#### COMMITTEE REPORT DIGEST

#### I. OVERVIEW

The Committee on Public Safety, Infrastructure and Maritime Transportation convened a public hearing on April 17, 2013 at 6:00 pm in *I Liheslatura's* Public Hearing Room. Among the items on the agenda was the consideration of Bill 86-32 (COR) whose referral history is as follows:

Bill 86-32 (COR) was introduced by Senator Thomas C. Ada on April 9, 2013, and was subsequently referred by the Committee on Rules to the Committee on Public Safety, Infrastructure and Maritime Transportation on April 9, 2013.

#### **Public Notice Requirements**

Notices were disseminated via email to all senators and all main media broadcasting outlets on Wednesday, April 10, 2013 (5-Day Notice), and again on Monday, April 15, 2013 (48-Hour Notice).

#### II. SUMMARY OF TESTIMONY AND DISCUSSION

The public hearing was Called-to-Order at 6:00 pm.

#### Former Senator Joanne Brown

Provided oral and written testimony (See Attached)

Joanne Brown, General Manager of the Port Authority of Guam supports passage of Bill 86-32. She states the waiver is one of the requirements necessary for a \$10,000,000 commercial loan intended to fund the MSLE [Marine Service Life Extension], which includes critical wharf repairs (F-3, F-4, F-5 and F-6), the upgrading of the Port's financial management system, and the purchase of a top lifter to support container yard operations. According to Ms. Brown, all these items are critical to "the sustainability of Port Operations."



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Ms. Brown further states that the Port is evaluating how to service the loan in both the near and long term. She states that upon completion of the Ports master plan in the next 24 weeks, the PAG may re-evaluate its financial strategy and use the updated master plan as support for a tariff petition. She concludes by reiterating the importance of the items to be financed by the loan, and thanks the legislature for its consideration.

#### **Question & Answer**

Chairperson Ada opens the floor for questions.

**Senator McCreadie** states the top-lifter may be a revenue source, but asks if the deterioration of the wharves is causing the government to lose revenue?

**Ms. Brown** answers that it is not a questions of losing revenue, but a question of structural integrity if the repairs are not addressed, and comments that should a section of wharf collapse, a significant portion of the port's wharf will be out of use. She further states when cargo ships and passenger vessels are in port, this is valuable real estate for operation. She adds that F-5 requires the most critical repairs. She closes by stating without the repairs, the Port's insurance may be affected, which would leave the Port in a difficult situation if there were an earthquake or typhoon.

**Senator McCreadie** asks what funding source is going to pay the remainder of the 10 million dollars?

**Ms. Brown** answers that is the reason the Port is looking to approach the PUC. She states that there are a lot of major infrastructure and equipment issues that have not been addressed at the PAG, and now, the Port has to accommodate at least organic growth by addressing the infrastructure and equipment issues. She states again that the needs to be financed are critical.

Vice-Speaker Cruz asks if the ANZ loan for the Port required a waiver of sovereign immunity?

**Ms. Brown** answers that the bank did not require legislative concurrence. States there was an effort to use language approved through a similar process, but in the case of the Bank of Guam, they requested this language be added into law.

**Chairperson Ada** asks for clarification of whether or not the ANZ loan was backed by the USDA?

**Ms. Brown** answers that to her knowledge, this particular loan is not backed by USDA.



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**Vice-Speaker Cruz** clarifies that he is very supportive of the Marine Service Life Extension, but he is concerned about this requirement for waiving sovereign immunity. Asks Director Brown if the Port's Legal Counsel has given an opinion on how broad this waiver is?

**Ms. Brown** state that the Legal Counsel reviewed the issue, and the Port understands the implications with the issue, but states that ultimately this is language the bank is requiring if the Port is to move forward with their proposal.

Vice-Speaker Cruz asks what General Manager Brown understands of the issue?

**Ms. Brown** states she understands that if the Port does not address its obligations, the Port will be subject to in legal actions that may result in the loss of government assets.

Vice-Speaker Cruz asks what would that be?

**Ms. Brown** states that it would be interesting if they [the bank] tried to acquire Port assets or Port property as a result of this.

Vice-Speaker Cruz states "that's my concern."

**Ms. Brown** states that it is a legitimate concern.

Vice-Speaker Cruz asks if there is any protection against that?

**Ms. Brown** states she is very confident that the port will be able to address the payments. She further states it is no different than the hundreds of millions of debt service the Government of Guam takes out and pays for at the beginning of every year.

Vice-Speaker Cruz states that in this case of the port, his concern is that they may try to get port property.

**Ms. Brown** states that is a possibility, but states that if the port does not address the financing to address these critical repairs, there may be no property to hold onto.

