asked how many students who received financial aid from the government of Guam and did not return back to Guam.
- Mr. Duarte answered that the off-island merit scholarship recipients rank first in default followed by the Pro-tech recipients.
- Dr. Underwood stated for every three students only one student returns.
- Speaker Won Pat, Ed.D asked if the scholarships have a service component.
- Mr. Duarte replied the local scholarships have service components.
- Senator Pangelinan spoke about a national publication that he read that addressed the student financial aid program and the confusing nature of the grantors. He stated there is a move in Congress to create uniformity in a way letters are drafted and offers are made. He wanted to bring this issue to the intention of the university. He recommended that the letter to the students should be clear and accurate in the terms of the responsibilities of the student and the university.
- Mr. Duarte replied that he has discussed this matter with his peers in the financial aid program. He emphasized the university letter is based on a standardized methodology. He further elaborated that the

university letter is simpler and transparent and not confusing, because the university has three federal aid programs and local aid programs.

- **Dr. Underwood** stated the confusion rest with the federal loan. Students are presented with a certain amount that they can receive and they get into trouble by mismanagement of the loan by buying a car He stressed that the university does not manage the loan, it is the responsibility of the student, but the university is held responsible for the students not obtaining an education.
- Senator Barnes asked if the existing recipients be affected if this bill becomes law.
- Mr. Duarte stated no.
- Senator Barnes asked if bill would affect the Pro-tech award recipients going off-island to other institutions.
- Mr. Duarte stated no.
- Senator Barnes asked if students attending college in the mainland will be able to qualify for Pro-tech award.
- Mr. Duarte stated that the bill removes the word continuous and therefore a person no longer has to be a resident of Guam continuously for ten years, just ten years during his or her life span.
- **Dr. Underwood** explained that some students attending college off-island change their resident status to obtain state resident tuition rate.
- Senator Tom Ada expressed concern of the eligibility for the scholarships especially with the high demand and the limited dollars funded for the programs. He would like to see that U.S. citizens be given preferential treatment followed by the permanent residents and green card holders.
- Mr. Duarte responded that the university is following the same guidelines applied to federal aid programs.
- Senator Tom Ada asked if the university is indifferent.
- **Dr. Underwood** replied that the university is not indifferent, but the university is looking at protecting its federal funding. However, he stated that they will research the matter.
- Senator Tom Ada noted that the bill states that merit scholarship recipients are from public and private schools, but DODEA does not fall into either category.
- Dr. Underwood replied that the inclusion of DODEA was made by a previous legislature.
- Senator Tom Ada stated that a student is afforded the opportunity to defer his/her service if the student decides to go on with graduate or post graduate studies. He stated that ROTC graduates should be given a 4 year deferment because of their military service.
- **Senator Tom Ada** questioned what if a student is unable to find employment within 6 months after graduation.

- Mr. Duarte replied the rules and regulations provides the board to give further extension if the student demonstrate he/she is seeking employment.
- **Senator Tom Ada** asked for clarification what is a non profit is accrediting body approved by the Guam Medical Examinee.
- **Speaker Won Pat** stated that this language was incorporated from another bill to allow Guam residents to attend foreign medical school graduates to receive the Pro-tech award.
- Senator Tony Ada asked if additional funding would be needed if the bill becomes law.
- Mr. Mark Duarte replied no.
- -Speaker Won Pat, Ed.D. adjourned the public hearing.

#### III. FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

AN ACT TO ADD A NEW CHAPTER 15A OF DIVISION 3, TITLE 17 GUAM CODE ANNOTATED RELATIVE TO THE STUDENT FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE PROGRAMS

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF GUAM:

Section 1. Legislative Findings and Intent. I Liheslaturan Guahan finds
that access to higher education is becoming more difficult as costs continue to rise
at all institutions of higher education across the nation. The biggest source of
financial assistance for most college students in the United States remains the
federal government's Title IV programs (U.S. Higher Education Act) consisting
mainly of the Pell Grant and the Direct Student Loan programs.

I Liheslatura further finds that while Title IV programs have been extremely helpful in supplementing a student's cost of education, aid to students have steadily lagged behind rising higher education costs, resulting in students and their families opting to sign up for costly education loans.

In an effort to assist students to fill these funding gaps, most states have implemented programs to assist the most needy students and families in their communities with state grants to attend universities within their jurisdiction.

1	Programs	such	as	the	Cal	Grant	(California),	the	Hawaii	State	Incentive	Grant

- 2 (Hawaii), and the Oregon Opportunity Act (Oregon) are examples of programs that
- 3 provide grants to their students that meet certain residency, financial, and academic
- 4 requirements. These state grants, in conjunction with Title IV programs offered by
- 5 the federal government, allow more students access to higher education.
- I Liheslatura further finds that, although Guam currently offers financial assistance to residents to pursue higher education, these programs are often cumbersome and bureaucratic, requiring separate application forms with different application due dates and eligibility requirements, resulting in confusion and frustration on the part of the student.
  - It is therefore the intent of *I Liheslatura* to reform the process of the locally funded financial aid programs by aligning the limited local resources with funds received from the federal government. The alignment of these resources will result in greater access for Guam residents to higher education by making it more affordable.
- Section 2. A new Chapter 15A is hereby added to Division 3 of Title 17

  Guam Code Annotated to read as follows:

§15A102. Administration. The provision of this Chapter shall be administered by the Board of Regents of the University of Guam, and all awards provided by this Chapter shall be granted by the Board. The Board of Regents may delegate to the management of the University, its authority granted under any Administrative Rules and Regulations.

