II. COMMITTEE PROCEEDINGS

Chairman Pangelinan: We'll proceed with the last bill on the agenda, which is Bill 244-32, introduced by Senator Frank Aguon. An act amending Public Law 32-068, relative to withholding tax revenue collections and making appropriations to the Unified Judiciary for law enforcement salary increase implementation. For the record, we--of course, in addition to the public hearing notices that were disseminated to all the media as required by the law--we also sent personal letters, inviting testimony from the governor and the lieutenant governor; the Office of the Attorney General; Bureau of Budget and Management Research; Department of Administration; the Office of Public Accountability; the Mayors' Council of Guam; the Guam Chamber of Commerce; and the Judiciary.

We have, this morning, signed up to testify: Mr. Phil Tydingco. Were you going to testify? I don't see him.

We'll start with the Chief Justice of the Unified Judiciary of Guam. We have Mr. Chris Budasi from the Judiciary; Mr. Joshua Tenorio; Mr. Ed Toves; John Lizama; Perry Taitano--all members of the Judiciary. We'll proceed with the panel that is up here at this time and proceed with any other members of the audience who may wish to present additional testimony. Mr. Chief Justice, good morning, Sir.

Chief Justice F. Philip Carbullido: Good morning, Mr. Chairman and Members of the Committee.

Chairman Pangelinan: Oh, I'm sorry. May I have Senator Aguon just give a brief synopsis of the bill? Thank you, and my apologies, Senator Aguon.

(a) Bill Sponsor Summary

Senator Frank B. Aguon, Jr.: Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker. First of all, thank you very much for entertaining this particular measure at this time for your committee. I would also like to extend my appreciation to Senators San Nicolas and Respicio who have co-sponsored this legislation. We all know that in December, the law enforcement remaining balance of 20% was implemented across the board to the Executive Branch law enforcement personnel. In this particular case, the funding that was implemented at that time was not applicable to cover the Judiciary. Based on communication between the Chief Justice as well as the incumbent Chief Executive in that particular case, there was communication that perhaps the route to take in terms of getting additional resources would be through the legislative body.

Mr. Speaker, obviously, you're very much in tune with finances, and there is no need for me to extrapolate some of the numbers in here in terms of how the legislation came about with this. But just so that I can just briefly explain to our colleagues here in terms of where the numbers originated from--because it wasn't just an arbitrary figure that was thrown out--if you take a look at the retroactive pay that was provided by the Executive Branch of approximately-they highlighted--\$10 million that was being distributed to all law enforcement, inclusive of those who were no longer in the system, I took a consecutive figure of \$7.6 million--rather than the \$10 million, it was reduced to that level. Based on the lump sum payment to our law enforcement officers, that would translate to approximately \$1.9 million in unanticipated additional withholding taxes at a rate of 25%.

The same concept applies, Mr. Speaker--in this case--the Judiciary was able to remit a similar amount of about \$1.3 million dollars and that would equate to withholding taxes based on those lump sum payments of \$340,000, which adds up to about \$2.2 million.

But then, if you project the application of the remaining balance of Public 29-105 (the 20%), you're looking at-just with the Executive Branch, alone, (989 law enforcement personnel), a salary adjustment of about--totaling \$6 million dollars that would equate to approximately \$1.5 million in terms of withholding taxes just on that incremental pay adjustment, likewise with the Judiciary of Guam... in their particular case, there was a commitment made, and we'll hear from the Chief Justice that, in fact, he was going to apply the same concept to the law enforcement. The marshals as well as the probation officers. He did effectuate that as of a couple of weeks ago.

That would absorb approximately the \$900,000 that's being requested here for the Judiciary, and that would result in withholding taxes of about \$200,000. Collectively, if we're looking at the lump sum payments, the retroactive payments for a couple of years, that would-plus the prospective application of the 20% pay adjustment--that would add up to approximately \$3.9 million. The way the legislation presents this is the revenue base was adjusted accordingly, based on those calculations.

Because the tax refund component, there's legislation, Mr. Speaker, that you have sponsored that also encourages the legislature and the government of Guam to set aside certain amounts of additional proceeds. There was \$1.2 million that was allocated to the tax refund payment fund, and of the remaining balance, \$900,000 was allocated specifically to address the law enforcement prospective payment for the balance of this fiscal year. It does not address any other obligations that this government still has to the Judiciary. We know that obviously, the Executive Branch is still looking at projecting to pay, when funds become available, the additional 50%, which may amount to \$10 million within the balance of this fiscal year.

Likewise, that's an obligation that this committee and this legislature may have to deal with in a separate matter with the Judiciary as they try to identify resources in that respect. I certainly hope that I presented it, Mr. Speaker, in light of how the numbers were identified, and I certainly respect the Chief Executive when he came out with that statement, but we're looking at resources that were initially not calculated into the fiscal year budget. These pay adjustments as well as the direct payment for retroactive pay would result in additional withholding taxes that would be remitted to this government so that we could apply it accordingly. And in this case, we're looking at applying \$900,000 to take care of the Judiciary.

Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker.

Chairman Pangelinan: Thank you, and Si Yu'os Ma'åse', Senator Aguon. Mr. Chief Justice.

Chief Justice F. Philip Carbullido: Thank you, Mr. Chairman and Members of the committee. Håfa Adai, and good morning. At the outset, let me just state for the record that my name is Philip Carbullido, the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Guam. If you'll permit me to introduce the employees of the Judiciary who are around this table, I'll start with Mr. John Lizama to my far left who is our Chief Probation Officer; Mr. Ed Toves, Head Marshal of the Courts; Mr. Perry Taitano, Head Administrator of the Courts; Mr. Chris Budasi, our Controller; and Mr. Josh Tenorio who is our Director of Policy, Planning, Community, and Media Relations.

Senator Aguon pretty much presented our testimonies, but if you will permit us to make our case for the record, we very much appreciate it. We want to thank Senator Aguon, our oversight chair as well as Senators San Nicolas and Respicio for introducing this bill. We want to thank you, Mr. Chairman, Senator Pangelinan, for promptly scheduling a public that allows us to present our testimonies in support of this bill.

In a nutshell, the rationale for why this bill should be supported is not complicated. The Guam Legislature mandated a 40% adjustment to the law enforcement of all government of Guam employees in terms of paying this out over a period of time in increments of 10% over four years. This was done in 2009, initially. The legislature made an initial appropriation when this was first passed to fund the first 10%. There have been disagreements in terms of the continuing funding of the subsequent increments. The bottom line is that the Guam Judiciary was able to fund, going forward, the first and second increments of this 40% adjustment but was not able to make the back pays of the amounts that have accumulated as a result of not making the timely payments when they were mandated.

In December of 2013, as a result of the various austerity measures that the Judiciary had practiced over the years, the release by the governor of certain prior year allotments and the tools that Chairman Pangelinan, your leadership that you have provided the Judiciary in the current Budget Act, we were able to pay down towards these obligations that were owed to our law enforcement officers that we made of \$1.8 million dollars in terms of these collective tools that have been made available to us.

This took care of, as Senator Aguon has summarized, the back-pay from 2009 to 2012 in terms of prior year obligations; 2013 remains outstanding to the tune of (it's stated in my written testimony) of about \$1.3 million dollars. What's at issue before this Committee this morning is the sum of \$900,000 to fund the full 40% adjustment going forward in terms of the same time period that the governor has announced for the implementation of the full 40% for the Executive Branch employees.

That's the period from the last pay period in December to the end of the fiscal year. At the current level of expenditure, if we did not receive an infusion of the \$900,000, then we have to

make certain adjustments at the end of the fiscal year, because we will have a deficiency of \$900,000 and our current level of expenditure.

The governor has announced that all the law enforcement officers of the Executive Branch are to be fully paid, and he has made a down payment towards the arrears, and he intends to make full payment, as I understand, toward the end of the fiscal year. In addition, he has fully implemented the 40% so I did not feel we could continue the disparity in terms of the full 40% implementation. All we're asking before this Committee is for parity, for equality and to carry out the mandate of this legislature.

When we requested for us to be included in the payment as announced, the governor advised that while he supports the full implementation across the board to all government of Guam employees, including the Judiciary, that the Judiciary must fend for itself in terms of finding the funds. As you are all fully aware, the Judiciary does not have the power of the purse string, nor do we control the disbursement of the collections from the revenues of the government of Guam. We are dependent on the legislature and the governor for our operational revenue.

Bill 244-32 is intended to fulfill that dependency, and in summary, I would like to say that all it does is it brings parity and equity and recognizes that the law enforcement officers, the marshals and the probation officers of the Judiciary, are equally entitled. If you're going to pay their counterparts in the Executive Branch the full mandate of what this legislature has instructed, then all the employees of the Judiciary should be included.

Senator Aguon has testified just in terms of--that these are real dollars, because there have been some sentiments expressed that maybe this is not actual revenue that may be available. Mr. Chris Budasi is in a better position to comment on that and echo the sentiments of Senator Aguon, and I will ask him to do that at the end of my testimony. We ask you, Mr. Chairman and Members of this Committee to support what is contained in Bill 244-32 to bring equity and parity to the law enforcement officers of the Guam Judiciary, and we look forward to the favorable support of the entire Guam Legislature. Thank you, Mr. Chairman, for the opportunity and allowing me to testify before you this morning. Mr. Budasi.

Before he testifies, I would just like to add one additional point that my chamber assistant and her usual efficiency has presented our testimony in certain folders that have been distributed. These are recycled folders, and if at the end of the process, you don't have need for these folders, we'd like to ask them back.

