

SUBJECT: REQUEST FOR \$127,000 APPROPRIATION FROM TAF FOR CULTURAL CHILDREN'S TELEVISION PROGRAMMING

Hafa Adai Senator and Colleagues,

Guam faces many unique challenges in the years ahead. Our struggle towards a happy community and our work to expand our tourism into new markets often seem worlds apart. Illegal dumping, litter, graffiti, loss of language, and a watering down of culture pose difficult challenges to the tourism industry, but are also broader indications that our own community is in need of mending. A healthy community takes better care of its island and are better hosts for visiting friends. If we are ever to turn things around, it will be with a new generation that loves our community, connects to our story and culture — and is empowered to take care of Guam.

In 2012, we produced the first three episodes of a children's program, *Nihi*, which beckons viewers to new adventures of learning fun. We had four specific goals in mind:

- 1. Preserve and protect our unique language, culture, stories, identity, and resources,
- 2. Instill a confidence and pride in our unique identity and our island community,
- 3. Inspire a deep love for our water, land, and people; and
- 4. Promote sustainable and healthy ways of living

In January of 2013 we held a private viewing for a test group of parents and children. The production of our sample episodes was partially funded by GPT and CAHA. The remainder was made possible by in-kind donations of skill, time, and resources valued at over \$10,000.

This program would have immediate benefits to the tourism industry:

- 1. A YouTube channel for children that potential tourists and their children could watch and follow, becoming familiar with Guam as a family-friendly destination, and intrigued by our language, custom and culture.
- 2. For visitors, this children's programming could be made available on the visitor's channel, in airport and hotel lobbies, and in hotel rooms where visitors could listen to our unique language, see some of the unique and important places on Guam, and learn how to take care of our island while they are here. This programming would be educational but would also provide culturally focused entertainment for families.

The long-term benefits are more exciting. Imagine every elementary public school child having access to our programming. Imagine the new generation growing up with a renewed commitment to keeping our island clean. Imagine a generation that takes great pride in perpetuating our language, culture, traditions, and stories. The benefits to tourism would be unquestionable. The benefits for our community would be immeasurable.

We're requesting that you appropriate \$127,000 from the TAF which will cover a portion of production costs or a deliverable of twenty (20) 19-minute episodes. This would help with initial costs while we cultivate business sponsors and donors, apply for grants and develop products.

Funding NIHI! is a long-term investment in our children with immediate and long-term benefits for tourism. Not only will we provide marketable web content for potential tourists, and entertainment for current visitors – with your help, we will strengthen the very foundation that our community is built on. The continued viability of Guam's tourism industry depends on this.

Cara Flores-Mays is a communications consultant with over 12 years of industry experience in communications and project management. She was the main organizer for the Micronesian Youth Services Network in her tenure with Sanctuary, Inc. and organized capacity building training for non-profit organizations throughout the Micronesian region in collaboration with the Pacific Island Non-Government Organization (PIANGO) and Unitech University in New Zealand. In addition, she is currently a consulting trainer with the Office of Minority Health Resource Center (OMHRC) providing instruction on the development of LOGIC Models and conducting program evaluations for OMHRC grantees in the region.

Dr. Natividad received her master's degree in social work from the University of Hawaii at Manoa and her Ph.D in human services from Capella University.

Michael Lujan Bevacqua, Ph.D is the grandson of Elizabeth De Leon Flores Lujan, *familian Bådu, Kabesa* and the Chamorro Master Blacksmith, Joaquin Flores Lujan, *familian Kåtson, Bittot.* He has two children: a daughter, Sumåhi Chan Bevacqua and a son, Akli'e' Chan Bevacqua.

Bevacqua graduated from the University of Guam with a BA in art and literature and an MA in Micronesian studies. He also completed his MA and Ph.D in ethnic studies from the University of California, San Diego in 2010.

He has worked as a producer for the documentary *Land of the Chamorros* (dir. Frances Negron-Muntaner) since 2002, and wrote for the documentary *The Insular Empire* (dir. Vanessa Warheit, Amy Robinson) since 2006. He consulted for the non-profit group, Guam Communications Network (GCN) from 2003 to 2004, where he assisted in the translation of health documents into Chamorro, wrote narratives, and painted images for the *Chamorro Providing Access to Health Book*. Since 2006 Bevacqua has worked as the assistant managing editor for two academic journals *Social Identities* and *African Identities*. He was also co-editor of *Chamoru Childhood*, an anthology of Chamoru stories published by Achiote Press in 2009.

Tammy Jo Anderson-Taft ENVIRONMENT

Tammy Jo Anderson Taft is currently the Public Information Officer for the Guam Environmental Protection Agency. Previously she worked as the Education Coordinator at UnderWater World, Guam and the NOAA Coral Reef Fellow for the Guam Coastal Management Program – Bureau of Statistics and Plans. Taft moved to Guam in 2005 to work as a reporter for the Pacific Daily News.

Taft is originally from small farm in North Dakota. She has always loved Guam's natural beauty due to the fact her parents lived in Guam in the 1970s and had many paintings of the island in their North Dakota home. After moving to Guam, she became an active part of the multi-agency Environmental Education Committee (EEC) and continues to help organize events through the EEC. Taft was also a founding member of the Guam Environmental Alliance, a non-governmental agency focused on environmental stewardship. The group managed a grant to help with reforestation of the Masso Reservoir Nature Area in Piti.

Taft has a degree in communications from Wartburg College in Waverly, IA. She provides a variety of communication services for Guam EPA and the EEC including web design, logo design, video production, graphic design, writing and social media presence.

Dr. Hope Cristobal MENTAL HEALTH

Hope Cristobal, Ph.Dl is an indigenous Chamoru who was born and raised on Guam. She is a psychologist who specializes in the treatment and assessment of indigenous, underserved, and marginalized populations, focusing on the unique situation for colonized Chamorus in Guam. She completed her doctorate degree at Argosy University in Hawaii with a specialty in the treatment of diverse populations. At her internship at the Center for Multicultural Training in Psychology at Boston Medical Center, Dr. Cristobal completed a neuropsychology rotation working with low socio-economic status minority families and children infected and affected by HIV/AIDS. She has experience working with children diagnosed with an emotional disability, including autism, in the public and private school systems in Guam and Hawaii. Dr. Cristobal's dissertation focuses on a theoretical application of a culturally competent mental health system for the indigenous Chamoru population in Guam. She is an advocate for human rights at the local, national, and international levels, and is dedicated to raising awareness about the social ills facing the Chamoru community in Guam. Dr. Cristobal has been invited to speak on this topic at various conferences and community events in Guam, California, and Hawaii. In 2007 and again in 2010, she testified at the United Nations regarding the psychosocial problems currently facing the Chamoru people and urged the Committee on Decolonization to move forward with their commitment to eradicate colonies around the world. Dr. Cristobal is a psychologist at Guam's only Community Mental Health Center - The Guam Behavioral Health and Wellness Center, and owns her own private practice, working with children, youth, and their families. Dr. Cristobal believes that the long-term sustainability of indigenous communities is rooted in the resolution of colonization, and the installation of community-empowered, indigenous-lead, culturally-sensitive solutions and programs.
