

The public hearing was adjourned at 2:17PM.



The federal Act marks a national embrace of similar sentencing safety valves that have been enacted by legislatures in some eight states and counting. Like its state counterparts, the federal legislation is a sound way to reduce prison populations and save money, while at the same time protecting public safety. The federal Act seeks only to codify what has been described as an "common-sense" understanding that while mandatory minimum sentences may be appropriate in many cases, they are certainly not so in every case, especially those cases involving nonviolent offenders.

I Libeslaturan Guahan finds that giving courts more flexibility in sentencing will only improve upon our justice system, as scarce prison beds will be reserved first and foremost to keep the public safe from truly violent offenders. Thank you for providing me with the opportunity to submit testimony regarding *Bill No. 14-33(COR)*, *AN ACT TO ADD A NEW §80.39 TO ARTICLE 2, CHAPTER 80, TITLE 9 GUAM CODE ANNOTATED RLEATIVE TO EMPOWERING THE COURTS OF GUAM TO DEPART FROM APPLICABLE MANDATORY MINIMUM SENTENCES UNDER SPECIFIC CONDITIONS, AND FOR OTHER PURPOSES*, introduced by Senator Tina Rose Muña Barnes.

The Judiciary of Guam does not object to any legislation that provides Judges with the authority to utilize their education and training, courtroom experience, and judicial discretion to determine appropriate sentences for convicted defendants. Because judges must stand for retention every 7 years before the electorate, and it is through this statutory mechanism that they are held accountable for their actions.

However, have a few concerns regarding the bill as draft. First, the reporting requirements contained in §80.39.3 appears to be more appropriate satisfied by the Office of the Attorney General. Negotiated plea agreements typically involve some movement away from maximum penalties allowable under the law (although not mandatory sentences). These plea agreements, which are proposed by the Office of the Attorney General, include recommended sentences that are carefully considered by Judges. The reasoning behind such recommendations stems from the parties involved. The same would be true with any departures from mandatory sentences.

Second, the provision contained in §80.39.4 should be closely examined given the fiscal challenges being experienced by the Department of Corrections as the Judiciary of Guam could not quantify any potential savings to court operations should this bill be enacted.

Finally, the current format of the bill is not in conformance with the formatting scheme of the Compiler's Office. I suggest that the provisions be renumbered as attached. Thank-you for your consideration.

ATTACHMENT

"§80.39. Title. This Section shall be known and may be cited as Justice Safety Valve Act of 2013.

§80.39.1. Sentencing.

- (a) Sentencing.(A)-Notwithstanding any other provision of law, when sentencing a person convicted of a violation for which there is a mandatory minimum sentence, but which did not:
 - (1) Linclude the use, attempted use or threatened use of serious physical force by the defendant against another person or result in the serious physical injury of another person by the defendant; or
 - (2) Involve any sexual contact offense by the defendant against a minor (other than an offense involving sexual conduct where the victim was at least 16 years old and the offender was not more than four years older than the victim and the sexual conduct was consensual);
- (B) The court may depart from the applicable mandatory minimum sentence if the court finds substantial and compelling reasons on the record that, in giving due regard to the nature of the crime, history and character of the defendant and his or her chances of successful rehabilitation that: (1) I imposition of the mandatory minimum would result in substantial injustice to the defendant; and (2) The mandatory minimum sentence is not necessary for the protection of the public.
- §80.39.2. (b) Exceptions. Subsection (a) Section 80.39.1 of this Article shall not apply if the court finds that:
 - (1) The individual has a conviction for the same offense during the tenyear period prior to the commission of the offense:
 - (2) The individual intentionally uses<u>d</u> a firearm in a manner that causes physical injury during the commission of the offense: or
 - (3) The individual was the leader, manager, or supervisor of others in a continuing criminal enterprise.
- §80.39.3. (c) Reporting. Upon departing from mandatory minimum sentences, judges shall report to Judicial Council which shall, one year following the enactment of this statute and annually thereafter, make available in electronic form and on the World Wide Web, a report as to the number of departures from mandatory minimum sentences made by each judge of the Superior Court of Guam.
- §80.39.4. (d) Reinvestment. Twenty-five (25) percent of the savings realized as a result of this act shall revert to the general fund to advance evidence-based practices shown to reduce recidivism."

COMMENTS TO BILL No. 14-33(COR)

AN ACT TO ADD A NEW \$80-39 TO ARTICLE 2, CHAPTER 80, TITLE 9 GUAM CODE ANNOTATED KNOWN AS THE JUSTICE SAFETY VALVE ACT OF 2013 RELATIVE TO EMPOWERING THE COURTS OF GUAM TO DEPART FROM APPLICABLE MANDATORY MINIMUM SENTENCES UNDER SPECIFIC CONDITIONS. AND FOR OTHER PURPOSE.

According to the proposed Bill's Legislative Findings and Intent, I Liheslaturan Guähon seeks to allow the Guam Courts the ability to impose sentences below the mandatory minimum sentence under specific conditions. It is anticipated that giving the courts more flexibility in sentencing will help improve our justice system and reserve scarce prison beds for the totally violent offenders. The Bill also provides for the reinvestment of twenty-five percent (25%) of any realized savings as a result of this Act to revert to the General Fund to support advance evidence-based practices to reduce recidivism.

Per written testimony, the Judiciary of Guam supports the intent of the proposed measure, however, is concerned with the provision of the reinvestment as the Judiciary of Guam cannot quantify any potential savings to court operations and suggest it be closely examined given the fiscal challenges being experienced by the Department of Corrections (DOC) and its growing population. Furthermore, the Office of Public Accountability (OPA) on its Audit Report No. 14-06 on DOC's Prison Capacity Planning cites that DOC lacks a prison capacity plan to effectively manage its growing prisoner (inmates/detainees) population and currently has the highest pre-trial detention rate in the world.

In closing, the Bureau would like to note that the proposed Bill does not include language on how the "realized savings" would be monitored between the Judiciary of Guam and the DOC. In addition, since the Bill is proposing that savings be reverted to the General Fund, if enacted, would entail an appropriation from the General Fund for the specific purpose of supporting evidence-based practices to reduce recidivism by the Judiciary of Guam and/or the DOC.


