

This hearing is scheduled to receive public testimony on the following items:

- Bill No. 6-32 (LS) An act to amend §25.15 and §25.20 of Chapter 25, Title 9, Guam Code Annotated, relative to strengthening penalties for crimes involving criminal sexual conduct, which may be cited as the "Predator Prevention Act".
- Bill No. 10-32 (COR) An act to add a new Chapter 39A to Title 7 of the Guam Code Annotated relative to creating the Uniform Child Abduction Prevention Act.
- Bill No. 41-32 (LS) An act to amend Chapter 30, Title 9 Guam Code Annotated relative to strengthening the penalties for crimes of family violence.

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

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#### **COMMITTEE REPORT DIGEST**

#### I. OVERVIEW

The Committee on Guam U.S. Military Relocation, Homeland Security, Veterans' Affairs and Judiciary convened a public hearing on Monday, March 4th, 2013, at 9:00 a.m. in the Public Hearing Room of *I Liheslaturan Guahan*. Among the items on the agenda was Bill No. 43-32 (COR) - B.J.F. Cruz / J.T. Won Pat, Ed.D. - An act to add a new (b) (1) and (2) to § 67.801; and to add a new § 67.802 and § 67.803 to Article 8 of Chapter 67 of Title 9 Guam Code Annotated relative to strengthening the penalties for the possession, manufacturing, selling, or distribution of any synthetic Cannabinoid or Salvia Divinorum.

#### **Public Notice Requirements**

All legal requirements for public notices were met, with notices disseminated via-email to all senators and media outlets on February 25th, 2013, a published notice at the Marianas Variety on February 26th, 2013, and a notice again sent on March 1st, 2013. Copies of the hearing notices and e-mail notifications are appended to the report.

#### **Appearing before the Committee**

The public hearing was called to order at 9:00 a.m.

#### II. SUMMARY OF TESTIMONY AND DISCUSSION

Sen. Aguon: Recognizes testimonies by Atty. Phil Tydingco, and Lt. Arthur Paulino from Guam Police Department. Also recognizes sponsor's statement from Vice Speaker Benjamin Cruz given his absence.

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Vice Cruz's Testimony: Recent meeting with Atty. General's office, U.S. Attorney, Customs, and Drug Enforcement Agency, with regards to rapidly evolving forms of Spice. Synthetic cannabinoids are popular increasing due to easy accessibility and price. It's available in 'headshops' and other stores, and can be consumed in many forms. It causes nausea and panic attacks; and contains substances more potent than marijuana. U.S. military has taken steps to prevent usage. Our laws must evolve to beat those who try to outrun law in distribution and production of this drug. This is necessary for the protection of our youth, and encourage legislature and the public to support this measure.

Phil Tydingco: Offers no testimony.

Lt. Paulino: Thanks Senators for allowing testimony. Reads written testimony from Chief Bordallo of Guam Police Department. They are in support of its intent; however are concerned with its cost. Without standardized process to verify substance, enforcement will be diminished. Followed by testimony of crime lab. GPD is working on accurate identification of spice, and substances used in its production. Available methods of detection in other labs utilizes "high-performance liquid chromatography mass spectrometer", which local laboratory does not have. They can use a "gas chromatography mass spectrometer", but must purchase samples of substances. Once these are acquired, lab can check whether they can reproduce spice as available. Second, laboratory only has limited samples of known substances that constitute spice. Laboratory must be in compliance of standards for analyses of these drugs; once method is established, can be applied. However, without all necessary substances needed, the laboratory will have to validate an additional test using spice made from other synthetic cannabinoids. Third, other standard substances, cannot be procured, and as such the lab will have to make a formal request with U.S. DEA for supply. There is a long waiting list for non-commercially available substances. Two challenges: lack of substances for standardized checking, and lack of adequate equipment. Testimony by GPD legal unit. Testing using locally available equipment will require purchase of crystalline form of substance to be checked. There is accordingly no need for purchase of new equipment, but just larger quantities of substance standards. No information on whether all standards will be available for purchase, but will continue research.