Chairman Pangelinan: And if we give them back to you, can we reduce the appropriation?

Mr. Chris Budasi: Thank you, Mr. Chairman, Senators Morrison, Aguon, Limtiaco, Duenas, Ada, and Yamashita. I have a brief written testimony that I'll read.

Chairman Pangelinan: Thank you very much, Mr. Budasi. Any other members going to present testimony, Mr. Chief Justice?

Mr. Joshua Tenorio: Good morning, Mr. Chairman. Joshua Tenorio from the court. I just want to make a point about the retroactive pay of the \$1.5 million owed to our law enforcement officers. We know that the governor will pay this amount--well, it's likely the governor will pay this amount before the end of the fiscal year.

Chairman Pangelinan: You mean, before the end of the election.

Mr. Joshua Tenorio: It might be the same time.

When one group of employees who are entitled to the same pay gets paid and another doesn't, it does create problems. Although our marshals and probation officers are excellent professionals, I don't think that we would want to be in a situation where our brothers and sisters in the Executive Branch-the police, customs, and firemen are being paid what they're entitled to what the rest of them getting paid. It really causes a problem; it will cause problems in productivity, and it causes problems among the branches and among the law enforcement agencies.

I just hope that as you continue to deliberate this matter that we recognize that there needs to be equity in the process and that these law enforcement officers shouldn't be penalized for working for the branch that doesn't control the purse strings and that their public safety infrastructure is just as important as the others in the Executive Branch. Thank you.

Chairman Pangelinan: Thank you very much.

Mr. Edward Toves: Good morning, Honorable Chair and Honorable Senators. My name is Edward Toves; I'm the Chief Marshal. We're here to ask for your support for Bill 244-32. Listening to the other session earlier, you made mention to--"you must have something to compare with." All the other law enforcement agencies--it's apparent--we're comparing ourselves with all the other law enforcement agencies. We're not being treated fairly as far as equity is concerned. All we're here for is to ask your support, and we really appreciate it in advance. Thank you.

Mr. John Lizama: Good morning, Mr. Chairman and Members of the Committee. My name is John Lizama, and I'm the Chief Probation Officer, and we are here to support the bill. One of the things I'd like to highlight is the fact that it's not only myself as the Chief Probation Officer, but we actually have our probation officers behind us. It affects their families, it affects them, and it affects their families. It also--we just want what's fair and equal to everyone. We actually have the probation officers that have come forward and said they wanted to be here in support of the bill. We actually have probation officers who are working that have expressed an interest that upon my return and the deputy's return to give them a highlight of what happened in this hearing, because it does affect them, and it does affect their families.

In addition, the probation officers--approximately 52 probation officers--have signed a letter here that I will submit, advising you--this Committee--that they're in support of the bill-Bill 244. We'd like to thank you for this opportunity. We know it's trying times for the government when it comes to finances, but your consideration of this bill in support of the probation officers is greatly appreciated. Thank you very much.

Chairman Pangelinan: Thank you very much, Mr. Lizama. Mr. Taitano, were you going to present any testimony?

Mr. Perry Taitano: Thank you, Mr. Chairman, Senators. We really appreciate this opportunity to come before you. Everything has been said that needs to be said. I just want to add that we continue to provide services beyond our mandate. We provide services to the community, to other law enforcement agencies of the resources that we have. In terms of maximizing what we have, the court has done that. I just ask that that support be reflected for the fact that the courts continue to provide beyond what is required of it in terms of its mandate. And the fact that they actually perform that--their caseload exceeds national averages, and yet they still perform beyond that. I just ask for that support. Thank you.

Chairman Pangelinan: Thank you very much. Senator Aguon did you have questions or comments for the panel?

Senator Frank Aguon, Jr.: I just wanted to thank you for your presence today and the request for additional funding. I think that perhaps from this perspective, it's a reminder of how the process sometimes has to work, and that is recognizing that if, in fact, the resources are not able to be identified in the Executive Branch, and we have to come back to this body and make sure that these financial obligations are addressed. I hope that with the support of the good chairman, speaker Pangelinan, as well as my colleagues', we'll be able to see the eventual passage of this.

Let me just close with this, Mr. Speaker, if I may, I know that--just on a slight note-separate note, Perry, you've done an excellent job at the Judiciary of Guam, and this is probably your last public presentation for the Judiciary so I would like to personally extend the Committee's appreciation, and I'm sure all the members of this body, for all your efforts at the Judiciary. Thank you.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Chairman Pangelinan: Thank you very much, Senator Aguon.

Why don't I just ask a couple of questions. As you've mentioned, the finances of the government of Guam, Judiciary is dependent upon the collections of the General Fund in order to fund its operations through the appropriations granted by this legislative body, and we're trying to say that we can fund this because of the additional tax increases that we'll collect due to the additional increase in the wages. Mr. Budasi, what do you anticipate the cost of--I know you anticipated the cost for the Judiciary, but since you've had an opportunity to look at the govGuam budget from the General Fund--the holistic approach to it--the cost of the 40%, full

implementation of 40% in terms of salaries to the govGuam payroll, what do you estimate that number to be?