§15A103. Fund. There is hereby established a Student Financial Assistance Fund hereinafter referred to as the "Fund" from which awards granted pursuant to this Chapter shall be financed. The Board is authorized to accept for the Funds gifts, devices; bequests, donations and all other kinds of contributions for the purposes of the Fund. The Fund may be supplemented by annual appropriations to the extent made necessary by awards granted pursuant to this Chapter. The Fund shall be administered by the Board and all moneys appropriated for awards pursuant to this Chapter and all repayment of such awards, made under this Chapter, shall be paid directly to the Fund and dispensed by the Board. Within sixty (60) days after the closing of each fiscal year, the Board shall transmit to the Legislature an annual report consistent with §15A112 of this Article.

§15A104. Regulations. The Board, subject to the provisions of the Administrative Adjudication Law, shall make regulations pursuant to and not inconsistent with the provision of this Chapter.

§15A105. Application Forms and Notices. The Board shall prescribe by regulation necessary application forms and procedures for all awards pursuant to this Chapter. The Board shall give notice to the community to permit interested students, who shall be residents of Guam

and citizens of the United States of America, or a permanent resident alien, an opportunity to apply for the awards granted by this Chapter.

§15A106. Limitation on Awards. No person receiving benefits under one article of this Chapter shall be entitled to benefits under any other article of this Chapter, and no person receiving benefits under any teacher training program, in-service training program or other government of Guam education programs shall be entitled to benefits under the provision of this Chapter.

§15A107. Discharge of Award Obligations Upon Death or Disability. The Board may, upon death or disability of a student who is receiving or has received an award under the provisions of this Chapter, discharge in full or in part all obligations for the repayment of said award.

§15A108. Garnishment of Income Tax Refunds in the Event of Default. The Board may, subject to the terms and conditions of a Memorandum of Understanding with the Department of Revenue and Taxation, garnish the tax refunds due to any recipients of assistance pursuant to this Chapter and/or recipient's co-signer(s) who has defaulted on the repayment of such assistance and a judgment has been issued. Such garnishment shall not exceed the judgment amount.

§15A109. Interest Computation on Financial Assistance Awarded On or After Award Year 2013-2014 for Non Cash (Non-Service Credit) Repayments. Interest on all awards of assistance made on or after Award Year 2013-2014, pursuant to this Chapter shall be computed on the outstanding balance on a simple interest basis beginning on the date of disbursement at an annual percentage rate of ten percent (10%). Repayment shall be made in either a lump sum by which the principal and accrued

- 1 interest up to the date of repayment is satisfied or through a periodic payment plan under the following conditions: 2 (a) the awardee can amortize the combined balance of principal and 3 accrued interest balances over a specified term at an annual 4 percentage rate of 10 percent (10%); 5 6
  - (b) the period for repayment shall not exceed ten (10) years; and
  - (c) all awardees choosing to repay assistance in cash in lieu of service credit must pay all accrued interest before any payments are applied to the principal of the debt.

Repayment of awards made prior to Award Year 2013-2014 shall be made pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 15 of this Title.

#### §15A110. Prohibition.

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- (a) No awards shall be granted under this Chapter for the purposes of pursuing theological studies.
- (b) No money may be expended for awards under this Chapter unless such awards are authorized by the Board by resolution. Any officer who disburses or certifies any expenditure from the Fund without such authorization shall be personally liable for the restitution of such expenditure to the Fund.
- §15A111. Prioritization of Awards. Beginning in the 2013-2014 award year, the Board shall adopt, by resolution, a listing of awarding priorities prior to awarding students under Articles 3 of this Chapter. Awarding priorities shall be established every three (3) years or sooner if requested by the President of the University.
- §15A112. Reporting Requirements. The Board shall submit a report of the Student Financial Assistance Programs for Higher Education to the

Governor of Guam and to the Speaker of *I Liheslaturan Guahan* no later than one month from the end of the Academic Year which, at the very least, shall contain the following information: the total number of recipients under this chapter, sorted by new and continuing recipients; the total number of students that have completed their degrees under Article 3, sorted by program; the total amount expended for the academic year; and any other information that *I Liheslatura* will deem helpful in the review of the programs in this chapter.

§15A201. Students Entitled to Merit Awards

§15A204. Rules and Regulations

#### §15A201. Students Entitles to Merit Awards.

- (a) There are established annual Merit Awards for high school students in the graduating classes of public and private high school licensed to do business on Guam now or hereafter established. The students entitled to these awards shall be the students having the highest scholastic standing in the graduating classes of each such public and non-public high school on Guam. The awards shall be determined as follows:
  - (1) One for every fifty (50) graduates or a fraction thereof of a school's graduating class. If as a result of the

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equal scholastic standing of two (2) or more graduates, there is a tie for the awards granted pursuant to this Chapter, the graduates' respective school shall provide a mechanism to break the tie. Awardees are entitled to four (4) years of education at the University of Guam.

(2) All awards shall be subject to the following limitations:

### A recipient must be a:

- (i) United States citizen, or a permanent resident alien, who has completed a minimum of three (3) but no more than four (4) academic years and meets all academic credit requirements for graduation during attendance in a public, non-public, or DODEA high school on Guam; and
- (ii) a resident of Guam for a continuous period of not less than five (5) years immediately preceding June 15<sup>th</sup> of the year the award is to be given.
- (4) To be eligible for a Merit Award, a student must have achieved a cumulative high school grade point average of not less than 3.00 or its equivalent at the time of graduation.
- (b) If any student is ineligible for an award because of failure to meet the requirements contained in Subsection (a) of this Section; or if any eligible student chooses not to accept an award when first offered such award, the award shall be granted to the eligible student with the next highest scholastic rank, on

in the case of a tie, the student that was eliminated by the tiebreaker. If an eligible student declines to accept an award when first offered, the student may not accept the award after it has been granted to another student. The recipient of a merit award must notify the Board within thirty (30) days that the award is accepted. Failure to notify the Board within thirty (30) days will forfeit the award and shall be offered to the next alternate.

