II. COMMITTEE PROCEEDINGS

Chairman Pangelinan: Bill 109-32 (COR), introduced by Sen. Michael San Nicolas, is an act to amend §26205 of Article 2, Chapter 26, Title 11, Guam Code Annotated, relative to increasing the Statute of Limitations on the collection of unpaid Business Privilege Tax to ten (10) years. Once again, we have a sponsor statement from Sen. San Nicolas, which will be read by Vice Speaker BJ Cruz and then we'll receive the testimony of the Director.

(a) Bill Sponsor Summary

Senator San Nicolas: [see attached Sponsor's Statement on Bill No. 109-32 COR read by Vice Speaker Cruz].

Chairman Pangelinan: Thank you very much. For the record, we received testimony from the Chamber of Commerce, who are basically concerned about the extension of statute of limitations and are making some recommendations with regards to additional support to Rev & Tax. Their comments are submitted in written testimony, which be available as part of the record of the Committee Report. In addition, we had a Marie Baker who signed up, who indicated she is not in support of the legislation. Mr. Camacho?

(b) Testimony

Mr. Camacho: [read written testimony – see attached]

Chairman Vicente Pangelinan. Thank you very much, Mr. Camacho. Senator Cruz? Senator Yamashita? Senator Limtiaco?

Senator Limtiaco: John, don't you think that those seven years is more than enough time to collect on those overdue GRTs? And if so, why are we continuously issuing the business licenses to those that have overdue business privilege taxes that continue to do business after the fact?

Mr. Camacho: Yes, this year we're basically taking an active role on businesses that are renewing, current businesses that are renewing. Last month, we sent out roughly 1,000 letters to inform those businesses that have accounts or receivables with the Department that if they come in to renew their business license, they would need to first clear with the Collection Branch, and ensure that if taxes are not paid at that time, that an agreed payment plan with the Collection Branch be secured before a renewal license is issued. Yes, we are taking an active role this year on the receivables that are attributable to not only GRT, but also to income tax withholding and other taxes.

Senator Limtiaco: Do the payment plans that you enter into with the companies also require that the business keep current with their current business privilege tax requirements, and the payment plan is just to pay for the outstanding?

Mr. Camacho: Yes, whatever is outstanding, there will be a payment plan, and they have to be current. In other words, next year, if they don't become current, then they become again delinquent. So they will likely receive another letter from our department saying that these things have to be followed. Our collection or revenue officers personnel are taking an active role on this month, renewal of business licenses this month, to ensure that these receivables that are outstanding without any payment plan are being addressed.

Senator Limtiaco: Ok, but current means on a quarterly basis not on an annual basis, right? So when you say they must remain current, if they go overdue, let's say it's the second quarter and they haven't paid their business privilege tax, is there any stipulation or procedure where you revoke their business license? Or do you let then just continue to operate and hope that they'll pay it somehow?

Mr. Camacho: First thing is that they have to get a payment plan. The payment plan is basically what's in the receivable. If they owe at that point in time, for example, \$5000, and they come in to renew, if they have a payment plan and whatever that payment plan is, and they're current or say they miss one month, say \$1000/month, or a huge amount, you're talking about the current, the GRT that is filed for the current month. We try to inform them that they have to current on your taxes.

Chairman Vicente Pangelinan: Thank you very much. Senator Aguon?

Senator Aguon: Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker. Just one quick question because I know you used the term "taxes assessed" versus "return is filed." Can you just clarify for my personal edification, what exactly is the difference?

Mr. Camacho: The difference basically is that the income tax use the word, "assess," meaning it's put on record. Let's say, for example, you come in and file your GRT today, so tomorrow we record it in our books, if it becomes unpaid within a week's time we get it, we process it, it becomes unpaid then we assess it. So that assessment day will be basically when we do the assessment. We record it in our books.

Senator Aguon: And that's the time when the Department acknowledges that obligation.

Mr. Camacho: Yeah, because at the same time, a return has to be in a form that we can process. In other words, if you submit something that cannot be processed then we will communicate with the taxpayer to make sure the numbers are right. So assess is basically when we put in our records that assessment has been provided.

Senator Aguon: So if you communicate with the taxpayer that, in fact, their filing must be adjusted then a period doesn't commence until that correction is made.