Mr. Chris Budasi: Since the original base salary increase of 2008?

Chairman Pangelinan: Yes. Right.

Mr. Chris Budasi: I believe that some of the estimates were in the neighborhood of upwards of \$40 million.

Chairman Pangelinan: So the additional 20% for the full implementation, now... what would that add to the govGuam payroll?

Mr. Chris Budasi: Currently, I believe the 30 and 40%, the last estimate we looked at was somewhere--when I was in the Committee, I think it was about \$14 million, not including benefits.

Chairman Pangelinan: Right. So \$14 million in additional payroll costs, and if we do the same calculations here, would generate additional amount in taxes from withholding taxes.

Mr. Chris Budasi: I figure 25% of the wages earned.

Chairman Pangelinan: Right. So the increase in revenue created by the increase in salary is still short of what is necessary to pay it?

Mr. Chris Budasi: Correct.

Chairman Pangelinan: So we'd still be running a deficit. So we'd be running a deficit in the General Fund, and we'll run a deficit in the Judiciary. That's the challenge that we have. That's why we have to depend on the administration in terms of--they have the more complete information--in terms of how are they going to find the difference between the \$14 million total cost of the full implementation, the additional payroll cost for the last 20%--that \$14 million in additional, when we're only going to generate an additional \$3-4 million in taxes.

That's why we need to look at this from the wider perspective in terms of what the governor's doing. I understand the governor has just announced--or DOA has said that they're not going to pay the attorney general's office. They originally thought that they were going to absorb that cost as part of the Executive Branch pay, but I just received some notice that they're not going to do it. Now we have to find the additional money for the attorney general's office. What the governor is doing here, is he's taking all the revenues that are being generated by the additional withholding tax generated, and reserving it for his Executive Branch and leaving nothing for anybody else.

Even doing that, he's still going to be challenged, and this government and this legislature is going to be challenged with finding that additional resource and cutting things somewhere else in order to make the difference between the \$3-4 million we collect and the \$10 million that

we're short to continue paying this, so it's a big challenge. I'm going to ask Mr. Budasi to come back to the office to help us meet that challenge. Then maybe we'll be able to do it. I just wanted to point that out, because as you very well recognize, maybe we might need the help of the Judiciary in terms of prodding the administration through any kind of legal process to treat everybody equitably and fairly in this whole process.

I think that has been the objective of this legislature with the implementation. We made sure, for example, in the Hay Study authorization--the governor is saying, in addition to doing this, he's going to implement the Hay Study, when we're going to be \$10 million short already. But he's going to do the Hay Study. But in the Hay Study, in the authorization granted by this legislative body, we thought the governor was going to be fair and equal to everyone. We felt that he was the governor of the people of Guam--the head of the government of Guam, which includes the Judiciary and that he, would treat everybody fairly and equitably.

And we know that with his last decisions, he hasn't done that—he's left everybody else to fend for themselves, which has resulted in the disparity and the inequity that's been created now in the pay for these personnel. In the Hay Study, we said that if he's going to implement the Hay Study that it be prorated so that every branch of this government--every employee who deserves to be paid, if we have a dollar, he's not going to be able to take the entire dollar and just give it all to the Executive Branch. He's going to have to give a percentage of that to the Judiciary, a percentage of that to the Legislature and to the other instrumentalities of this government.

We've kind of corralled him on that--we think--on that issue that he's not going to be able to implement the Hay Study and create a disparity in its implementation. Unfortunately, we have to do that by statute, because we can't depend on just his goodness and goodwill to do it for every other program. That's what we're looking at, and that's what we're challenged with. We want to thank you. We recognize the dilemma that the Judiciary is in; its desire to ensure that it treats its people fairly and equitably and gives them what is due. We have the challenge to provide the resources to make sure that happens. This bill is an attempt to do that, and we'll continue to look at it, work with it, and see what we can do in order to make sure that the resources are provided to the Judiciary to close that inequity and close that gap. There being no other testimony and no other comments, I'd like to thank you for your presence, and you have a chance to make some closing remarks.

Chief Justice F. Philip Carbullido: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. I recognize the shortcomings in terms of the revenue estimates. I would like to say in that regard that at the time the revenue projections were made, there was a definitive amount that was estimated, and I assumed that the governor was making his decision to make the additional payments based on that fixed sum that was estimated at the onset. I don't know, necessarily, that he included the \$10 million that's going to be paid out to the law enforcement officers of the Executive Branch and the additional \$1.8 million that we have paid out in reference to our law enforcement officers.

