I. <u>OVERVIEW</u>

Bill No. 119-32 (COR) was introduced on May 16, 2013 by Senator V. Anthony Ada, and was subsequently referred by the Committee on Rules to the Committee on Guam US Military Relocation, Veterans' Affairs, Homeland Security and Judiciary on May 16, 2013.

The Committee on Guam US Military Relocation, Veterans' Affairs, Homeland Security and Judiciary convened a public hearing on Bill No. 119-32 (COR) on June 5, 2013 at 9:00AM in I Liheslatura's Public Hearing Room.

Public Notice Requirements

Public Hearing notices were disseminated via e-mail to all senators and all main media broadcasting outlets on May 29, 2013 (5-Day Notice), and again on June 3, 2013 (48-Hour Notice). Notices were also published in the Marianas Variety Newspaper on May 30, 2013 and June 3, 2013.

The public hearing was Called-to-Order at 9:00 AM.

II. SUMMARY OF TESTIMONY & DISCUSSION

Senator Frank B. Aguon, Jr.:

Opens the agenda on Bill 119-32 (COR), "An act to add a new Article 2 to Chapter 37 of 9GCA relative to home invasion".

Senator V. Anthony Ada:

Thanks Senator Aguon and states that Senator Duenas is a co-sponsor of the Bill. Senator Ada goes on to state the following:

Home invasion is described as illegal and is usually a forceful entry into an occupied private dwelling with the violent intent to commit crimes against the

occupants such as robbery, assault, rape, murder, or kidnapping. In some jurisdictions, there is a defined crime of home invasions and in others, there is no defined crime. However, events that accompanied the home invasion are charged as crimes. In areas where home invasion is defined, the definition by punishment varies by jurisdiction.

If Bill No. 119-32 is passed into law, Guam would join twenty-three (23) other states that either defined home invasion as a separate crime or as an enhanced burglary offense.

Bill No. 119-32 is patterned after the Connecticut law which punishes attempted home invasion and fleeing from the home invasion attempt as the same as committing the actual crime. Currently, on Guam, unless a home invader commits multiple offenses, the most they can be prosecuted for is felony burglary and criminal trespass. This Bill -- like the Connecticut law it is patterned after, which is regarded as model legislation for such a crime -- includes the minimum sentencing requirements and does not allow for ignorance of occupancy as a defense. The defendant can't get away by stating they didn't know that anybody was home.

A home invasion occur in the U.S. every fifteen (15) to twenty (20) minutes and here on Guam, one home invasion is one too many.

Senator Ada states he looks forward to hearing the testimonies from those who will be testifying on this legislation and thanks Senator Aguon.

Senator Frank B. Aguon, Jr.:

Thanks Senator Ada and invites those interested in providing testimony for Bill No. 119-32 to step forward. Senator Aguon recognizes Deputy Attorney General Phil Tydingco and invites him to begin his testimony.

Deputy Attorney General Phil Tydingco:

Identifies himself as Phil Tydingco, Chief Deputy Attorney General who is here on behalf of Attorney General Leonardo Rapadas and the Office of the Attorney General. Mr. Tydingco greets the Chairman and all Senators present and thanks the Committee for allowing testimony. He states that the AG's office welcomes this new bill and believes it is very important to have a home invasion statute. He goes on to testify the following:

The hallmark of a home invasion statute is to address burglaries. Burglaries can result in crimes against a person namely aggravated assault, rape, kidnap, and murder. Right now, there are at least two (2) home invasion cases here on Guam, one is a murder case, and the other attempted murder or aggravated assault and criminal sexual conduct.

We are recommending that within the definition of 'Home Invasion', the AG's office prefers to see attempts to commit a violent crime against the person of another person. Reason is because Guam's statute already has definitions of violent crimes in 9GCA Section 80.70 & 80.72. They are aggravated murder, murder, manslaughter, aggravated assault, kidnapping, first degree criminal sexual conduct, second degree criminal sexual conduct, arson, first degree robbery, and second degree robbery. Senator Brant McCreadie is working on legislation to expand these via other legislations. A listing of these violent crimes are also referenced in 9GCA Section 80.72. So be consistent with Title 9, and clarify the nature of home invasion. Because by simply calling it a felony it looks like a burglary statute that we have on the books already. If the true nature of the

home invasion were identified as in to commit a violent crime, you could say as defined in Section 80.72 if you want to be absolutely clear. You can reference that, and it's one of our major suggestions to this proposed legislation.