- (c) Award recipients must agree that the recipient will work on Guam for a period of one (1) year for each academic year the award was received within six (6) months following the completion or termination of the course of study for which the award was granted; provided that if the recipient continues as a full-time student at a graduate or professional school, such recipient may defer work on Guam until such additional studies are completed.
- (d) Awards granted on or subsequent to the effective date of this Section shall be cancelled if a recipient:
- (1) fails to maintain a cumulative grade point average of 2.5 or its equivalent, except a recipient may be allowed one (1) academic term to regain the required grade point average without cancellation of the award, or
- (2) fails to meet the academic and/or other requirements governing full-time students at the University of Guam, except a recipient shall be allowed one (1) academic term to regain full-time status before cancellation of recipient's award.

1	§15A202. Benefits. Students entitled to merit awards pursuant to this
2	Article shall receive the following benefits:
3	(a) Tuition and Fees at the University of Guam. Tuition and
4	fees for each academic year to be paid by the Student Financial
5	Assistance Fund for a period of not more than four (4) years in an
6	undergraduate program at the University of Guam. For awards
7	granted under §15A201(a)(2) of this Article, student shall receive an
8	additional two (2) years of tuition and fees for a graduate degree at the
9	University of Guam. To be eligible for an additional award granted
10	under §15A201(a)(2), the awardee must begin their graduate program
11	at the University of Guam within three years from their undergraduate
12	completion date.
13	(b) Stipend. Award recipients are entitled to a monthly stipend
14	to be disbursed in nine (9) monthly installments during the academic
15	year, as follows:
16	(1) First Year and Second Year Students: Three Hundred
17	Dollars (\$300.00) per month.
18	(2) Third Year and Fourth Year Students: Five Hundred
19	Dollars (\$500.00) per month.
20	(3) Graduate Students: Six Hundred Dollars (\$600.00)
21	per month.
22	(c) Allowance for Textbooks. Each student receiving an award
23	under this Article shall be entitled to an additional Three Hundred and
24	Fifty Dollars (\$350.00) per semester for textbooks.
25	(d) Optional Inter-Session Allowed.

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- (1) Summer Semester. Each student shall be entitled to tuition for full time enrollment, fees, and textbooks.
- (2) Between Fall and Spring Semesters. Each student shall be entitled to tuition for full time enrollment, fees, and textbooks. Students attending inter-session between Fall and Spring Semesters shall not be entitled to an additional stipend.

§15A203. Service Credit. The financial assistance granted under this Article shall be repaid on a one-to-one basis for each year that assistance was provided through employment on Guam or in the office of Guam's Delegate to the United States Congress. In the event that any portion of the assistance is not repaid through service credit, the amount unpaid in service credit shall become due and payable.

- (a) In calculating the amount due and payable for failure to pay through service credit, the amount due shall be the total amount of assistance minus the number of years repaid through service credit. For purposes of this Section, a year of service credit is twelve (12) months. The Board may also extend payments of cash repayment by executing a promissory note for a term not to exceed ten (10) years at an annual percentage rate of not less than ten percent (10%). No amounts shall be considered due and payable during the time which the awardee is repaying service credit pursuant to the provisions in this Article.
- (b) The Board may allow deferrals of repayment through service for the following reasons:
  - (1) pursuit of a graduate degree; or

### (2) a family or medical emergency

(c) Any awardee granted an award pursuant to the provisions
of this Article must commence work on Guam within six (6) months
following the completion of studies, unless extended by the Board for
extenuating circumstances or will be considered in default of their
obligation as of the date classes ended. The permanent transfer to an
off-Guam office or branch of a Guam employer shall not count
towards service credit and shall result in default on the date of transfer
and interest shall begin accruing on such a date of default. Permanent
transfers, for purposes of this Section, are those that are longer than
six (6) months. The Board shall establish such policies prescribing
the length and terms of repayment, the interest rates to be charged,
and the collection of delinquent accounts.

(d) Death or total disability of the student shall terminate any obligations herein. Total disability for purposes of this Section is defined as any physiological or psychological condition that will prevent the student from obtaining or maintaining any form of gainful employment for a period of not less than three (3) years. The Board may defer repayment for temporary disability. Total and permanent disability requires the certification by two (2) physicians licensed to practice in the United States.

§15A204. Rules and Regulations. The Board shall develop appropriate rules and regulations for the administration of this Article.

§15A301. Students Entitled to Awards. There are established professional and technical awards for graduate studies. To qualify for these awards, applicants must meet the following criteria:

(a) The applicant must be a bona fide resident of Guam for a period of not less than ten (10) years prior to application, and a United States citizen, or a permanent resident alien, and must have achieved an overall grade point average of 3.00 in undergraduate studies if pursuing a master's degree or a professional degree, or a 3.33 grade point average in a master's degree or professional degree program if pursuing a doctoral degree or an irrevocable letter of acceptance from a U.S. accredited institution as recognized by the Council for Higher Education Accreditation (CHEA) or its successors or an irrevocable letter of acceptance from a foreign medical school as listed in the World Health Organization (WHO) listing of medical schools, which was approved by the Board of Medical Examiners or the Council on Medical Education and hospitals of the American Medical Association (or by a private non-profit accrediting body approved by the Guam Board of Medical Examiners.

