I. OVERVIEW: The Committee on Health & Human Services, Health Insurance Reform, Economic Development and Senior Citizens conducted a public hearing on December 3, 2014. The hearing convened at 10am in I Liheslatura's Public Hearing Room. Among the items on the agenda was the consideration Bill 422-32 (COR)- An act to provide for isolation and quarantine procedures relative to an emergency detention order for the incubation periods of severe communicable diseases, as determined by the U.S. Center for Disease Control, by amending Sections III and IV of the Isolation and Quarantine Regulations, Chapter 10 of Division 1, 26 GAR., and provide for the disposition of bodies, by, adding a new §4502(H) and amending § 4505, both of Chapter 4A, 10GCA, and to authorize the sum of One Hundred Thirty Thousand Dollars (\$130,000.00) for related purposes. Introduced by Sen. Dennis G. Rodriguez, Jr.

The public hearing on agenda item Bill No. 422-32 (COR) was called to order at.

II. SUMMARY OF TESTIMONY & DISCUSSION.

Chairman Rodriguez: We will now move on to the next item on the agenda Bill 422. I would like to now call on Mr. Leo Casil Deputy Director DPHSS, Mr. Ambrosio Constantino, Department of Homeland Security and also anyone else from DPHSS or Homeland that would like to come forward, please come forward. Do we have anyone else? Thank you very much for being here and thank you very much for patiently waiting Bill 422 is an act to provide...(Please see bill title)

What this bill is as the main sponsor is to provide the tools necessary to our first responders here I've been dealing with any communicable disease threat to our community. Last term, we worked close with Public Health, Josie O' Mallan specifically to provide an isolation quarantine procedures and on what we need to do to be moving forward if indeed there is any threat to our community. Fortunately, we have never tested that law we never needed to test that law, but seeing what is



happening worldwide we want to make sure that our community remains protected and that working with Public Health and Homeland Security we have come up with this bill that would provide them the tools necessary to do just that and protect our community.

This bill also provides a small amount for funds that are being appropriated at the governors digression to use what is available within the executive branch for the purchase of PPEs known as personal protective equipments and understand I don't believe and correct me if I'm wrong but we don't have any of these equipments on island this dollar amount comes in consultation from homeland security in knowing what these costs are and what may be needed in the event of any threat to our community. I'll go ahead and start off with Public Health Mr. Casil.

Leo Casil: (Please see written testimony)

Chairman Rodriguez: Thank you very much Mr. Casil. Mr Constantino?

Mr. Constantino: (Please see written testimony)

Chairman Rodriguez: Thank you very much sir. Ms. Perez? Mr. Lujan? Did you have any?

Lucia Perez: (summary) In support of Bill 422-32 with the requested changes: She would like to say the 130,000 dollars is the beginning of such funding and she thanks the legislature for that but with previous experience, she would like to include the private sector of ambulance services in the event that they may need to utilize them. This funding would need to be increased just as Mr. Constantino has mentioned PPE Personal Protective Equipment those are disposable items are not cheap especially if people start putting advance requests in that their supplies are at hand and meet their needs. Public Health would set up standards and guidelines on how to disseminate that, I know by experience and as an EMT, every time there is a run, there is that disposable supply level that has to be kept, and that does not come cheap.

Chairman Rodriguez: Thank you very much, Ms. Perez for your testimony and for your services as well just to address that concern, this as I said when I introduced this bill this bill is really proactive approach rather than a panic approach to protect our community.

With this small amount of \$130,000 was meant to ensure that we get the equipment we need, PPEs, right now, the bill also states for subsequent for any replenishments if these are used or if any departments that are listed here would need to keep in stock that it be requested through their budgets and so this is a start in the amount and the start in the way they developed our plan moving forward we're asking the departments to ensure they incorporate this in their request moving forward so thank you very much for that. One of the agencies that was overlooked to include was Guam Customs and Quarantine as one of the first responders as well we'll make sure they are included in the bill that is reported out in the committee. Mr. Lujan did you have any?

Patrick Lujan: (summary) He is the Emergency Preparedness Manager is in full support of this bill. He has been hosting meetings in a regular basis for the flu plan to be ready by the end of December.



They will present to the legislature to amend chapter 10 dealing with the preparedness in the public health realm.

