COMMITTEE REPORT DIGEST

I. OVERVIEW

Bill No. 141-32 (COR) was introduced on June 11, 2013 by Senators Tommy A. Morrison and Thomas C. Ada. The bill was subsequently referred by the Committee on Rules to the Committee on Aviation, Ground Transportation, Regulatory Concerns and Future Generations on June 12, 2013.

The Committee on Aviation, Ground Transportation, Regulatory Concerns and Future Generations convened a public hearing on June 27, 2013 at 10:03 a.m. in *I Liheslatura*'s Public Hearing Room. Among the items on the hearing agenda was Bill No. 141-32 (COR). The hearing was adjourned at 11:22 a.m.

II. TESTIMONY & DISCUSSION

Chairman Michael San Nicolas: The hearing will now continue on bill number 141-32. I would like to invite Senator Morrison to go ahead and make his opening statement on the bill.

Scnator Tommy Morrison: Thank You Mr. Chair. I'd like to first thank Senator Tom Ada for the work that he has done on this issue and for graciously allowing me to introduce this version of the bill, with his suggested recommendations. I also want to thank him for being a co-sponsor of this bill. He has done lots of work into this. Before the enactment of Public Law 29-91, in July 18, 2008, full face tinting of windshields was legal on Guam. While this was great for heat mitigation, it was a serious safety problem for night time driving. It was a problem for night walking too, especially since pedestrians were at risk for getting hit by vehicles with darkly tinted windshields. The reason for the changes proposed in Bill 141-32 is that there are auto window films that are essentially clear and are effective at reducing the amount of ultraviolet rays that enter through the windshield without hindering visibility. Applying these films to windshields is currently illegal. Quite simply, Bill 141 would allow for community use. Thank you.



Chairman San Nicolas: Thank you, Senator Morrison. We have one individual who signed up for testimony.

Mr. Joe Roberto: Good morning, Senators. I am in full support of this bill and what I brought are actual samples. I want to let the Senators actually see the product. This product is one of several different types of film that manufacturers make. By virtue of the word clear, it's just like how you are looking at me right now. That film, through technology, cuts out lots of heat. That is why I have stressed to Senators in the past that technology allows so much heat to be reduced and makes you more comfortable in your car, given the huge investment that it is. I gave Senators Morrison a flyer earlier about a seminar that is happening with the Chamber [of Commerce] this afternoon. I have here, a picture of the sun. This sun, at 100%, is coming through your windshield right now as you drive through Guam. That product right there will take away one-third of what you feel. There are films out there that, through technology, can cut the heat right in half. It is out there and it exists. Again, we can bring it in but it costs. It does exist. Can you imagine how much you will be saving in fuel? By not letting that amount of heat, you will be able to reduce the demand in your vehicle with your air conditioner. When you do not let that compressor work as hard, you are going to use less fuel. Let's just not talk about your car, but your home or building. The amount of heat entering your building, home, or car... if you reduce that amount, it allows you to save more on power and fuel. We're talking about GPA and the savings they will have. Everyone today is thinking about the green dream and that's what this is about. As written, I am in full support of Bill 141.

Chairman San Nicolas: Thank you for the samples, Joe. Senator Morrison.

Senator Morrison: I just want to thank you for participating in this process and educating us on this new technology. I know that you have been working closely with Senator Tom Ada. It was coincidental that we were trying to do the same thing. It worked out in the end and we were able to put together this measure. I'm not sure in which jurisdictions these are being applied at this time. Are these already being commercially used?

Mr. Roberto: Automotive and commercial around the world. Yes.

Senator Morrison: That's all I have.

Chairman San Nicolas: Thank you. Senator Limiaco.

Senator Michael Limitaco: The only question I have is in regards to the military bases. Are they allowed on the bases? I do know that the bases have strict requirements for the tinting of the windows.

Mr. Roberto: With this product, no.

Senator Limitaco: This will not be allowed on base.

Mr. Roberto: The lowest you can go on the front windshield of any type of material is six inches.

Senator Limitaco: Okay. In regards to the specification in the bill about the VLT at 60%, that is not proprietary, is it? That same specification is available on any manufacturer of tint?