(b) the applicant must agree to the repayment terms as specified in §15A303 and §15A304;

- (c) the applicant must present to the Board, prior to granting of the award, satisfactory proof that such applicant has been accepted by a U.S. accredited college or university, as recognized by the Council for Higher Education Accreditation (CHEA), or its successors, or satisfactory proof that such applicant has been accepted by a foreign medical school as listed in the World Health Organization (WHO) listing of medical schools, which was approved by the Board of Medical Examiners or the Council on Medical Education and hospitals of the American Medical Association or by a private non-profit accrediting body approved by the Guam Board of Medical Examines as a full-time student pursuing a program of study in the field applied for; and
- (d) the college or university must be properly accredited as recognized by the Council for Higher Education Accreditation (CHEA), or its successors, or the foreign medical school must be properly accredited as listed in the World Health Organization (WHO) listing of medical schools, which was approved by the Board of Medical Examiners or the Council on Medical Education and hospitals of the American Medical Association or by a private non-profit accrediting body approved by the Guam Board of Medical Examiners, and must be approved by the Board, however, that no award shall be granted for studies at an off-Guam institution in a program that is available at the University of Guam.

- (e) The Board shall select the recipients of the awards based upon the basis of scholastic ability, financial need, and aptitude. The Board may also use work or life-time experience and achievement criteria in place of the aptitude criteria, if it can be reasonably determined that the applicant will succeed in a course of study funded by an award herein.
- (f) In determining financial need, the applicant must submit a Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) to determine level of need.
- (g) No benefits as specified in §15A302 shall be continued beyond the number of years normally required to complete studies in the specific academic degree program for which the award was granted, except under exceptional circumstances, as determined by the Board.
- §15A302. Benefits. Students entitled to awards pursuant to this Article shall receive the following benefits:
  - (a) payment of tuition and fees up to Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) per year, except that students whose course of study is in an area leading to a Doctor of Medicine (MD), a Doctor of Dental Medicine (DMD), Doctor of Dental Surgery (DDS), a Doctor in Clinical Psychology (ClinPsyD), or a Doctor of Veterinary Medicine (DVM) shall be entitled to Twenty Thousand Dollars (\$20,000.00) for tuition and fees.
  - (b) an annual grant loan of not more than Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) per year to be used for room and board, books and educational supplies, except that students whose course of study is in

an area leading to a Doctor of Medicine (MD), a Doctor of Dental Medicine (DMD), Doctor of Dental Surgery (DDS), a Doctor in Clinical Psychology (ClinPsyD), or a Doctor of Veterinary Medicine (DVM) shall be entitled to Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$15,000.00) Such grant loans are to be non-interest bearing, except as to unpaid delinquent amounts; and

(c) cost of an economy, one way airfare to the school of attendance and the cost of an economy, one way airfare to return to Guam upon completion of studies for which an award was given under this Article.

Total for items (a) and (b) of this Section shall not exceed Twenty Thousand Dollars (\$20,000.00) per year. If the course of study leads to a Doctor of Medicine (MD), a Doctor of Dental Medicine (DMD), Doctor of Dental Surgery (DDS), a Doctor in Clinical Psychology (ClinPsyD), or a Doctor of Veterinary Medicine (DVM), the total for items (a) and (b) of this Section shall not exceed Thirty-five Thousand Dollars (\$35,000.00) per year.

§15A303. Repayment of Benefits and Service Credit. The financial assistance granted under this Article shall be repaid on a two-to-one (2:1) basis for each year that assistance was provided through employment on Guam or in the office of Guam's Delegate to the United States Congress. In the event that any portion of the assistance is not repaid through service credit, the amount unpaid in service credit shall become due and payable.

(a) Every student granted an award pursuant to this Article shall execute a promissory note agreeing to repay said loan over a period to be determined by the Board, but not in excess of ten (10) years from

the contemplated date of the termination or the completion of the course of study for which the award was approved. The amount of the note shall be left blank until the completion of studies, in which the amount of the note will be the total monetary amount of assistance provided by the award. Said promissory note shall be non-interest bearing, except as to amounts unpaid by service credit that are due and payable under the note, which shall be subject to interest at the annual rate of ten percent (10%). No amounts shall be considered due and payable during the time in which the awardee is repaying service credit pursuant to the provisions herein.

- (b) Any student granted an award pursuant to this Article shall receive service credit against amounts due under the promissory note as follows:
  - (1) The amount of the note shall be the total amount of assistance provided. Service credit shall be applied in against the note in monthly installments.
  - (2) The number of monthly installments to be paid shall be based on the number of months for which assistance was provided multiplied by two (2).
  - (3) In the event of default, the balance due in monetary terms shall be the amount of assistance provided less the amount repaid through service credit. The amount repaid through service credit shall be the total amount of assistance provided divided by the number of installments of service credit due as calculated in sub section (b)(2) multiplied by the number of installment paid through service credit.

(c) Any awardee granted an award pursuant to the provisions of this Article must commence work on Guam within six (6) months following the completion of studies, unless extended by the Board for extenuating circumstances, or will be considered in default of their obligation as of the date classes ended. The permanent transfer to an off-Guam office or branch of a Guam employer shall not count towards service credit and shall result in default on the date of transfer and interest shall begin accruing on such a date of default. Permanent transfers, for purposes of this Section, are those that are longer than six (6) months. The Board shall establish such policies prescribing the length and terms of repayment, the interest rates to be charged, and the collection of delinquent accounts.