I will leave it up to your capable hands to make the determination whether or not there is additional revenue or not. We are heartened that the members of the legislature recognize that all law enforcement officers should be treated equally.

Chairman Pangelinan: Thank you, and that's why we sent personal letters of invitation to the governor, his administration, and his financial team to come and make that presentation, hoping to get a clearer picture of the decision-making process and the numbers they had used in order to justify the ability to add that additional cost to the govGuam payroll which was also not reflected on the expenditure side. We remain hopeful that he will cooperate with this legislature and the judiciary and provide us with the testimony needed in order for us to make the best decision we can in moving forward in terms of providing resources to the Judiciary. Thank you. Si Yu'os Ma'åse'. Any other members of the audience who would like to provide testimony, we'd like to provide you with this opportunity.

If there are no others, we'd like to thank you very much for your presence this morning.

This concludes the testimony on Bill No. 244-32. There being no additional individuals to present any additional testimony, this Committee will continue to remain open for the acceptance of any additional information or public testimony on the bill discussed. I Maga'lahi Guåhan has recently identified funds and ordered the final two (2) ten percent (10%) increments be implemented during the first pay period in December 2013. In addition, I Maga'lahi Guahan identified funds to pay Ten Million Dollars (\$10,000,000) toward the accrued payroll liability owed to law enforcement officers for Fiscal Years 2011 through 2014.

I Liheslatura further finds that funds identified by I Maga'lahi Guåhan are only for increasing wages and paying prior obligations owed to law enforcement personnel at the Guam Police Department, Department of Corrections, Customs and Quarantine Agency, Department of Parks and Recreation, Department of Agriculture, Attorney General's Office, Department of Revenue and Taxation and the Department of Youth Affairs. Funding to increase the salaries for Unified Judiciary law enforcement personnel was not identified by I Maga'lahi Guåhan leaving the Marshal and Probation officers frozen at the second ten percent (10%) increment or at a salary level twenty percent (20%) below their law enforcement colleagues in other branches and agencies of the government.

On November 27, 2013, the Unified Judiciary fulfilled part of its obligation created by Public Law 29-105 to law enforcement personnel by making a retroactive payment for Fiscal Years 2009 through 2012. This retroactive payment was made possible from the austerity measures put into place to reduce court expenses, the collection of past due appropriations, and management tools provided by *I Liheslatura* included in the FY 2013 and FY 2014 Budget Acts.

I Liheslatura further finds the unbudgeted retroactive payment of accrued payroll liabilities to law enforcement personnel by the Unified Judiciary and Executive Branch has created a windfall of new withholding taxes in FY 2014 or collections in excess of estimates. The Unified Judiciary remitted approximately

Hafa Adai Mr. Chairman and Members of the Committee:

Thank you for inviting me to testify on Bill No. 244-32(COR), AN ACT AMENDING PUBLIC LAW 32-068, RELATIVE TO WITHOLDING TAX REVENUE COLLECTIONS AND MAKING APPROPRIATIONS TO THE UNIFIED JUDICIARY LAW ENFORCEMENT SALARY INCREASE IMPLEMENTATION.

I want to thank Senators Aguon, San Nicolas, and Respicio for sponsoring this legislation, which will provide a funding source to pay the salary increases mandated by Public Law 29-105 for twenty-one (21) pay periods of FY14 in the amount of Nine Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$900,000). Without the additional funding, the Judiciary will not have sufficient funds to maintain operations at its current level of expenditure in the last pay period of this fiscal year.

As soon as Governor Calvo announced his decision to fully implement the law enforcement salary increases on December 11, 2013 for executive branch law enforcement officers, I again communicated the need to treat judiciary law enforcement officers – 57 marshals and 55 probation officers equally. The judiciary law enforcement officers are part of the same government entitled to the same pay adjustments as their counterparts in the executive branch under Public Law 29-105. Attached is a list of these officers which was earlier sent to Governor Calvo and to the members of the legislature.

In his response, Governor Calvo stated that additional money in the form of an appropriation must come from the legislature and encouraged the judiciary to work with senators to identify the source of revenue to fund the appropriation. Bill No. 244-32(COR) identifies additional revenue and appropriates funds for the payment of the law enforcement salary increases through the end of the fiscal year.

If this bill is passed into law, a liability of One Million Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$1.5 Million) will still remain unpaid to these law enforcement officers for the raises owed in FY 13 and the first five (5) pay periods of FY14. I would like to request that this amount be also paid within this fiscal year given the Governor's declaration that executive branch law enforcement officers will be fully paid.

Law enforcement officers at the Judiciary of Guam, the marshals and probation officers, must be paid equitably alongside their counterparts in the executive branch. Anything less will cause dysfunction within our law enforcement community. They should not be treated any differently.

For your information, I am attaching my correspondence to Governor Calvo and his reply. I look forward to the favorable consideration of the legislature in passing Bill No. 244.