Atty. Tydingco: AG supports proposed bill and updated provisions, but offers some technical issues. Proposed language makes it a crime to manufacture, distribute, substances; in comparison language in another part of the bill also makes it a crime to deliver. Under language of Code, "deliver" is broader than "distribute". If Bill 43 is changed to use the term "distribute", would not take away from intent. Second, use of language in punishment part of statute is vague; appears that it could be subject to punishments that could apply to marijuana, which has reduced penalties. Defense counsel may be able to argue that synthetic cannabis should be treated like real cannabis, which is subject to reduced penalties. AG agrees with Vice Speaker and other research that this substance is more harmful, and as such should not be subject to such reductions. Proposal that it should be treated similar to 'harder' Schedule 1 drugs. Also stresses AG Rapadas's indication that Legislature should support crime lab's need for new detection equipment.





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Sen. Aguon: Thanks testimony, and recognizes written testimony by Director of the Dept. of Public Health.

Speaker Won Pat: Asks whether comments by GPD was written by someone from the lab, or by another person.

Lt. Paulino: Clarifies that testimony was written by Ms. Monica Salas of the crime lab.

Speaker Won Pat: Asks for clarification on preferred position by GPD.

Lt. Paulino: Preferred position is to have substance standards be available, so that when officer brings in suspected spice, the lab can have a readily available standard to compare with. GPD has requests from surrounding islands as well; substances are expensive. Additional equipment would be beneficial, but available substance standards could also be utilized. Because the chemical constitution of spice rapidly evolves, keeping up is always a challenge for any crime lab.

Speaker Won Pat: Inquires whether other methods could be available, other than using substance standards; whether they can do tests on individual.

Lt. Paulino: They do, but standards must still be available. Stresses the need for substance standard to test samples against. Must also consider that off-island testing usually requires a longer timeframe.

Speaker Won Pat: Suggests that it may be helpful to have cost estimates for the different options.

Sen. Aguon: Question with regards to testing, whether the crime lab conducts testing for Guam National Guard and other military entities on island.

Lt. Paulino: Unsure, but indicates that GPD is moving towards direction of a regional crime lab.

Sen. Aguon: Concludes testimonies for Bill 43-32, and adjourns public hearing accordingly.

#### III. FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATION

The Committee on Guam U.S. Military Relocation, Homeland Security, Veterans' Affiars and Judiciary to which was referred "Bill No. 43-32 (COR) - B.J.F. Cruz / J.T. Won Pat, Ed.D. - An act to add a new (b) (1) and (2) to § 67.801; and to add a new § 67.802 and § 67.803 to Article 8 of Chapter 67 of Title 9 Guam Code Annotated relative to strengthening the penalties for the possession, manufacturing, selling, or distribution of any synthetic Cannabinoid or Salvia Divinorum" hereby submits these findings to I Mina' Trentai Dos na Lehislaturan Guahan and reports out Bill No. 43-32 (COR) with a recommendation **TO DO PASS**.

Hafa Adai. Good morning to you and fellow senators of the Committee on Guam U.S. Military Relocation, Homeland Security, Veteran's Affairs and Judiciary. My name is James W. Gillan, the Director of the Department of Public Health and Social Services. Thank you for allowing me this opportunity to comment on Bill No. 43-32 relative to strengthening the penalties for the possession, manufacturing, selling, or distribution of any synthetic cannabinoid or salvia divinorum by amending certain provisions of Chapter 67 of Title 9 of the Guam Code Annotated (known as the Guam Uniform Controlled Substances Act). We support the passage of Bill 43-32 but with recommendations for some amendments.

The Department of Public Health and Social Services is responsible for administering the Guam Uniform Controlled Substances Act (hereafter, identified as the "Act"), and mandated to update the controlled substances schedules as necessary, pursuant to the Administrative Adjudication Law, Title 5 Guam Code Annotated, §9100, et seq. We are grateful once again to this Legislative body for another opportunity to strengthen our existing regulatory and enforcement responsibilities by adding a definition for synthetic cannabinoid.

This testimony is supplementary to our previous testimony that was presented on December 13, 2011 for Bill 386-31, which later became Public Law 31-164 on January 4, 2012. While that testimony still stands true today with respect to our position on salvia divinorum, we would like to discuss some salient points about synthetic cannabinoids.

According to the National Institute on Drug Abuse, synthetic cannabinoids (also known as spice, K2, fake weed, and a whole other slew of street names) are "popular among young people; of the illicit drugs most used by high-school seniors, they are second only to marijuana." They are more popular among boys than girls. Some of the effects of using these products include elevated mood, relaxation, and altered perception which is reportedly similar to marijuana, but in some cases, have been reported to be even stronger than marijuana. Other effects include psychosis, like extreme anxiety, paranoia, and hallucinations.