Chairman Rodriguez: Thank you very much? Mrs. O Mallan

Mrs. Josie O' Mallan: I'm here to answer question

Chairman Rodriguez: Okay, great. Senator Aguon?

Senator Aguon: First of all, thank you very much Mr. Chairman and good morning everyone. When the task force was initially in paneled there was a lot of concerns by our community and just by virtue of a lot of the activities that you've been carrying out and the discussions I just want to let you all know thank you for steeping up for the forefront and try to alleviate that our tremendous coordination not only in the airport facility visitors possible Ebola but you got GFD you have an isolation room you have GMH involved in this, homeland security, public health and public health is taking the lead and you've done well to try to allay some of the concerns of the fears of the community.

My only issue in regards to this is that I'm surprised that a request was not put for emergency procurement. You've gone through all of this discussion in terms of the availability of 130,000 dollars, but you need the equipment here on Guam yesterday. Even though we can continue to use the term, remote, that Guam would have an Ebola case you know just by standing you need all of these supplies yesterday, so that if an emergency procurement Mr. Chairman, I would suggest that be part of the consideration so that public health would be empowered to be able to procure or homeland security to procure these PPEs and that be provided another thing is the with regards to ongoing national discussions on Ebola.

I know President Obama I believe, not today, yesterday, did travel to get an update from a particular state in terms of the national planning to try and ensure they address it in the mainland US, obviously inclusive on Guam. What is the most recent discussion in regards to trying to address so that our people would understand what you have all discussed in addition to this legislation what are some of the ongoing activities that are taking place are we getting any possible financial support from the national government we need to apply is that where we can also seek some additional support or is this a situation where okay Guam we can send national standards but in your own terms of being able to find the PPEs and entire processes so that our community understands what's been going on so far.

Mr. Constantino: I didn't know that Guam Memorial Hospital has started procuring \$55,000 worth of equipment and I know they had to get approval from I don't know the terminology, Asst. Secretary HHS, Health and Human Services Assistant Secretary to Emergency Preparedness is that correct. Anyway it was approved \$55,000 they are already in the process, I do know that Guam Memorial Hospital donated a case 22 tire beck suits to the Fire Department to ensure that if the emergency was to occur right now the GFD, GMH, Public Health would be able to Respond to the Emergency we are in consultation with the private sectors as well Patrick Lujan here had a meeting that included the 3 major clinics and brought them in to discuss some of their responses and some of the things they are doing as a task force of all the different subcommittees went together to basically



let everyone know what each subdivision is doing, well subcommittee was doing so that we don't just have a tunnel vision and a broad scope, so that everybody understands what's going on with that.

We also had discussions with let's say Guam hotel restaurant association, their security and safety committee and just letting them know that they need to come up to the plate as well and look at their industry because I remember a long time ago when I was a part of that industry when H1N1 came to this island some time ago as a manager for one of the hotels one of the things that I had to come up with on how our particular hotel is going to respond to our emergency which was H1N1 at that time, we did have a plan and briefed it to CDC and the bottom line was to minimize contact with the individual.

We looked at worst case scenarios, we had tabletop exercises including Guam International Airport and other agencies, public health had their table top CDC was sort of facilitating it Guam Memorial Hospital had their internal tabletop again CDC and Public Health who were facilitating it and Port Authority and Coast Guard and their entities so we are looking at all the different ports of entry as well as the private clinics as well as the private sectors to get involved and come up with a one direction solution because in the end it is not just one entity that is going to be responding but the island as a whole.

Senator Aguon: Thank you very much for that response and I am hopeful that our community is not only tuning in but understanding all the effort that has gone to this process thus far. That just highlights the activeness and you want to say proactive of the task force in terms of trying to be able to address the situation and now from the front end identify the funding for PPEs so that our community can continue and be assured health wise should remote chance happen in Guam the resources all the different agencies the private sector have already coordinated table top exercise because that is very helpful to know with all the situations that is occurring nationwide, certainly little Guam here in our wonderful island we have the stakeholders all participating and getting the proper exercises and training and education in regards as to how should it ever happens and I commend all of you and I thank you for all your efforts, obviously you know the legislative body is here to provide as much support in conjunction with working with the executive branch. Thank you Mr. Chair.