Dear Governor Calvo:

Hafa Adai! I am writing to request your assistance regarding compensation due to more than 100 law enforcement officers employed by the Judiciary of Guam who are entitled to an increased rate of pay of forty percent (40%) pursuant to Public Law 29-105. Currently, these law enforcement officers are being paid at the twenty percent (20%) level pursuant to the statute due to budgetary constraints.

On Wednesday, you announced that GovGuam law enforcement officers would begin taking home pay with the full 40 percent adjustment and ordered half the back pay amount owed to each officer to be paid. However, marshals and probation officers were not included in the adjustment and payment.

In our efforts to reduce this liability and comply with the law, the Judiciary of Guam has paid \$1.8 Million Dollars to law enforcement officers for law enforcement pay entitlements from Fiscal Years 2009 through 2012. These retroactive payments were identified from austerity measures put into place to reduce court expenses, your release of past due appropriations, and management tools included in the FY14 Budget Act.

Like their brothers and sisters in police services, adult and youth corrections, customs, and investigative services working throughout the executive branch, the judiciary law enforcement officers perform critical public safety duties on behalf of our government and must be compensated equitably. Without such assistance, a serious disparity will exist, creating a situation of inequity for these judiciary employees and would potentially cause dysfunction within the public safety arena.

Attached is a list of the employees that are negatively impacted by this action. In order to correct this disparity and pay them prospectively at the forty percent (40%) level as the executive branch law enforcement officers, the Judiciary requires an additional Nine Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$900,000) through the end of the year. This would leave a liability of One Million Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$1.5 Million) owed to our public safety personnel for FY13 and the first five (5) pay periods of FY14.


Your honor, I want to stress these raises were only made possible because tough choices my administration made going back to January 2011, and because of our commitment to keeping the promises made years ago to our employees.



Thank you for your letter of December 17, 2013 regarding the law enforcement pay raises and back wages earned by public safety officers at the judiciary.



Dear Chairman Pangelinan and Members of the Committee:

Thank you for the opportunity to testify on Bill No. 244-32 (COR), AN ACT AMENDING PUBLIC LAW 32-068, RELATIVE TO WITHOLDING TAX REVENUE COLLECTIONS AND MAKING APPROPRIATIONS TO THE UNIFIED JUDICIARY LAW ENFORCEMENT SALARY INCREASE IMPLEMENTATION.

The Judiciary of Guam implemented the final two (2) ten percent (10%) increments for our law enforcement personnel at the same time as the Executive Branch. The effect of implementing the final increments mandated by Public Law 29-105 without an additional appropriation of \$900,000 during this fiscal year will result in a budgetary shortfall requiring the Judiciary to most likely reduce hours of operations in the fourth quarter of the fiscal year in order to stay within the existing appropriation levels provided by Public Law 32-068 (FY 2014 Budget Act).

During my tenure as the Chairman of the Special Accounting Service (SAS), the Bureau of Budget and Management Research (BBMR) presented its General Fund revenue projection model as a three year moving average using historical collection data. The retroactive payments and prospective 20% pay increment to law enforcement represent increased wages to government of Guam employees that was not part of the three year historical average used to formulate the FY 2014 revenue projections or the expenditure plan in the FY 2014 Budget Act.

I agree and support that both retroactive payments and prospective salary increases to all government of Guam law enforcement personnel represent a significant, tangible increase in withholding tax revenue collections that justifies amending the adopted revenues in FY 2014 Budget Act.

The additional withholding taxes generated and paid by Judiciary Marshal and Probation employees from the retroactive payments and 20% salary increase is approximately \$600,000 or two-thirds of what is needed to cover the increase in personnel costs resulting from the Judiciary's decision to equitably implement and comply with Public Law 29-105.

The amount of activity at the court continues to increase in an effort to keep pace with increases in case filings and dispensing of justice in a timely manner. The introduction and passage of Bill No. 244-32 (COR) will ensure that the Judiciary of Guam is able to maintain our existing level of operations for the remainder of the fiscal year without having to reduce hours in the fourth (4th) quarter.

The Bureau notes a projected \$1,570,161 increase in witholding for the approximate 21.7 pay periods in FY 2014 according to data provided by the Department of Administration's Payroll Division (exclusive Unified Judiciary). The Bureau would like to also note provisions of Chapter 1. Section 4(b) of P.L. 32-68 relative to excess revenues. According to testimony provided by the Unified Judiciary, \$900K would be sufficient to address roughly 21 pay periods in FY 2014 with a liability of \$1.5M for uncompensated periods in FY 2013 and the first five (5) pay periods in FY 2014. Information has been requested from the Department of Revenue and Taxation; however, data has not been received as of these comments.