Mr. Roberto: Most manufacturers in the world make VLT from as low as 3% to as high as 90%.

Senator Limitaco: And the definition of VLT?

Mr. Roberto: Visible light transmittance, which is the amount of light allowed to pass through the film. That's why, on that tag, it says perfect 75. That is the amount of light allowed to pass through the film. The opposite is true in which 25 is blocked.

Senator Limiiaco: Thank you.

Chairman San Nicolas: Senator Ada.

Senator Tom Ada: I want to say that I first became interested in this clear film for the windshield because Mr. Roberto had a demonstration table set up at the recent sustainability conference. He had a demonstration, and you could feel for yourself the amount of heat that was filtered out by this film. I just want to clear, for the record, that are laws do not allow any film to be put on the windshield primarily because the law enforcement people want to make sure that they can see into the vehicle, more so than for their safety. Also, the safety of the motorist... not impairing their ability to see through. What this bill does is acknowledges the advances in the technology with respect to clear film. The one question I have: I believe that the law now prescribes that your windshield, whether it is factory made, must allow a certain percentage of light to come through.

Mr. Roberto: Correct. As it is written, it allows me to block as much as 40%-50%.

Senator Ada: Okay. With this clear film technology, it will only block out...

Mr. Roberto: 25%.

Senator Ada: 25%. So, it is still within the requirements?

Mr. Roberto: By far.

Senator Ada: Is this clear film in compliance with DOT requirements?

Mr. Roberto: I have not read up on any DOT requirements.

Senator Ada: In terms of how much light it allows through, there is a DOT requirement, correct?

Mr. Roberto: For the Department of Transportation, what I do know, relative to vehicles, is the way glass has to be made. The side windows have to be tempered glass and the front windshield must be laminated glass. That lamination is between two pieces of glass. On every vehicle out there right now, there is already a film between two pieces of glass. Also, the back glass has to be tempered. As far as something retrofitted or something applied after – solid glass by itself – I have not read up on anything in that regard.

Senator Ada: I don't have any other questions.

Chairman San Nicolas: Thank you. I'm pretty satisfied myself. Thank you very much for joining us today. If there are no other questions from anyone on the panel, this will conclude our hearing.

Mr. Roberto: Senator, if I may take this opportunity. I'm looking at this room right now and in this room, I'm very comfortable and cold. If you take window film on this building and the blinds that are closing the huge windows and you were to open it and let all that natural light in, you might be able to turn off the lights. By turning off the lights, you are saving that much more power. By saving more power, you are saving more fuel and money. Now, because you have it covered is because of all the heat-

especially in the afternoon that comes through there. Can you imagine a film that was to block out about 75%-90% of that heat? Open the blinds, don't let the heat in and turn off the lights. The air conditioning that we're feeling will feel the exact same way, therefore saving that much more power and money. Actually, the compressor, when reaching a certain temperature, automatically shuts off. With reducing the amount of heat into a room or a car, it shuts off that much faster. That's what this is all about with window film – saving power, saving money and saving fuel.

Chairman San Nicolas: Thank you very much, Joe. The great thing about the private sector is that they are always looking at ways to innovate technology into this island and we very much appreciate your contribution to the community. If there are no other statements, that will conclude our hearing on Bill 141-32.

III. FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

Comments:

If the proposed legislation becomes law, there is a potential negative impact on funding going towards the Judicial Building Fund. The proposed legislation is an amendment that would allow transparent sun screening film materials to be applied to the entire windshield of a motor vehicle provided that the sun screening film permits a visible light transmittance (VLT) of 60%. Subsection (C) of Title 16 GCA, Article 2, Chapter 3, Section 3209 currently states that transparent sun screening film materials can be installed, affixed, or applied along the top edge of the windshield so long as such materials measure no lower than eight (8) inches below the top of the windshield. Violators of subsection (C) are subject to a fine of no less than Fifty Dollars (\$50) and no more than Two Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$250) for each separate offense. Assuming that there are two to four citations per year for non-compliance to this legislative measure, the Bureau estimates that no less than \$100 (lowest potential revenue for two citations) and no more than \$1,000 (highest potential revenue for four citations) of potential revenues will not be received by the Judiciary's Judicial Building Fund.