According to the U.S. Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration, "Synthetic cannabinoids first appeared in [their] records in 2009, but there were too few visits to be reported. By 2010, [emergency department] visits involving synthetic cannabinoids rose to a reportable level for the Nation (3.7 visits per 100,000 population). By 2011, there were 9.2 visits per 100,000 population involving synthetic cannabinoids across all age groups — about 150 percent increase...The rate of visits involving synthetic cannabinoids was highest among patients aged 18 to 20 (60.8 visits per 100,000 population), followed by patients aged 12 to 17 (30.2 visits per 100,000)."

Although this Department is unsure of the public health impact, or extent that synthetic cannabinoids or salvia divinorum has affected Guam, we approve the intent of Bill 43-32 in protecting public health, but would like to recommend that the following changes be made:

- Move the definition of synthetic cannabinoid to Article 1 of the Act. Public Law 31-164 (enacted on January 4, 2012) repealed all of Article 8; therefore, it doesn't exist contrary to the language of Bill 43-32. Placing the definition for synthetic cannabinoid in Article 1 would be more appropriate because Article 1 contains all the definitions used in the Act.
- We recommend that all other provisions of Bill 43-32 be removed. Public Law 31-164 placed salvia divinorum and synthetic cannabinoids as a Schedule I drug, thus all the other provisions, including penalties (e.g., Article 4 Offenses and Penalties; Article 4a Use of Minors in a Drug Operation; and Article 5 Enforcement and Administrative Provisions) will be applicable. There are already provisions which state the illegal acts and penalty provisions for the manufacture, selling, distributing, possessing, and conspiring to use Schedule I drugs, so Sections 2 and 3 of Bill 43-32 appear redundant and unnecessary.




"Spice" refers to a wide variety of herbal mixtures that produce experiences similar to marijuana (cannabis) and that are marketed as "safe," legal alternatives to that drug. Sold under many names, including K2, fake weed, Yucatan Fire, Skunk, Moon Rocks, and others — and labeled "not for human consumption" — these products contain dried, shredded plant material and chemical additives that are responsible for their psychoactive (mind-altering) effects.


#### **False Advertising**

Labels on Spice products often claim that they contain "natural" psycho-active material taken from a variety of plants. Spice products do contain dried plant material, but chemical analyses show that their active ingredients are *synthetic* (or designer) cannabinoid compounds.

For several years, Spice mixtures have been easy to purchase in head shops and gas stations and via the Internet. Because the chemicals used in Spice have a high potential for abuse and no medical benefit, the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) has designated the five active chemicals most frequently found in Spice as Schedule I controlled substances, making it illegal to sell, buy, or possess them. Manufacturers of Spice products attempt to evade these legal restrictions by substituting different chemicals in their mixtures, while the DEA continues to monitor the situation and evaluate the need for updating the list of banned cannabinoids.

Spice products are popular among young people; of the illicit drugs most used by high-school seniors, they are second only to marijuana. (They are more popular among boys than girls — in 2012, nearly twice as many male 12th graders reported past-year use of synthetic marijuana as females in the same age group.) Easy access and the misperception that Spice products are "natural" and therefore harmless have likely contributed to their popularity. Another selling point is that the chemicals used in Spice are not easily detected in standard drug tests.





### How Is Spice Abused?

Some Spice products are sold as "incense," but they more closely resemble potpourri. Like marijuana, Spice is abused mainly by smoking. Sometimes Spice is mixed with marijuana or is prepared as an herbal infusion for drinking.

### How Does Spice Affect the Brain?

Spice users report experiences similar to those produced by marijuana—elevated mood, relaxation, and altered perception—and in some cases the effects are even stronger than those of marijuana. Some users report psychotic effects like extreme anxiety, paranoia, and hallucinations.

So far, there have been no scientific studies of Spice's effects on the human brain, but we do know that the cannabinoid compounds found in Spice products act on the same cell receptors as THC, the primary psychoactive component of marijuana. Some of the compounds found in Spice, however, bind more strongly to those receptors, which could lead to a much more powerful and unpredictable effect. Because the chemical composition of many products sold as Spice is unknown, it is likely that some varieties also contain substances that could cause dramatically different effects than the user might expect.

### What Are the Other Health Effects of Spice?

Spice abusers who have been taken to Poison Control Centers report symptoms that include rapid heart rate, vomiting, agitation, confusion, and hallucinations. Spice can also raise blood pressure and cause reduced blood supply to the heart (myocardial ischemia), and in a few cases it has been associated with heart attacks. Regular users may experience withdrawal and addiction symptoms.