COMMENTS TO BILL No. 243-32(COR)

BILL NO. 243-32 IS AN ACT TO IMPLEMENT THE LAW ENFORCEMENT PAY ADJUSTMENT FOR EMPLOYEES OF THE UNIFIED JUDICIARY OF GUAM, FUND CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS TO THE MUNICIPAL MARKET OF MANGILAO AND TO CREATE THE RESPONSIBLE NON-PROFIT ENDOWMENT FUND, BY AMENDING §2 OF CHAPTER I AND ADDING §§ 13, 14, AND 15 TO CHAPTER XI, EACH OF PUBLIC LAW 32-68.

The proposed bill is seeking to provide funding of an additional \$1.5 Million in General Fund (GF) revenues to be used to fund the additional appropriations as an amendment to P.L. 32-68. These new appropriations are as follows:

- Nine Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$900,000) to the Unified Judiciary of Guam for the law enforcement pay adjustments (pursuant to Public Law 29-105).
- Two Hundred Nine Thousand Four Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$209,450) to the Mayor's Council of Guam for capital improvement projects of the Mangilao Municipal Market.
- Three Hundred Ninety Thousand Five Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$390,550) for the creation of a "Responsible Non-Profit Endowment Fund" for the funding of registered non-profit organizations.

The proposed appropriation of \$900,000 is fully supported by the Unified Judiciary of Guam as a funding authorization to pay for salary increases of existing law enforcement personnel staff for approximately 21 pay periods of FY 2014.

The basis of the proposed amendment of the GF revenues for FY 2014 has not been addressed or identified in the bill. Furthermore, such proposed revenue increase is contrary to Section 4(b), Chapter 1 of P.L. 32-68 which requires all excess GF funding to be transferred and deposited into the Supplemental Appropriations Revenue (SAR) Fund. Such contradiction would invalidate the proposed GF revenue increase.

The Bureau notes a projected \$1,570,161 increase in witholding for the approximate 21.7 pay periods in FY 2014 according to data provided by the Department of Administration's Payroll Division (exclusive Unified Judiciary). The Bureau would like to also note provisions of Chapter 1. Section 4(b) of P.L. 32-68 relative to excess revenues. According to testimony provided by the Unified Judiciary, \$900K would be sufficient to address roughly 21 pay periods in FY 2014 with a liability of \$1.5M for uncompensated periods in FY 2013 and the first five (5) pay periods in FY 2014. Information has been requested from the Department of Revenue and Taxation; however, data has not been received as of these comments.

Comments:

The subject Bill proposes to appropriate \$25,000 for the government of Guam to compensate land owners for the use of their propery to construct a roadway in Chalan Pago. This \$25,000 will address an agreed upon court settlement and eliminate a liability of the government of Guam. The General Fund tracking as of month end December 31, 2013 show revenues tracking at .16% above adopted revenues. The FY2014 General Fund revenues is fully committed; any revenues exceeding the FY2015 adopted revenues must be transferred from the General Fund to the Supplemental Appropriation Revenues (SAR) Fund for legislative appropriation, pusuant to Section 4(b), Chapter 1 of Public Law 32-068. This proposed legislation is authorizing or appropriating from the General Fund which is contrary to the existing mandate.

BUREAU OF BUDGET AND MANAGEMENT RESEARCH COMMENTS ON BILL NO. 265-32 (COR)

The proposed legislation is aimed at the following: adding a new Section 75122 to Chapter 25, Title 21, GCA.

Should the proposed legislation be passed into law, the Chamorro Land Trust Commission ("Commission") would be authorized to enter into economic leases for the benefit of Chamorro Land Trust "projects" and for an additional revenue stream to be collected by the "Commission". The proposed legislation defines an economic lease to mean a commercial lease with a non-beneficiary of the Chamorro Land Trust parcel of property intended to generate revenues. The proposed legislation defines a "project" of the Chamorro Land Trust to mean a specific undertaking to develop, construct, reconstruct, rehabilitate, renovate, or to otherwise improve or enhance land or real property.

Section 2 of the proposed legislation establishes the terms of the economic leases. In this section, all economic leases are subject to a maximum of fifty (50) years with an option to renew the lease every five (5) years. During the first five (5) years of the fifty (50) year economic lease, the lease payment shall increase by 2% every year of the five (5) year span. According to §75122.4 of the proposed legislation, parcels of Chamorro Land Trust property have not yet been designated for eligibility for economic leases. If the parcels of Chamorro Land Trust property still need to be surveyed, the Bureau anticipates the cost of survey would be taken upon by the "Commission". The recording or filing of an approved survey map is \$25.00 plus \$5.00 per additional sheet.

Because there is not enough significant information to come up with an exact cost impact, the Bureau is basing a cost impact on an assumption for a single economic lease. The assumption is as follows: A retail company is selected to enter into an economic lease with the "Commission"; the lease rate of the property \$1 per square foot; the property size is 5,000 square feet; and there currently is no building infrastructure on the 5,000 square foot property.