Chairman Rodriguez: Thank you very much, is there anything else that you like to add. Mrs.O' Mallan?

Mrs. Josie O' Mallan: Sure, just to add to what Mr. Constantino has mentioned. Earlier on, the federal government actually granted flexibility to Public Health who receives the Public Health Emergency Grants well as the hospital who receives the Hospital Preparedness Grant redirect funds to where there is a need and that actually has happened we do have at a part of our reach in the national strategic stockpile which is a resource in the event that we exhaust supplies and equipment we need to respond I know that in through the tax force and through the meetings we've been on engaging with all our key responders that we do have supplies to respond initially to incidence that may have occurred and then we have our reach back to again support us.



We are in the process of procuring some of the key equipment that is needed especially for the fire the EMT's that would be transporting you know suspect case be assured that there is a lot of working progress, planning, to be better prepare so that we can respond more effectively.

Patrick Lujan: May I add

Chairman Rodriguez: Yes, Please.

Patrick Lujan: Since you guys are on TV and a portion of the public that watches this and your concerned with the communities concern just to let you know even prior to the nationwide media exposure we've been under the surveillance and for this portion we have been watching this throughout Asia and throughout the world.

On top of the task force Public Health with the multiple and table top exercises and coast guard, we continue to push out guidance and information CDC pretty much stabilized prior months continual weekly change even with PPEs one week we were totally ready the next week we weren't ready that is how much the change of this disease has taking place and affected even us we continue to have briefings and major stakeholder meetings we meet with the Guam Medical Society we continue to work with the Guam Customs the Airport Operations committee which deals with all of their airlines and even with their cleaning company that cleans the airplanes and private clinics and even private hotels we enhanced the laboratory procedures in Public Health we've enhanced epidemiology procedures we created a procedure customs and how we would respond to any type of potential individual under investigation. Under her office we've trained DOD personnel already on the virus and our director was in FIJI reporting out to the World Health Organization we are in a better position than most of all the rest of the Pacific as far as preparedness is concerned for Ebola and we continue the discussions of Guam's preparedness and status just for your information to give you a little bit of comfort we've been working really hard for our major stakeholders whether it is Ebola or other any public health outbreak, we continue to get it in a better posture.

Chairman Rodriguez: Thank you very much and I have no doubt that our government of Public Health, Homeland Security, and the Task Force is doing a lot to ensure that Guam is prepared and ready and I can't overemphasize this legislation is really in a proactive approach. It is not a panic approach what may happen in case of a threat to our community or so. Thank you very much for the work that you do. Mr. Casil?

Mr. Casil: Just to show you how tight our schedule is, we have been directed to have a mandate to finish our pandemic plan to update and to accommodate Ebola by December 31st so the time frame as you can see that is a lot of time frame our subcommittee is constantly working and updating and so on we really appreciate your bill and perhaps it could also pass it at the same time should God forbid anything happen and we'll be ready with that, thank you very much.

Senator Aguon: Just a quick question because obviously continuity binders are always very helpful in regards to situations like this, are you following your disaster preparedness plan? Out of homeland security where public health would step in would take the lead or are you moving forward based on



all the suggestions and all the inclusions of the private sector as well as government of Guam Agencies just planning and moving ahead based on other plans than the emergency disaster.

Mr. Casil: We are following the emergency plan in cases of medical emergency, public health is the lead and we are following that plan the other thing is also the basis of our plan is the pandemic plan out of 2008, we look at that and that is the basis of how we respond to the emergency, but as Pat has mentioned earlier, CDC has changed protocols because of the changes of the protocol we had to relook at the plan set up a task force go through table top exercises meet with other stakeholders and so we are trying to expand out all plans are great guidance but in the end we always need to adjust what the threat is and it is the Ebola threat is changing the landscape of the medical community responds because of that I'm basically helping with public health as the lead in coordinating this effort to basically update ourselves and again your bill, this bill is very timely, In between our division as well you both use senators as our oversight senators we coordinated with your section to ensure that the communication is both ways.

Chairman Rodriguez: Great, thank you very much. So it is now 11:54am this public hearing is adjourned thank you.

There being no other testimony, or comments by Senators, Chairman Rodriguez declared the bill as having been heard, and concluded the public hearing on Bill No. 422-32 (COR).

III. FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

Minor technical amendments relative to certain terminology in the field of communicable diseases, prevention and control were made to the Bill at the request of the Bureau of Communicable Disease Control and Prevention, and the Director, Department of Public Health and Social Services.

AN ACT TO PROVIDE FOR ISOLATION AND QUARANTINE **PROCEDURES** RELATIVE AN TO EMERGENCY DETENTION ORDER FOR THE INCUBATION PERIODS OF SEVERE COMMUNICABLE DISEASES, AS DETERMINED BY THE U.S. CENTER FOR DISEASE CONTROL, BY AMENDING SECTIONS III AND IV OF THE ISOLATION AND QUARANTINE REGULATIONS, CHAPTER 10 OF AND PROVIDE DIVISION 1, 26 GAR., DISPOSITION OF BODIES, BY ADDING A NEW § 4502(H) AND AMENDING § 4505, BOTH OF CHAPTER 4A, 10GCA, AND TO AUTHORIZE THE SUM OF ONE HUNDRED (\$130,000.00) THIRTY **THOUSAND DOLLARS** FOR RELATED PURPOSES.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF GUAM:

Section 1. Legislative Findings and Intent: I Liheslaturan Guåhan finds
that the Ebola Virus Disease epidemic in western Africa, the recent controlled
return of two infected American medical missionaries, and one imported case that
resulted in the limited spread of the Ebola virus to two (2) healthcare workers
within the continental United States.

The current fight against the spread of the epidemic of Ebola is being fought, in significant part, through the isolation of those infected, and with limited medical resources directly capable of combating the disease. These medications are still being developed, and are essentially unavailable. The incubation period during

which the Ebola virus can incubate and present in a person exposed to the virus is 1 twenty-one (21) days, as determined by the U.S. Center for Disease Control and 2 Prevention and the World Health Organization.

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I Liheslaturan Guåhan recognizes the ongoing debate in the United States as to whether the U.S. government and its lead health organization are taking sufficient steps to prevent entry of infected persons into the United States, and implement sufficient mandatory isolation and guarantine procedures for infected persons as well as those who have been exposed to them. Two eastern States, New York and New Jersey, have now gone so far as to implement their own stringent regulations mandating a twenty-one (21) day isolation and quarantine period for those persons returning who have treated or been exposed to Ebola patients in the affected western Africa countries.

Numerous American medical associations, hospitals, and other professional healthcare provider organizations are protesting the lack of training and preparedness, sufficient equipment and resources to properly and safely respond to the Ebola threat. On Guam, first responders lack sufficient safety equipment to respond to more than a handful of cases before the current, limited supplies would be exhausted.

Although the Guam Memorial Hospital Authority has a number of isolation rooms which are sufficient for certain types of communicable diseases, the institutions resources, and realistic capabilities to address an Ebola case are limited. Many larger and well recognized hospitals with resources far beyond the capabilities of GMHA are expressing their concerns and inadequacies in terms of safe containment and treatment capabilities. This is not a reflection upon the dedicated and highly qualified healthcare providers at the hospital, but rather, a limited resources and supplies. Nonetheless, the first line of defense must be proper isolation and quarantine to prevent the spread. Part and parcel to this is providing the necessary authority for the Director of the Department of Public

5 Health and Social Services to mandate, as is determined necessary for public health

and safety, the isolation and quarantine of infected persons, as well as those who

have had significant direct contact exposure to active cases at such time that

8 transmission is extremely possible.

It is, therefore, the *intent* of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* to provide the authority, based upon professionally determined criteria, for Executing an Emergency Detention Order, and the Procedures for Isolation and Quarantine.

Section 2. Section §3309 of Article 3 – Disease Control, Chapter 3, Title 10, Guam Code Annotated, is hereby *amended*, to read:

"§3309. Isolation and Quarantine: Regulations. Isolation and quarantine shall be imposed in accordance with regulations. Such regulations shall designate the disease for which isolation or quarantine is necessary, and such other requirements concerning diagnosis, treatment, release and other pertinent matters as may be necessary.

