II. INTRODUCTION, SUMMARY OF TESTIMONY & DISCUSSION

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COMMITTEE ON RULES OF I MENA TRENTAL DOS NA LIHESLATURAN GUÅHAN:

WHEREAS, I Liheslaturan Guåhan recognizes and acknowledges the clear connection between waste reduction, recycling, resource recovery and beneficial reuse issues and the need to change unsustainable consumption and production patterns while protecting and managing the natural resource base of economic and social development; and

WHEREAS, I Liheslaturan Guåhan finds that based on recent estimates, the expected life of the landfill will be 35-40 years, with the Military as a customer and 45-50 years without the Military. The life span of the landfill can be extended only with

effective implementation of waste reduction, recycling, resource recovery and beneficial reuse programs; and

WHEREAS, I Liheslaturan Guåhan recognizes that its work in establishing the Recycling Revolving Fund, Recycling Enterprise Zones at the Port Authority of Guam, and the Guam Beverage Recycling Act of 2010 were all steps towards the eventual establishing of a sustainable zero waste community for Guam; and

WHEREAS, developing and implementing a zero waste strategy should be measured, evaluated and achieved by utilizing current and accepted methodologies, such as environmental systems management and life cycle analysis, to support science based policies and operations; and

WHEREAS, Guam's limited and valuable land resource and fragile environment must be preserved and protected. The protection of the environment, both terrestrial and aquatic, stimulation of the economy, and distribution of equity can be achieved by promoting waste reduction, recycling, resource recovery and beneficial reuse through Zero Waste practices in the public and private sectors; and

WHEREAS, the use of the term "zero waste" includes "Zero Solid Waste", "Zero Hazardous Waste", "Zero Toxics" and "Zero Emissions." The goals of "zero waste" embody the need for a closed-looped waste management system, in which waste is a sign of inefficiency and the entire concept of waste should be eliminated; and

WHEREAS, waste should be thought of as a "residual product" or simply a "potential resource" for beneficial reuse to counter the basic acceptance of waste as a normal course of events. Zero Waste strategies consider the entire life-cycle of products, processes and systems in the context of a comprehensive systems understanding of our interactions with nature and the search for inefficiencies at all stages; and

WHEREAS, Zero Waste is a community-based model that aims to eliminate or minimize landfill disposal by the application of simple solutions and sustainable materials management systems that are healthy for our people, and our island; and WHEREAS, The Association of State and Territorial Solid Waste Management Officials has endorsed developing a Zero Waste Strategy, a significant component in implementing a comprehensive (waste) materials management program for small island developing states like Guam through both regulatory and cooperative environmental governance; and

WHEREAS, Because of its mission the Solid Waste Management Authority will have the primary responsibility for implementing the Guam Zero Waste Plan and developing the outreach and educational components required to educate and inform the public; and

WHEREAS, the Guam Environmental Protection Agency and its Division of Air and Land should work collaboratively with the Solid Waste Management Authority, and the Office of the Governor to synchronize its permitting process so that it will reflect and incorporate Zero Waste principals into all of permitting and monitoring functions and systems; and

WHEREAS, Zero Waste is a critical stepping stone to other necessary steps in the effort to protect health, improve equity, and reach sustainability. Zero Waste can be linked to sustainable agriculture, permaculture, architecture, energy, industrial, economic and community development; and

WHEREAS, a Zero Waste strategy supports all three of the generally accepted goals of sustainability, that is, environmental protection as well as economic and social well-being. Environmental protection is enhanced by reducing (ideally to zero) hazardous and solid wastes to nature and by reducing the need for energy generation and hydrocarbon extraction. Economic well-being is improved by enabling organizations to identify inefficiencies in processes, products and services and thereby to find cost-saving solutions to them.