For the first 5 years of the economic lease agreement, the value of \$5,000 lease agreement payment will increase by 2% every year until the fifth year, which would result in a \$5,412 lease payment for the property by the fifth year to be received by the "Commission". Assuming that the retail store will be constructed to a total amount of 3,500 square feet, the Bureau estimates that \$1,000 (lowest possible amount for commercial building permit costs) will be received by the Department of Public Works in the form of a building permit.

Adding a building infrastructure to the property would increase the real property tax rate, which the Bureau estimates that an additional \$1,358 (3,500 sq. ft. building * \$100/sq. ft. for commercial building * 0.388% building tax rate) will be received by the Department of Revenue & Taxation. In addition to the increase of taxes for the property, the Bureau anticipates another \$100 to be received by the Department of Revenue & Taxation in the form of a business license. Another form of revenue would come in the form of income taxes to be received by the Department of Revenue & Taxation. Assuming that three (3) employees are hired at minimum wage, the Bureau estimates that \$3,166.80 (3 employees * \$15,080/annum * 7% income tax rate) will be received by the Department of Revenue and Taxation. The total amount to be received by the Department of Revenue & Taxation amounts to \$4,624.80 (real property taxes, a business license, and income taxes).

Working under the assumption that all ten (10) of the selected parcels of Chamorro Land Trust property are the same as the above stated scenario, the Bureau estimates that \$50,000 will be received by the "Commission" in the form of lease agreement payments on the first year of this bill's enactment (\$5,000/parcel of property * 10 parcels). The Bureau estimates that \$10,000 will be received by the Department of Public Works in the form of building permits (\$1,000/building permit * 10 parcels of property). The Bureau estimates that \$46,248 will be received by the Department of Revenue & Taxation in the form of real property taxes, business licenses, and income taxes (\$4,624.80 total to be received by DRT in above stated scenario * 10 parcels of property). The total potential revenue for the first year of this Bill's enactment amounts to \$106,248.

The proposed legislation would allow the economic leases last over a span of fifty (50) years, which the lowest possible revenue in the form of lease payments to be received by the "Commission" over a fifty (50) year period amounts to \$2,500,000.

1/Should the proposed legislation become law, the provisions in regards to the Guam Building Law will be strengthened and a penalty for violating the Guam Building Law will be more clearly defined. The proposed legislation would amend §§ 66501, 66503, and 66504 of Article 5, Title 21 GCA to include the language "vacate, vacating" any building that is deemed as an usafe structure pursuant to §66501 of Article 5, Title 21 GCA. The proposed legislation would also amend § 66505 to omit the language "imprisonment" in regards to violations against the Guam Building Law and the "usafe building" clause in § 66501 of Article 5, Title 21 GCA. The § 66507 to include the definition of the fine/penalty if any person violates proposed legislation would amend the provisions in Article 5, Title 21 GCA regarding unsafe structures and failure to vacate, repair, or demolish such structure. §66507, Article 5, Title 21 GCA stipulates that the assessed, annual fine will be twenty percent (20%) of the assessed value of the subject property. The proposed legislation is administrative in nature, but there is potential for revenues to be received by the Guam Building Code Council, funded by the Contractor's License Board Fund, in the form of fine assessments. For example, if a building that amounts to a total of 4,638 square feet, and is deemed an "unsafe building" pursuant to § 66501, Article 5, Title 21 GCA, the Bureau estimates that \$92,760 (4,638 sq. ft * \$100/sq. ft. commercial building tax appraisal rate * 20% of the appraised value) would need to be collected by the owner(s) of such property by the Guam Building Code Council.

I Liheslatura further finds that funds identified by I Maga'lahi Guåhan are only for increasing wages and paying prior obligations owed to law enforcement personnel at the Guam Police Department, Department of Corrections, Customs and Quarantine Agency, Department of Parks and Recreation, Department of Agriculture, Attorney General's Office, Department of Revenue and Taxation and the Department of Youth Affairs. Funding to increase the salaries for Unified Judiciary law enforcement personnel was not identified by I Maga'lahi Guåhan leaving the Marshal and Probation officers frozen at the second ten percent (10%) increment or at a salary level twenty percent (20%) below their law enforcement colleagues in other branches and agencies of the government.

On November 27, 2013, the Unified Judiciary fulfilled part of its obligation created by Public Law 29-105 to law enforcement personnel by making a retroactive payment for Fiscal Years 2009 through 2012. This retroactive payment was made possible from the austerity measures put into place to reduce court expenses, the collection of past due appropriations, and management tools provided by *I Liheslatura* included in the FY 2013 and FY 2014 Budget Acts.

I Liheslatura further finds the unbudgeted retroactive payment of accrued payroll liabilities to law enforcement personnel by the Unified Judiciary and Executive Branch has created a windfall of new withholding taxes in FY 2014 or collections in excess of estimates. The Unified Judiciary remitted approximately