**Vice Speaker Cruz** states he understands, but is very concerned with the demand for the waiver. Further states he has been contemplating an amendment to the effect of,

"Notwithstanding this Section, any claim for relief brought against the Port Authority of Guam shall be brought under and in accordance with Title 5 GCA of the Government Claims Act, such claims shall be subject to the provisions of monetary relief only and under no circumstances in the event of default on any and all of the PAG financial



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engagements subsequent to foreclosure on said security interests may any lienholder seek to maintain a cause of action for relief other than monetary obligation paying for security

interest agreements between the lienholder and the port. The limitations thereby preclude any foreclosure on real property that encompasses the Port of Guam."

States he does not want to be in the situation where a foreclosure proceeding starts and the Port is sold. Also states that any other loans in the future may jeopardize port assets because we've waived sovereign immunity. Continues by stating that he would like to limit recovery to monetary assets without the possibility of foreclosure or sale. Closes by stating that he does not want this to be the "catalyst" to put the Port up for sale.

Asks General Manager Brown if she remembers any other time where the Government has waived sovereign immunity for any loan?

**Ms. Brown** responds that off the top of her head, she cannot answer because the financing she dealt with while at the legislature was for bonds in the hundreds of millions of dollars.

Vice-Speaker Cruz states those bonds are Section-thirty (30) guaranteed.

**Ms. Brown** states Section-thirty (30) are almost always used for that purpose.

**Vice-Speaker Cruz** reiterates his concern is the possibility of foreclosure because the language is so broad.

**Ms. Brown** states the port will take all the necessary steps to ensure that the debts are paid. Also adds that there is the possibility that they may pursue a bond or refinance in the future and pay the debt off sooner. States they are bringing forth the legislation only because the lending institution requested it. She closes by stating the senator is welcome to discuss the bill and his proposed language with his colleagues and the bank and PAG will leave that to the legislature.

**Vice-Speaker Cruz** Follows up on Senator McCreadie's question about the debt service for this loan and refers to an attachment from Port's 5-year Tariff Projection and Financial Plan stating, total fees without the surcharge per container are currently \$565.00. Further states that if we go through the scenarios in the proposal that the Port references as the source of debt service for the loan, with the initial 3.95% increase and the annual compounding increases, within 10 years, the can fees will be \$832.00 per can, and by the 20<sup>th</sup> year, the per can fee will be \$1226.00. Closes by asking for clarification regarding the projection of container fees and increases, and adds if it increases by 6.95%, the community will be paying in excess of \$1400.00 per container.

**Ms. Brown** answers, nobody likes rate increases, but the reality is, if the upgrades are not addressed, the Port cannot operate. She further states it cannot sustain organic growth, and if there is an earthquake there will be major consequences. States the most responsible thing to do



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is address the repairs, so the valuable real estate remains operational. Further states that down the road, there are other financing options that can be spread over a longer period of time, but for now, this financing is essential for repairs that are needed to sustain port operations.

**Vice-Speaker Cruz** asks if there is any discussion with MARAD about getting the \$10 Million from the existing forty two million dollars (\$42,000,000) that remains in the Port Enterprise Fund account.

**Ms. Brown** answers that amount of money is already dedicated to other upgrades at the Port, that also must be done. States it would be wonderful if the federal government could pay for this, but that's not where we're at right now.

**Vice-Speaker Cruz** responds if everyone agrees that the priority is the MSLE, can we not discuss the possibility with MARAD, especially considering the potential 200% increase per container.

**Ms. Brown** states that they are not arguing with the figures, but this is the cold hard reality, and this may be the case.

**Vice-Speaker Cruz** wants the community to be aware two things: the possibility of foreclosure, and that in order to pay for it, they have to be ready to go from \$565.00 to \$1464.00 per container.

**Ms. Brown** states she will not argue that point, but wants to address the vice-speaker's question about the current modernization with MARAD, and states that the design and work are planned to be completed by 2015. She states the Port feels they are on track, and though the wharfs are critical, so are the other projects. She closes by stating there may be more federal funds available.

Chairperson Ada states that the Guam Water Works Authority took out a loan previously and did waive its sovereign immunity. Also states that using funds from the DOD grant for the Wharf repairs was discussed, but that option was found to be unfavorable. MARAD initially wanted to put the entire \$50M grant into the waterfront and not the uplands, but the Governor, Congresswoman and Legislature spoke against it. States the Port ultimately decided to finance the repairs.

Asks General Manager Brown to elaborate on the "in-time borrowing conditions" mentioned in her testimony, and asks when the Port will submit its petition for an increase to the PUC. Lastly, he asks, how is this debt service to be satisfied?



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**General Manager Brown** states that the Port is still evaluating the data to present the case to the Board and PUC, as it is more than likely they will need a rate increase. Further states the Port's

hope is to appear before the PUC in the next few months. Yields to Alma Javier (Procurement Manager) for the financing portion of the chairperson's questions.