WHERAS, Social well-being is enhanced through efficiency improvements that allow more resources to be available for all. In addition, more complete use of "wastes" may additionally create jobs in return logistics and reprocessing activities; and

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WHEREAS, I Liheslaturan Guåhan finds that the concept of "sustainable materials management," within the last several years, has increasingly captured the attention of environmental managers and the public. As recent discussions have focused on energy efficiency, resource conservation, the release of greenhouse gases, climate change and toxins, it has become increasingly clear that the way we manage and use materials, across their full life cycle, has a critical effect on the world's environmental health; and

WHEREAS, the United States Environmental Protection Agency has described the importance of how we manage materials in its report, Sustainable Materials Management: The Road Ahead (2009). In the report, EPA argued that, to ensure a sustainable society, we need to rethink how we manage materials – and indeed which materials we use by looking at the full life cycle of materials from extraction to production to use to disposal; and

WHEREAS, I Liheslaturan Guåhan is committed to protecting and enhancing environmental quality now and for future generations; and

WHEREAS, over one hundred thousand of tons of materials are generated in Guam each year by residents, businesses, organizations, and institutions, and approximately 85% of this amount is sent for landfill disposal; and

WHEREAS, the placement of materials in landfills can cause damage to human health, wastes natural resources, and irresponsibly transfers liabilities to future generations; and

WHEREAS, waste prevention, reuse, recycling, and composting are material management options that conserve resources while reducing environmental impacts; and

WHEREAS, increased recycling, permaculture and composting will increase the cost-efficiency of local publicly supported recycling facilities and programs; and WHEREAS, increased recycling saves energy, water, natural resources, reduces

air and water pollution, reduces the damage caused by extracting resources from the environment, and reduces the need for landfill facilities; and

WHEREAS, a resource recovery based economy will sustain, on a per-ton basis, up to ten times more jobs than land filling or incineration, and these jobs will be more productive and meaningful; and

WHEREAS, increasingly, U.S. and international governments and organizations are adopting the policy that the financial responsibility of collecting, recycling, and disposing of materials belongs with producers and importers; and

WHEREAS, recognizing that voluntary recycling goals have not, and in all probability cannot, achieve waste elimination; and

WHEREAS, the Zero Waste philosophy accepts that the earth's ability to support life is finite and that natural resources must be used in the most efficient and sustainable way possible; and

WHEREAS, the guiding principles of Zero Waste are: managing resources instead of waste; conserving natural resources through waste prevention and recycling; turning discarded resources into jobs and new products instead of trash; promoting products and materials that are durable and recyclable; and discouraging products and materials that can only become trash after their use; and

WHEREAS, I Liheslaturan Guåhan calls for the creation and implementation of a Guam Zero Waste Plan; and now therefore be it

RESOLVED, that the Committee on Rules of I Mina' Trentai Dos Na Liheslaturan Guåhan does hereby, on behalf of the people of Guam, call for the Guam Zero Waste Plan to be designed to achieve the initial goal of increasing waste diversion for the Government of Guam and for the island as a whole, to 60% or better

- 1 by the year 2016. The ultimate goal of the Guam Zero Waste Plan is to eliminate waste
- by 2022, thereby preserving the current landfill for generations to come, before having
- 3 to spend the hundreds of millions of dollars in resources needed to build another

This "Blueprint for Zero Waste" provides a critical first step as well as a path to help the Government of Guam (GovGuam) and people of Guam realize a vision of Zero Waste to preserve the environment for Guam's children and the juture.









EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Visioning

The most important part of any long journey is a vision for the future. On February 7, 2012, representatives of the Office of the Governor of Guam and key public and private-sector solid waste stakeholders met at the Ricardo J. Bordallo Governor's Complex in Adelup for a Zero Waste Visioning Session. During the Visioning Session, stakeholder input was sought regarding solid waste diversion opportunities and Zero Waste options with respect to the development of an overall Zero Waste Plan for Guani

Key Visioning Objectives

During the Visioning Session, Stakeholders emphasized the importance of implementing the following key strategies:

- **Develop targets:** Work with the Guam Legislature, GovGuam agencies, and Guam Council of Mayors to put a framework in place to achieve Zero Waste.
- Walk the talk: One of the most important keys to achieving the goal of Zero Waste is leadership. Adopt legislation and policies that favor Zero Waste.
- Use incentives in the right place: A continuous and constantly adapting flow of initiatives, solutions, and ideas are going to be required to achieve the goal of Zero Waste.
- Develop infrastructure for recycling and resource recovery: Although some
 initial help will be needed for GovGuam to get a Zero Waste Program operational, if the
 incentives afe in the right place, the private-sector and markets will assist in building and
 operating the infrastructure.
- Implement a marketing campaign: Publicize the Zero Waste Program to educate, engage, and inspire the community.
- **Develop an effective enforcement process:** Fund the necessary enforcement personnel, educate volunteers and follow through with fines and penalties.

Implementation Phasing Timeline

Initiatives that will be implemented through a combination of legislation and policy that will allow GovGuam and industry stakeholders to build a strong Zero Waste foundation.

PHASE I

Initiatives that will foster public/private and public/public partnerships, raise funds, and allocate staffing in support of additional initiatives.

Pifteen Zero Waste initiatives, selected from an initial list of a wide variety of upstream, midstream, and downstream source diversion options suggested by stakeholders on Guam, are evaluated in the Zero Waste Pfan. From a practical perspective, the legislation, policies, programs, and infrastructure needed to implement the fifteen initiatives described in the Zero Waste Plan cannot be implemented all at once. Therefore, the use of a phased approach over a 20-year planning period is recommended to implement an Island-wide Zero Waste Program,

PHASE III

Initiatives that will be implemented through additional legislation, as well as those that require more extensive research and planning.

LONG TERM 2025 AND BEYOND Initiatives that will include the expansion of existing policy and programs to broaden the scope of Zero Waste practices and move towards Guam's Zero Waste goals,



The development of a well-integrated Zero Waste system on Guam will be an evolving process. There will be political, technical, marketing, financial, and educational issues to address at each step.

Landfill Diversion Potential

Diversion of landfill waste, which is an over-arching goal of Guam's Zero Waste Plan, will be achieved with the implementation of the initiatives detailed in the plan. Typically, diversion successes

21-37% of materials diverted

increase as new or expanded programs mature due to increased operational efficiencies, greater public participation/acceptance, and established markets. A conservative estimate of the materials diverted from landfilling ranges from approximately 8,700 tons in 2015 (a 21% diversion rate) to 48,400 tons in 2030 (a 37% diversion rate). In the United States, the

national landfill diversion rate is 34%. Many communities have achieved

over 50% landfill diversion. San Francisco, a leading Zero Waste community, has achieved 80% landfill diversion. Achievement of similar percentages on Guam are likely to be tempered by low overall quantities (which increases unit costs and limits market leverage), limited local markets, and high over-seas transportation costs.


Zero Waste is an economic development tool as well as an environmental tool. Reuse, recycling, composting, and source reduction offer direct and substantial development opportunities. Both public and

private sector jobs, many of which are small business

opportunities, will be created with the implementation of a Zero Waste Program for Guam. Up to four full-time equivalent (FTE) GovGuam (i.e., public sector) lobs will be created for the duration of the Zero Waste planning period; as many as seven FTEs may be needed during the first two years of implementing the Zero Waste Program. In

the private sector, as many as seven new FTEs will be created in 2015, with up to thirty-seven FTEs by 2030 for materials processing on Guam. Additional offisland jobs will also be created for secondary processing and remanufacturing.



Funding Strategy

The use of a combination of internal (i.e., GovGuam) and external (i.e., federal and private foundation) funding sources to build a sustainable financial strategy is recommended. Initially, from a practical perspective, a combination of a


landfill tipping fee surcharge and a Gross Receipts Tax (GRT)

Projected savings by 2030 are almost \$4M per year

Rate surcharge is a potentially reasonable approach to funding a Zero Waste Program for Guam. Over time,

the use of a more diversified funding strategy, which potentially includes the addition of revenues generated by the various Zero Waste initiatives implemented and grant awards, should be phased-in.