(a) The regulations *shall* also provide for isolation and quarantine, voluntary and involuntary, for the known incubation period, as determined by the CDC, of any communicable disease which is identified and declared by the U.S. Center for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) to be critically dangerous to public health and safety, and CDC mandates, directives, instructions and protocol criteria are being declared and implemented in a national effort to combat the spread of the disease."

- Section 3. A new Item 71 is hereby added to §3301(a) of Article 3, Chapter 3, Title 10, Guam Code Annotated, to read:
- In the event of any severe communicable disease with pandemic 3 potential which is identified and declared by the U.S. Center for Disease Control 4 and Prevention (CDC) to be critically dangerous to public health and safety, and 5 CDC mandates, directives, instructions and protocol criteria are being implemented 6 in a national effort to combat the spread of the disease, the disease shall be 7 immediately added, and shall not require prior promulgation by regulation as a 8 requisite for inclusion when time is of the essence in ensuring the health and safety 9 of the public. Subsequent promulgation by regulation may follow when 10 practicable." 11
- Section 4. A new Subsection (c) is hereby *ADDED* to §3310 of Article 3, Chapter 3, Title 10, Guam Code Annotated, to read:
- Notwithstanding §3309 of this Article, the Director may, in his 14 discretion and for the health and safety of the public, remove such person, with or 15 without his consent for isolation and quarantine, voluntary and involuntary, for the 16 duration of the known incubation period, as determined by the U.S. Center for 17 Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), of any severe communicable disease 18 which is identified and declared by the CDC to be critically dangerous to public 19 health and safety, and for which CDC mandates, directives, instructions and 20 protocol criteria are being declared and implemented in a national effort to combat 21 the spread of the disease. 22

- (i) The Director *shall* base the minimum duration of the incubation period upon the period of time determined to be appropriate and necessary by the U.S. Center for Disease Control and Prevention.
- (ii) The duration of isolation and quarantine for the incubation period

 shall be deemed to include an additional period of time as is necessary for

 testing and confirmation that the person does not have, or no longer is the

 carrier of a communicable disease.
- Section 5. Subsection III.A of Section II Procedure for Requesting Voluntary Isolation, of the Procedures for Isolation and Quarantine of Chapter 10, Division 1, Title 26, Guam Administrative Rules and Regulations, is hereby amended by ADDING a new Item 4, to read:

"III. Use Of Voluntary Isolation.

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- A. Voluntary Isolation should always be used as a first option UNLESS the
 DPHSS Director under the medical advice of the Chief Medical Officer has:
 - 1. determined in his or her professional judgment that seeking voluntary compliance would create a risk of serious harm; and
- 2. determined that there is a reason to believe that the person or persons is/are, or is/are suspected to be, infected with, exposed to or contaminated with a communicable disease or chemical, biological, or radiological agent that could spread to or contaminate others if remedial action is not taken; and
 - 3. Determined that there is a reason to believe that the person or persons would pose a serious and imminent risk to the health and safety of others if not detained for purposes of isolation and quarantine; and

twenty-one (21) days, as determined by the U.S. Center for Disease Control and the World Health Organization.

I Liheslaturan Guåhan recognizes the ongoing debate in the United States as to whether the U.S. government and its lead health organization are taking sufficient steps to prevent entry of infected persons into the United States, and implement sufficient mandatory isolation and quarantine procedures for infected persons as well as those who have been exposed to them. Two eastern States, New York and New Jersey, have now gone so far as to implement their own stringent regulations mandating a twenty-one (21) day isolation and quarantine period for those persons returning who have treated or been exposed to Ebola patients in the affected western Africa countries.

Numerous American medical associations, hospitals, and other professional healthcare provider organizations are protesting the lack of training and preparedness, sufficient equipment and resources to properly and safely respond to the Ebola threat. On Guam, first responders lack sufficient safety equipment to respond to more than a handful of cases before the current, limited supplies would be exhausted.