**Ms. Javier** states if the bill is passed, the Port will begin the loan document process with the Bank of Guam. States this should take approximately 30-days, and then the PAG will transmit to the PUC a petition in June or July. Upon PUC approval, they hope to begin solicitation for the SLE project.

Chairperson Ada asks "this August?"

**Ms.** Javier answers yes because the technical scope of work is completed.

**Chairperson Ada** states the PUC will most likely not return within 30-days, and they will be asking the same questions. If not, then the Port can do an in detail study or file for an interim rate increase with the debt service outlined in the terms as justification. States that this would start the process sooner.

**Ms. Brown** states Port has discussed the interim tariff. She further states that the Port has no desire to delay the process because they know how critical it is for the project to move forward. States the target is early next year for the repairs to be done.

**Chairperson Ada** states given the concerns of the Vice-Speaker, the PAG will seek concurrence of the amended language by GEDA and the bank before reporting Bill 86-32 (COR) out for consideration by the Legislature.

**Ms. Brown** states she appreciates that, as facilitating this process will be one less hurdle out of the way.

**Chairperson Ada** states that on the floor, other senators will be asking the same question, how are they going to pay for the loan?

**Ms. Brown** adds that if they do not have the ability to pay for the loan, then the legislation will not be needed. Also states that the repairs need to be done and are critical to the port.

Chairperson Ada thanks the panel and adjourns the public hearing at 6:45pm.

#### III. FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

The Committee on Public Safety, Infrastructure and Maritime Transportation has substituted Bill 35-32 (COR) with the following significant changes:





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• In Sections 2 the following language was added to address concerns that the Port Authority of Guam could pledge assets other than revenues by waiving sovereign immunity:

Should any suit or action arise or be initiated to enforce any of the terms of any agreement, indenture, or pledge of revenues, concerning the indebtedness authorized under this Article, any judgment therein shall be paid solely from the revenues of the Authority and at no time shall any other property be subject to foreclosure or recourse to satisfy any suit or action authorized by this Article or judgment therein.

• The Committee on Public Safety, Infrastructure and Maritime Transportation notes that the language was reviewed and agreed upon by the Port Authority of Guam, Guam Economic Development Authority, Bank of Guam and Vice Speaker Benjamin J.F. Cruz.

The PAG is requesting this waiver as it is needed to comply with lender requirements in order to obtain a \$10M loan. The loan is intended to fund: (1) Marine Service Life Extension (MSLE) project for much needed repairs and to prevent further structural deterioration of the F3, F4, F5 and F6 Wharfs; (2) upgrade the Financial Management System (FMS) due to the current system becoming obsolete; (3) additional Top Lifter to support the ongoing operations of cargo movement between the vessel, yard, and gate. All of these outlined needs are critical to the sustainability of Port operations.

In December of 2010, the PAG became aware of the defects and significant deterioration of the F5 Wharf after underwater inspections were conducted on all six wharves. In addition to the concerns with F5, it was determined that cathodic protection is also needed on F3, F4, and F6 wharfs. Moreover, if these repairs are not addressed, the Port's wharves may not be insurable. As a result of these concerns, PAG commissioned its consultants to develop the technical scope of work to address the identified defects and mitigate further deterioration. Further, considerable discussion on the funding options for any work to be undertaken for this matter took place between the PAG and federal partners, given that cost estimates were unclear at that time and funding alternatives were limited. In March 2012, the Port Board of Directors provided authorization to Port Management to pursue financing options to fund repairs to the Port facilities. It was also during this time that the Port's Board of Directors determined the need to address the upgrade of the FMS and to acquire an additional top-lifter to maintain and support Port operations. In June of 2012, the design work for the MSLE project was completed. In September 2012, through the assistance of the Guam Economic Development Authority, the solicitation process for financing, as required under

procurement laws, rules and regulations, was initiated and resulted in the selection of Bank of Guam as the awarded financing institution. Subsequently, negotiations between the PAG and Bank of Guam took place over the course of the end of the fourth quarter in 2012.

In late January 2013, the PAG was advised of Bank of Guam's additional condition to close the loan which required PAG to waive its sovereign immunity through legislative assistance. The PAG Board of Directors, consequently passed Board Resolution 2013-02 on February 15, 2013 requesting legislative assistance to introduce the legislation which we submit this testimony for this evening. Bill No. 86-32, as proposed, is needed to comply with Bank of Guam's requirements to close the commercial loan being sought by PAG.