The long-term savings and economic benefits from implementing a Zero Waste program will eventually dwarf the initial investment. However, while the long-term savings of Zero Waste programs may be significant, many of the program initiatives require several years of investment before savings can be achieved.





Positive Economic Impacts

Programmatic-level economic impacts from the implementation of a Zero Waste Program on Guam were developed using the initiatives evaluated in the Guam Zero Waste Plan. Estimated costs include potential expenses for program development and implementation, potential revenues generated from materials resale, and avoided landfill disposal costs. While the avoidance of landfill disposal costs does not represent a tangible revenue stream, these savings go directly to the bottom line of any solid waste management program, and are one of the primary long-term benefits of implementing a Zero Waste Program. Zero Waste on Guam is Revenue Positive The information presented in the table above clearly demonstrates that when both potential estimated revenues (i.e., material sales) and avoided landfill costs are considered, the aggregated initiatives expected to be implemented by GovGuam in Phase I and III are revenue positive throughout the planning period, with the exception of initially capitalizing on large initiative. The Phase II initiatives, which will most likely be developed by the private and non-profit sectors, will need to off-set capital and annual cost expenditures with facility tip fees, grant funding and other resources.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COMMITTEE ON RULES OF I MUNA

TRENTAI DOS NA LIHESLATURAN GUÅHAN:

WHEREAS, I Liheslaturan Guåhan recognizes and acknowledges the clear connection between waste reduction, recycling, resource recovery and beneficial reuse issues and the need to change unsustainable consumption and production patterns while protecting and managing the natural resource base of economic and social development; and

WHEREAS, I Liheslaturan Guåhan finds that based on recent estimates, the expected life of the landfill will be 35-40 years, with the Military as a customer and 45-50 years without the Military. The life span of the landfill can be extended only with effective implementation of waste reduction, recycling, resource recovery and beneficial reuse programs; and

WHEREAS, I Liheslaturan Guåhan recognizes that its work in establishing the Recycling Revolving Fund, Recycling Enterprise Zones at the Port Authority of Guam, and the Guam Beverage Recycling Act of 2010 were all steps towards the eventual establishing of a sustainable zero waste community for Guam; and

WHEREAS, developing and implementing a zero waste strategy should be measured, evaluated and achieved by utilizing current and accepted methodologies, such as environmental systems management and life cycle analysis, to support science based policies and operations; and

WHEREAS, Guam's limited and valuable land resource and fragile environment must be preserved and protected. The protection of the environment, both terrestrial and aquatic, stimulation of the economy, and distribution of equity can be achieved by promoting waste reduction, recycling, resource recovery and beneficial reuse through Zero Waste practices in the public and private sectors; and

WHEREAS, the use of the term "zero waste" includes "Zero Solid Waste", "Zero Hazardous Waste", "Zero Toxics" and "Zero Emissions." The goals of "zero waste" embody the need for a closed-looped waste management system, in which waste is a sign of inefficiency and the entire concept of waste should be eliminated; and

WHEREAS, waste should be thought of as a "residual product" or simply a "potential resource" for beneficial reuse to counter the basic acceptance of waste as a normal course of events. Zero Waste strategies consider the entire life-cycle of products, processes and systems in the context of a comprehensive systems understanding of our interactions with nature and the search for inefficiencies at all stages; and

WHEREAS, Zero Waste is a community-based model that aims to eliminate or minimize landfill disposal by the application of simple solutions and sustainable materials management systems that are healthy for our people, and our island; and WHEREAS, The Association of State and Territorial Solid Waste Management Officials has endorsed developing a Zero Waste Strategy, a significant component in implementing a comprehensive (waste) materials management program for small island developing states like Guam through both regulatory and cooperative environmental governance; and

WHEREAS, Because of its mission the Solid Waste Management Authority will have the primary responsibility for implementing the Guam Zero Waste Plan and developing the outreach and educational components required to educate and inform the public; and

WHEREAS, the Guam Environmental Protection Agency and its Division of Air and Land should work collaboratively with the Solid Waste Management Authority, and the Office of the Governor to synchronize its permitting process so that it will reflect and incorporate Zero Waste principals into all of permitting and monitoring functions and systems; and