Although the Guam Memorial Hospital Authority has a number of isolation rooms which are sufficient for certain types of communicable diseases, the institutions resources, and realistic capabilities to address an Ebola case are limited. Many larger and well recognized hospitals with resources far beyond the capabilities of GMHA are expressing their concerns and inadequacies in terms of safe containment and treatment capabilities. This is not a reflection upon the dedicated and highly qualified healthcare providers at the hospital, but rather, a realistic assessment of what has historically been an underfunded hospital with

proper isolation and quarantine to prevent the spread. Part and parcel to this is providing the necessary authority for the Director of the Department of Public Health and Social Services to mandate, as is determined necessary for public health

limited resources and supplies. Nonetheless, the first line of defense must be

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

Testimony on Bill 422-32 (COR)

Hafa Adai, Mr. Chairman and members of the Committee on Health and Human Services, Senior Citizens, Economic Development, and Election Reform. My name is James W. Gillan, Director of the Department of Public Health and Social Services (DPHSS). Thank you for allowing me the opportunity to provide testimony in support of on Bill 422-32, "An Act to Provide for Isolation and Quarantine Procedures Relative to an Emergency Detention Order for the Incubation Periods of Severe Communicable Diseases, as Determined by the U.S. Center for Disease Control, by *Amending* Sections III and IV of the Isolation and Quarantine Regulations, Chapter 10 of Division 1, 26 GAR., and Provide for the Disposition of bodies, by Adding a New §4502(H) and Amending §4505, both of Chapter 4A, 10GCA, and to Authorize the Sum of \$130,000 for Related Purposes."

On August 8, the World Health Organization declared the current Ebola outbreak a Public Health Emergency of International Concern. The 2014 Ebola epidemic is the largest in history with widespread transmission in multiple countries in West Africa. As of November 28, a total of 15,901 Ebola cases were reported with 5,674 deaths. To date, two imported cases, including one death, and two locally acquired cases in healthcare workers have been reported in the United States. There is no reported case of Ebola on Guam.

The Ebola virus is not spread by casual contact, through air or by water, or by any food grown or legally purchased in the United States. The virus is spread through direct contact with the body fluids of a person who is sick with or has died from Ebola (blood, vomit, urine, feces, semen, spit). Ebola can only be spread to others after symptoms begin. Symptoms (fever, headache, diarrhea, vomiting, stomach/muscle pain, unexplained bleeding) can appear from 2 to 21 days after exposure (incubation period).

The incubation period of communicable diseases is defined as the length of time between entry of an infectious agent into the body and the beginning of disease symptoms. Bill 422-32 amends the current Isolation and Quarantine Regulations to extend the period of isolation or quarantine, with or without consent, based on the incubation period of any communicable disease, including Ebola, beyond the 10 days.

In addition, we are is in support of adding §4502 and amending §4505 of Chapter 4A, 10GCA giving authority to the Director regarding the final disposition of human remains based on CDC guidance, to ensure the safe handling of human remains that may contain a communicable disease, such as Ebola.

We support the initial funding authorization of \$130,000 to the Department of Public Health and Social Services to be expended as designated in Section 10 for "Bio infectious Personal Protection Equipment and Supplies." A distribution and allocation plan will be established to prioritize the expenditures and who the appropriate entities will be for the initial set up.

Lastly, we request that the citation of "U.S. Center for Disease Control" be corrected to the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, and the term "pandemic" removed in Section 4.(c) to ensure that all communicable diseases not classified as a pandemic (epidemic occurring on a scale which crosses international boundaries, usually affecting a large number of people) are covered.

- 1. Current law and regulations allow the Director of Department of Public Health & Social Services (DPHSS) the authority to impose isolation or quarantine of individuals that is reasonably suspected of having or is suspected of being a carrier of any disease that is considered a danger to the public community. However, Guam regulations limit that authority to only 10 days, while some pathogens have an incubation period longer than the authorized period of 10 days. In the case of Ebola, the incubation period is 21 days per Center for Disease Control (CDC).
- 2. If the required quarantine or isolation period, set by CDC, is greater than 10 days, then the Government of Guam must go before the courts to request additional days to ensure patient is not a danger to the community because of the disease. This is a legal delay that can be superseded by your bill.
- 3. Prior to a pandemic emergency, personal protective equipment (PPE) on hand should be inventoried to ensure necessary stock is available to respond. This \$130,000 is a good start if an emergency was to occur or there are signs of a possible emergency. Possible signs include Ebola confirmed in places like Philippines, Hawaii, Japan. Korea or other locations with direct flights to Guam. Recommend that within your bill, it identifies whose account the \$130,000 is put into.