- (d) If any temporary leave of absence is expected to last longer than forty-five (45) days, the awardee shall inform the Board of the length of time expected to be off-island, the reason for such time off-island, and the address while off-island. As long as the employee remains employed on Guam while off-island temporarily, the employee shall receive service credit for such employment, during the time the employee is off-island for the purposes described herein.
- (e) Death or total disability of the student shall terminate any obligations herein. Total disability for purposes of this Section is defined as any physiological or psychological condition that will prevent the student from obtaining or maintaining any form of gainful employment for a period of not less than three (3) years. The Board may defer repayment for temporary disability. Total and permanent

disability requires the certification by two (2) physicians licensed to 1 practice in the United States. 2 (f) The Board may grant deferrals of repayment through service 3 in cases where a family medical emergency arises. 4 (g) In the event a student forfeits an award defined in §15A404, 5 no service credit shall be granted and repaid according to the 6 provisions herein for those years in which assistance was provided 7 and all awards plus interest shall be repaid according to the provisions 8 herein. 9 §15A304. Forfeiture of Awards. Yamashita Teacher Corp), and Article 14 (The Every Child is Entitled to a Higher Education Scholarship Program) consistent with Rules and Regulations promulgated by the Board as authorized by this Chapter. The Rules and Regulations for programs authorized under this section must contain provisions for repayment of benefits and service credit.

§15A405. Rules and Regulations. The Board shall promulgate rules and regulations prior to the granting of any award under this Chapter."

Section 3. Sunset Provision. After Award Year 2012-2013, no other awards shall be granted under Chapter 15 of Title 17 Guam Code Annotated except as provided for in Chapter 15A. However, the provisions of Chapter 15 Title 17 shall remain in effect for all awards granted in Award Year 2012-2013 and prior.

AN ACT TO ADD A NEW CHAPTER 15A OF DIVISION 3, TITLE 17 GUAM CODE ANNOTATED RELATIVE TO THE STUDENT FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE PROGRAMS

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF GUAM:

Section 1. Legislative Findings and Intent. I Liheslaturan Guahan finds that access to higher education is becoming more difficult as costs continue to rise at all institutions of higher education across the nation. The biggest source of financial assistance for most college students in the United States remains the federal government's Title IV programs (U.S. Higher Education Act) consisting mainly of the Pell Grant and the Direct Student Loan programs.

I Liheslatura further finds that while Title IV programs have been extremely helpful in supplementing a student's cost of education, aid to students have steadily lagged behind rising higher education costs, resulting in students and their families opting to sign up for costly education loans.

In an effort to assist students to fill these funding gaps, most states have

implemented programs to assist the most needy students and families in their

communities with state grants to attend universities within their jurisdiction.

provide grants to their students that meet certain residency, financial, and academic
requirements. These state grants, in conjunction with Title IV programs offered by
the federal government, allow more students access to higher education.

I Liheslatura further finds that, although Guam currently offers financial assistance to residents to pursue higher education, these programs are often cumbersome and bureaucratic, requiring separate application forms with different application due dates and eligibility requirements, resulting in confusion and frustration on the part of the student.

It is therefore the intent of *I Liheslatura* to reform the process of the locally funded financial aid programs by aligning the limited local resources with funds received from the federal government. The alignment of these resources will result in greater access for Guam residents to higher education by making it more affordable.

Section 2. A new Chapter 15A is hereby added to Division 3 of Title 17 Guam Code Annotated to read as follows:

**§15A102. Administration.** The provision of this Chapter shall be administered by the Board of Regents of the University of Guam, and all awards provided by this Chapter shall be granted by the Board. The Board of Regents may delegate to the management of the University, its authority granted under any Administrative Rules and Regulations.

\$15A103. Fund. There is hereby established a Student Financial Assistance Fund hereinafter referred to as the "Fund" from which awards granted pursuant to this Chapter shall be financed. The Board is authorized to accept for the Funds gifts, devices, bequests, donations and all other kinds of contributions for the purposes of the Fund. The Fund may be supplemented by annual appropriations to the extent made necessary by awards granted pursuant to this Chapter. The Fund shall be administered by the Board and all moneys appropriated for awards pursuant to this Chapter and all repayment of such awards, made under this Chapter, shall be paid directly to the Fund and dispensed by the Board. Within sixty (60) days after the closing of each fiscal year, the Board shall transmit to the Legislature an annual report consistent with §15A112 of this Article.

§15A104. Regulations. The Board, subject to the provisions of the Administrative Adjudication Law, shall make regulations pursuant to and not inconsistent with the provision of this Chapter.

§15A105. Application Forms and Notices. The Board shall prescribe by regulation necessary application forms and procedures for all awards pursuant to this Chapter. The Board shall give notice to the community to permit interested students, who shall be residents of Guam and citizens of the United States of America, or a permanent resident alien, an opportunity to apply for the awards granted by this Chapter.

**§15A106.** Limitation on Awards. No person receiving benefits under one article of this Chapter shall be entitled to benefits under any other article of this Chapter, and no person receiving benefits under any teacher training program, in-service training program or other government of Guam education programs shall be entitled to benefits under the provision of this Chapter.

§15A107. Discharge of Award Obligations Upon Death or Disability. The Board may, upon death or disability of a student who is receiving or has received an award under the provisions of this Chapter, discharge in full or in part all obligations for the repayment of said award.