WHEREAS, Zero Waste is a critical stepping stone to other necessary steps in the effort to protect health, improve equity, and reach sustainability. Zero Waste can be linked to sustainable agriculture, permaculture, architecture, energy, industrial, economic and community development; and

WHEREAS, a Zero Waste strategy supports all three of the generally accepted goals of sustainability, that is, environmental protection as well as economic and social well-being. Environmental protection is enhanced by reducing (ideally to zero) hazardous and solid wastes to nature and by reducing the need for energy generation and hydrocarbon extraction. Economic well-being is improved by enabling organizations to identify inefficiencies in processes, products and services and thereby to find cost-saving solutions to them.

WHERAS, Social well-being is enhanced through efficiency improvements that allow more resources to be available for all. In addition, more complete use of "wastes" may additionally create jobs in return logistics and reprocessing activities; and

and

WHEREAS, I Liheslaturan Guåhan finds that the concept of "sustainable materials management," within the last several years, has increasingly captured the attention of environmental managers and the public. As recent discussions have focused on energy efficiency, resource conservation, the release of greenhouse gases, climate change and toxins, it has become increasingly clear that the way we manage and use materials, across their full life cycle, has a critical effect on the world's environmental health; and

WHEREAS, the United States Environmental Protection Agency has described the importance of how we manage materials in its report, Sustainable Materials Management: The Road Ahead (2009). In the report, EPA argued that, to ensure a sustainable society, we need to rethink how we manage materials – and indeed which materials we use by looking at the full life cycle of materials from extraction to production to use to disposal; and

WHEREAS, I Liheslaturan Guåhan is committed to protecting and enhancing environmental quality now and for future generations; and

WHEREAS, over one hundred thousand of tons of materials are generated in Guam each year by residents, businesses, organizations, and institutions, and approximately 85% of this amount is sent for landfill disposal; and

WHEREAS, the placement of materials in landfills can cause damage to human health, wastes natural resources, and irresponsibly transfers liabilities to future generations; and

WHEREAS, waste prevention, reuse, recycling, and composting are material management options that conserve resources while reducing environmental impacts;

WHEREAS, increased recycling, permaculture and composting will increase the cost-efficiency of local publicly supported recycling facilities and programs; and

WHEREAS, increased recycling saves energy, water, natural resources, reduces air and water pollution, reduces the damage caused by extracting resources from the environment, and reduces the need for landfill facilities; and

WHEREAS, a resource recovery based economy will sustain, on a per-ton basis, up to ten times more jobs than land filling or incineration, and these jobs will be more productive and meaningful; and

WHEREAS, increasingly, U.S. and international governments and organizations are adopting the policy that the financial responsibility of collecting, recycling, and disposing of materials belongs with producers and importers; and

WHEREAS, recognizing that voluntary recycling goals have not, and in all probability cannot, achieve waste elimination; and

WHEREAS, the Zero Waste philosophy accepts that the earth's ability to support life is finite and that natural resources must be used in the most efficient and sustainable way possible; and

WHEREAS, the guiding principles of Zero Waste are: managing resources instead of waste; conserving natural resources through waste prevention and recycling; turning discarded resources into jobs and new products instead of trash; promoting products and materials that are durable and recyclable; and discouraging products and materials that can only become trash after their use; and

WHEREAS, I Liheslaturan Guåhan calls for the creation and implementation of a Guam Zero Waste Plan; and now therefore be it

RESOLVED, that the Committee on Rules of *I Mina' Trentai Dos Na Liheslaturan Guåhan* does hereby, on behalf of the people of Guam, call for the Guam Zero Waste Plan to be designed to achieve the initial goal of increasing waste diversion for the Government of Guam and for the island as a whole, to 60% or better

by the year 2016. The ultimate goal of the Guam Zero Waste Plan is to eliminate waste

2 by 2022, thereby preserving the current landfill for generations to come, before having

3 to spend the hundreds of millions of dollars in resources needed to build another

4 landfill, and be it further