We still do not know all the ways Spice may affect human health or how toxic it may be, but one public health concern is that there may be harmful heavy metal residues in Spice mixtures. Without further analyses, it is difficult to determine whether this concern is justified.

### K2 or Spice

#### Overview

K2 or "Spice" is a mixture of herbs and spices that is typically sprayed with a synthetic compound chemically similar to THC, the psychoactive ingredients in marijuana. The chemical compounds typically include HU-210, HU-211, JWH-018, and JWH-073. K2 is commonly purchased in head shops, tobacco shops, various retail outlets, and over the Internet. It is often marketed as incense or "fake weed." Purchasing over the Internet can be dangerous because it is not usually known where the products come from or what amount of chemical is on the organic material.

#### Street names

Bilss, Black Mamba, Bombay Blue, Fake Weed, Genie, Spice, Zohai

#### Looks like

K2 is typically sold in small, silvery plastic bags of dried leaves and marketed as incense that can be smoked. It is said to resemble potpourri.

#### Methods of abuse

K2 products are usually smoked in joints or pipes, but some users make it into a tea.

#### Affect on mind

Psychological effects are similar to those of marijuana and include paranoia, panic attacks, and giddiness.

#### Affect on body

Physiological effects of K2 include increased heart rate and increase of blood pressure. It appears to be stored in the body for long periods of time, and therefore the long-term effects on humans are not fully known.



#### Overdose effects

There have been no reported deaths by overdose.

#### Legal status in the United States

On Tuesday, March 1, 2011, DEA published a final order in the Federal Register temporarily placing five synthetic cannabinoids into Schedule I of the CSA. The order became effective on March 1, 2011. The substances placed into

Schedule I are 1-pentyl-3-(1-naphthoyl) indole (JWH-018), 1-butyl-3-(1-naphthoyl) indole (JWH-073), 1-[2-(4-morpholinyl) ethyl]-3-(1-naphthoyl)indole (JWH-200), 5-(1,1-dimethylheptyl)-2-[(1R,3S)-3-hydroxycyclohexyl]-phenol (CP-47,497), and 5-(1,1-dimethyloctyl)-2-[(1R,3S)-3-hydroxycyclohexyl]-phenol (cannabicyclohexanol; CP-47,497 C8 homologue). This action is based on a finding by the Administrator that the placement of these synthetic cannabinoids into Schedule I of the CSA is necessary to avoid an imminent hazard to the public safety. As a result of this order, the full effect of the CSA and its implementing regulations including criminal, civil and administrative penalties, sanctions, and regulatory controls of Schedule I substances will be imposed on the manufacture, distribution, possession, importation, and exportation of these synthetic cannabinoids.

#### Common places of origin

Manufacturers of this product are not regulated and are often unknown since these products are purchased via the Internet whether wholesale or retail. Several websites that sell the product are based in China. Some products may contain an herb called damiana, which is native to Central America, Mexico, and the Caribbean.

#### Testimony on Bill 386-31 (COR)

Hafa Adai, Chairman Palacios and the members of the Committee on Public Safety, Law Enforcement, and Judiciary. My name is James W. Gillan, the Director of the Department of Public Health and Social Services (DPHSS). Thank you for allowing me the opportunity to present testimony on Bill 386-31, An act to add a new item (F) to Appendix A of Chapter 67 of Title 9 of the Guam Code Annotated relative to designating *Salvia divinorum* or *Salvinorum A* and certain synthetic cannabinoids as Schedule I controlled substances under the Guam Uniform Controlled Substances Act (the "Act"). As the Department designated to administer the Act, including the updating of controlled substance schedules, we support Bill 386-31.

The current law makes it a violation to possess Salvia divinorum or Salvinorum A, but the passage of Bill 386-31 will impose stricter regulatory requirements of these substances and other synthetic cannabinoids as Schedule I controlled substances. There is strong compelling evidence from the U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) that this is a necessary measure that makes good sense in protecting public health and providing them safety. The placement of these substances as a scheduled drug will essentially have the full impact of the Guam Uniform Controlled Substances Act in terms of regulating its manufacture, distribution, possession, importation, and exportation of these synthetic cannabinoids including the application of criminal, civil, and administrative penalties.