Mr. Camacho: Generally, that's going to be...because it's unprocessable, in other words there's missing elements in the return. It's the day we make the assessment, rather than the day they file it.

Chairman Vicente Pangelinan: It just gives you more time. A little bit.

Mr. Camacho: We're mirroring the IRS and they use the word "assess" and it's a lot better because when you file an amended return say a year later, you miss \$5000, or didn't report it, I now increase my tax by \$400 so it's a time when we make that \$400 assessment that it will run from that date.

Chairman Vicente Pangelinan: Thank you very much. This concludes the testimony on Bill No. 109-32. There being no additional individuals to present any additional testimony, this Committee will continue to remain open for the acceptance of any additional information or public testimony on the bill discussed. 
Dear Chairman Pangelinan,

Håfa adai! In line with the philosophy of fairness to all taxpayers, the BPT statute of limitations should be increased from 7 years to 10 years, so that it is in line with the statute of limitations for all taxes that mirror the federal code and for the proposed timeframe for property taxes.

Business Privilege Taxes are derived from gross receipts, which means that the tax is only applied when a billing is assessed for a sale or service provided. Unlike income tax that could potentially have a year-end tax bill that is beyond the individual's ability to pay, the monies to pay business privilege taxes should ALWAYS be available, because no tax would be generated without the gross sale. Furthering this is the schedule of payments for Business Privilege Taxes, which are due on a monthly basis, making the accounting and payment of these taxes aligned with the flow of gross revenue.

We have many honorable businesses on this island who pay their taxes on time and receive their business licenses justly. The failure of the Department of Revenue and Taxation to collect BPT and thereafter allow only 7 years to pass for the non-payer to escape taxes is grossly unfair to our just and honorable taxpaying businesses.

Increasing the statute of limitations on BPT will provide a fair statute of limitations standard for all of our tax bases. It will enable the Department of Revenue and Taxation to collect from those companies that are getting away with not paying what they owe. Accounting for the people's money and making sure that it is collectible is vital for the provision of quality services that our people deserve.

Dear Chairman Pangelinan,

On behalf of the Board of Directors and Members of the Guam Chamber of Commerce, thank you for the opportunity to submit our comments on Bill No. 109-32, which seeks to increase the statute of limitation on the collection of unpaid business privilege taxes from seven years to ten years.

Though we recognize that the authors' intent to create a consistent ten-year statute of limitations across the board for all un-paid taxes, we feel that extending the authority from seven years to ten years for business privilege taxes will not solve the intrinsic problem of the Department. The Department of Revenue and Taxation already has seven years to monitor, report and collect taxes from businesses, which is more than sufficient. The Chamber has advocated in past testimonials to the Guam Legislature that the Government of Guam rebuild the capacity of the Department of Revenue & Taxation by providing a budget to restore collection support to adequate levels. Collection support should include sufficient personnel in each division, updated equipment and supplies, and continuous training and development of personnel. Additionally, the Department should explore the viability of a "cost recovery" charge for a number of its services.

The Chamber would also like to reiterate that expeditious tax collection, paired with minimal tax accounts receivable write-offs, would result in an improved flow of cash into the Government coffers. If the Department of Revenue & Taxation is supplied with adequate resources, we are confident productivity, efficiency and service levels would increase tremendously, and significantly reduce any need to increase taxes or place additional burdens on the taxpayers that will be caused by an extended statute of limitations.

We highly encourage you and your colleagues to review these recommendations and reconsider moving forward with this legislation. We would be happy to sit with you and the authors of the bill for further discussion. Thank you for the opportunity to provide our comments.

The Department of Revenue & Taxation (DRT) hereby submits written testimony regarding the aforementioned proposed legislation. DRT fully supports the passage of Bill No. 109-32(Cor).

We fully support the "Responsible Business Privilege Tax Statutes of Limitations Act" to amend §26205 of Article 2, Title 11, Guam Code Annotated. The Bill proposes to allow for the Business Privilege Tax Statute of Limitations period for the Collection of Taxes be consistent with the Guam Territorial Income Tax Code (GTITC). This in effect gives the Government of Guam an additional three (3) years to collect unpaid taxes and to avert possible losses of revenue.

However, to be consistent with the GTITC, the Bill should include the following language: "The statute of limitations for collections of unpaid taxes due on business privilege tax returns shall be ten (10) years after the tax is assessed", instead of "after the return is filed".

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