§15A108. Garnishment of Income Tax Refunds in the Event of Default. The Board may, subject to the terms and conditions of a Memorandum of Understanding with the Department of Revenue and Taxation, garnish the tax refunds due to any recipients of assistance pursuant to this Chapter and/or recipient's co-signer(s) who has defaulted on the repayment of such assistance and a judgment has been issued. Such garnishment shall not exceed the judgment amount.

§15A109. Interest Computation on Financial Assistance Awarded On or After Award Year 2013-2014 for Non Cash (Non-Service Credit) Repayments. Interest on all awards of assistance made on or after Award Year 2013-2014, pursuant to this Chapter shall be computed on the outstanding balance on a simple interest basis beginning on the date of disbursement at an annual percentage rate of ten percent (10%). Repayment shall be made in either a lump sum by which the principal and accrued interest up to the date of repayment is satisfied or through a periodic payment plan under the following conditions:

(a) the awardee can amortize the combined balance of principal and accrued interest balances over a specified term at an annual percentage rate of 10 percent (10%); (b) the period for repayment shall not exceed ten (10) years; and (c) all awardees choosing to repay assistance in cash in lieu of service credit must pay all accrued interest before any payments are applied to the principal of the debt. Repayment of awards made prior to Award Year 2013-2014 shall be made 

#### §15A110. Prohibition.

pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 15 of this Title.

- (a) No awards shall be granted under this Chapter for the purposes of pursuing theological studies.
- (b) No money may be expended for awards under this Chapter unless such awards are authorized by the Board by resolution. Any officer who disburses or certifies any expenditure from the Fund without such authorization shall be personally liable for the restitution of such expenditure to the Fund.
- **§15A111. Prioritization of Awards.** Beginning in the 2013-2014 award year, the Board shall adopt, by resolution, a listing of awarding priorities prior to awarding students under Articles 3 of this Chapter. Awarding priorities shall be established every three (3) years or sooner if requested by the President of the University.
- §15A112. Reporting Requirements. The Board shall submit a report of the Student Financial Assistance Programs for Higher Education to the Governor of Guam and to the Speaker of *I Liheslaturan Guahan* no later than one month from the end of the Academic Year which, at the very least,

shall contain the following information: the total number of recipients under this chapter, sorted by new and continuing recipients; the total number of students that have completed their degrees under Article 3, sorted by program; the total amount expended for the academic year; and any other information that *I Liheslatura* will deem helpful in the review of the programs in this chapter.

§15A201. Students Entitled to Merit Awards

#### §15A201. Students Entitles to Merit Awards.

- (a) There are established annual Merit Awards for high school students in the graduating classes of public and private high school licensed to do business on Guam now or hereafter established. The students entitled to these awards shall be the students having the highest scholastic standing in the graduating classes of each such public and non-public high school on Guam. The awards shall be determined as follows:
  - (1) One for every fifty (50) graduates or a fraction thereof of a school's graduating class. If as a result of the equal scholastic standing of two (2) or more graduates, there is a tie for the awards granted pursuant to this

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Chapter, the graduates' respective school shall provide a mechanism to break the tie. Awardees are entitled to four (4) years of education at the University of Guam.

(2) All awards shall be subject to the following limitations:

## A recipient must be a:

- (i) United States citizen, or a permanent resident alien, who has completed a minimum of three (3) but no more than four (4) academic years and meets all academic credit requirements for graduation during attendance in a public, non-public, or DODEA high school on Guam; and
- (ii) a resident of Guam for a continuous period of not less than five (5) years immediately preceding June 15<sup>th</sup> of the year the award is to be given.
- (4) To be eligible for a Merit Award, a student must have achieved a cumulative high school grade point average of not less than 3.00 or its equivalent at the time of graduation.
- (b) If any student is ineligible for an award because of failure to meet the requirements contained in Subsection (a) of this Section; or if any eligible student chooses not to accept an award when first offered such award, the award shall be granted to the eligible student with the next highest scholastic rank, on in the case of a tie, the student that was eliminated by the tiebreaker. If an eligible student declines to accept an award when

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first offered, the student may not accept the award after it has been granted to another student. The recipient of a merit award must notify the Board within thirty (30) days that the award is accepted. Failure to notify the Board within thirty (30) days will forfeit the award and shall be offered to the next alternate.

- (c) Award recipients must agree that the recipient will work on Guam for a period of one (1) year for each academic year the award was received within six (6) months following the completion or termination of the course of study for which the award was granted; provided that if the recipient continues as a full-time student at a graduate or professional school, such recipient may defer work on Guam until such additional studies are completed.
- (d) Awards granted on or subsequent to the effective date of this Section shall be cancelled if a recipient:
- (1) fails to maintain a cumulative grade point average of 2.5 or its equivalent, except a recipient may be allowed one (1) academic term to regain the required grade point average without cancellation of the award, or
- (2) fails to meet the academic and/or other requirements governing full-time students at the University of Guam, except a recipient shall be allowed one (1) academic term to regain full-time status before cancellation of recipient's award.
- §15A202. Benefits. Students entitled to merit awards pursuant to this Article shall receive the following benefits:

§15A203. Service Credit. The financial assistance granted under this Article shall be repaid on a one-to-one basis for each year that assistance was provided through employment on Guam or in the office of Guam's Delegate to the United States Congress. In the event that any portion of the assistance is not repaid through service credit, the amount unpaid in service credit shall become due and payable.