Pursuant to §67.201 of the Act, there are eight factors that DPHSS must consider in determining whether a substance should be controlled. These factors include (1) the actual or relative potential for abuse; (2) the scientific evidence of its pharmacological effect, if known; (3) the state of current scientific knowledge regarding the substance; (4) the history and current pattern of abuse; (5) the scope, duration and significance of abuse; (6) the risk to the public health; (7) the potential of the substance to produce psychic or physiological dependence liability; and (8) whether the substance is an immediate precursor of a controlled substance. Tests for a substance to be classified as a Schedule I include substances that have a high potential for abuse, has no currently accepted medical use in treatment in the United States, and lacks accepted safety use under medical supervision.

According to the DEA, "these substances [Salvia] are not intended for human consumption, but there has been a rapid and significant increase in abuse of these substances in the United States...[which] are banned in at least 18 states in the United States and several countries, and all five branches of the U.S. military prohibit military personnel from possessing or using synthetic cannabinoids. Second, law enforcement has seized synthetic cannabinoids in conjunction with controlled substances and based on self-reports to law enforcement and health care professionals, synthetic cannabinoids are abused for their psychoactive properties. Third,

numerous state and local public health departments and poison control centers have issued health warnings describing the adverse health effects associated with synthetic cannabinoids. Based on scientific data currently available, these five substances have the potential to be extremely harmful and, therefore, pose an imminent hazard to the public safety."

The American Association of Poison Control Centers reported receiving a total of 2,915 calls in 2010 involving Salvia. As of October 31, 2011, the number of calls increased more than 100% to 5,741 from 49 states and the District of Columbia. DEA has indicated that there is little information regarding the pharmacology, toxicology, and safety of these substances in humans given the minimal amount of pre-clinical investigations undertaken regarding these substances; therefore, the full danger of these drugs has not yet been determined.

The National Institutes of Health and National Institute of Drug Abuse has noted that a variety of mood and perceptual effects have been described in the use of Salvia with adverse health effects that include rapid heart rate, vomiting, agitation, confusion, and hallucinations. Numerous state and local public health departments, and poison control centers state that anxiety, nausea, elevated blood pressure, tremor, seizures, paranoid behavior, and non-responsiveness are amongst other adverse health effects.

Based on the above information, the DPHSS believes that sufficient evidence exists to list these synthetic cannabinoid substances as a Schedule I drug. However, we recommend that these substances be placed in Section (C) of Appendix A, instead of the creation of a new Item (F), since synthetic cannabinoid are categorized as a hallucinogenic substance.

The Department of Public Health and Social Services supports this bill which would strengthen penalties for possession, manufacturing, selling or distribution of any synthetic cannabinoid or Salvia Divinorum.

Salvia Divinorum is a hallucinogen not currently controlled under the Controlled Substances Act. It is however under regulatory controls in 20 US States and 9 Countries as of July 2012. There is not enough information on long term use and negative health effects. It is, though a drug of choice for younger persons aged 12-25. Since it has side effects similar to those associated with marijuana use, it can lead to impaired judgment. Those under the influence are more likely to be involved in vehicular accidents.

#### Senator Cruz – Sponsor Statement for Bill No. 43-32 (COR):

After a recent meeting with representatives from the Office of the US Attorney, the Office of the Attorney General, the Guam Customs Authority, and the Drug Enforcement Agency, Bill No. 43-32 (COR) was introduced to help the law enforcement community keep pace with rapidly evolving forms of spice. Unfortunately, each time an anti-spice law has been passed; a new form of chemical spice is manufactured that makes it street legal again.

The synthetic cannabinoid, also known as "Spice," is a combination of herbal and chemical compounds that commonly produce a reaction similar to the use of marijuana. The popularity is increasing, especially among youth, due to easy accessibility, low cost, and the difficulty of detection on drug tests. It is sold in smoke shops, head shops, and other retailers as incense. Spice is abused mainly by smoking or prepared as a drink. Users experience severe adverse reactions including hallucinations, nausea, vomiting, agitation, and panic attacks. The chemical composition of Spice is considerably more potent that tetrahydrocannabinol or THC, the active ingredient in marijuana.

Through past Public Laws my colleagues and I have taken proactive steps to ban Spice. The U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration and U.S. Military have taken action to control and prohibit the use of Spice. If passed, Bill 43-32 will update Guam's existing legal definition of Spice and strengthen its penalties for the possession, distribution, or sale of Spice in any quantity. When the makers of this drug evolve to beat our laws – our laws must evolve to beat them in order to protect our residents and Guam's precious youth. It is important that we remain ahead of this problem and I urge my colleagues to support the passage of Bill No. 43-32 (COR).