In parallel with the request for the introduction and hopeful passage of Bill No. 86-32, the Port is also evaluating how it will finance the MSLE loan in both the near-term and long-term. In October of 2012, the Port submitted a 5-year Tariff Projection and a 20-year Port Modernization Financial Plan to its Board and the PUC. Since that submission, the Port has embarked on an effort to update its 2007 Master Plan. It is anticipated that the Plan will be completed over the next 24 weeks that will trigger the process of a revised Master Plan for approval. The completion and approval of the revised Master Plan will provide the support for an updated 5-Year Tariff Petition to the PUC based on the projects and funding necessary to secure Port Modernization, long-term sustainability, and long term financial sufficiency for a 20-year horizon.

It is worthy to note that the construction project for the MSLE project is expected to begin upon completion of the solicitation and contracting process of approximately 6-months, thereby, the actual construction work is anticipated to begin in 2014. As part of the mutually agreed terms and conditions of this loan with Bank of Guam, it is expected that the monthly payments due for the first two years during the construction period will only be for interest payments. Therefore, the annual debt service requirement for the first two (2) years will correspond to the in-time borrowing conditions of the loan. To fulfill the loan requirements, the PAG is prepared to maintain a reserve account to cover three-months of payments for the loan.

The Port is currently working on finalizing its financial strategy to present its petition to the PUC after the Port and its consultants have evaluated the 2012 cargo volumes, addressed adjustments to its financial model and reviewed any potential reprogramming possibilities. Regardless of the outcome of the Port's financial strategy, Legislative approval of the Waiver of Sovereign Immunity is a necessary step to moving forward on this critical Service Life Extension project and acquiring much needed equipment.

We thank you for your introduction of this measure and respectfully request favorable consideration for its expeditious passage by you and your colleagues.

Dear Chairman Ada:

As I noted to you and the members of your Committee during the April 17<sup>th</sup> Public Hearing of Bill 86-32 (COR), relative to authorizing the Port Authority of Guam to waive sovereign immunity as a prerequisite for approval of a \$10,000,000 commercial loan, I am greatly concerned by the overbroad and sweeping nature of the waiver as proposed.

As presently drafted, the language contained within Bill 86-32 (COR) would:

- 1) Waive the Port's sovereign immunity for *all* prospective financial obligations authorized by the Port's enabling legislation (Title 12, Chapter 10). Though a blanket waiver may not have been intended, the consequences of this language may be horrendous.
- 2) Absent a clear statutory reference to the Government Claims Act or expressed language accomplishing the same result, relief arising by default of any obligation under Article 2 of Title 12 could result in the foreclosure or assignment of Port real property or assets.

In addition to my reading of the measure as drafted, I would note that the Port's General Manger acknowledged the legitimacy of my concerns at the same hearing. My fears are compounded by the fact that the Port does not yet have a plan to meet the debt service required by this obligation.

At your invitation, I respectfully submit the attached ammended version of Bill 86-32 (COR). In addition to the language required by the Authority's lending institution, the following protections have been added:

- 1) Claims on indebtedness are limited to monetary relief, as mandated by the Government Claims Act.
- 2) The Government of Guam, must in the event of any default by the Authority, have the right to assume such indebtedness or obligation (this is to ensure that GovGuam can

protect the Port's real property assets and at the same time provide relief to any claimaint.)

Though the amendments I have attached are a working start, I hope that you will allow me the opportunity to submit revised language upon greater research and reflection.

While I am certain that other legal minds may differ on the best way to address my concerns, the purpose of these amendments is to unambiguously assert that the Port is a public asset which must always remain in the public trust.

I thank you in advance for your kind consideration of this matter.





WHEREAS, on March 30, 2012, the Board of Directors authorized the Port Authority of Guam (PAG) to initiate the procurement process with the Guam Economic Development Agency (GEDA) to solicit financial assistance in an amount up to \$15M to fund the service life extension repairs for the wharfs; and

WHEREAS, after some developments, the Board of Directors at its June 28, 2012 regular board meeting concurred with the issuance of the Request for Proposal (RFP) No. 12-014 for a commercial lending institution for the proposed financing of the Port's service life extension repairs on the Port's wharf; financial management system and top lifter with the total amount not to exceed Ten Million Dollars (\$10,000,000.00); and

WHEREAS, GEDA issued the RFP on September 14, 2012 and received three responses to the proposal. Two of the responses were deemed acceptable and the third withdrew its interest; and

WHEREAS, after a thorough analysis, the Evaluation Team scored and ranked the offerors based on their response to the request for proposal; and

WHEREAS, on October 26, 2012, the Negotiation Team met with Bank of Guam and was able to successfully negotiate the terms and conditions; and

WHEREAS, on January 22, 2013, it was made known to the Port Authority of Guam that Bank of Guam through review by their legal counsel, had expressed that the condition on closing the loan was for the Port Authority of Guam to waive its sovereign immunity; now therefore be it

RESOLVED, that the Port Authority of Guam Board of Directors approves to waive the Port Authority of Guam's sovereign immunity as a condition to close the loan and as well agrees to the commitment terms by Bank of Guam; and be it further