- (a) In calculating the amount due and payable for failure to pay through service credit, the amount due shall be the total amount of assistance minus the number of years repaid through service credit. For purposes of this Section, a year of service credit is twelve (12) months. The Board may also extend payments of cash repayment by executing a promissory note for a term not to exceed ten (10) years at an annual percentage rate of not less than ten percent (10%). No amounts shall be considered due and payable during the time which the awardee is repaying service credit pursuant to the provisions in this Article.
- (b) The Board may allow deferrals of repayment through service for the following reasons:
  - (1) pursuit of a graduate degree; or
  - (2) a family or medical emergency

- §15A301. Students Entitled to Awards. There are established professional and technical awards for graduate studies. To qualify for these awards, applicants must meet the following criteria:
- (a) The applicant must be a bona fide resident of Guam for a period of not less than ten (10) years prior to application, and a United States citizen, or a permanent resident alien, and must have achieved an overall grade point average of 3.00 in undergraduate studies if pursuing a master's degree or a professional degree, or a 3.33 grade point average in a master's degree or professional degree program if pursuing a doctoral degree or an irrevocable letter of acceptance from a U.S. accredited institution as recognized by the Council for Higher Education Accreditation (CHEA) or its successors or an irrevocable letter of acceptance from a foreign medical school as listed in the World Health Organization (WHO) listing of medical schools, which was approved by the Board of Medical Examiners or the Council on Medical Education and hospitals of the American Medical Association (or by a private non-profit accrediting body approved by the Guam Board of Medical Examiners.
  - (b) the applicant must agree to the repayment terms as specified in §15A303 and §15A304;

(c) the applicant must present to the Board, prior to granting of the award, satisfactory proof that such applicant has been accepted by a U.S. accredited college or university, as recognized by the Council for Higher Education Accreditation (CHEA), or its successors, or satisfactory proof that such applicant has been accepted by a foreign medical school as listed in the World Health Organization (WHO) listing of medical schools, which was approved by the Board of Medical Examiners or the Council on Medical Education and hospitals of the American Medical Association or by a private non-profit accrediting body approved by the Guam Board of

Medical Examines as a full-time student pursuing a program of study in the field applied for; and

- (d) the college or university must be properly accredited as recognized by the Council for Higher Education Accreditation (CHEA), or its successors, or the foreign medical school must be properly accredited as listed in the World Health Organization (WHO) listing of medical schools, which was approved by the Board of Medical Examiners or the Council on Medical Education and hospitals of the American Medical Association or by a private non-profit accrediting body approved by the Guam Board of Medical Examiners, and must be approved by the Board, however, that no award shall be granted for studies at an off-Guam institution in a program that is available at the University of Guam.
- (e) The Board shall select the recipients of the awards based upon the basis of scholastic ability, financial need, and aptitude. The Board may also use work or life-time experience and achievement

criteria in place of the aptitude criteria, if it can be reasonably determined that the applicant will succeed in a course of study funded by an award herein.

- (f) In determining financial need, the applicant must submit a Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) to determine level of need.
- (g) No benefits as specified in §15A302 shall be continued beyond the number of years normally required to complete studies in the specific academic degree program for which the award was granted, except under exceptional circumstances, as determined by the Board.
- §15A302. Benefits. Students entitled to awards pursuant to this Article shall receive the following benefits:
  - (a) payment of tuition and fees up to Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) per year, except that students whose course of study is in an area leading to a Doctor of Medicine (MD), a Doctor of Dental Medicine (DMD), Doctor of Dental Surgery (DDS), a Doctor in Clinical Psychology (ClinPsyD), or a Doctor of Veterinary Medicine (DVM) shall be entitled to Twenty Thousand Dollars (\$20,000.00) for tuition and fees.
  - (b) an annual grant loan of not more than Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) per year to be used for room and board, books and educational supplies, except that students whose course of study is in an area leading to a Doctor of Medicine (MD), a Doctor of Dental Medicine (DMD), Doctor of Dental Surgery (DDS), a Doctor in Clinical Psychology (ClinPsyD), or a Doctor of Veterinary Medicine

(DVM) shall be entitled to Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$15,000.00) Such grant loans are to be non-interest bearing, except as to unpaid delinquent amounts; and

(c) cost of an economy, one way airfare to the school of attendance and the cost of an economy, one way airfare to return to Guam upon completion of studies for which an award was given under this Article.

Total for items (a) and (b) of this Section shall not exceed Twenty Thousand Dollars (\$20,000.00) per year. If the course of study leads to a Doctor of Medicine (MD), a Doctor of Dental Medicine (DMD), Doctor of Dental Surgery (DDS), a Doctor in Clinical Psychology (ClinPsyD), or a Doctor of Veterinary Medicine (DVM), the total for items (a) and (b) of this Section shall not exceed Thirty-five Thousand Dollars (\$35,000.00) per year.

§15A303. Repayment of Benefits and Service Credit. The financial assistance granted under this Article shall be repaid on a two-to-one (2:1) basis for each year that assistance was provided through employment on Guam or in the office of Guam's Delegate to the United States Congress. In the event that any portion of the assistance is not repaid through service credit, the amount unpaid in service credit shall become due and payable.

(a) Every student granted an award pursuant to this Article shall execute a promissory note agreeing to repay said loan over a period to be determined by the Board, but not in excess of ten (10) years from the contemplated date of the termination or the completion of the course of study for which the award was approved. The amount of the note shall be left blank until the completion of studies, in which the

amount of the note will be the total monetary amount of assistance provided by the award. Said promissory note shall be non-interest bearing, except as to amounts unpaid by service credit that are due and payable under the note, which shall be subject to interest at the annual rate of ten percent (10%). No amounts shall be considered due and payable during the time in which the awardee is repaying service credit pursuant to the provisions herein.