Re: Analysis of Synthetic Cannabinoids (Spice)

Dear Senator Cruz:

The Guam Police Crime Lab Drug Analysis Unit is currently working on a method for the analysis of and validation studies for synthetic cannabinoids, hereinafter referred to as Spice. The laboratory is in possession of 1-mL each of two (2) standards, JWH-018 & JWH-022, for use in this process. Below is a summary of the issues facing the GPD Crime Lab Drug Analysis Unit in the analysis of Spice.

- The available methods of analysis for Spice performed in other laboratories in the United States utilize an instrument called the High Performance Liquid Chromatography Mass Spectrometer (HPLC-MS) which our laboratory does not have. Research via the internet provided a method using the instrument our laboratory does have, the Gas Chromatograph Mass Spectrometer (GCMS). In order to access the full text article describing the analytical techniques, the article must be purchased and is currently priced at \$34.95 US (subject to change). Once the article is acquired, the laboratory will evaluate the procedure outlined in the article and determine if it can be reproduced using the instruments and chemicals available. If additional chemicals are needed, those chemicals will need to be procured.
- The laboratory only has two (2) standards of the approximately twenty-six (26) known synthetic cannabinoids. This will make identification of any of the other Spice compounds difficult as the laboratory must be in compliance with the minimum requirements recommended by SWGDrug (Scientific Working Group for the analysis of seized Drugs) for the positive identification of drug compounds. The laboratory will use the two (2) available standards to develop the method for analysis of Spice containing JWH-018 or JWH-022. Once this method is established, it is anticipated that the other synthetic cannabinoids can be analyzed using the same instrumental method, however without the specific standard of the Spice variation, the laboratory will have to identify and validate an additional test to confirm Spice made from any of the other synthetic cannabinoids.

• Not all the synthetic cannabinoid standards are commercially available for purchase. For the standards that cannot be purchased, the laboratory will have to make a formal request to the Drug Enforcement Administration for samples. There is currently a small supply available and a long waiting list for the non-commercially available Spice standards.

The following options may assist with the process of analyzing Spice:

- 1) Purchase of a HPLC-MS to include its accessories, installation, training, libraries, warranty, and service contracts. After training and installation is complete, the validation process of the known standards must be conducted. Purchase of an HPLC-MS gives the laboratory the future advantage of having the same instrument and methods used by other laboratories in the United States which will shorten the validation period of synthetic cannabinoids that may be later discovered. We will also have the capability of analyzing other large drug molecules, such as steroids, which can easily be identified with this instrument.
- 2) The next option is to purchase the article on the analysis of Spice using the GCMS. Based on what the article says, the laboratory will attempt to reproduce the methods and analytical techniques described and to validate the method on the GCMS. Further, additional chemicals may need to be procured in order to complete the analysis. This will delay the validation process until the procurement of the necessary items is complete.
- 3) Finally, an alternative option is to send the suspected Spice samples to an off-island laboratory for analysis. This should be a temporary solution as the Guam Police Crime Lab Drug Analysis Unit desires to develop a sustainable method of successfully identifying Spice for the law enforcement entities on-island.

The analysis of Spice presents a two-fold challenge, lack of available standards for comparison and the lack of the instrumentation used by other U.S. laboratories. The Guam Police Crime Lab Drug Analysis Unit will continue to work with the resources available to research and develop an acceptable method of analysis for synthetic cannabinoids.

Good Morning Lt. Wade,

Attached is a copy of the draft memo that was finalized by someone else for Senator BJ Cruz. After speaking with Analyn, we can use a regular GCMS (Gas Chromatograph Mass Spectrometer) method without deuterium. This will require that GPD purchase a larger quantity of the crystalline form of the various synthetic cannabinoids commercially available.

Analyn made contact with analysts that she networked with in previous conferences. She received four responses from colleagues who provided her a copy of their method that is being used in their respective laboratories in Alabama, Kansas, Ohio and Virginia. This is good news in that we will not need to purchase any new equipment, just larger quantities of the standards. Then, of course, we need to validate the method on our own instruments before actively analyzing the cases for court or investigative purposes.

The standards are quite expensive. We spent nearly \$3000 for 1 ml each of two standards. The crystalline form will be much more expensive than that and there are more than 22 known variations. I have no information on how many of the variations are commercially available for purchase. We will research this.