Also, Colorado has language in their home invasion statute that permits or justifies physical force by homeowners or the residents, upon another person, only to defend themselves or the third persons, when they believe the use of imminent force is necessary -- sort of a castle doctrine. It's not uncommon for people to come home, find a burglar, and then be attacked. But they're defending their home and they attack that person first, or the burglar / criminal turns upon them, but that person is trying to defend themselves in their home. The home is the most sacred place so we should consider that. It should not be a defense when someone catches somebody and they ward them off & strike at them so they can leave and that person turns on them and kills them in their own home when all they were doing is trying to chase the invader out by use of lawful force. That is another consideration. Once again, we support the bill.

Senator Frank B. Aguon, Jr.:

Thanks Deputy Attorney General Tydingco for his comments, welcomes Senator Michael Limtiaco and thanks him for joining the public hearing. Senator Aguon questions Mr. Tydingco whether or not his oral testimony will be followed by written testimony or comments.

Deputy Attorney General Phil Tydingco:

States that he can provide written testimony but will more than likely request for a copy of the transcript from Senator Aguon.

Senator Frank B. Aguon, Jr.:

States that Mr. Tydingco's comments will be included in the committee report.

Deputy Attorney General Phil Tydingco:

States that the more important and quick fix is to say home invasion is a violent crime rather than a felony. He believes that the intent or what is trying to be achieved is to make clear that we have tough laws to people who are not just burglars, but those who kill, rape, kidnap, and assault the residents at home.

Senator Frank B. Aguon, Jr.:

Thanks Mr. Tydingco and allows Senator Ada to comment.

Senator V. Anthony Ada:

Thanks Mr. Tydingco for his testimony and states that he wants to make sure those who intend to commit home invasions are justly punished. He thinks that home invasions – in a place considered sacred – should not be tolerated.

Senator Frank B. Aguon, Jr.:

Thanks Senator Ada and allows the panel of Senators to ask questions or make comments.

Senator Christopher M. Duenas:

Thanks Senator Ada for inviting him to be a co-sponsor for this Bill. He states it is very important legislation and goes on to state the following:

Unfortunately I have come home to a ransacked house and have endured the feelings of anger & rage. And then after putting my house back together the best I could, and going to bed that night, I cannot find the words to explain it. You don't even feel comfortable in your own most private sanctuary, your home, where you normally would feel completely safe and go to hide away from some of life's difficulties and challenges. Fortunately, I've never had to worry about a home invasion happening while I was home. I could not even imagine what that would feel like and what others felt. For someone to invade your space and even threatened your very existence, I can't emphasize how much.

Senator Duenas thanks Mr. Tydingco for his testimony, for coming out in full support, and for adding additional language to strengthen the bill. He also states that the language added by the AG's office will make the bill clearer so that individuals would be prosecuted - hopefully to the highest extent of the law. Senator Duenas asks Mr. Tydingco about extending the law to include those that would be a 'look-out' in a crime that is being perpetrated. So that in the event the individual is captured or known to have been an assistant in or aiding in that type of crime, they have the same level of culpability.

Deputy Attorney General Phil Tydingco:

States that if the felony were broad, it may include those individuals, but that if it is changed to those violent crimes, it would require an actual actor who commits rape, murder, etc. as required. It all depends on the facts & circumstances in each case. In the scenario of a group or a gang deciding to harm someone, all are held culpable especially when charged with complicity, facilitation, or conspiracy. There are different levels of punishments for those different roles. This bill is not as broad to include a look-out, specifically if the charge of the crime is changed. However, there are fact patterns that could fit. There are circumstances where the look-out could be culpable especially if evidence shows they planned to do harm, frequently those cases get resolved properly. Usually when they all get caught, the AGs try to enlist the cooperation of the lease culpable and get then to testify against the others in exchange.

Senator Christopher M. Duenas:

Thanks Mr. Tydingco's for his testimony and states that the author might want to work on some follow-ups with the AG prior to session.

Senator V. Anthony Ada:

States that the intent of the legislation is also to include those that are look-outs or get away drivers and that if you get evidence that they planned together, there will be charges as if they're the ones committing the crime inside the house.

Senator Christopher M. Duenas:

Thanks Senator Ada.

Senator Frank B. Aguon, Jr.:

Thanks Senator Duenas and welcomes Vice Speaker Benjamin J.F. Cruz to the public hearing and allows Senator Michael Limtiaco to ask questions.

Senator Michael Limtiaco:

Thanks Senator Aguon then addresses Mr. Tydingco and questions what the interpretation of the definition 'felony against the person of another person other than the participant' is on page 1, line 18 of Bill 119-32.