- (b) Any student granted an award pursuant to this Article shall receive service credit against amounts due under the promissory note as follows:
  - (1) The amount of the note shall be the total amount of assistance provided. Service credit shall be applied in against the note in monthly installments.
  - (2) The number of monthly installments to be paid shall be based on the number of months for which assistance was provided multiplied by two (2).
  - (3) In the event of default, the balance due in monetary terms shall be the amount of assistance provided less the amount repaid through service credit. The amount repaid through service credit shall be the total amount of assistance provided divided by the number of installments of service credit due as calculated in sub section (b)(2) multiplied by the number of installment paid through service credit.
- (c) Any awardee granted an award pursuant to the provisions of this Article must commence work on Guam within six (6) months following the completion of studies, unless extended by the Board for

extenuating circumstances, or will be considered in default of their obligation as of the date classes ended. The permanent transfer to an off-Guam office or branch of a Guam employer shall not count towards service credit and shall result in default on the date of transfer and interest shall begin accruing on such a date of default. Permanent transfers, for purposes of this Section, are those that are longer than six (6) months. The Board shall establish such policies prescribing the length and terms of repayment, the interest rates to be charged, and the collection of delinquent accounts.

- (d) If any temporary leave of absence is expected to last longer than forty-five (45) days, the awardee shall inform the Board of the length of time expected to be off-island, the reason for such time off-island, and the address while off-island. As long as the employee remains employed on Guam while off-island temporarily, the employee shall receive service credit for such employment, during the time the employee is off-island for the purposes described herein.
- (e) Death or total disability of the student shall terminate any obligations herein. Total disability for purposes of this Section is defined as any physiological or psychological condition that will prevent the student from obtaining or maintaining any form of gainful employment for a period of not less than three (3) years. The Board may defer repayment for temporary disability. Total and permanent disability requires the certification by two (2) physicians licensed to practice in the United States.
- (f) The Board may grant deferrals of repayment through service in cases where a family medical emergency arises.

(g) In the event a student forfeits an award defined in §15A404, no service credit shall be granted and repaid according to the provisions herein for those years in which assistance was provided and all awards plus interest shall be repaid according to the provisions herein.

§15A304. Forfeiture of Awards. Expulsion from a school or institution attended, or suspension for a period of the same or greater than one (1) academic semester, or its equivalent, in such school or institution, or failure to complete the program for which the award was granted, or failure to comply with the regulations of the Board, shall result in a forfeiture of the award provided by this Article. For purposes of this Article, a person shall be considered to have completed the course of studies upon the event or events of forfeiture as provided in this Section.

§15A305. Rules and Regulations. The Board shall develop rules and regulations pursuant to the Administrative Adjudication Law for the administration of the program enacted by this Article. In addition to the administration of the program, such Rules and Regulations shall include provisions for:

- (a) conditions for continuance of an award;
- (b) construction of applicable promissory notes;
- (c) time frames for the completion of program studies; and
- (d) provisions for the temporary suspension of completion of a degree program or repayment of awards for cases beyond the control of the scholarship recipient such as personal illness of death or illness of a family member.

**§15A402. Benefits.** Students entitled to grants pursuant to this Article shall receive the following benefits:

the Board:

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a. A grant amount between Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) to Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000.00) per year based on financial need. "Financial need" means the difference between the student's cost of attendance at the University of Guam and the student's expected family contribution (EFC). Expected Family Contribution (EFC), shall be determined using the federal methodology pursuant to subdivision (a) of Section 69506 (as established by Title IV of the federal Higher Education Act of 1965, as amended (20 U.S.C. Secs. 1070 et seq.) and applicable rules and regulations adopted by Board.

- 1. Final awards shall be determined by the Board based on a combination of fund availability, financial need and application priority due dates.
- 2. Award recipients shall remain eligible for award renewal only if he or she remains a Guam resident, in attendance, and making satisfactory academic progress at the University of Guam, as determined by the Board.
- 3. Award recipients shall not receive more than one type of award concurrently under this Chapter.

§15A403. Repayment of Benefits and Service Credit. The financial assistance granted under this Article shall be repaid on a one-to-one (1:1) basis for each year that assistance was provided through employment on Guam or in the office of Guam's Delegate to the United States Congress. In the event that any portion of the assistance is not repaid through service credit, the amount unpaid in service credit shall become due and payable.

§15A404. Programs for Teachers, Nurses, and Other Specialized Awards. The Board shall continue to award programs identified in 17 GCA

Chapter 15, specifically, Article 9 (Doc Sanchez Scholarships), Article 10 (Nursing Training), Article 13 (The Doctor Antonio C. Yamashita Teacher Corp), and Article 14 (The Every Child is Entitled to a Higher Education Scholarship Program) consistent with Rules and Regulations promulgated by the Board as authorized by this Chapter. The Rules and Regulations for programs authorized under this section must contain provisions for repayment of benefits and service credit.

§15A405. Rules and Regulations. The Board shall promulgate rules and regulations prior to the granting of any award under this Chapter."

**Section 3. Sunset Provision.** After Award Year 2012-2013, no other awards shall be granted under Chapter 15 of Title 17 Guam Code Annotated except as provided for in Chapter 15A. However, the provisions of Chapter 15 Title 17 shall remain in effect for all awards granted in Award Year 2012-2013 and prior.