Deputy Attorney General Phil Tydingco:

Mr. Tydingco states that 'the person of another person' is a definition of saying 'against the body of a person' and that the phraseology means that it is your body or your physical person.

Senator Michael Limtiaco:

Asks Mr. Tydingco if it is the AG's recommendation to keep that language as is.

Deputy Attorney General Phil Tydingco:

States that the phraseology is used throughout the statute but that it can be simplified by saying 'against another other than the participant' or 'body of another'. Mr. Tydingco also states that the existing phraseology has legal meaning which is "a physical person or body of a person or of the human".

Senator Michael Limtiaco:

Acknowledges Mr. Tydingco's response and questions Mr. Tydingco's previous comment regarding duplicity or duplicative laws. Senator Limitaco asks about the penalties associated with having to separate the meanings. He points out that Section 37.204 states a sentence imposed for home invasion shall run consecutively to any other sentence. So in the event that they're committed of both burglary and home invasion, what is the AG's take on the duplicative nature of that and whether or not the current penalties for burglary are already imposed. Take the home invasion into consideration.

Deputy Attorney General Phil Tydingco:

Mr. Tydingco responds with the following:

Based on the twenty (20) states that have the home invasion statute, the intent is to address the violent nature of crimes that are committed. Not necessarily with the initial intent upon entering, but a burglar is there and then the homeowner comes home and discovers the person, tries to chase them out, and there's a confrontation. The burglar kills the homeowner, but they never intended it upon entering. The home invasion statute is designed to address the violent nature of crimes that are committed. First timers are subject to zero to three (3) years, or zero to five (5) years sentence. If it's a second burglary conviction, it's mandatory minimum five (5) years up to ten (10) years.

The difference here is that our burglary statute includes when you enter or surreptitiously remain. That phraseology might want to be included. We don't have that in the home invasion statute 'surreptitiously remains'. This covers those who break in or stay there; those who entered legally (ie. a party) and never left, they hid in the closet. Legally first they're invited in and then they surreptitiously hide there and attack later. That's what our burglary statute has, so it covers a broad range of crimes.

Attorney General Rapadas proposed to distinguish home invasion. Our statute in 9GCA 80.70 & 80.72 identifies a list of violent island crimes. For example, the homeowner comes home and discovers the burglar and tries to chase the burglar (who is there to initially steal), but a confrontation occurs and the burglar beats





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you to death and runs out, so this home invasion statute would cover that, the burglary would not necessarily (cover) what the home invasion would, which the Attorney General supports. What is also distinguished is this consecutive penalty. So you could be charged with burglary and if you're a first-timer, you will get a zero (0) to three (3) years sentence or up to five (5) years sentence. But if you also happened to commit a violent crime there, you are also convicted of the home invasion statute. Then that penalty will run consecutive to whatever is here.

So it's not duplicative in nature. What would be duplicative is if we would've left it as commit a violent crime or commits a felony again. It's almost the same as a burglary statute which states 'just commit a crime therein' and it's not uncommon for the home invasion statute to make the penalty consecutive. Because they consider murder, rape, or kidnapping committed during a burglary or home invasion as even more evil and therefore should be punished more severely by having consecutive sentences. That's a policy call and you folks could amend that in.

If you don't, it allows the court and lawyers to argue the concurrent sentence but if you mandate this, the judge has no choice but to go consecutive.

Senator Michael Limtiaco:

Thanks Mr. Tydingco

Senator Frank B. Aguon, Jr.:

Thanks Senator Limitaco and offers Vice Speaker Cruz to comment (he declines), then thanks Mr. Tydingco for testifying and concludes testimonies for Bill 119-32 and adjourns the public hearing accordingly.

The public hearing was adjourned at 9:39 AM.

III. FINDINGS & RECOMMENDATIONS

Footnotes

The bill proposes to add a new article to Title 9 GCA to include Home Invasion as an offense. The bill categorizes Home Invasion as a first degree felony and any person guility shall be sentenced to at least ten (10) years which may not be suspended or reduced by the court. Title 9 GCA, Chapter 80 notes "in the case of a felony of the first degree, the court shall impose a sentence of not less than five (5) years and not more than twenty (20) years. The bill require a minimum of 10 years. It costs approximately \$84,000 a year to incarcerate one inmate. The minimum sentence requirement will have a fiscal impact. An offender could be sentenced no lesss than (5) years for a first degree felony per Chapter 80, Title 9 GCA. However, Bill 119-32 will require a sentence with a minimum of (10) ten years. The additional sentence requirement will have a fiscal impact of constants.
